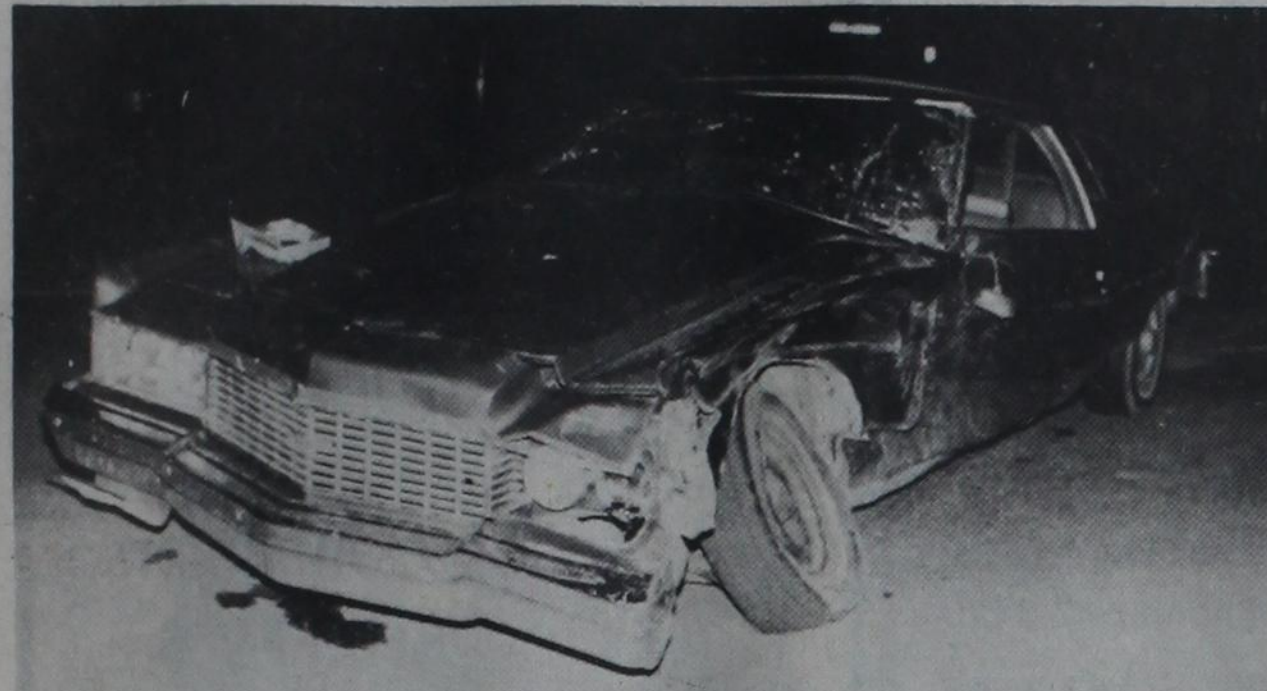

Five persons injured in 'double' accidents

A Dimmitt businessman was seriously injured last Wednesday night when his motorcycle collided with a car at West Bedford and Northwest Fifth. Then, four persons were hurt when a police car route to the accident collided broadside with another car in front of Colonial Inn.

At about 11 p.m., Jerry McGuire on his 1980 AMC Harley Davidson motorcycle collided with a 1974 Chevrolet Impala driven by Emilia Rojas Mares at the intersection of West Bedford and Northwest Fifth, near Allsup's. The accident is still under investigation.

McGuire has multiple fractures of one leg and is in High Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo. Local police officers were at Chief Ron Mitchell's home at the airport when the accident call came. They traveled in three vehicles toward Dimmitt on US 385 to cover the accident.

The lead police car was a 1976 Plymouth driven by Calvin Davenport, 22, with city patrolman Paul Horn, 21, as passenger. The siren was on.

County approves free-cheese program

Free cheese will be available to Castro County citizens the first part of July, if all goes well. The County Commissioners approved the cheese program in its Monday meeting.

County Judge Mrs. M. L. (Polly) Simpson said that she had received calls from people wanting the free cheese. The state-supported program is available in various cities for

needy people and low-income families, she added.

"The people who have been calling do not qualify, as far as I can see," the judge said.

The commissioners approved the cheese program with a vote of three to one. Commissioner Jimmie Howell said that he did not approve the program because "it'll be more hassle than it's worth."

The program will be handled through Castro County Community Action. The distribution dates will be set later, according to Wannie Stevens of CCCA.

County Attorney Jimmy Davis presented a resolution to the county governing board for its approval. The resolution will formalize the new boundaries of both the Commissioner's precincts and the

Justice of the Peace precincts and will make them identical. Sixteen voting boxes will be located throughout the county so that four boxes will be located in each of the four precincts.

The commissioners decided to view a map before approving the resolution. Also, the words "along the center of" needed to be added in the

boundary description of Precinct 3. In other business, the county board: —Discussed supporting the Panhandle Alcoholic Recovery Center's social detoxification program. Mrs. Simpson will attend a meeting today (Thursday) in Amarillo to learn more about the program. PARC's figures

indicated that Castro County has an estimated alcoholic population of 739 and affecting 2,956 other people. —Decided to fill out and return a questionnaire from the Governor's Budget and Planning Office concerning block grants. —Heard a report that the Expo Building took in \$250 in May with expenditures of \$314.32.

A Hart man was killed in a hit-and-run accident Sunday morning between Dimmitt and Hart on SH 194.

Someone reported to the Castro County Sheriff's office at about 5:42 a.m. that he had seen a man lying on the highway.

Juan Alfredo Avila was apparently run over at about 5:30 a.m. on SH 194, about 6.7 miles southwest of Dimmitt.

The 25-year-old man was taken to Plains Memorial Hospital, and Justice of the Peace Marshall Young pronounced him dead at 6:30 a.m. An autopsy report revealed that Avila was possibly hit by two automobiles — a larger vehicle first, then a smaller vehicle.

The farm laborer had resided in Hart for about a month. He was born Oct. 2, 1956, in Juarez, Mexico.

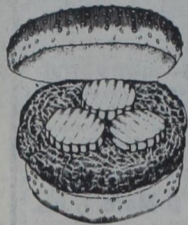

Tuesday will be "Charley Hill Day" in all ASCS county offices in Texas, according to Charles Wayne Mayfield, ASCS state executive director.

Tuesday will also be "Charley Hill Day" in Castro County, according to a proclamation by County Judge Mrs. M. L. Simpson.

Hill will receive the 1981-82 Administrator's Award for Service to Agriculture along with nine other county executive directors across the nation. He will be presented his award at the state office in Austin.

"He received the award for

his commendable service to the young people of Texas by encouraging them to excel in agricultural careers," said David R. Adams, acting district director.

During Hill's career here, Castro County has become an intensified agricultural area with multiple irrigated crops and a high level of producer participation in ASCS programs.

Also during his 40 years of service, he has been an active participant in the county's 4-H and FFA groups, livestock shows, and has coached Little League baseball, Little Dribblers basketball and tennis.

He is a Nazareth School Board member; officer in the Nazareth Lions Club, member of the American Legion Post, and is active in church affairs, especially the Knights of Columbus.

Condition of grain storage is important

When determining a farmer's eligibility for commodity loans or the grain reserve program, the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service considers the condition of the storage structure and the commodity stored within the structure.

"Grain under loan must be stored in approved on-farm facilities or in commercial warehouses," county ASC official Melvin Barton said. Farm program participants are responsible for any loss in quality or quantity of farm-stored grain.

The probability of insect infestation, moisture damage and mold growth increases when grain is stored and left undisturbed in the same location for several months. Rapid insect development usually occurs during the

spring, summer and early fall. "Grain inspections are particularly important during these months," Barton said. Storage bins must be cleaned and sprayed thoroughly from top to bottom, inside and out. Old grain, trash and weeds must be removed from around the bin and kept from growing or accumulating during storage.

Because temperature differences develop within the structure when surface and perimeter areas of the grain cool, stored grain collects moisture that may shift from one location to another. Moisture from warm grain shifts to cooler parts of the structure, causing damp areas within the grain that favor insect activity and mold development. These, in turn, cause rapid deterioration and heating of the grain.

Barton said farm-stored grain should be inspected at least every three weeks, and more often if problems arise. When there's evidence of insects, farmers are required to treat the grain with a fumigant.

"We encourage program participants to continue using proper grain storage procedures and to contact our office any time they are in doubt as to the condition of farm-stored grain," the ASCS official said.

Ruidoso-Sunland Inc. Horsemanship camp names Kemp to board to be held at WTSU

It's understandable why Carl Lee Kemp is so acclimated to the horse racing industry.

"My father, Carl, raised horses for many years," said the 40-year-old native of Dimmitt. "I farm and ranch both and have a cattle business. We've raised horses all our lives." Because of that background, Kemp has been elected to the Ruidoso-Sunland, Inc. board of directors. The board is the governing body of Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park race tracks in southern New Mexico. Kemp currently operates 5 1/2 sections of irrigated farm land 10 miles southwest of Dimmitt.

Born and raised in Dimmitt, he graduated from high school here in 1965. He and his wife, Sue, have five children: Shawn, 17; Shannon, 16; Corey, 12; Burt, 14 and Duke, 10.

He owns 27 broodmares, including Sound of Music, the granddam of Super Sound Charge. Super Sound Charge, named the 1980 World Champion Quarter Running Horse, won such prestigious events as the Los Alamitos Championship at Los Alamitos Race Course near Los Angeles, the Josies Bar Handicap, the Vessels Maturity and the Go Man Go Handicap.

"We also run and train our own horses and send them to Sunland Park and Ruidoso Downs," Kemp said. "We have six in training now. The quarter horses include Fire the Bow, Rainbow's Duke and Playful Mood."

Kemp also owns interests in several outstanding stallions. He has a share in quarter horse racing's all-time leading sire, Easy Jet; the swift thoroughbred Hemen, who has been an outstanding sire of quarter horses; Super Sound Charge, who enjoyed a productive racing career; 21 and Change, Wee Folk and El Natural.

Kemp has been a member of the Ruidoso Jockey Club for the past 13 years. The Jockey Club purchased both Sunland Park and Ruidoso Downs from the Fortuna Corp. in the fall of 1978.

But this is his first opportunity to serve in an administrative position with the Ruidoso-Sunland, Inc. board of directors, a wholly owned subsidiary of the Jockey Club.

"When they called and asked if I'd consider running, I was really pleased," Kemp said. "It was a big honor and I hope I can make a significant contribution."

With the \$2.4 million improvement project in effect for the season's 76-day race season, Kemp is more than optimistic about the future of the Lincoln County racing facility.

"I think it's just going up from here," said Kemp. "The handle will be way up. The efficiency of serving the patrons will be much better. Ruidoso Downs is no longer a bush-league track. It's a big-time business. I really don't see any end to where it's going to go."

The Dimmitt businessman said it's possible Ruidoso Downs could have a daily mutuel handle average of \$1 million within five years.

"The way the purses are going up and the way the facility has been expanded has really helped," Kemp said. "The way the patrons are being accommodated is so much better. They can now

bet easier and collect easier with the new computerized mutuel machines. The facilities are more pleasant, and the surroundings are so nice.

"It all works in a big circle. With better facilities, more people can attend the races, the mutuel handle will go up and then the purses will increase. That will attract better horsemen and better horses. That's why it's very possible we can do \$1 million a day in maybe five years."

While Ruidoso Downs is the current focus of Southwest racing with its improvements, Kemp said Sunland Park, located six miles west of downtown El Paso, also figures prominently in the board of directors' plans.

"The attendance at both Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park has been going up every year," Kemp said. "I'm sure we'll see Sunland Park get improvements and El Paso keeps getting bigger and bigger. Sunland Park will start to get added support from El Paso, and that's what really helps business, when more people become interested."

"I see nothing but the best for both tracks. I'm pleased to be on the board of directors and hope I can help with the growth of both operations," he added.

An adult horsemanship camp will be held at the West Texas State University horse center next week. Beginning Monday, a variety of horse care, management, training and Western and English riding activities have been planned for the workshop.

Instructor Gary Marble recently said that participants will be able to concentrate their efforts on skills they need most for their work with horses or for success in showing, training or just enjoying horses.

Techniques will be used to improve riding and horse-control skills including video taping, group lessons, trail rides and games on horseback

that have value in improving horsemanship.

Some of the more unique lessons that campers may want to practice will include loading horses into the trailers, backing trailers and catching the devious horses. Learning by doing safely will be emphasized throughout the week.

Becky Simmons of Alanreed will assist Marble in all areas of instruction. She is a graduate of William Woods Equine Program in Fulton, Mo., and is a specialist in teaching English riding, riding hunters and jumpers.

Christian betrayal**

There is little that I could say that could add to the outcry of multitudes of Christians and Christian leaders who are outraged at the recent statements of Evangelist Billy Graham regarding the supposed religious freedom inside Soviet Russia.

A quote from the Miami Herald says, "The Rev. Billy Graham says that he saw no religious repression...in Moscow...Surely the renowned American evangelist simply did not look."

Sergei Soldatov, a former Soviet prisoner is quoted as saying, "The first thing that is going to happen is that the Soviet propaganda machine is going to capitalize and emphasize the words Graham said."

Soldatov's predictions are already coming true. Radio Moscow, the Soviet Union's most powerful radio station, reaching many areas of the world is using Graham's statements to back Soviet claims to be a nation of peace and religious freedom.

Like the Presbyterian minister Carl McIntire has said so many times on the radio, "Russia wants piece; a piece of this and a piece of that until they have it all."

One very knowledgeable person said of religious conditions in Marxist nations, "This is one of the greatest and most tragic blows ever to Soviet Christians. Graham has handed the communist authorities the greatest weapon they have ever had to use against Christians - and they are using the weapon now."

Graham acknowledged, "I would like to come back and preach in many places throughout the country, if I am invited and all things work out."

Newsweek magazine asked the question, "But at what price, Soviet Christians are now asking, and to whose profit?"

Apparently stung by the outcry, Graham hurried back to New York stating that he wanted to meet the press, "as quickly as possible" to straighten out what he said were remarks "quoted out of context or misconstrued."

However, when challenged during the course of the press conference, Graham had to admit that he had been quoted correctly in the statements he was alleged to have made.

Why did Graham make the visit at all? Graham said, "I knew that I might be used for propaganda. But I felt the risk was worthwhile from the point of view that I was able to proclaim the Gospel of Christ in the capital of the Soviet Union."

But at whose risk? The risk that Graham was prepared to undermine and betray the persecuted Christians by

openly aligning himself with their persecutors.

I see little difference in what Graham did and what Saul of Tarsus did when he held the clothes of those who stoned Stephen as recorded in the seventh chapter of Acts.

Graham aligned himself with the Soviet officials in collaborating their lies about religious freedom in Soviet Russia.

I am thankful that Billy Graham still preaches the Gospel of Christ and no doubt, he has won far more persons to saving faith in Christ than I ever will, due to the outreach he has. But I cannot understand why, except for personal ego, that he would align himself with a godless communist nation who is against all that he is supposed to stand for!

Compromise with modernists, humanists, atheists, etc. does more to ruin the effectiveness of the Gospel of Christ than almost anything else that a Christian could do

and Rev. Graham has done just that in the biggest way possible. Mr. Graham owes a public apology to all Christians who hold dear the principles of Christianity and Christian separation from the ungodly, and especially the Christians in Soviet Russia and similar countries where their religious freedoms have been destroyed or where they worship anyway at the expense of imprisonment or death if they get caught.

I am a fundamental, independent Baptist who dearly cherishes the religious freedom that we have in the good old USA, but if Billy Graham says that there is religious freedom in Soviet Russia, what would he say about our religious freedom if our country should become like Russia?

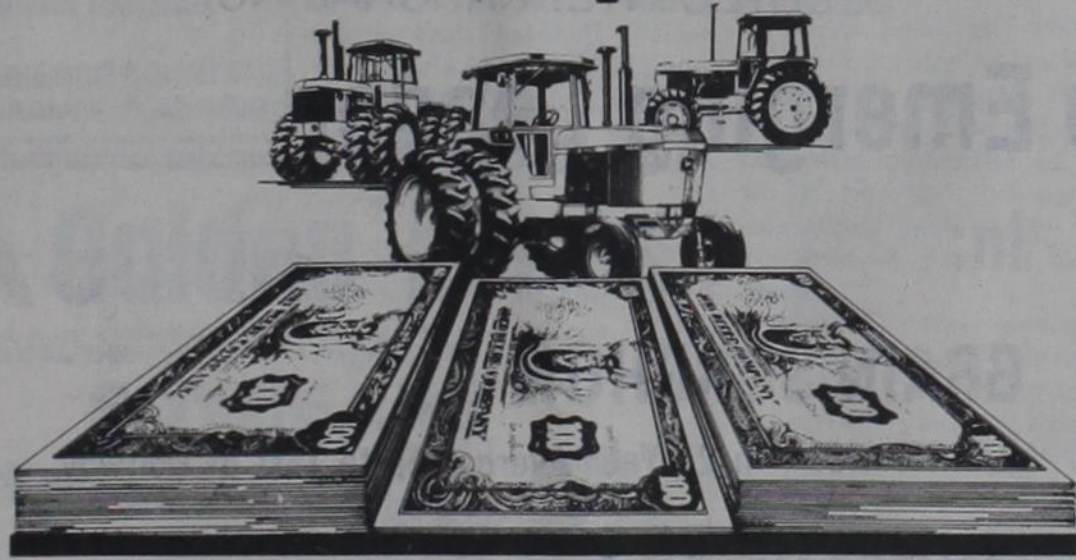

Limit student stock-show trips?

With students missing two to seven weeks of classes to compete in spring livestock shows, should the school limit the number of shows they can enter?

The Dimmitt School Board agonized for two hours over this question Monday night, but took no definite action.

A motion by Fred Bruegel Jr. to limit vo-ag students to two stock shows a year outside the county died for lack of a second. Instead, board members decided to talk to vo-ag teachers, get their suggestions and "try to get something worked out" to cut down on the stock-show schedule that took 60 high school students out of school for an average of 9.65 days each last spring.

The emotional two-hour discussion came during a study of student absenteeism caused by extracurricular

activities.

The study showed that 60 DHS students missed an average of 9.65 days of school last year to compete in stock shows in Hereford, Amarillo, El Paso, Houston, Denver and other cities, under the banner of either FFA or 4-H.

Also, 50 middle school students missed an average of 6.65 days each for stock shows last year, with two students missing 35½ days each, the study showed.

The survey pinpointed stock shows as the main extracurricular source of student absenteeism, ahead of band, choir and athletics.

In the high school, 144 students missed an average of 3.42 days for band activities, 108 students missed an average of 1.8 days for athletics, and 253 students missed an average of 2.14 days for "other" extracurricular

activities (UIL literary events, choir trips, industrial art shows, cheerleading, FHA activities, etc.)

In the Middle School, 29 students missed an average of 3.03 days for choir trips, 106 students were out an average of 2.56 days for athletics, seven students missed an average of 1.5 days due to band activities, and 16 CVAE students missed a day apiece.

Class time missed by faculty members due to school-sanctioned trips and extracurricular activities ranged from one to 11 days for coaches, seven and 11 days for the two band directors, 23½ days for vo-ag teacher Ed Standlee and 38½ days for vo-ag instructor Larry Gray.

Comparing the latest absenteeism survey with the original one of 1976-77, Bruegel commented, "It's obvious that the problem (of stock-show absences) is getting worse."

Supt. Robert Ryan explained that stock-show

participation has grown gradually during the last eight years, with more distant shows involved, and that the high school started sending both vo-ag teachers on the student trips in 1974-75 because of parents' demands. Bruegel and Deanne Clark maintained that academic progress suffers both for those missing class and for those left in class with a substitute teacher.

But Glenn Odom was quick to defend the entire stock-show program and the time it required, arguing that students must maintain good grades to participate and that the shows "provide an incentive for them to keep up their studies."

Noting that Dimmitt High School's FFA chapter has been a consistent winner in individual advancement awards for the past several years, Odom told the other board members, "I don't know whether this means much to you, but it means a

lot to me in its importance to my kids, and for these kids to earn these advancements they've got to have some outside exposure and experience."

Every school board member has had children competing in stock shows, and none questioned the value of the youngsters' livestock projects. But the discussion got lively on whether, and how, to impose restrictions to cut absenteeism.

Monty Boozer, objecting to any school-imposed limitation, said it should be the parents' responsibility to determine how many stock shows their children compete in.

"The school board should not assume authority that should be left to parents," Boozer said.

But Don Gregory countered that if the board decided it could not limit the number of stock-show trips a student can take, "then what's to keep the choir from going to six or seven contests if they want to and if their parents want them to? I think we've got to have

the authority to limit these activities."

Board president Charles Wales commented that participation in livestock shows "is the only thing we haven't limited or controlled." He said he favored serving notice to vo-ag students "to cut down voluntarily, or you're going to face regulation, because this has gotten out of hand."

But Ryan said that if the school tries to regulate FFA members, "a lot of the kids will simply go the 4-H route and there would be nothing we could do about it" because a special provision in school policy that sanctions activities of the state-sponsored 4-H program.

After Bruegel's motion for a limit died for lack of a second, members agreed to toss the issue back to the vo-ag department for a possible self-regulating solution.

"I'm willing to give them eight or nine months to take the initiative, but by next March I want to see some results," Wales said.

Hand-gun course may be offered

Hand-gun classes for men and women will be offered in mid-July, if enough interest is shown.

The sessions will include classroom instruction and hand-gun practice. Although there will be no charge for the class, participants will have to furnish their own revolvers.

Chief Mitchell gives reaction

To the Citizens of Dimmitt:

Since it is not possible to contact all of you personally, I take this means of expressing to you my feelings.

When I came to Dimmitt Feb. 1, 1980, I was looking for a place to make my home and raise my children. I have never been made to feel more at home or more welcome in a community.

It has certainly been my pleasure to serve as your police chief for the last two years and five months. When I came to Dimmitt I had two patrolmen and one sergeant, and the two patrolmen had made plans to leave, and did leave a short time later. Since that time we have had a high turnover in personnel. This is a problem that existed when I came and has existed for a number of years. I have not been able to hire adequately trained officers, due largely to salary and the reputation Dimmitt has had for changing chiefs. I assure you that

changing chiefs will not make this problem go away. I know of no one that has a magic wand to wave and solve this very serious situation.

I was not made aware of any complaints against me or any serious complaint against the patrolmen who worked for me. In fact, I was told by the mayor a short time ago that they had had no complaints. So it was a shock to me when I was called in last Wednesday night and asked to resign.

I don't know at this time if we will be leaving Dimmitt. It is certainly not our desire to do this. It is a very heart-breaking experience to feel as we do about a community and to have to pull up roots and leave.

The only apologies I make are to the citizens of Dimmitt for not being able to provide you with the kind of police department you so richly deserve. Kay and I thank all of you from the bottom of our hearts.

YOUR CITY AT WORK

I can recall a time when the city park was a source of pride for the entire community. The park was properly maintained at all times, and I think city residents could take their whole family to the park for fun and recreation. Special interest clubs were always involved in new projects such as planting new shrubs and flowers to dress up certain sections of the park. Tennis courts and baseball fields were also added for community use. We certainly had no major problems with vandal-

ism or abuse in the park itself.

In recent years, our city park has taken on a new and different appearance. The shrubs, grass, trees and flowers have been neglected. The building at the park has been a constant source of vandalism. The rest room facilities have been torn up or torn out each time they are repaired. One of the restroom doors was actually ripped out of the wall.

At one point, city employees put up a sign which stated a \$200 fine for destruction of city property. The sign itself was even vandalized and had to be removed. Even the basketball goals have been removed or bent all out of shape.

Most Dimmitt residents that I have talked to in regard to the park would like to see its present condition changed back to its original condition. I feel the same way; however, I'm not sure we can deal with the problem of constant vandalism.

Our police officers will maintain periodic patrols of the park area, but the vandalism occurs when there is no one in authority present. I would appreciate your own personal opinion or comments on how to deal with vandalism at the city parks. I would like to invite you to come by the office to discuss the matter or drop me a note at P. O. Box 146. I have indicated that I would like to see the park restored to its original condition; however, I hesitate to spend city funds unless we can control the vandalism.

Herbal teas need caution

Some herb teas may have possible side effects that are more, than just relaxing, says Dr. Cass Ryan-Crowe, a food and nutrition specialist on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Reports have shown that senna tea can cause abdominal cramps and watery diarrhea, the specialist points out. Deaths have even been reported in Africa from ingesting overdoses of senna preparations, she adds.

Chamomile, made from flower heads, can cause anaphylactic shock, an unusual or exaggerated reaction to a foreign protein, or allergic rhinitis in persons sensitive to ragweed pollen, she explains.
