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"Trade at Home." An old worn-out slogan maybe, but when carefully analyzed it still has meat. Dimmitt merchants are no different than merchants anywhere, for instance Tulsa, Hereford, Plainview, Lubbock, Amarillo or Tumbucktoo. They are here because they looked the community over and decided that it would be a good place to cast their lot. They invested what money they had, could borrow, or thought was necessary, to buy equipment, fixtures, stock, etc., in order to attract the trade of the area. They didn't ask anybody to guarantee them a thing, they saw the need for the type of service or merchandise, they were prepared to offer and it was their own decision to locate in this fair little city. Naturally, being a resident and operating a business here, or in any town, the businessman takes pride in his town and if he has any sense at all he wants his business to grow and his town to prosper. There may be times, when unthoughtfully, he will parrot the old worn out slogan, "Trade at Home." He doesn't mean it. In an effort to prove to the tradespeople of the area, that their needs can be taken care of in Dimmitt, some thirty odd firms are in the midst of an advertising campaign called "Parade of Values" just to make you a little more conscious of the services that can be had at home. Turn to page five, six and seven of this issue of the News, you will find advertised there almost any commodity or service that you could possibly need. If I was a merchant I would never tell you that you should trade at home, but being only a printer, a sort of a bystander as it were, I can tell you that you are sort of dopey if you don't trade at home. You get a good deal and guaranteed fair treatment.

Three Delegates Go To Boys' And Girls' State

Paralyn Render, Rodney Hutto and Charles Kuntz will represent Dimmitt at Girls' and Boys' State this month in Austin.

Miss Render, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Render, is sponsored by the American Legion Auxiliary. She will attend Texas Bluebonnet Girls' State to be held June 15-24 at the School for the Blind in Austin.

Hutto, son of Mr. and Mrs. S. R. Hutto, is sponsored by the American Legion and Kuntz, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Kuntz, is sponsored by another organization through the American Legion. They will attend Boys' State June 11-18 on the University of Texas campus in Austin.

The delegates are chosen on the basis of leadership, scholarship, character, honesty, cooperativeness, physical fitness and personality. The high school student senate and faculty each submit a list of names of three boys and three girls to the American Legion and American Legion Auxiliary committees who make the final choice.

The objective of Boys' and Girls' State is to educate youth in the duties, privileges and responsibilities of American citizenship.

Also attending Boys' State this year are Jack Flynn as senior counselor and Jack Flynn, II, A 1965 delegate to Boys' State, as junior counselor. Mrs. Jack Flynn will attend Girls' State as a staff member.

Crawford Martin And Al Maurer Win In Primary Run-Off

Crawford Martin and Alfons (Al) Maurer were victorious in the Castro County Democratic primary run-off election June 4.

Martin defeated Franklin Spears for the attorney general nomination by a 253-222 vote in balloting in five voting places in Castro County Saturday.

Maurer won the nomination for Democratic candidate for Commissioner, Precinct 4 over W. H. (Bill) Simpson by a 229-136 vote.

Martin's and Maurer's names will appear on the general election ballot in the regular voting in November.

John Quinby Is Vo-Ag Teacher

John R. Quinby of Lueders, Texas, has been hired as a vocational agriculture teacher at Dimmitt High School for the next school year, according to Superintendent Paul Hilburn. Quinby is looking for a house and will move to Dimmitt by July 1st.

Quinby is filling the vacancy left when Jon Henderson was hired at Boys Ranch as vocational agriculture teacher. He graduated from Chillicothe High School in 1958 and attended Tarleton State College, Stephenville, for two years before transferring to Texas Tech where he received his degree in 1962. He has taught the last four years at Lueders High School.

During his four years at Lueders, Quinby enjoyed considerable success at livestock shows. In the Jones County Show which has seven other vo-ag departments and the 4-H Clubs, Quinby's students twice had championships in each of the following: steers, heifers, fine wool lambs, crossbred lambs, and medium wool lambs. His students have shown at Houston, Fort Worth, Abilene and San Angelo. This past spring, he has the second place heifer at Fort Worth and the champion at San Angelo.

In Leadership Contests, his teams have also placed high in both District and Area. He has scored a first place in Radio Broadcasting and Greenhand Quiz this last year.

Two of his students made State Farmer while he was at Lueders. This was the first time in the history of the FFA Chapter at Lueders that a boy had made State Farmer. Quinby stated that it would be hard to leave a bunch of hardworking students.

Quinby was raised on the Texas A & M Agricultural Experiment Station near Chillicothe where his father, J. R. Quinby, is credited by many as developing the hybrid grain sorghum. His father is presently living at Plainview where he is Chief Genetist for Pioneer Seed Company.

Quinby is married and has two children. His wife also graduated from Chillicothe High School and attended McMurry College, Abilene.

City Commission Will Receive Bids For New Airport Site

The Dimmitt City Commission will receive bids for option to purchase land for a new airport site until 5 p.m. June 20 at the City Secretary's office.

The sealed bids will be opened at the City Commissioner's meeting at 7:30 p.m. June 20. The bids submitted for consideration by the commission will be an option to purchase subject to bond passage by local voters within a one-year period from June 20, 1966 to June 20, 1967.

The bids should state legal description of the land and include the option price per acre.

The land must be 6400 feet long and 500 feet wide and have land adjacent to it suitable for parking ramp, hangers and an area for making a cross-wind runway. The land must be within three miles of the Dimmitt courthouse square and also adjacent to a paved road. The area must be clear of all high lines and telephone lines for a 2000 foot distance in all directions and clear

Recreation Meeting Is Scheduled

The steering committee of the Castro County Recreation Project have announced, and are anxious for a large turnout, at a public meeting Monday night at 8 o'clock in the Junior High School auditorium. Purpose of the meeting is to promote the sale of memberships in the recreation project, and to enlist workers in its promotion. The committee stressed the fact that interested people from all communities in the county and surrounding area, are invited to the meeting and solicited as members in the project.

A representative of the steering committee pointed out that memberships were being sold for \$100 but that the fee would be increased to \$250 the first of July. A membership of 250 will be required for the organization to qualify for a \$262,000 loan to buy the necessary acreage and to build the recreation facilities.

Details concerning the recreation project will be discussed at the meeting and any questions concerning the project will be answered.

James Mitchell of Hart has accepted the call of Youth Director of the First Baptist Church in Espanalo, New Mexico for ten weeks.

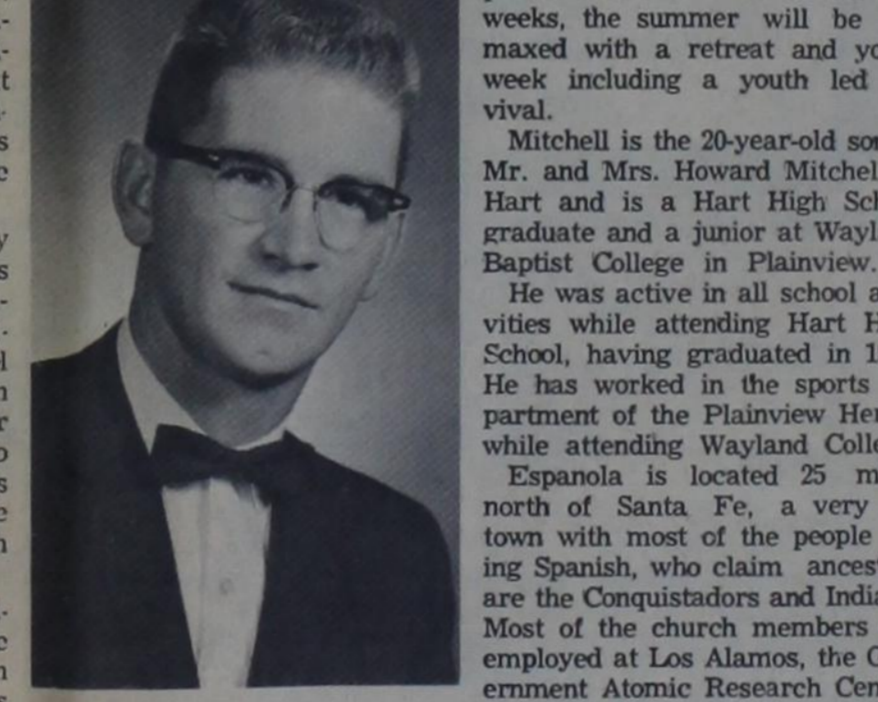
His duties will consist of anything from janitor to assistant pastor. At the close of the ten weeks, the summer will be climaxed with a retreat and youth week including a youth led revival.

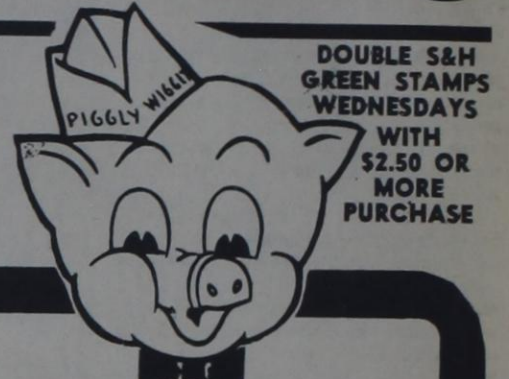

H-D NOTES

More Americans will vacation by car this year than ever before. Many older citizens will be among these travelers, says Miss Leota Lane, Texas A & M University Extension specialist in family life education.

Research done in connection with the recent national driving test indicates that many drivers need to brush up on their driving skills. Additionally, older citizens, especially will want to check up on these safe-driving points:

1. With the aid of a road map, plan the route you will take by dividing the distance into even periods of driving. Outline rest stops, scenic points, and overnight lodging to provide variety in each day's travel.
 2. Allow plenty of driving time. Schedule arrival in major cities to avoid rush hour traffic.
 3. More people travel on weekends than during the week. Plan your long trips during the week, and schedule weekends for visiting.
 4. Summer means that more vacationers will be traveling. When possible, plan trips before the close of school in the spring and after the start of school in the fall.
 5. To reduce eyestrain, wear sunglasses for daytime driving and keep night driving to a minimum.
 6. All stopping, passing and turning distances are more difficult to judge after dark. Plan most of the driving during the daylight hours.
- Research indicates that many medicines can affect the way a driver handles the wheel. Cer-

tain drugs such as antihistamines, cold tablets, and sedatives may dull your reflexes or impair your co-ordination.

Tranquilizing drugs can cloud your judgment and interfere with your driving skills. Stimulants may cause undue nervousness. Consult your doctor about side effects of any drug he prescribes. Don't drive until you know that the drugs you take won't affect your driving skill.

SHEERS CALL FOR SPECIAL SEAMS

Are you planning to sew with the sheer fabrics, such as voiles and dotted Swiss?

They are popular this season, but their transparency calls for special treatment of the seams. There are three different ways to make seams in sheer fabrics.

The first method is to stitch a plain 1/4 inch seam with the right sides of the fabric together. Make another row of stitching within the seam allowance, 1/4 inch from the first seam. Then trim the seam close to the second stitching line.

Another method is to make a French seam by placing the wrong sides of the fabric together. Stitch a plain 1/4 inch seam, and trim the seam allowance to 1/4 inch. Then turn the garment with the right sides together and press the garment flat along the seam line. Baste and stitch along the regular 1/4 inch seam line so that the finished seam will be 1/4 inch wide.

A third method of seaming sheer fabrics is a mock French seam. Stitch the right sides of the fabric together along the 1/4 inch seam line. Next turn the raw edges in 1/4 inch toward the seamline and sew together by hand or machine to make a 1/4 inch seam.

Best results are usually obtained by using the French seam on straight seams and the mock French seam on curved seams where fitting is necessary.

When you are choosing a pattern for a sheer fabric, check to see that sheers are recommended. The garment will look better if few seams are in evidence.

JUNE PLENTIFUL FOODS CAN SIMPLIFY MEAL PLANNING
What to serve for dinner — is this your problem? Why not consult the June plentiful foods list for helpful ideas? Plentiful this month are raisins, split peas and lentils, canned red salmon and seasonal vegetables.

We're reaping the benefits of the largest raisin crop since 1953, says the U. S. Department of Agriculture. In addition to this 272,000 ton crop, this year's production also is expected to be large.

Split pea supplies are reported very heavy and producer prices declining. Lentil stocks also are large. You should find both split peas and lentils especially economical.

Bright red salmon is the answer to nutritious summer salads and other special "no-cook" dishes. The 1965 pack of canned red salmon was 2 1/2 times the pack of the year before.

Garden fresh vegetables will add color and flavor to your dinners. Market news offices of US DA's Consumer and Marketing Service report increasing amounts of vegetables moving in to local markets.

Let June plentiful foods be your answer to palate-pleasing dishes. Raisins have many uses. They can be used for nutritious snacks, in salads, pies and other desserts.

- 1 cup raisins
 - 3 eggs
 - 1 cup sugar
 - 1/4 pound margarine
 - 1 tablespoon flour
- Cook raisins in a small amount of water until tender. Separate egg yolks and white (use whites for meringue). Mix sugar and flour with beaten yolks. Pour egg mixture into raisins and cook until thick. Pour into baked pastry shell and cover with meringue. Bake at 350 degrees for twelve minutes.

Lentils and split peas may be boiled or baked without soaking if desired. Use 2 1/2 cups of water for each cup of lentils. Oven cooking is recommended for split peas, add 1 1/2 cups of water. Boil for 2 minutes then soak for 30 minutes. Place in a baking dish; cover and bake at 350 degrees for 25 minutes.

If acid ingredients such as tomatoes, catsup or vinegar are included in the recipe, add them late in the cooking period when beans are almost tender. Acids delay softening of the skins.

Salmon can be used to make a light refreshing summer salad. It could be served with the meal or could be used as the main dish with a bread, beverage, and dessert.

SALMON SALAD — serves 8
2 cups cooked salmon
1 1/2-pound can salmon, drained and flaked
1/2 cup chopped celery
1/2 cup minced sweet pickle
2 tablespoons chopped green pepper
1 teaspoon lemon juice

One-third cup salad dressing, cooked or mayonnaise. Combine all ingredients; chill thoroughly before serving.

Strawberry tarts would be good as a dessert for this salad meal. Fresh strawberries are a favorite of nearly everyone.

FRESH FRUIT TARTS
1 recipe pastry
heavy duty aluminum foil
1 package vanilla pudding
1/2 cup heavy cream, whipped
2 pints fresh strawberries
Chill pastry for 15 minutes. Tear foil into 4 inch squares. Place one on top of the other, interlining with squares of waxed paper. Using a round dish, trace circle pattern on top square. Cut all squares at once. Discard waxed paper as it is used. A 4-inch circle makes a 2 1/2 inch tart. Roll pastry to 1/4 inch thickness and cut to match aluminum foil circles. Place pastry circles on top of foil circles. Prick all over with a fork. At this point you can either freeze the tarts for later use or continue to bake and fill tarts. If pastry is frozen, let

it soften at room temperatures. Then pick up 1 foil circle with matching pastry. With thumb and forefinger, turn up edge of foil and pastry 1 inch all around, and pinch at about 1 inch intervals to hold edges up. Place on a shallow pan or cookie sheet and bake tart shells at 450 degrees F. for 15 minutes if unfrozen, or 20 minutes if frozen, or until delicately browned. Prepare vanilla pudding as label directs. Fold whipping cream into chilled pudding. Place a spoonful in each tart shell. Top with strawberries, and spoon melted preserves over the fruit. Makes 12 to 14 tarts.

Methodist Conferences Meet in Dallas This Week

The eight Methodist Conferences of Texas are meeting simultaneously in Dallas, Texas, June 6-11. The Northwest Texas Annual Conference is one of these. This conference covers the area from Midland to the New Mexico border, northward including all of the Panhandle of Texas, eastward to Vernon and southward to a line from Baird to Blackwell, and westward to Midland again. This Conference is organized into eight districts: Abilene, Big Spring, Brownfield, Lubbock, Plainview, Amarillo, Pampa, and Childress. There have a total of 252 pastoral charges served by 240 effective ministers. This Conference has about 108,000 members. Bishop Eugene Slater, elected while serving Polk Street Church, Amarillo, presides and oversees the work of this and the Southwest Texas Conference. His residence is in San Antonio.

The Annual Conference in the Methodist Church is composed of all the traveling preachers in full connection with it and a lay member elected by each pastoral charge. It operates under the Constitution of the Methodist Church. Local churches are con-nected to it. It elects and ordains the ministers. It receives and votes on reports of boards and committees to set up the program for the Conference in the year ahead. It elects delegates to the General Conference which is the supreme legislative body of the Church and meets each four years. This Conference has been compared to our National Congress and the Annual Conference to that of the states. In fact, the Methodist Church in America was organized in 1784, contemporary to the organization of The

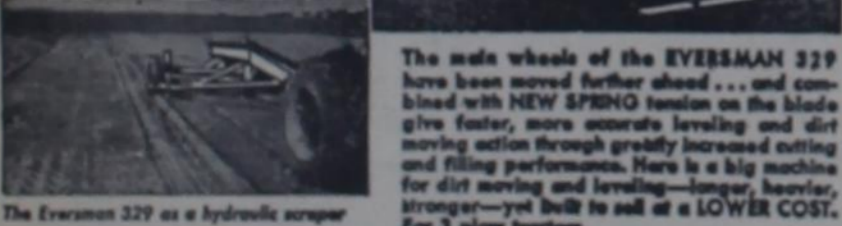

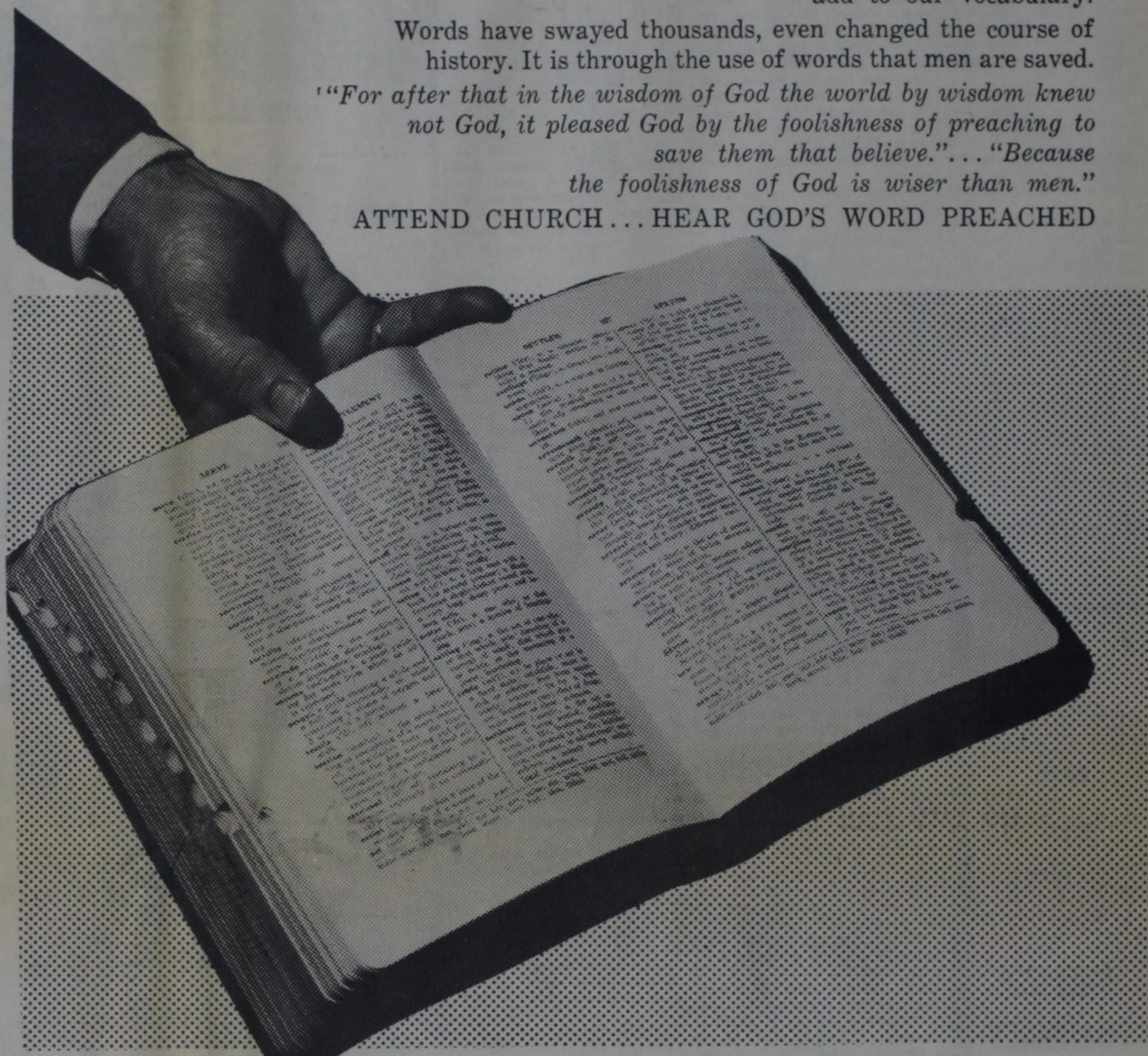

Operation Golden Eagle Conserves America's Outdoor Heritage

Operation Golden Eagle, the Nation's new program to maintain and preserve America's outdoor heritage, offers all citizens a direct opportunity to contribute substantially to conservation of natural resources through purchases of \$7 Golden Passports valid at more than 7,000 Federal recreation areas.

The slogan of the program, "Use, Enjoy, and Help Expand Your Great American Outdoors," states the purpose and the need for the project. The Golden Eagle theme was selected because the eagle symbolizes the out-of-doors to most people.

Federal officials expect Operation Golden Eagle to produce \$13 million this year for the Land and Water Conservation Fund. Together with an estimated \$100 million from other sources, money from the sale of Golden Passports will provide grants to States and their cities and counties to increase outdoor recreation opportunities. A portion from the Fund goes for authorized Federal recreation purposes, including ac-

quisitions for seashores, recreation areas, National Forests, Parks and Wildlife Refuges.

While providing a needed and worthwhile contribution to the Nation's recreation requirements, the 1966 \$7 Golden Passport offers an incentive in that it will admit the holder and everyone in his car to 7,000 Federal recreation areas any time during the year ending March 31, 1967.

Individuals purchasing a \$7 Golden Passport by mail from the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation, Box 7763, Washington, D. C. 20044, will receive a Golden Eagle Family Award Certificate suitable for framing and a handsome Golden Eagle lapel insignia.

Golden Eagle \$7 permits also may be purchased at most Federal areas where they are valid for entrance, at county offices of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, at local offices of the American Automobile Association, Tennessee Valley Authority, and at field and headquarters offices of the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers, Forest Service, National Park Service, Bu-

DEADLINE NEARS FOR "NEW WHEAT FARM" APPLICATIONS

Farmers who wish to be considered for a "new farm" allotment for the 1967 crop of winter wheat on a farm which does not have a 1966 wheat allotment should get in touch with the ASCS county office during the next few weeks, Jim Elder, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, said today. Such farmers have until July 1 to file applications for such an allotment.

A producer eligible to file such an application is one with a farm for which no wheat allotment has been established and for which neither the owner nor the operator has an interest in the wheat allotment on any other farm, who has available land and adequate equipment and facilities for the successful production of a wheat crop on the farm, who during the last 5 years has had at least 2 years' experience in producing wheat, and who as an operator expects to receive 50 percent or more of the current year's income from the total production on the farm (not including the anticipated income from wheat produced on a "new farm" allotment.) Other factors are involved, and it is suggested that interested producers discuss the details with officials at the ASCS county office.

The Chairman said that formal application for a "new farm" wheat allotment may be made by filing written application at the ASCS county office prior to the July 1 deadline

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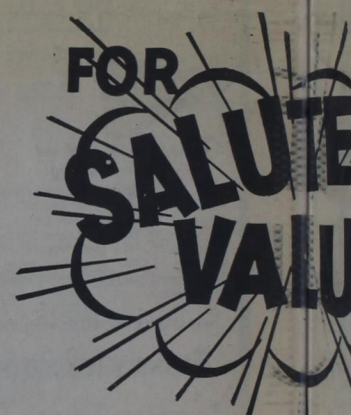

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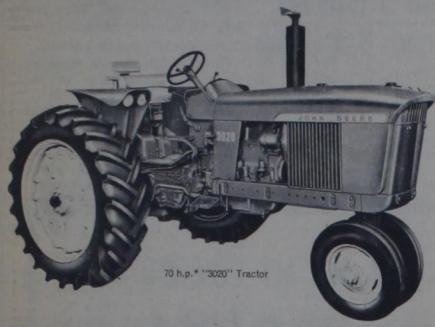
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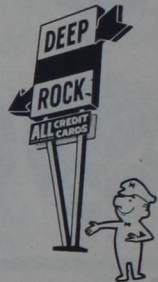
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Cardinals Defeat Earth Nine 11-5

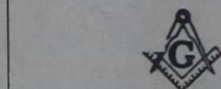

LEGAL NOTICE

ORDINANCE NO. 245

An ordinance defining the term "dwelling unit"; prescribing minimum standards for houses, buildings, structures, or parts thereof, hereinafter constructed, erected, established, or altered, containing or to contain one or more dwelling units. Prescribing prerequisites to the issuance of certain building permits; prohibiting the construction, erection, establishment, or alteration of any such house, building, structure, or part thereof without complying with the minimum standards herein prescribed; prohibiting the occupancy of any such house, building, structure, or part thereof, hereafter constructed, erected, established or altered without complying with the minimum standards herein prescribed; prescribing penalties for violation, prescribing a savings clause, prescribing a method of publication of this ordinance; and declaring an emergency.

WHEREAS, the City Commission of the City of Dimmitt, Texas, deems the passage, promulgation, and enforcement of the provisions hereinafter contained necessary for the protection and promotion of public health, safety and general welfare of the community.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF DIMMITT, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: The term "Dwelling unit", as that term is used in this Ordinance, shall mean a house, building, structure, or part of a house, building, or structure, designed or intended for occupancy as a separate housekeeping unit, including space for sleeping, for eating, and for the preparation of food.

SECTION 2: Each house, building, structure, or part of a house, building, structure, or part of a house, building, or structure, containing or to contain one or more dwelling units, as that term is herein defined, shall conform to the following standards, which are deemed to be the minimum standards necessary for the health and general welfare of the people:

a. Each such dwelling unit shall contain a minimum area of 300 square feet of floor space, permanently enclosed and roofed of sound construction.

b. Each such dwelling unit shall be designed and constructed to provide a separate room or compartment with permanent floor, other than earth, and permanent roof, completely enclosed, and separated from the remainder of such dwelling unit by permanent walls from floor to ceiling or roof, directly connected with, and having its only entrance from the remainder of the permanently en-

closed part of such dwelling unit, in which room or compartment shall be provided and installed a water closet, lavatory, and bathtub or shower. Separate rooms may be provided for each such facility provided each room conforms to the requirements hereof. The roof and walls shall be of sound, permanent type materials.

c. The room containing the water closet, lavatory, and bath or shower shall be provided with a window or opening for light and ventilation of an area of not less than one-tenth of the total floor space of such room, except where adequate mechanical light and ventilation are provided. Such window or opening shall be completely screened with screening of not less than 16 wires per inch each way.

d. Each such dwelling unit shall be designed and constructed to provide for a sink installed in some part of such dwelling unit other than the room or compartment containing the water closet or bathing facilities.

e. Each plumbing fixture, including water closets, lavatories, bathtubs, showers, and sinks, installed in any such dwelling unit shall be provided with running water.

f. Each plumbing fixture, including water closets, lavatories, bathtubs, showers, and sinks shall be connected by adequate waste and drainage lines, of type and design prescribed by ordinances of the City of Dimmitt, to be a sanitary sewer, if available, or to an outside septic tank, the design and installation of which is approved by the plumbing inspector of the City of Dimmitt. In the event a septic tank is used, the waste of drainage line from the sink must be so connected as to permit the affluent from such sink to be passed through a grease trap before entering the septic tank or drain field.

SECTION 3: Hereafter, no building permit shall be issued involving the construction, erection, establishment, or alteration of a house, building, structure, or part of a house, building or structure, containing or to contain one or more such dwelling units, unless plans, specifications, or a written statement of the applicant accompany the application for such permit showing the requirements of this Ordinance are to be complied with.

SECTION 4: It shall be unlawful for any person to cause to be constructed erected, established or altered, any house, building, or structure, or part of any house, building, or structure containing or to contain any such dwelling unit, or to perform or assist in the performance of any such construction, establishment, erection, or alteration, unless the requirements of Section 2 of this Ordinance are being complied with.

SECTION 5: It shall be unlawful for the owner, or any agent or

representative of the owner, of any house, building, structure, or part of any house, building, or structure, hereafter erected, constructed, or altered, and containing such dwelling unit, to occupy the same, or cause or permit the same to be occupied, or for any other person to occupy the same unless the requirements of Section 2 of this Ordinance have been complied with.

SECTION 6: Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and each such person shall be deemed guilty of a separate offense for each day during which any violation of any of the provisions of this Ordinance is committed, continued, or permitted, and upon conviction of any

such violation such person shall be punishable by a fine of not less than Five Dollars (\$5.00) nor more than Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00).

SECTION 7: The invalidity of any section or subsection, paragraph, sentence, clause, phrase, word or words shall not invalidate any other part of this Ordinance. It is the intent of the City Commission in enacting this Ordinance that the provisions are separate and no provision hereof shall become inoperative or fail by reason of the invalidity of any other provision.

SECTION 8: This Ordinance shall take effect from and after the date of its publication in the official publication of the City of Dimmitt, which publication shall be

sufficient if it contains the title of this ordinance and states the penalty provided herein for the violation hereof

WHEREAS, an emergency is apparent for the immediate preservation of health, safety and general welfare of the public that required this Ordinance to become effective immediately. Therefore, all rules to the contrary requiring three or several readings of the ordinance are hereby waived and this ordinance shall become effective from and after its passage, and publication as provided herein

Richardsons Are New Managers Of Colonial Inn

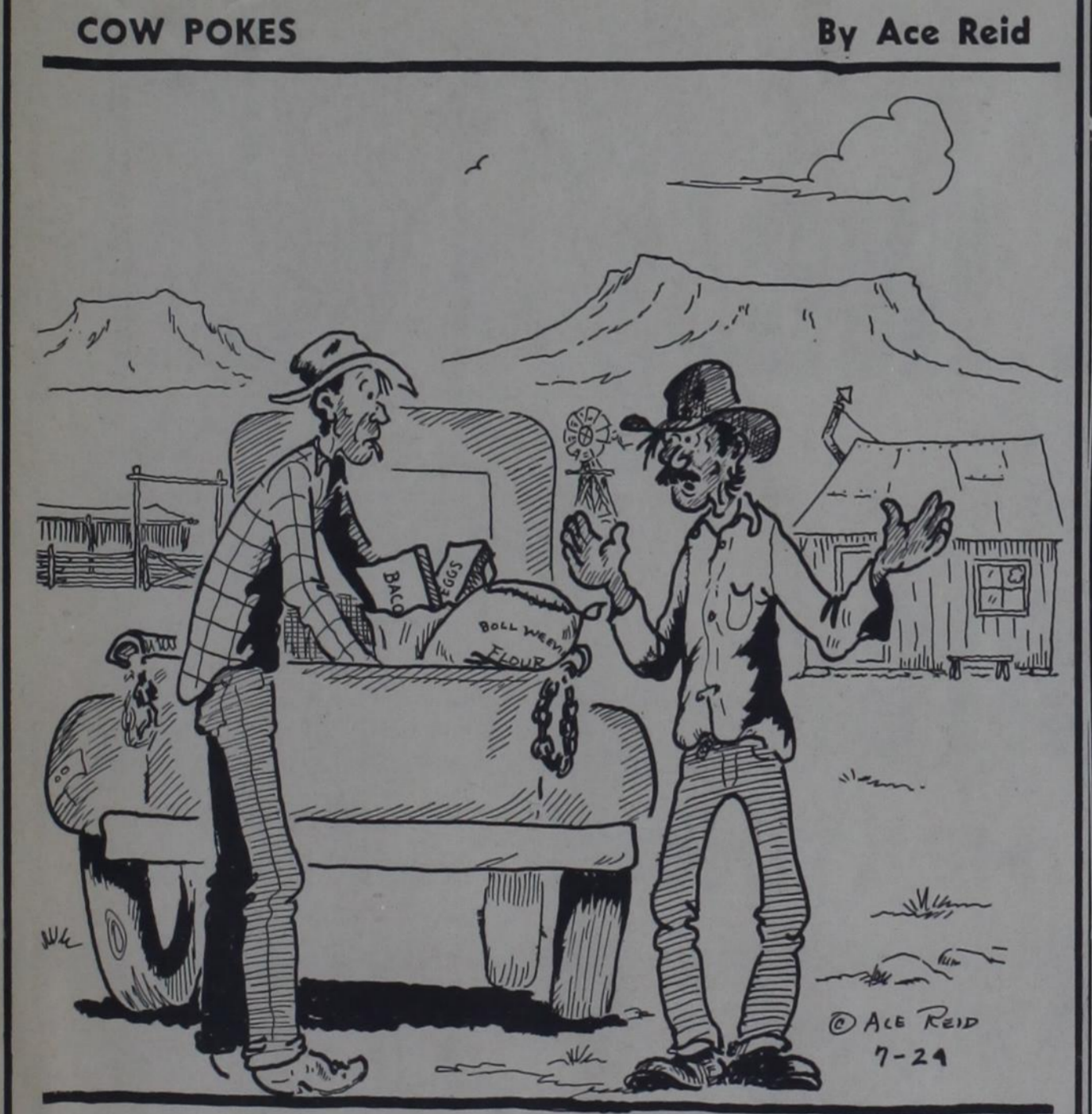
