Mary Baldrige, director of nursing service, at Plains Memorial Hospital, has a problem. Mrs. Baldrige is allergic to roses, regardless of color or type. She is as tenderhearted and sentimental as the next person and she appreciates and wants patients in the hospital to receive pot plants and flowers of all kinds, that is all kinds but roses. She doesn't have to come into contact with roses, or even be in the room with them to be affected by the allergy, just passing down the hall in front of an open door to a room that has a rose bouquet is sufficient to make her face turn red, swell, and give forth with all of the symptoms that are a result of the affliction. Nurse Baldrige would be the last person on the staff to insist that roses not be sent to patients in the hospital, but she would be the one that would appreciate it the most if some other flowers are substituted for roses.

In reading about the new government cotton program, in the daily papers, which recently was voted out of the Agricultural Committee of Congress, I was surprised to learn that any one of several counties in West Texas had a larger cotton allotment. Under the government cotton allotment program New Mexico is allowed to plant in the neighborhood of 180,000 acres. The last time I noticed Lubbock county had a cotton allotment of 240,000 or 250,000 acres. The cotton program reported out of the Agricultural Committee may be a good one, in fact it may be just what we need. But I am afraid that it has provisions that may make cotton an unprofitable product as far as the farmer is concerned. It seems that the support price will be lowered and that compliance will not be compulsory. The success of the government farm programs in the past has resulted in a fair level of price supports with a mandatory curtailment of production. The new program seems to be an experiment, and if it fails chaos will be the lot of the cotton farmer.

The News was in receipt of two classified advertisements this week that we declined to publish. We frequently receive advertisements that we feel, for one reason or another, should not appear in the paper. One of the reasons for instance is that we are skeptical about the advertiser paying for the requested publicity. I am talking about advertisements that are sent or called in from distant points. While we get legitimate advertisements through the mails, and we feel that with the experience we have had in the newspaper business we can pretty well tell if they are legitimate, there are many phonies that crop up now and then. Occasionally the advertisements of gimmicks will be accompanied by a check and so far as the newspaper is concerned it would get paid for its services. But the sleeper is in the fact that we would be allowing some questionable outfit to use the columns of our paper to dupe whatever gullible, or unsuspecting readers we might have out of money, that they probably could ill afford to lose. In some cases we have warnings from the Texas Press Association about advertisements that we may receive from crooked or phony outfits, but many times it is a new deal that the Press Association has no way of knowing about. The advertisement that flipped us this week was one that purported to build a home, one, two or three bedrooms for a customer with no down payment, and for monthly payments from \$30.00 to \$80.00 and of course a credit rating was not necessary. This just can't be so in a bonafide business deal. Whatever the purpose behind a proposition such as this someone is going to get hurt, that is if there are any takers. Our guess was that first off there would be some sort of service charge, and if the deal was never consummated, any money passed to the seller would be gone for good. You are always ahead when you deal with people you know.

H-D NOTES

Well, today's a big day for many of our 4-H girls - the 1965 Dress Revue. This morning the girls are modeling their garments for the judges. The girls then leave their record books and garments for construction judging.

Tonight at 8:00 p.m. in the Dimmitt Junior High School Auditorium the Dress Revue and Awards will be presented.

Everyone is invited to attend this 4-H highlight.

Do you realize that every time you buy a food product, you are casting a vote for it?

You - the consumer - determine what varieties stay on the market. If you ignore a product, it will be taken off the market and re-evaluated.

There's an abundance of food choices available for you. A recent survey in one large store revealed the following: Eighty-five different cuts of meat or poultry - not including cold cuts and seafood.

Seventy varieties of canned vegetables.

Nine different varieties of canned green beans - plus fresh and frozen packs.

Some 262 different combinations of can sizes, brands, and varieties in vegetables.

Therefore, it is indeed wise to study the products available. Then choose according to intended use of the product and the amount of time, and energy available for preparation.

Yesterday's cake can be an ice cream treat today. Make use of slightly dry cake by cutting and arranging it into 2 or 3 layers, spreading softened ice cream between layers and over the top. Serve with a chocolate sauce, a fresh fruit sauce, or a whipped cream topping.

Texas A & M Extension nutritionists tell us that homemakers may soon be able to buy frozen liquid eggs.

In New York State, frozen liquid eggs are already available to the food service industry in 5-pound (50 eggs) and 10-pound (100 eggs) packages.

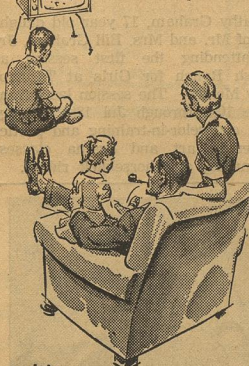
The eggs, packed in polyethylene, defrost quickly in the refrigerator. The bags, with a corner cut diagonally, provide a perfect pouring spout.

The frozen eggs are marketed in New York under the supervision of the State Department of Agriculture and Markets. Only eggs of Grade AA and A quality are used. All containers must be approved, and the farms and processing plants are under continuous inspection by the Department of Agriculture and Markets.

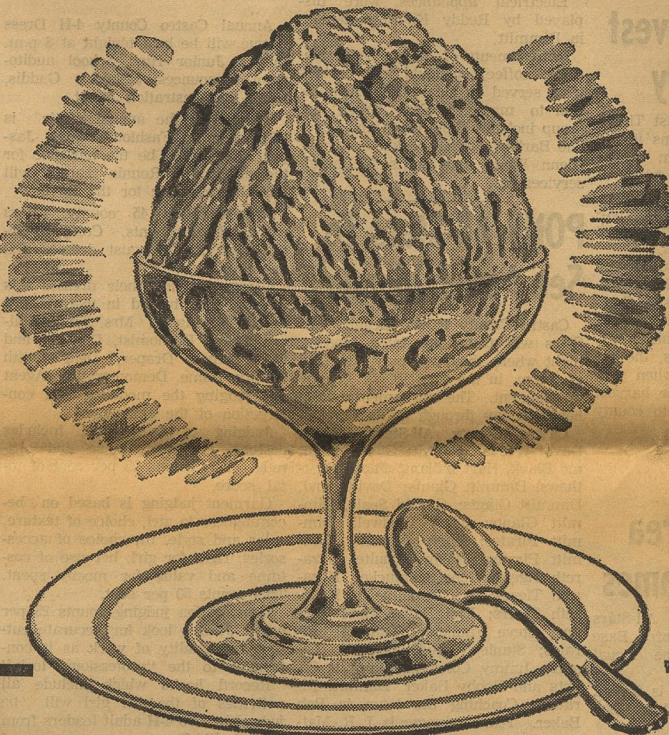

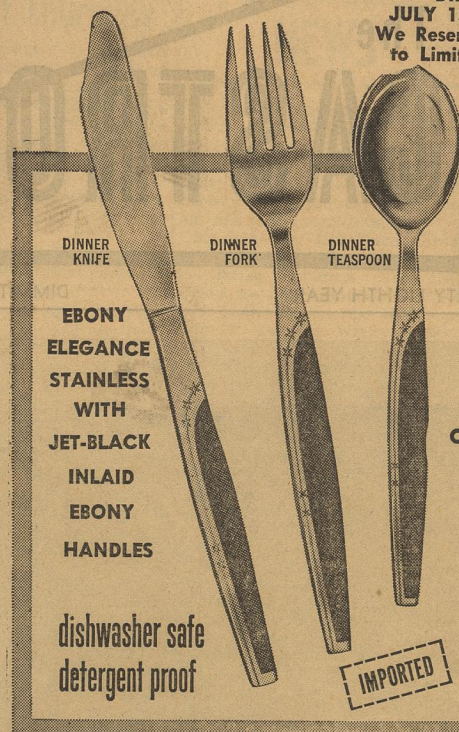

## Recipes Given From Two European Kitchens To Homemaking Students

Summer homemaking students and incoming freshmen homemaking students received a rare treat last Thursday afternoon as they sampled cooking from two European kitchens. The students were treated to a demonstration of how to prepare "Apple Strudel" by Anna Kovacs of Hereford. Mrs. Kovacs was born in Yugoslavia. She moved to the United States in 1961. From the land of Denmark, the students tasted "Ris a' la maude", traditional Christmas dessert of the Danish. This dessert was prepared by Mrs. Ellen Donslund of Copenhagen, Denmark and Mrs. June Parker of 702 W. Grant. Mrs. Donslund and her husband are visiting in Dimmitt for six weeks. He is a minister of a Church of Christ Mission in Denmark which is given support by the Bedford Street Church of Christ. Mrs. Parker is the new Bedford Street Church of Christ minister's wife. The Parkers returned to the United States in June after spending five years in Denmark. The 30 homemaking students viewed some handiwork made by Mrs. Parker's fourth grade daughter while attending school in Denmark. In Denmark, the girls take Homemaking in the first six grades of school.

Then unless they make Homemaking a vocation, they will not take any more courses even in High School. Mrs. Parker's daughter had knitted house shoes and made a pair of shorts during her fourth grade course. The incoming freshmen girls attending the demonstrations were given a tour of the High School's other departments such as math, speech, gym and science. Recipes of foreign origin follow: **APPLE STRUDEL FROM YUGOSLAVIA**  
DOUGH PREPARATION:  
1 cup flour  
dash of salt  
1/2 cup warm water  
1 or 2 egg yolks  
2 tablespoons shortening  
Work dough until smooth like gum - divide in half - let dough rest for 15 or 20 minutes (real important) covered with cup towel and bowl.  
12 small apples  
Melt 3 heaping tablespoons shortening in a pan  
Stretch each piece of dough to 8 inch diameter on floured cloth, then flour hands and stretch each piece of dough to two foot square. Sprinkle flour over dough and then shred apples over dough. Sprinkle each piece of dough with 1/2 cup of sugar

cup of nuts to each piece of dough. Take melted grease (shortening) and sprinkle over strudel especially around the edges where dough is thicker, then tuck in edge and roll with cloth. Before baking brush top and sides with pastry brush. Bake on greased cookie sheet arranging in "U" shape and then cut in two to make two long strips. Bake in 350 degree oven for 30 minutes. After taking strudel out of the oven, sprinkle with powdered sugar. Serves 12 large pieces. Mrs. Hottel, Homemaking teacher comments, "It is amazing how one cup flour dough can be stretched to serve approximately 34."  
**RIS A' LA MAUDE FROM DENMARK**  
1 cup regular rice  
1 quart milk  
1 cup sugar  
1 1/2 cups whipping cream, add vanilla and whip to soft peaks  
1/2 to 3/4 cups almonds (cut in pieces)  
Cook rice in milk until tender, approximately one hour over real low flame (stirring often). When done add sugar and almonds, and let stand until cold. Whip cream and fold into rice mixture.  
SAUCE: Approx. 1 cup sugar (or sweeten to taste)  
2 cups cherry juice or substitute 1 tablespoon cornstarch  
Bring juice and sugar to boil Mix cornstarch with a little cold water and add to juice and boil 30 seconds. Cool. Serve in a pitcher to be poured over rice mixture. Serves approximately 20.



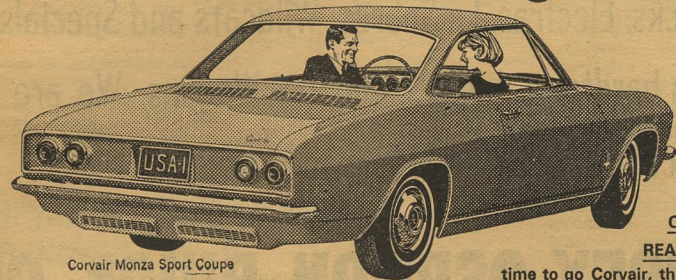

# PARALLEL TERRACES OFFER FARMERS SEVERAL ADVANTAGES

Terraces are still one of the most useful and most needed conservation practices even in Castro County where a large percentage of cropland is irrigated.

In years past, it is hard to estimate the miles of terraces that were built in the county. However, with the advent of irrigation, terraces disappeared from the scene and in their

place came irrigation furrows, washing away the topsoil that had been held in place by the very terraces that are now missing. Even on land that was not under irrigation, the terraces begin to disappear. The reasons given were simple and straight forward. It is impossible to irrigate properly in terraces when there are so many pointed and irregular lengths of rows, and besides terraces were laid on the level and water would not run. Another comment, from the dryland farmer, "You can't use modern four and six row equipment in conventional terraces."

Although all of these problems have not been overcome, the concept of parallel terracing has caused an upswing in the application of this much needed practice. As shown in figure 1 and figure 2, the difference in the two systems is as much as there is between night and day. Gone are the long, winding, odd shaped

areas of the conventional terrace system era, and in its place, a system of uniform, parallel terraces that keep the soil in place, while at the same time providing drainage to keep down wet spots so prevalent with the conventional system.

Take a look at the comparison of the two systems: First, the advantages of the Parallel system of Terraces.

1. Easier and faster cultivation.
2. Horizontal distances between terraces is such that an even number of rows can be laid out to fit modern, high efficiency, multi-row equipment.
3. Less turning on crops.
4. Natural depressions are utilized as waterways, thereby eliminating unsightly, wasteful wet spots in the field.

The disadvantages of the conventional terrace systems are:

1. Slower and more difficult cultivation.
2. Irregular distances between terraces are such that rows cannot be laid off to fit modern machinery.
3. Many turns must be made on crops.
4. Lows in field cause ponding, thus causing loss of cultivation land.

There is no doubt that parallel terraces are the answer to the dryland farmers' comments, but how about the irrigation farmers worries on irrigating.

First of all, the parallel terrace will not answer all of the problems confronting the irrigation farmer. However, in areas of weak or weakening water, they will be the answer again. Since terraces in a parallel system are graded, it would be possible to apply irrigation water to the rows between the terraces and not have the problems encountered in a conventional system. And, if a broad based terrace were used, it would be possible to irrigate up to two-thirds of the terraces. However, this idea fits better where there is a limited amount of water to apply. Then, full use of irrigation water can be used in the area between terraces can be handled as dry crop-terraces can be handled as dry cropland. In addition to providing erosion protection, the parallel terrace system would also provide maximum utilization of rainfall in areas of limited water. With the declining water table prevalent in some parts of the county now, it might be time for some farmers to look into the possibilities of installing a paral-

lel terrace system in anticipation of years to come.

The Soil Conservation Service Office assisting Running Water Soil Conservation District will be glad to give more details concerning this new method of installing one of the oldest and most useful conservation practices in the book. SCP cost-sharing is available to help defray expenses of this type of installation and there is a possibility that the Great Plains Conservation Program might fit your farm.

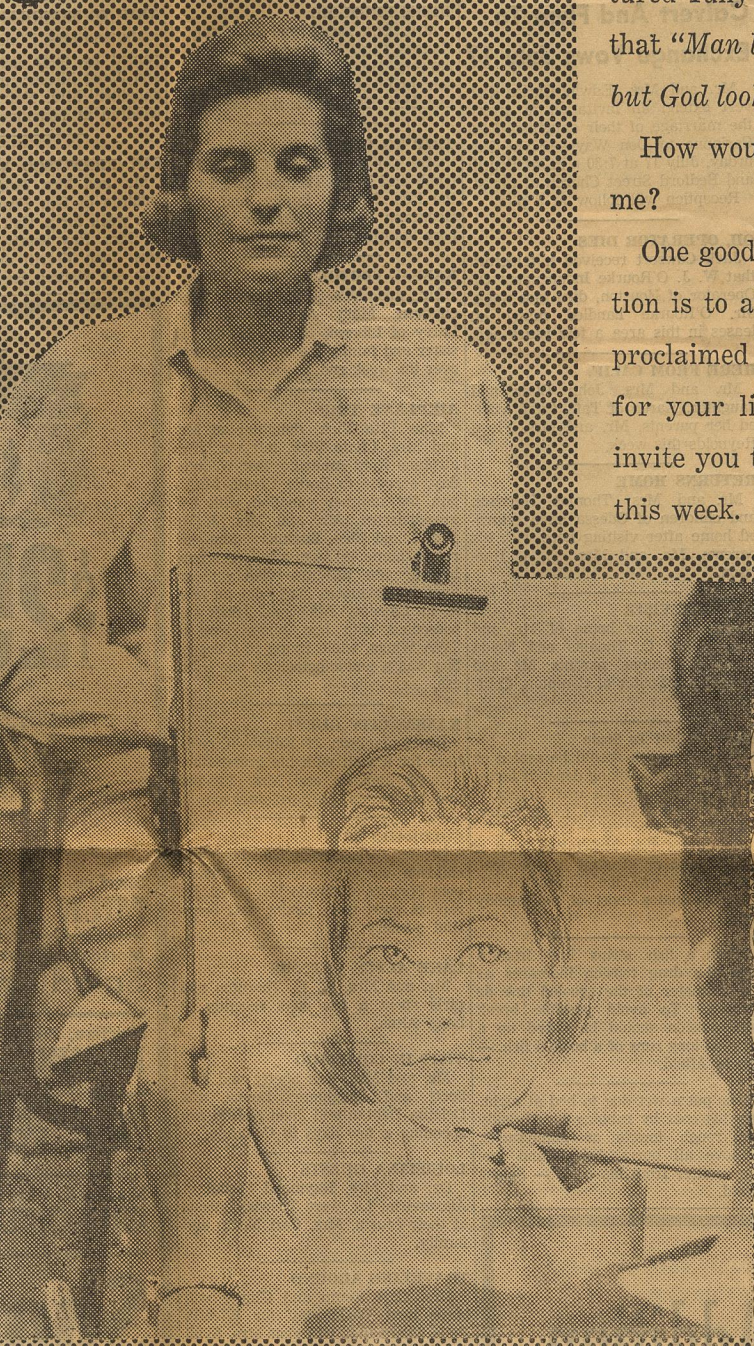

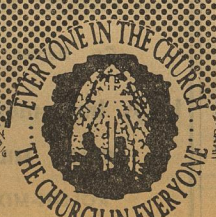

### Dimmitt Post Office Goes First Class

Dimmitt Post Office went first class July 1 announces Ernest L. Davis, postmaster.

Dimmitt was a second class office for twenty years, 1945-1965. There are four classifications of Post Offices based on yearly receipts in postage. Money order fees are included in the yearly receipts in a recent postal ruling. When receipts of a post office reach a certain amount, then classification is changed.

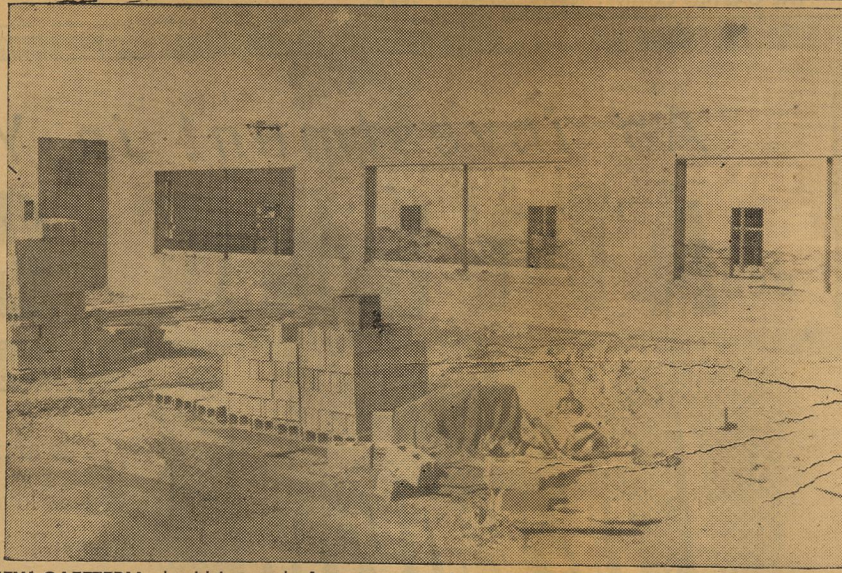
Dimmitt had enough receipts by January, 1965 to achieve first class rating but the change begins with the government's fiscal year, July 1. According to Postmaster Davis this change in classification show that the town is growing and expanding, more businesses and industry is bringing more people here.

Postal receipts for fiscal year July 1, 1964 through June 30, 1965 reached a grand total of \$65,496.43. This total may be divided to show \$62,336.53 received from postage and \$3,160.90 received in money order fees. The post office has just completed the fiscal year of 1965 and is now entering the government fiscal year of 1966.

Postmaster Davis comments, "There was a substantial increase in postage receipts for the 1965 fiscal year." Four post offices are located in Castro County. These post offices represent the four classifications as follows: Dimmitt, first class; Hart, second class; Nazareth, third class; and Summerfield, fourth class.

With the advance of the Dimmitt post office to first class, effective July 1, parcels mailed here must be limited to 40 pounds when addressed for delivery in the local, first and second zones; and limited to 20 pounds when addressed to the 3rd through 8th zones. Any parcel mailed at a first class post office for delivery to any other first class office in the United States are restricted to the above regulation.

Postmaster Davis says, "Patrons please note the reduced size and weight limits between first class offices."

#### Scale, Or Not To Scale

Whether a fish should be scaled or skinned before cooking depends largely on where the fish was caught. If it came from cool, clean water, scale it.

But if the fish was taken from a turbid pond or stream, it will taste much better with the skin pulled off. This eliminates most of the muddy flavor.

When a fish strips line from a reel, the drag tension increases as the diameter of the spooled line decreases. To avoid possible breakage, tension should be eased up a little on long runs of a hooked fish. —Sports Afield.

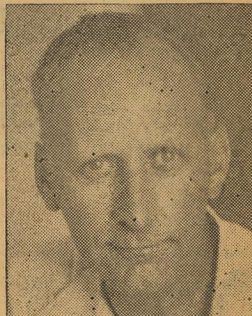

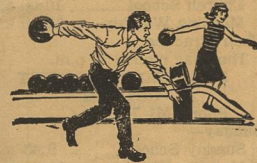

**Soil Survey Uses Conducted By SCS**

Soil maps are a basic tool for selecting a system of soil management. The maps show the kinds of soil in a field, a farm, or in a city or town. Currently, about one-half of the land in the Texas Panhandle has been surveyed. In the Running Water Soil Conservation District which is Castro County, about 53 percent has been completed to-date and it will be completed as manpower becomes available. The ultimate goal of the United States Department of Agriculture is to have a soil survey or map of every acre of land in the Nation.

What then does a soil map predict about a piece of land? In the Nationwide system now in use the soils are classified and named, just as plants and animals are. For example, plants are identified and named by such features as the structure and the shape of the leaf. Likewise, soils are identified and named by their main characteristics which are its texture (proportions of clay, silt, sand), color, depth, kinds and sequences of layers or horizons, and any other feature that is important to its use and management. These soil traits or features can be determined in the field by the Soil Scientist making the map. The names of the soils are taken from towns or localities near the place where the soil was first defined. Examples of soil names from this area are the Olton series, Amarillo series, Pullman series, Portales series and Randall series.

After the features or characteristics of a soil have been studied and determined, predictions can then be made about how it will respond to various kinds of management or use. Some of the questions that a soil survey and its interpretations can answer are: Is this land suited to cultivation? What kind of crops can be grown? How much erosion has occurred on it? What practices will be needed to maintain or increase the soil's fertility? Is the soil suited to irrigation and what kind of system will I need? What kind of na-

five grasses will it grow? Does the soil swell and shrink, creating a hazard to structural foundations? Does it flood often, and many others.  
The principal users of soil surveys are those involved in producing agricultural products - farmers, ranchers, dairymen, etc. Special interpretations have been made by Soil Conservation Service Technicians to assist agriculturalists in the use of the surveys. This is the land capability classification system. Soils are placed in eight classes, all of which do not normally exist on any single farm or ranch. Class I through IV are suited to cultivated crops. Classes V through VII are suited only to grazing and wildlife. Class 8 land is suited only to wildlife.  
Through the soil survey, this land capability system provides the basic facts with which the Soil Conservation Service Technician and the landowner or operator develop the conservation plan for the cultivated land on his farm. For rangeland, the soils are grouped into range sites. Each site is composed of a group of soils that respond similarly to kinds of grazing and that grow the same kind of grasses.

Soil maps are made by experienced Soil Scientists who are graduates of Agricultural Colleges and Universities, where they were trained in the soil sciences, crop sciences and related subjects. Ordinarily the Soil Scientists use aerial photographs as a base for plotting the soil boundaries. He goes over the land with a spade, auger or power sampler and digs as often as necessary to deter-

mine the kinds of soil and to mark their locations.  
Soil maps have many other uses. They are of use to prospective landowners, land appraisers, students of natural sciences, road builders, pipeline companies and others. In some urban areas, corrosion of underground pipe is a problem, thus soil maps are used as a guide for re-routing their pipelines around these salty areas, thereby saving these cities much expense. Soil surveys are also being used more and more by counties and school districts as basis for re-evaluation of their tax structures.

## Grain Sorghum Chat

Rome, Italy: Effective July 1, 1965, the tax placed on U. S. Grain Sorghum imported into Italy will be dropped by \$8.50 per ton establishing a threshold price for grain sorghum at \$60.80 per ton as compared to \$69.30 last year and to corn at \$64.80 per ton.

The announcement was made official this week by the Italian Minister of Agriculture during a visit to Italy by Bill Nelson, Executive Vice President of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association, in Europe under USDA auspices to work on duty and tax problems effecting grain sorghum markets.

## AMMO NOTES

Cotton is off to a good start this season in some areas. It has been hit by wet weather and blight in some areas. This past week of warmer weather and higher soil temperatures has caused cotton to

start growing faster. The question comes up as to whether to sidedress. If your cotton is off to a good start and a good stand, yield potential on cotton is good. This says that possibility of profit from fertilizer looks good. First, lets look at nitrogen. If cotton follows grain sorghum, nitrogen is definitely needed. A good rate is 80 lbs. ammonia per acre on heavier textured soils. If cotton follows cotton or wheat, 50 to 60 lbs. ammonia should be sufficient on heavier textured soils. On light textured sandy loam soils, increase these rates by 20 lbs. nitrogen. Phosphorus can still be applied. The most convenient way to apply it now is as a liquid with a dual applicator. Sidedressed phosphorus by 4-6 leaf stage should be as bene-

ficial as preplant. Sidedressed phosphorus could still be profitable up to first square. It should be applied soon, however. A suggested rate of phosphorus for cotton is 110 to 135 lbs. 11-37-0 or 200 to 250 lbs. 11-20-9-11S per acre on clay loam soils and 135-165 lbs. 11-37-0 250 to 300 lbs. 11-20-0-11S per acre on sandy loam soils. When sidedressing cotton, be careful not to prune roots. It would be desirable to apply fertilizer, particularly phosphorus, just ahead of new root growth. Applying it on 20 inch centers is still satisfactory for most cotton but it may be necessary on taller cotton to place it in the middles.
