

# County Helps Tower and Price Win

As Castro County went, so went the district and the state in major office elections Tuesday.

However, Castro voters declared their independence on the proposed constitutional amendment, parting from the state trend on four of them.

Castro County posted a rather bleak 49 percent turnout as approximately 1,618 of the county's 3,300 registered voters cast ballots.

(THE NEWS'S totals here are based on 87 percent of the county-

wide returns, with 14 of the county's 15 precincts complete. At press time Wednesday ballots were still being tallied in Precinct 2, the county's largest, and the election board estimated it wouldn't be finished until 4 p.m. Wednesday. The News's figures include 290 of the 502 votes cast in Precinct 2.)

IN THE TWO big races that drew the main spotlight here, Castro helped two Republican candidates establish "firsts" when it voted to send Bob Price of Pampa

to Congress and Sen. John Tower of Wichita Falls back to the US Senate.

Price carried all but three of the county's 15 precincts. The only boxes going for his Democratic opponent, Dee Miller, were No. 4 in Northeast Dimmitt (40 to 28 for Miller), No. 6 in Hart (115-65), and No. 10 at Sunnyside (16-12). Countywide, the Pampa rancher scored a 770 to 651 victory over Miller.

Throughout the 18th Congressional District, Price outpolled

Miller by a 5-4 margin, to become the first Republican ever sent to Congress in a two-man general election race in this district.

SEN. TOWER, bucking the Democratic "Establishment" in his first general election race, won a solid victory across the state — and in Castro County.

Here, the conservative GOP senator polled 777 votes to 629 for Waggoner Carr of Lubbock, who had received the blessing of LBJ, the Texas Congressional delegation, Gov. Connally and former

Gov. Allan Shivers. Fighting against these odds with a hard-hitting, sophisticated campaign, Tower defeated Carr statewide by a 5-4 margin.

Thus the 41-year-old Wichita Falls lawmaker became the first Republican in this century to win a US Senate seat from Texas in a general election. His present Senate term came via a special election in 1960 after LBJ had won the presidency.

IN THE ONLY contested local race, Democrat Dale Winders

was carrying a 285-103 lead over Independent H. K. "Red" Hill at presstime, and was assured election as Precinct 2 commissioner. Only 212 ballots remained to be counted in Precinct 2 at presstime, and Winders was maintaining a 3-1 margin.

ON THE 16 proposed constitutional amendments, Castro County declared its independence from the rest of the state by parting from the state trend on four of them. Castro voters turned thumbs down on Nos. 2, 3, 5 and 13, as well as No. 4, the only proposed amendment that failed to carry the state.

## Tomorrow's Homecoming At Hart High

During halftime, the Hart Booster Club will introduce and pay tribute to all exes who have played football at Hart.

A RECEPTION for all teachers and ex-students will be held in the school cafeteria after the game. All Hart High School ex-students are urged to attend the event.

## Park Group Finds Funds, Enacts Option

The \$290,000 recreation center plan here appears to be only a rubber-stamp away from approval in Washington.

THE CASTRO County Recreation Association found a lending source for the ambitious community playground project and last week exercised its option on 170 acres of land west of Dimmitt.

Treasurer Gerald Harden reports that the Texas State Teachers Association has tentatively committed itself to loan \$275,000 to build the community recreation center. The money would be on 35-year mortgage notes, he said. Steering committee members of the association are now awaiting action by the Farmers Home Administration in Washington, which must give tentative approval to guarantee the TSTA loan.

THE PROJECT has already been approved and recommended by the state FHA board.

"When tentative approval is given by the national FHA board," Harden said, "we'll be ready to incorporate, elect a permanent board of directors, call a membership meeting, draw our final blueprints and specifications and call for bids."

He added, "e still hope to start construction about Jan. 1." THE COMMUNITY playground would include a swimming pool, wading pool, nine-hole golf course 4,000 sq. ft. clubhouse and community building, children's fishing lake, trap shooting range, picnic areas, and two or three lighted ball parks for junior baseball leagues.

Some 303 persons became charter members of the association during the summer by paying \$100 each in charter dues. Their \$30,300 has been in 90-day time deposit certificates, and the interest from the money paid for the option on the land last week, Harden said.

REGULAR membership dues will be \$250 per family, "and we already have a waiting list for memberships," Harden said. Steering committee members are Don Newman, Jack Miller, Dr. J. E. Wohlgenuth, M. E. Cleavinger, and Harden. Jimmy Ross is the association's attorney.

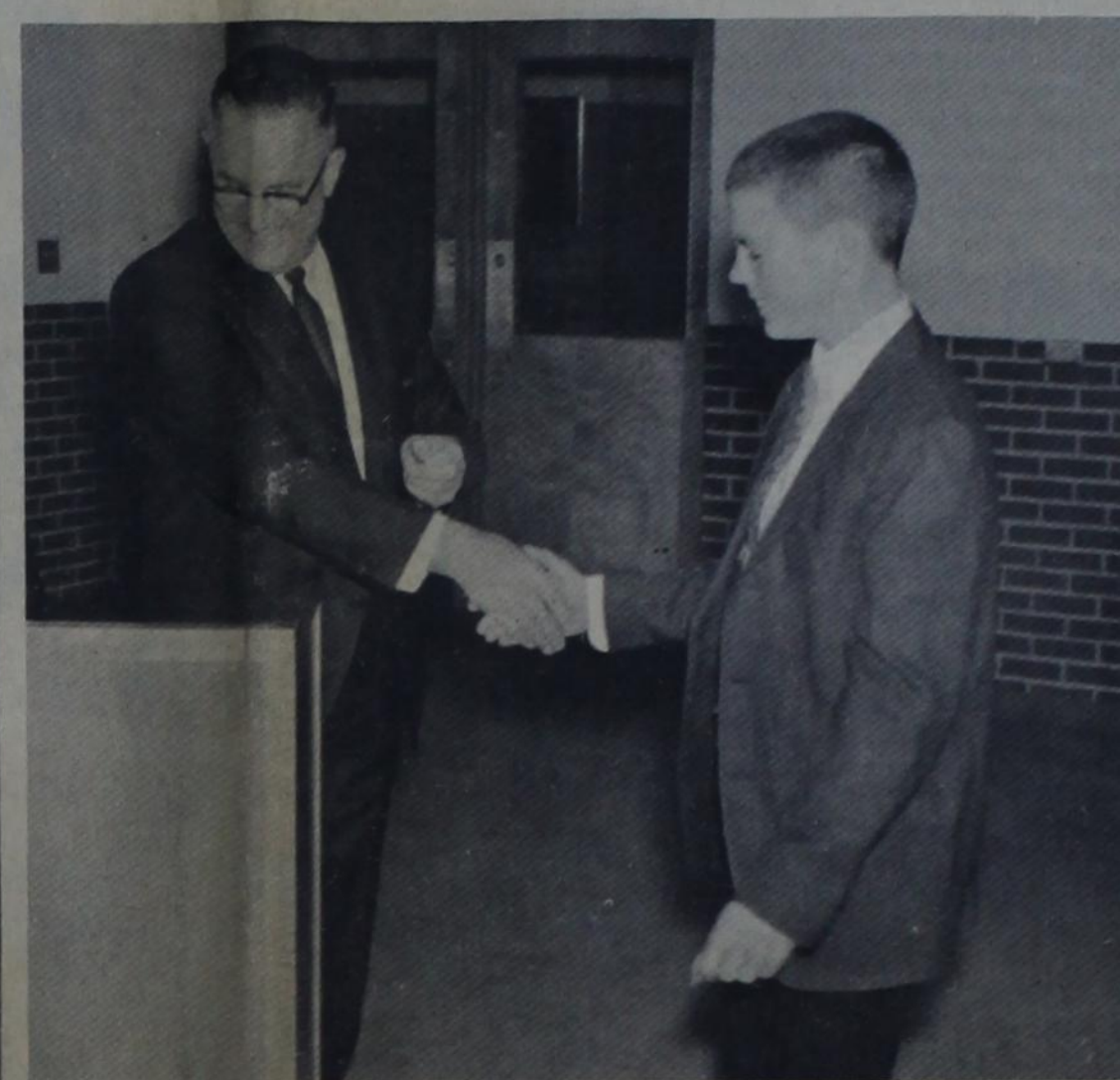

Castro County's outstanding 4-H members during the past year were Sharon Hochstein of Nazareth and Mickey Simpson of Jumbo.

THIS WAS the decision of the judges announced Saturday night at the annual Gold Star Banquet for county 4-H'ers at Dimmitt High School cafeteria.

Miss Hochstein, 15, and Simpson, 14, were presented the two Gold Star Awards by County

Judge Raymond Wilson to signify "outstanding achievement, leadership and contribution to the county 4-H program."

The Gold Star honor is the highest county award provided by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, which sponsors 4-H statewide. Only two are available to a county annually — one for a boy and one for a girl.

MISS HOCHSTEIN is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Hochstein Jr., and is president of the Nazareth 4-H Club.

Her projects have included electricity, fire prevention, clothing, photography, foods and food preservation.

Before becoming president of her 4-H Club, she served as its recreation leader and as secretary-treasurer. In Nazareth High School, she is also president of Future Homemakers of America, a member of the Children of Mary Sodality, and a twirler with the NHS Swift Band.

In 1965 her electric record book won first place in district competition, and this year she went to the state 4-H roundup with her sister, Debra, with a safety demonstration.

## about dimmitt and castro county by b. m. n.

I nominate Charles Guy of the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal, the masthead of the paper lists him as editor and publisher, as the most irresponsible newspaperman in the United States or any other place where newspapers are published.

It is one thing to be a partisan so far as party politics are concerned, but it is another thing to be vindictive, little, cheap and completely irresponsible when dealing with people. If the following statement, taken verbatim from a Charles Guy front page editorial in the Monday morning Lubbock-Avalanche Journal, is not an indication of total depravity and a warped mind so far as journalism responsibility is concerned, then Westbrook Pegler should be a guest columnist in every church paper in the land. The Guy gem of wisdom follows:

"We submit the thought that non-extremists, those that find distasteful the views of both the Minute Men on the right and the Yarborough liberals on the left, are those most likely to choose the man best fitted to serve all of Texas in the Upper House."

Mind you, this statement was made by a man that holds a responsible position in his city, a position that gives him control of an important news media supposedly read by a large number of people in the Lubbock area. Recent news stories in his paper give the lie to his statement when considered by sensible people. In recent days we have read of the arrests of Minute Men, and the confiscation of large catches of arms and ammunition in other states. Guy places those people on the one hand as extremists, and those of us who have supported Senator Yarborough, on occasions a majority of the voters in Texas, as extremists on the other end of the spectrum.

Apparently Guy's hatred of Senator Yarborough, a hatred generated by personal rather than public reasons, has apparently caused him to suffer a complete breakdown in his reasoning capabilities.

The statement we attributed to Guy wasn't taken out of context. It was a complete sentence in the front page editorial that attempted to analyze the outcome of the US Senator's race in Texas. Guy made the profound observation that everyone in-between the Minute Men on the right and the Yarborough liberals on the left were "middle of the roaders," and that the middle of the roaders would support Waggoner Carr. There again we have the implication that no one but extremists would support Senator Tower in his race for re-election. Here again Guy not only deserted his friends in former elections, the sizeable number of bond-fide republicans in the state, but castigated them in his attempt to be hateful to Senator Yarborough and his supporters.

This is being written on election day so we have no way of knowing the outcome of the election, but I submit that with friends like Charles Guy, Waggoner Carr needs no enemies.

One thing we know! The road we travel here will determine our destiny when we take our journey into the next world. We cannot travel the broad way and arrive in heaven because the broad way leads to destruction. There are only two roads! Which road are you traveling?

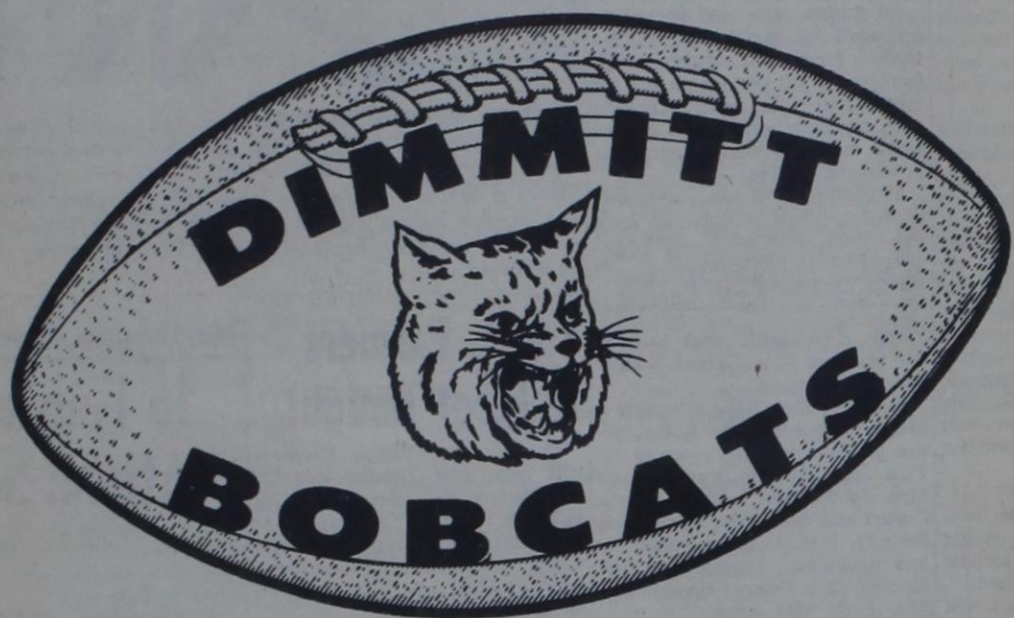

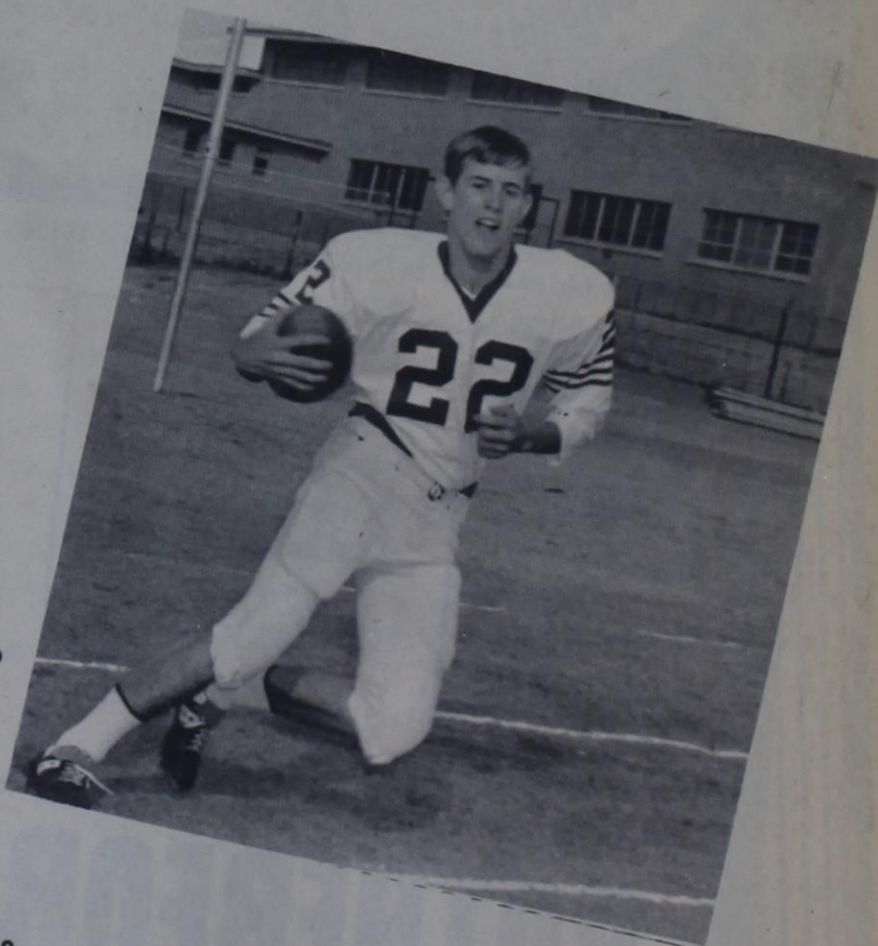

**Sewing? So Sew Safely**

Another busy week has gone. I'm wondering if any of you tried to preserve fall foliage by the recipe I gave. I started some a week ago Saturday, and so far they look good. I'll let you know if it works.

**SATURDAY evening** was our 4-H County Awards Program and supper. There were about 200 present. The highlight of the evening was Judge Raymond Wilson's announcement of the Gold Star girl, Sharon Hochstein, and Gold Star boy, Mickey Simpson. They will both be in Amarillo Saturday for the District I Gold Star Banquet. Rodney Hutto and Diana Adams from this county

will also attend as they each have a part on the program. Also, Ronnie Burks will play the piano at the district banquet.

**Bethel Home Demonstration Club** met for a luncheon Wednesday. Each member brought the recipe for what she'd prepared. I got very good recipes for salads. Reta Welch had one I'd like to share with you:

- 1 small can crushed pineapple, drained
- 1 can cherry pie filling
- 1 package orange Jello (add only enough water to dissolve)
- 6 bananas, sliced
- 1 cup pecans
- Put in a baked pastry shell and

top with shipped cream. If you like, you can use it without the shell and frost it with whipped cream.

It is delicious and very nice to make for the holidays. It doesn't take much time, either.

**MANY homemakers** in our county sew. Here are some safety rules for you to consider and follow to prevent many small accidents.

If small children are underfoot when you're sewing, keep needles, pins, shears, and other sharp instruments out of their reach. If you have a place for each piece of your sewing equipment, and keep it there, your sewing will be more convenient and safer, too.

Needles should be kept in a pin cushion or bag. This keeps the needles sharp and prevents rusting during damp weather. The original package the needles came in is also a safe place to keep them.

**KEEP THE pins** you are using in a pin cushion. They will be handy to use, and you will avoid pricked fingers from trying to pick loose pins out of a box. Shears should be kept in a case to protect the points. Don't throw them in a drawer with other equipment. An attractive case can be made from wool or felt scraps.

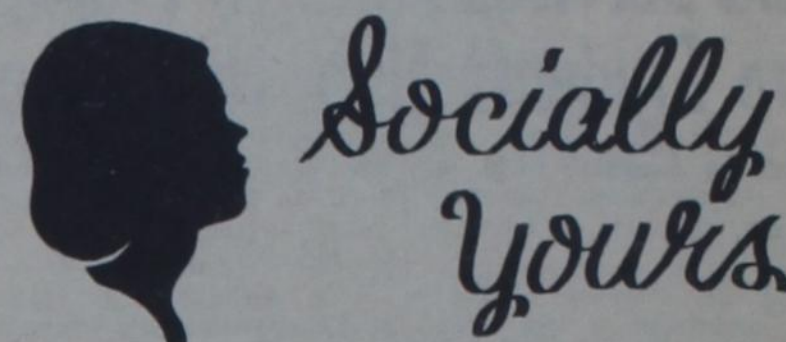
When you are operating the sewing machine, take care to keep your fingers out of the way. One careless moment can result in mashed or needle-pierced fingers. Haste in using your sewing equipment is often followed by painful injury.

If your sewing machine is left up when not in use, place a piece of fabric under the needle bar. Lower the needle into the fabric and then lower the presser foot.

**KEEP THE spools of thread** in thread boxes and extra buttons in boxes or jars. If they are allowed to fall on the floor, someone may slip on them and fall. Children could easily swallow small buttons they find on the floor.

The community's cost for having an AFS student is \$750 per year. Twice this amount would need to be raised for next year if Dimmitt is to get two students, Smith said.

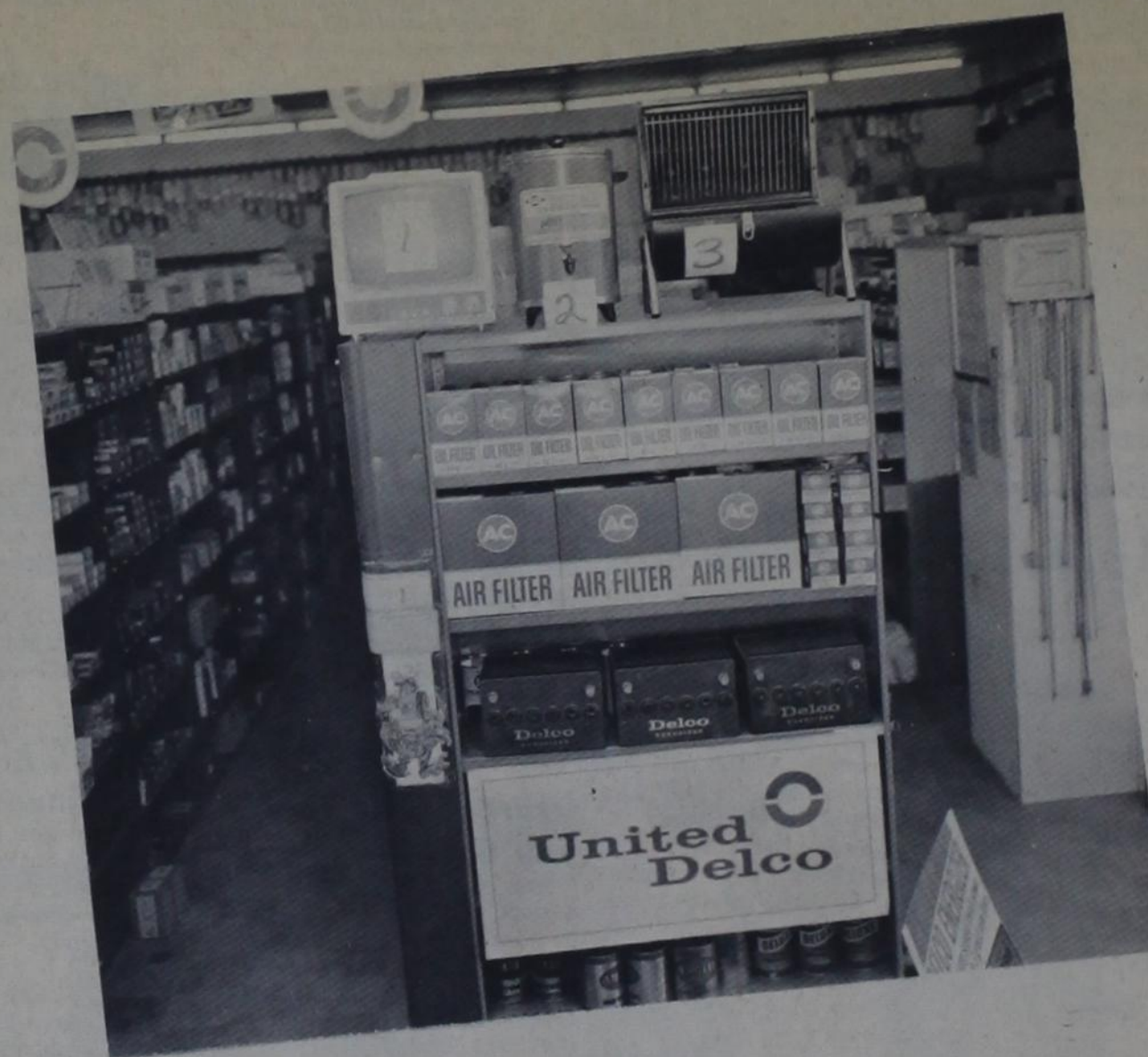

## Special Care of Cotton Seed For '67 Is Needed This Year

Right now is the time for cotton producers on the Plains to begin thinking about a supply of good planting seed for 1967, while they still have most of the 1966 crop from which to choose. **THIS IS the advice of Dr. Levon Ray, agronomist at the South Plains Research and Extension Center north of Lubbock.** Ray says special care in the selection and handling of planting seed from this year's crop will be even more important because of the early freeze and the high incidence of verticillium wilt, angular leaf spot and bacterial blight. Research has consistently and repeatedly proven that good planting seed is near the top among factors which influence both yield and quality in cotton production. Tests have shown as much as \$30 per acre additional income from good, strong, varietally pure planting seed. First, Ray says producers should arrange to get seed from cotton in the most mature, disease free field available. **SECOND, the seed roll at the gin should be dumped before this cotton is ginned.** It is not possible to maintain varietal purity in any other way, he cautioned.

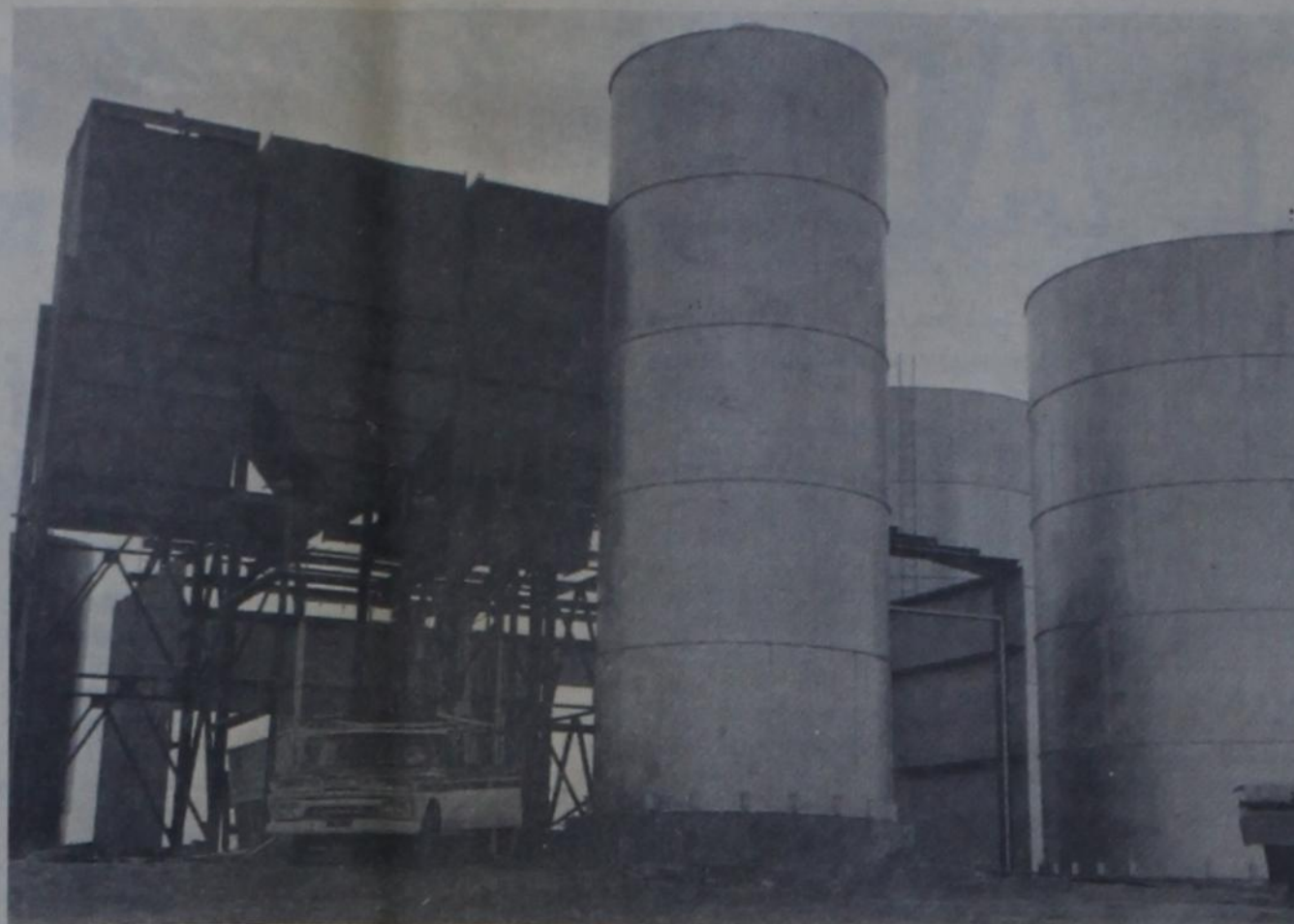
