City crashes rise in state

Traffic accidents took almost \$69 million out of the public till during September, the Texas Safety Association noted this week.

THE TOTAL cost of traffic accidents on Texas streets and highways soared past the half-billion dollar mark during the first nine months of the year, reaching \$589 million when computed according to a National Safety Council formula.

Preliminary reports for September indicate an estimated \$26 million lost from rural fatalities, injuries and property damage. Urban accident costs added another \$43 million to the tab, safety officials estimate.

Noting a 6 percent increase in fatalities in urban areas over the first nine months of 1968, the Safety Association emphasized the continuing need for the constant use of seatbelts, since a driver's chances of survival in a crash are five times greater if he is not thrown from the car.

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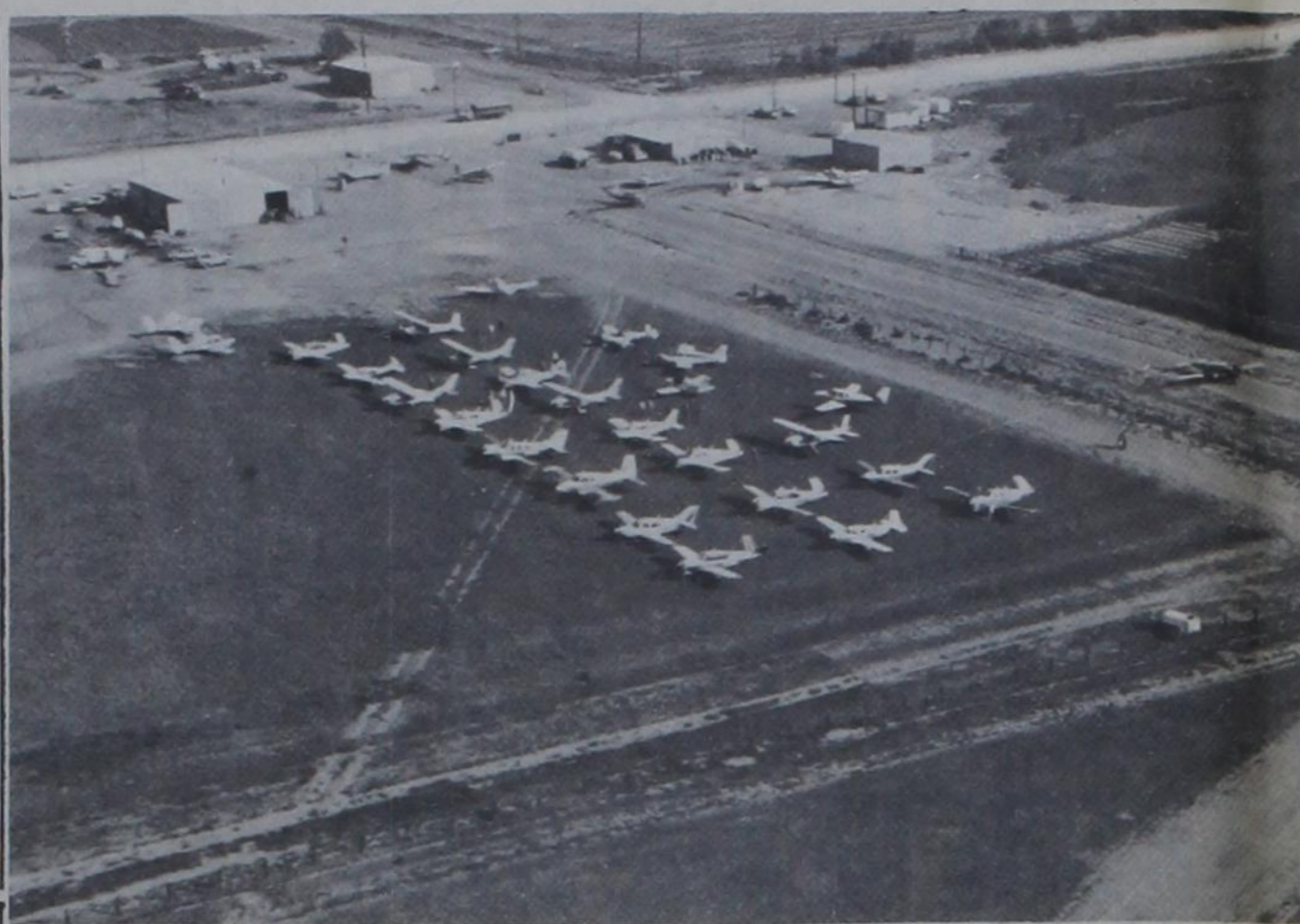

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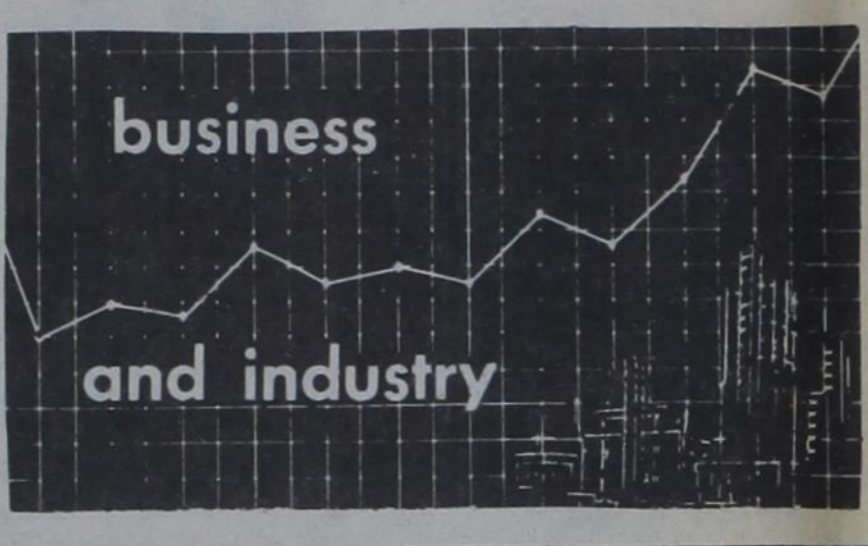

**Christmas Seal goals explained**

Urging residents of Castro County to support the 1969 Christmas Seal campaign against tuberculosis, emphysema and other respiratory diseases, President Bert Nuckols of the Top of Texas TB Association warned this week that one American in six is infected with TB germs, "and most of them don't know it."

**NOTING** that Texas had over 3,000 reported new cases of active TB in 1968, plus 412 relapses, Nuckols said that TB causes over two million deaths per year throughout the world, and that the US has over 300,000 cases of TB under medical supervision now.

"The crying need in TB control is education," Nuckols said. "We are trying to educate people to the need for tuberculin skin tests as part of their physical exami-

**Gifford-Hill lists changes in hierarchy**

John R. Hill Jr. was named Friday as president and chief executive officer of Gifford-Hill & Co., Inc., in a major change in the company's organization.

**P. W. GIFFORD**, chairman of the board and former president, announced the reorganization after a special meeting of the board of directors at the company's Dallas headquarters.

Gifford will continue as board chairman and chairman of the executive committee, finance committee and planning council. He also will be the board chairman and president of Gifco, Inc., a new subsidiary created Friday by the directors. Gifco will acquire the depleted sand and gravel properties of Gifford-Hill — about 18,000 acres of land in Texas, Arkansas and Louisiana — and will seek to sell, lease or develop these properties for industrial parks, recreation areas and other uses.

Gifford-Hill manufactures and sells diversified construction materials, and has a sales and service outlet in Dimmitt.

**TWO** executive vice-presidents of Gifford-Hill also were named Friday. They are James W. Porter, formerly president of the pipe division, and Robert N. Parker, who was senior vice-president under the former corporate structure.

Gifford said the new corporate structure is designed to provide closer integration of operations and staff functions.

"We believe the new organization will enable the company to benefit more fully from the mergers that took place on March 31 of this year, when Gifford-Hill Pipe Co., Gifford-Hill-Western, Inc., and Wales Transportation, Inc., were merged into the parent Gifford-Hill & Co.," Gifford said.

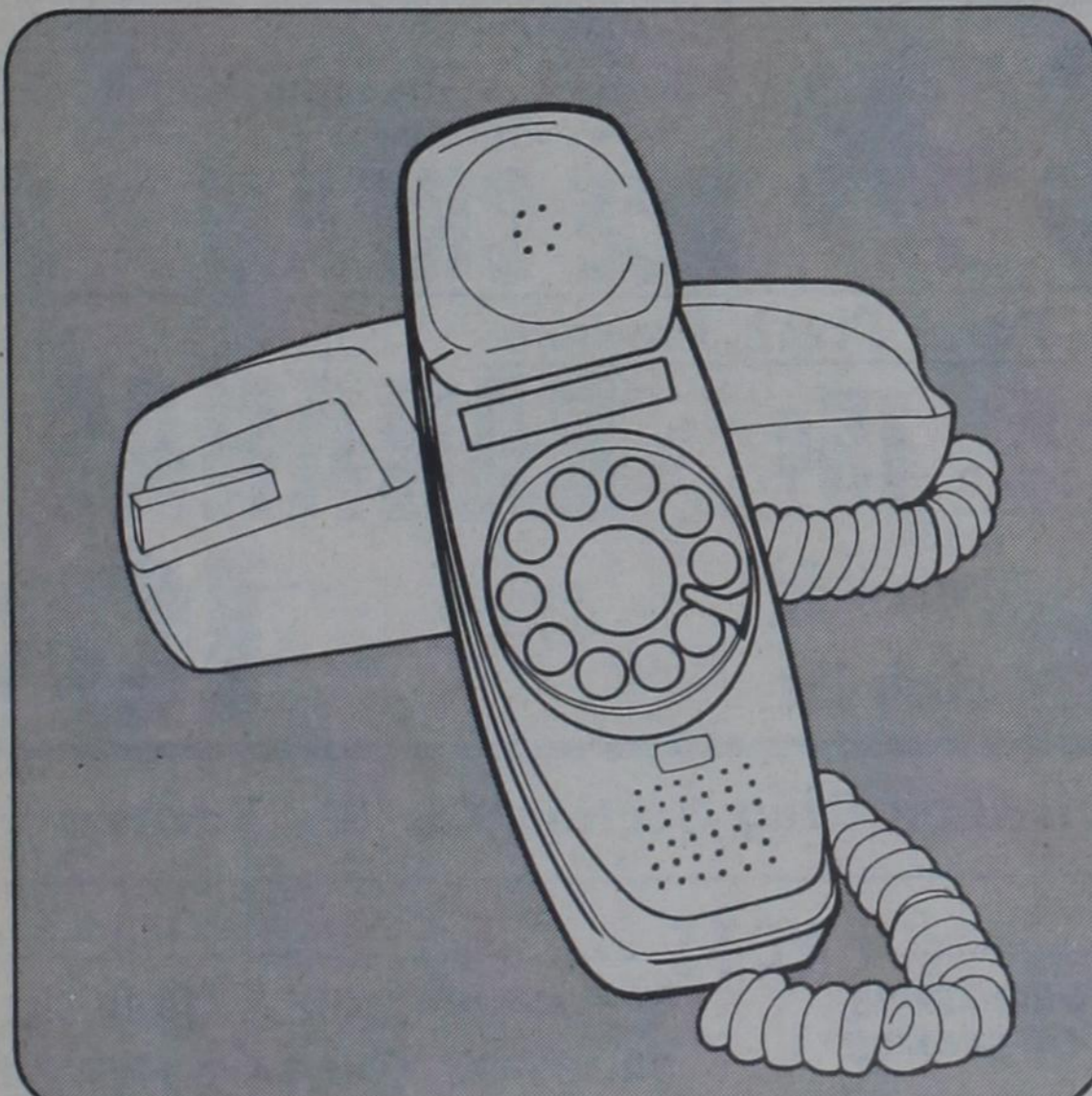
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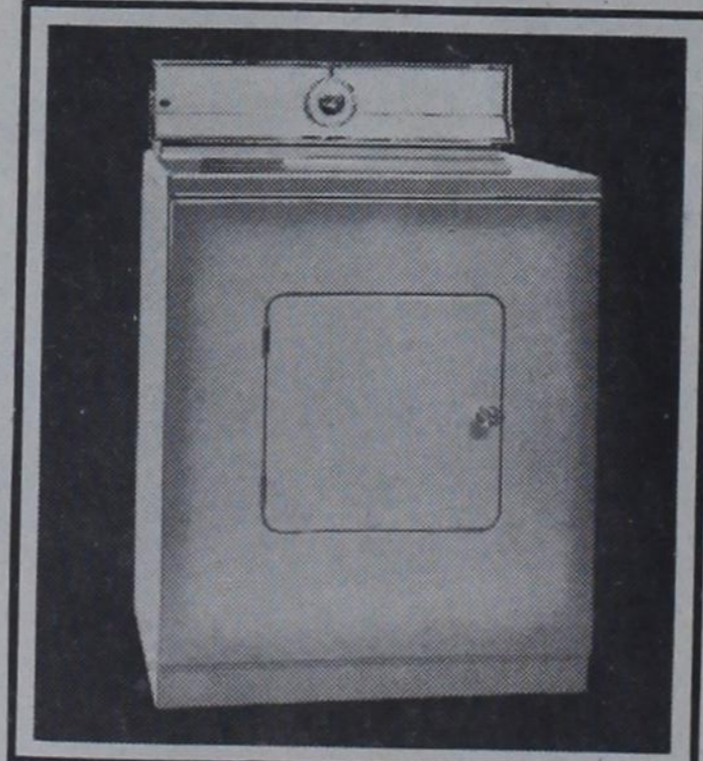

### Hart youths to trick-or-treat for CROP on Halloween night

Halloween will be "CROP" time again this year for Hart youngsters. **THEY WILL "trick or treat!"** for the Christian Rural Overseas Program to help provide food and self-help materials to the world's under-developed nations.

Mrs. Weldon Jones and Rev. C. T. Cunningham, local CROP co-chairmen, said approximately 50 junior and senior high students from all Hart churches will take part in the CROP Halloween project.

Last year Hart youngsters collected \$234.48 for the CROP project and helped other youngsters throughout Texas to collect more than \$65,000 for the program.

These donations helped the Church World Service provide almost 10 million pounds of food and self-help materials, and also helped CROP provide food under the Food for Peace Program, and to turn over almost \$250,000 to church overseas agencies other than the Church World Service for their relief ministries.

The Christian Rural Overseas Program is the hunger appeal of Church World Service which collects farm commodities and cash through volunteer workers, for the overseas relief and rehabilitation programs of the churches. Gifts to CROP are put to use under church supervision strictly on the basis of need.

Halloween has come to mean "CROP" time, a time of Christian sharing, to the young people of Texas. It has become a time of collecting for others in a Christian ministry of compassion when hunger threatens more than two-thirds of the world's population.

Contributions received through the youths' trick-or-treat program for CROP this year will help provide for the handling and distribution of government-donated foods in the Food for Peace Program, as well as to provide other assistance — such as high protein foods, emergency supplies, agricultural tools and seeds — not otherwise available to the overseas programs of the churches.

In some cases, the contributions will help in the shipment of local commodities.

# Cats rebound with 36-6 conquest

Roy Thomas, playing the most spectacular game of his senior year, rolled up 170 yards on power sweeps and plunges to lead the Dimmitt Bobcats to a 36-6 victory over the Abernathy Antelopes Friday night, moving the Cats back into contention for the 3-AA title.

**IT WAS** the first district loss of the season for the visiting Antelopes.

The 170 yards posted by the 149-pound halfback was the most he has ever gained in a single game, and it came on 28 carries as Thomas had to take over most of the running duties after Danny Newton was hurt early in the game.

Nelson Chavers, playing with an injured knee, gained 57 yards on 18 carries. Mark Cleavinger gained 15 yards the only time he carried the ball, filling in for Bill Sanders at quarterback on one series of downs.

**BOBCAT Stadium** was filled with a steady mist that became

heavy in the final two periods, but the Cats still managed to put on a passing attack that got them their first two touchdowns and a 14-0 lead at halftime.

After forcing the Antelopes to punt the first time the visitors had the ball, the Cats started a drive from their own 20 and marched to the Antelope 24-yard line with Newton, Thomas and Chavers carrying the brunt of the attack.

Sanders hit Cleavinger with a pass on the 15-yard line and the speedy end carried it in for what appeared to be a Bobcat touchdown — but it was called back and the Cats were penalized 5 yards for illegal motion. The Antelopes held and took over on downs at the Abernathy 25.

**IN THIS** initial Bobcat drive, Newton injured his leg and was forced to leave the game. Matthew Daniels filled in for Newton the rest of the quarter, but Newton returned in the second period and finished the game on defense. However, he carried only two more times on offense.

## Quail season to start Nov. 8, with exceptions

Quail season will be Nov. 8 through Jan. 31 in Castro County and throughout most of the Panhandle.

**BUT THERE** are some exceptions to the general Panhandle season dates that could get a quail hunter into trouble if he doesn't mark his calendar.

In Briscoe, Childress, Cottle, Hall and Motley Counties, the quail season won't open until Dec. 1.

And in Lamb County, the season and bag limits will not be effective until approved by the Lamb County Commissioners Court.

The commissioners court declared a short season in Lamb County two years ago, starting a fight that went all the way to the Texas Legislature.

**HERE ARE** the quail season dates and bag limits for the Panhandle regulatory area, set by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission at its last regular quarterly meeting:

Nov. 8 through Jan. 31, with a bag limit of 12 per day and 36 in possession in Armstrong, Bailey, Carson, Castro Collingsworth, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Donley, Floyd, Gray, Hale, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lamb, Lipscomb, Moore, Ochiltree, Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Roberts, Sherman and Swisher Counties.

Dec. 1 through Jan. 31, with a bag limit of 12 per day and 36 in possession in Briscoe, Childress, Cottle, Hall and Motley Counties.

The tough Dimmitt defense held again and forced the Antelopes to punt. Thomas fumbled the slippery ball in receiving the punt and Larry Turner recovered at the Bobcat 36. Abernathy went to work with Charles Johnson and Mark Harrison doing the ground work and Bobby Klatt chumking, but after a 15-yard offensive holding penalty and a pass that went over the head of Mike Kerr in the end zone — caused by Randy Griffitt's hard tackle on Klatt as he was passing — the Bobcats took over at the 30-yard line.

**DIMMITT'S** first score came midway in the second period after Harrison fumbled when hit by Gary Langford, Roy Thomas and Loy Wylie and Langford recovered for the Cats at the Abernathy 33.

After two running plays by Thomas and one by Chavers moved the ball to the 18-yard line, Sanders surprised the Antelopes and hit Wylie with a pass in the end zone for the touchdown. The pass was being blocked by defender Don Snodgrass but Wylie wrenched the ball out of his hands for the score. Cleavinger booted the extra point and Dimmitt was in the lead, 7-0.

The Bobcats' next touchdown came after Thomas fielded a punt by Ronald Harkey on the Dimmitt 45 and ran it back to the Antelope 34. Sanders' pass this time bounced off the shoulder pad of Mike Kerr and Cleavinger scooped it up for the touchdown. Cleavinger's kick again was good and Dimmitt had a 14-0 advantage with 5:06 left in the half.

**ABERNATHY** threatened late in the second quarter but Mark Cleavinger batted down two Klatt passes in the end zone to keep the Antelopes from scoring. Time and time again, Cleavinger stifled the intended receiver, and Thom-

as also came through to make several tackles to bottle up the Antelope offense.

Dimmitt's line gave up only three first downs in the first half. Since the Antelope defense had Thomas stopped for the long gain, this stiff Bobcat defense and Sanders' two touchdown passes spelled the 14-0 difference at halftime.

The Antelopes came loping back in the third period, driving 65 yards for the score. Johnson and Harrison moved the ball to the Dimmitt 9-yard line on sweeps and power plays. Klatt pulled the keeper and went in for the score from the 9 just as Sanders was coming up to stop him. Sanders blocked the pass for the two extra points and Dimmitt's lead was cut to 14-6 with less than three minutes gone in the third period.

**BUT DIMMITT** bounced back three minutes later when Randy Schumacher recovered a fumble by Johnson on the Abernathy 16. Three plays later, Thomas powered over the right side of the line for four yards and the touchdown. Cleavinger booted the extra point to move Dimmitt's lead to 21-6 with 5:08 left in the third period.

The Bobcats started another drive in the waning minutes of the third, but Mike Kerr intercepted a Sanders pass on the 24-yard line as the period ended.

Dimmitt's next score came after Thomas ran an Abernathy punt back from the Dimmitt 40-yard line to the Abernathy 32. Chavers and Thomas alternated at running, and the Cats scored

when Thomas smashed over left guard from the 6-yard line.

Cleavinger's kick was good, but Abernathy was offside. Dimmitt took the penalty — half the distance to the goal line — then Chavers pounded over for two extra points with 5:15 gone in the final period. This upped the Bobcat lead to 29-6.

**ON THE** Antelopes' first play following the kickoff, Langford intercepted Klatt's pass on the Dimmitt 45-yard line and ran it back to the Abernathy 45. Guard Randy Talley is still a questionable starter, though, as he continues to have trouble with the knee injury that has kept him sidelined for four of the first six games, including the last three.

THE BOBCATS seem to be at full strength mentally, too, the coach said.

They didn't dwell too long on their 28-26 upset by Olton before deciding they weren't going to let it happen again.

"I think our boys showed what kind of character they had against Abernathy," Smith said, "and they had to show it against a good team. The game was pretty close for a while, and if our boys had been down it could have been a long night."

SMITH added, "We were getting those second and third efforts against Abernathy, and that makes all the difference sometimes. I hope we can keep getting that kind of desire the rest of the year."

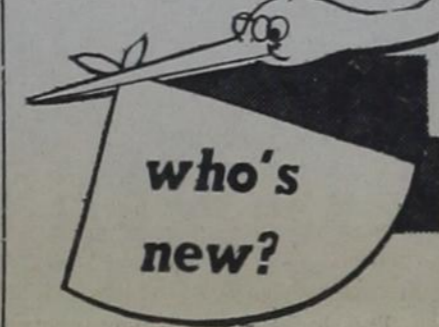
The ideal size for a den is eight boys, he said, although some of Dimmitt's dens now have more than that number.
