147 Firemen Visit Dimmitt Convention

The 48th Semi-Annual Convention of the Panhandle Firemen's Association held in Dimmitt Tuesday was one of the most successful yet, according to Fire Chief Willie John Word.

Attendance was 147 not counting the local department. Memphis won first place in the water polo and pumper races.

Three Youths Jailed In Theft

Three Latin American youths are in Castro County jail following their apprehension on charges of theft at the Clay Anderson farm near Hart Tuesday.

One of the boys, Everett Costello, is an escapee from the reform school at Gatesville and he has been returned there. The three being held locally are Earnest Artarove, Louis Bargas, and Romero Natera, all 17 years of age.

Anderson had asked an employment agency in Plainview to send out some farm hands. They arrived while he was gone and allegedly did the stealing then. Several hundred dollars worth of rifles, clothing and other miscellaneous items were taken but were recovered when the boys were apprehended by Plainview police Wednesday.

Nazareth In Baseball Lead

Nazareth High School Swifts rang up their 28th baseball game without a loss and at the same time won their third straight bi-district game in defeating Spade High School Wednesday at Olton.

The champion Swifts were paced by pitcher Leroy Hoelting who threw a no-hitter. Fred Acker hit two home runs and a double and Joe Venhaus hit one homer.

In their own district the Swifts have played and won six games. In bi-district play they have defeated Springlake and Farwell High Schools and in non-conference play have handed Plainview two defeats.

Castro County exceeded by \$29 its 1958 cancer fund goal of \$1,000 Drive Chairman Frank Latimer announced this week.

"We had a little over \$800 when a committee of women directed by Mrs. B. A. Fuller, Mrs. H. A. Cooper and Mrs. Ed Harris spent a day serving coffee and taking donations at the Dimmitt and Hart post offices and banks," Mr. Latimer said. "These ladies collected \$206 Wednesday to put the drive over the top and help in the fight against cancer."

Last year's goal was not met, lacking about \$50. Also expected yet are some memorials not turned in.

A member of the National Honor Society and the Science Club, he has been a two-year letterman on the Bobcat basketball team and is editor of the Bobcat Tales.

Last Rites for Mrs. E. B. Wright Held Monday

Mrs. Tina May Wright, 67, of Dimmitt died at 11:50 a.m. Saturday at Castro County Hospital following an automobile accident on Highway 51 in the north part of town.

The accident, which occurred directly in front of Cash and Carry Grocery, was apparently caused by Mrs. Wright suffering a heart attack. The front of her 1956 Ford was demolished when she plowed into the rear of a creamery truck. Mrs. Wright was unconscious when taken from the car and rushed to the hospital. She had been traveling south when she hit the truck. The force of the collision turned her car half around. The truck was parked at the time.

Mrs. Wright was well known in the Dimmitt area. The wife of past Dimmitt mayor E. B. Wright, she was a member of several local organizations and the Methodist Church. Mr. and Mrs. Wright, married in June, 1908, were pioneers of this area, having lived here since 1917. She was born in Arkansas in 1891 and was 67 years of age at the time of the accident.

Funeral services were conducted at 3 p.m. Monday at the First Methodist Church in Dimmitt. Interment was in the Castro Memorial Gardens under the direction of Dennis Funeral Home.

She is survived by her husband; one son, J. M. of Dimmitt; one daughter, Mrs. Tina May Fulcher, Waco; four sisters, Mrs. W. B. Downing, Brownfield, Mrs. J. B. Cardwell and Mrs. W. W. Royalty of Lubbock and Mrs. J. C. Burgess of Rusdale, Arkansas; one brother, Arthur May, Carlsbad, N. M.; four grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Baccalaureate services for the Dimmitt High School senior graduating class will be held in the First Methodist Church Sunday at 8 p.m.

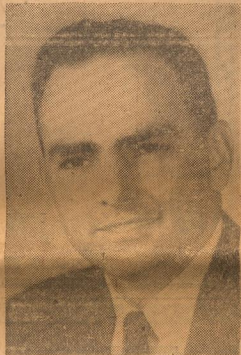
Commencement exercises will be held at the school auditorium Tuesday, also at 8 p.m.




"There is in every man, latent though it may have become, an awareness of his responsibility to God for the wise use of our soil and its related resources—water, plants and wildlife.

The church is, and truly ought to be, a factor for reminding man of his obligation to God in the use of God's rich natural gifts. For too long our people have neglected or used without appreciation or understanding these divinely created resources.

Already in this comparatively young nation we have lost millions of acres of good productive land. We have let water, a necessity and a boon to every community, become a scourge as it rushes seaward, bearing loads of sediment to stream, channel and precious reservoir.

This is again a reminder that this should be a very good year to rest native grassland for a good part of the growing season. Of course grazing weeds and annual grasses has not hurt up to now, but for maximum benefit to the good grasses, livestock should be taken off in the near future. A good example of what can be expected from resting native grass can be seen on Leo Witkowski's place about one half mile east of his house on the north. Leo chiseled his pasture during the winter of 1956 and rested it most of the growing season of 1957. This grass made a very fine recovery in 1957 and made a good seed crop. The chiseling on Witkowski's grass had a very good effect along with the resting.

Remember that you can receive ACP assistance for resting your grass for six months or one year. All grass needs a rest to regain vigor and produce seed crops occasionally.

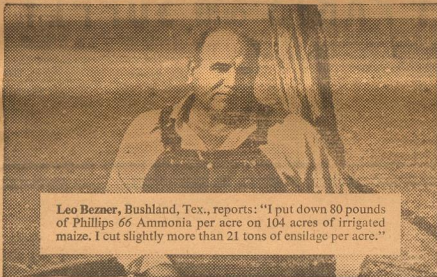

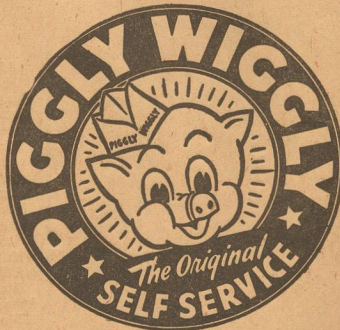
