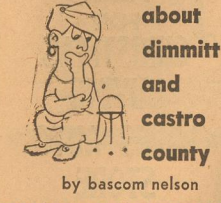
One outstanding scene takes place in the land of fairy tales, Denmark, where Casper and Mable see the story of Cinderella acted out by a group of children from the second and third grades.

"There are a number of victims of muscular distrophy in the immediate Panhandle," Willie John Word, Dimmitt fire chief said this week. "We know that any donation which you can make, however large or small, will be greatly appreciated by those families who have victims in their home, so when one of your volunteer firemen calls on you please give generously. It is going to be out of town in the next few days, you may make your donation to any of the firemen."

The muscular distrophy drive by the firemen last year netted more than \$280, which was sent to the national headquarters for later refunding to the Panhandle Chapter with headquarters in Amarillo.

## Finished Bank Building Open to Public Sunday

Employees and officials of the First State Bank of Dimmitt will show the public through their new ultra-modern and luxurious building at an open house Sunday between 2 and 6 p.m.

This occasion will climax a seven-months building program by Killingsworth Construction Company of Dimmitt.

The new building housing the 50-year-old banking firm is one of the finest in this area and construction costs were set at \$113,389.

The open house Sunday is for the general public. "We planned sending formal invitations to our customers and others whom we thought might be interested in attending," Bob McLean, president of the bank said this week. "However the increased tempo of our work may have caused even the names of some of our oldest customers to be overlooked. So I would like to issue a special invitation here, from myself and the other officers and employees of the bank, for everyone to attend our open house Sunday."

New occupants of the present bank building will be the Castro County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Office. The ASC will begin partially moving during next week, but the actual major transfer is slated for Saturday, November 22 with the office being ready to operate as usual the following Monday. The main fixtures and counters will remain in the building for ASC use.

A new feature of the new bank will be the drive-in teller window. Patrons will drive behind the building and circle around to the east side where they can make deposit, withdrawals and transact other similar business from the driver's seat of their car.

Another feature shown guests Sunday will be the luxurious community room, added to the bank as an additional public service for the use of people of the area. The large, modern room is carpeted and the use of draperies is accented. It will accommodate a meeting of about sixty people for any civic meeting or other worthwhile purpose.

The entire building has 6,000 feet of floor space, measuring 60x100 feet. Designers of the building were architects Robert A. Alexander and Associates of room.

Directors of the bank are Mr. and Mrs. Bob McLean, Mr. and Mrs. Ira Clingsmith and Mrs. Sal DiCuffa.

### Bobcats In Crucial Game Here Friday

The Dimmitt Bobcats will wind up their regularly scheduled season here Friday night against the Canyon Eagles in the annual Homecoming game.

For the second time this year the Bobcats are going into a football game as underdogs. Canyon is undefeated in conference play, falling before Phillips, Perryton and Dumas in non-district clashes. These three teams are among the best in the Panhandle.

Dimmitt has been defeated once in conference play this year. Their loss was to Dalhart, a team edged out by Canyon earlier this season. Dimmitt will go into the game fresh from a 48-7 victory over Tulia last Friday and Canyon can do the same thing after dropping Friona 34-6. Dimmitt has clinched third place and if they can pull the Canyon game out of the fire will be a third owner of a championship cup with Canyon and Dalhart. Both Dalhart and Dimmitt would like to see the Bobcats win. It will be a make or break game for Canyon. Dimmitt has a chance for representing the conference in the regional playoffs both by a flip of the coin if there is a three-way tie or by games won if Friona defeats Dalhart (considered highly unlikely) and Dimmitt defeats Canyon.

### Salvation Army Drops Tambourine In Favor of Single County Drive

One of the oldest and best-known systems of collections for public welfare—the Salvation Army tambourine—will be replaced in Dimmitt by an annual drive, it was announced this week.

A drive chairman, committee-men, and a full-fledged organization for the drive has been set up and will begin working with a kick-off breakfast at 7:30 a.m. Wednesday, November 19th in the Steak House Cafe.

This is the first time such a drive has been held in Dimmitt and marks the end in Texas of the traditional tambourine collections. Only one other chapter in the state uses this method.

Mr. Dan Johnston, Region V field director for the Salvation Army, said this week that one of the main reasons for the change over was that too many other organizations were copying the tambourine collections. This way, he said, donors will know their contributions are going to the Salvation Army and not some other organization that uses the same type dress and method of collecting funds.

Bill Harman, owner of Harman's Department Store in Dimmitt, will head the drive for Dimmitt. The County-wide campaign will employ the use of some 50 workers Mr. Johnston said.

The Service Unit Committee, which represents the Salvation Army in this county on a permanent basis, was reorganized Wednesday. Don Gladman, who has held his post for several years, was reappointed chairman and Judge Robert Estes named vice-chairman. Bob McLain will be treasurer and Earl Brock welfare secretary. Jack Cartwright is in charge of transit relief. All local welfare problems will be handled entirely by this committee. Casey Jones is chairman at Hart and Joe Warren is chairman at Nazareth.

Goal of the drive will be \$1,500. Method of operating the drive will be announced at a later date.

### Edgar Dennis Wins Farm Bureau State Talent Contest With Whips



A whip-cracking artist from Dimmitt will represent Texas in the entertainment program at the American Farm Bureau's national convention in Boston December 7 through 11.

He is Edgar Dennis, son of Mr. and Mrs. Morgan Dennis, and presently a student at Hardin Simmons University. He won the first place in the first state-wide talent-contest ever sponsored by the Farm Bureau. He was chosen at a State Farm Bureau Convention in Corpus Christi earlier this week.

Young Dennis had won the right to go to the state convention by winning first place at the Dimmitt Talent Find program here last summer with his whip act. He was named winner after performing against other contestants in the Driscoll Hotel Terrace Room in Corpus Christi Monday.

After popping a bull whip with first one hand, then the other, Dennis performed with a whip in each hand at the same time. The act became more tense when Mrs. Allen Webb of Dimmitt held a straw for Dennis to snap off with the whip. After holding the straw at arm's length and then behind her she held it in her mouth while Dennis cut it off inch by inch.

Other feats were splitting a newspaper held by Mrs. Webb, wrapping the whip around her waist and then twirling her with it and keeping time to "Yankee Doodle" with the popping of two whips.

Dennis, who graduated from Dimmitt High School, is also a trumpeter and special performer in the Hardin-Simmons Cowboy Band.

His performance next month in Boston will be in the Symphony Hall there. The national convention will also hear such speakers as Madame Chiang Kai-shek, Senator Barry M. Goldwater of Arizona, Senator Spessard L. Holland, of Florida and Allan B. Kline, past national president of the American Farm Bureau.

### Neumayers Are Honored By Waco Orphanage

Mr. and Mrs. Dilmond Neumayer were honored at an annual Methodist Home Commissioners dinner in Waco on November 5th.

The Neumayers were cited for continuous contributions to the Methodist Home, a home for orphans. Mr. Neumayer has delivered some 500,000 pounds of vegetables over the past 16 years. These have been mostly potatoes, carrots, parsnips, lettuce, and cabbage.

Mr. Neumayer received a citation, read before the gathering of 300 by the secretary of the Board of Commissioners. Mrs. Neumayer was presented two dozen red roses.

Also present at the dinner from Dimmitt was Rev. Darris L. Egger, pastor of the First Methodist Church in Dimmitt.

Mr. Hubert Johnson, superintendent of the home, will appear before the congregation of the church in Dimmitt in the near future for a public presentation of a plaque commemorating the work done by Mr. Neumayer in behalf of the home.

Mr. Neumayer's latest contribution to the Methodist Home was last week when he delivered 15,000 pounds of lettuce for the children there.

All the vegetables go for consumption of children in the home. It is kept in cold storage. To date this year Mr. Neumayer has delivered eight loads of vegetables. Ordinarily the vegetables are presented to him by friends and he hires hands to load one of his trucks which he personally drives to the home in Waco to make delivery.

The citation presented him by the home is the first such ever awarded.

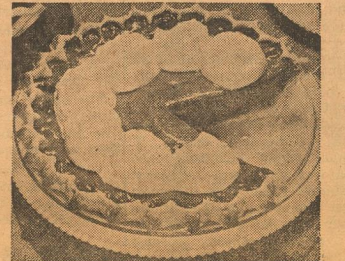

- 9-inch single crust unbaked pie shell

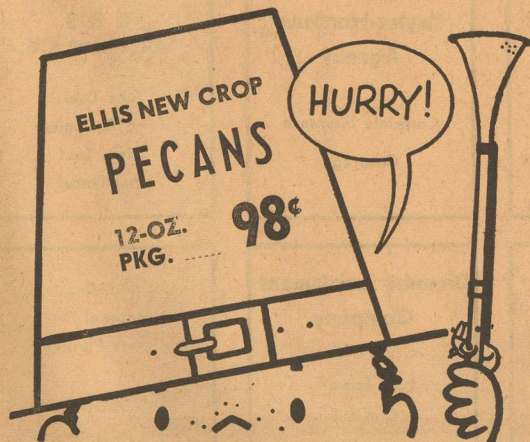
