# City-Wide Cleanup Set for July 15

The date for the annual Dimmitt city-wide clean-up was set for Tuesday, July 15, at a group meeting Tuesday composed of representatives from the various civic and service organizations of the city.

It was pointed out, that this year as usual, the biggest task confronting the clean-up committee would be securing of the cooperation of the citizenship of the city. Delegates from two women's clubs, the JayCee-Ettes and the Garden Club, agreed to assume the responsibility of coordinating the campaign in both the business and residential areas and to supply inspection teams to report on the success of the clean-up effort.

To supplement newspaper publicity and telephone contacts the JayCee-Ettes will circulate petitions in the business district to secure the signatures of firms that will agree to either close up their establishments on the morning of the Clean-Up Day or else furnish help to complete the task.



The Dimmitt Garden Club will spear-head the campaign in the residential district by calling residents and soliciting their cooperation and by rendering any other service necessary in the promotion of a successfully clean-up campaign.

Other organizations represented at the meeting Tuesday, and pledging wholehearted cooperation in the clean-up drive, were the Dimmitt Lions Club, Chamber of Commerce and City Officials.

Although Tuesday, July 15, has been designated as the official clean-up day, all Dimmitt residents are urged to insure a successful clean-up campaign by doing whatever work is necessary in advance of that date in order that the drive can be completed on schedule.

The City will supply sufficient trucks to haul away all trash and

in cutting weeds and picking up trash on vacant lots in their vicinity.

An official proclamation, appearing elsewhere on this page, by Mayor Joe Cowen, points up the need for, and benefits to be derived from, a City-Wide Clean Up.

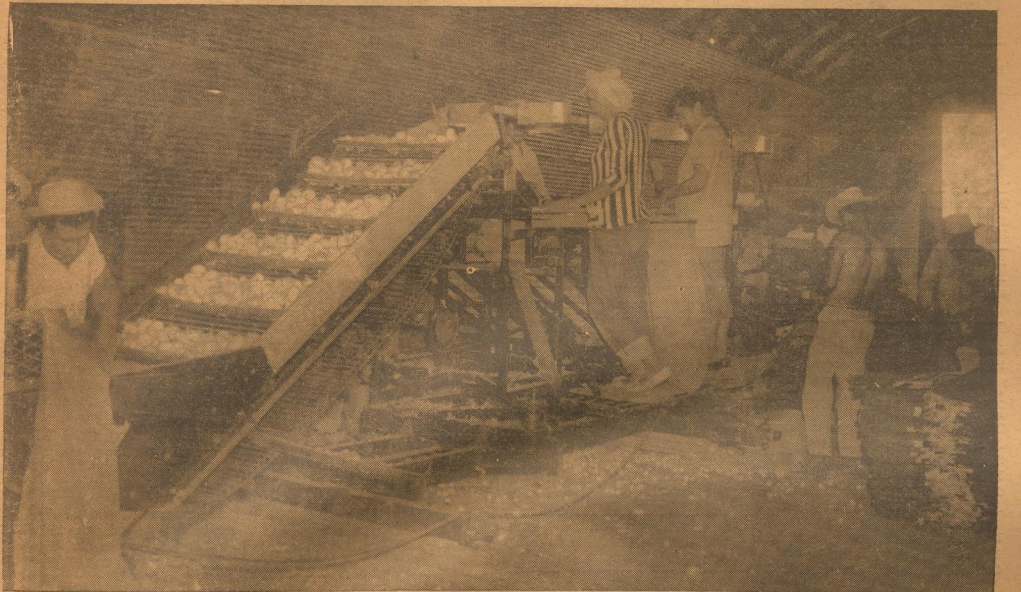

## Grain Firm to Build New Elevator Unit

Dimmitt Wheat Growers will start on a new one and three quarter-million bushel elevator unit next week.

The new white concrete structure will cross the railroad tracks west of the present south unit and continue south down the tracks. Measuring 62x186 feet the new unit will be 165 feet high and cost an estimated \$362,000. It will be constructed by the Chalmer-Barton firm of Hutchinson, Kansas and will be composed of 19 bins.

Expected completion date will be about October 1. This new unit will push Dimmitt Wheat Grower's storage to 3 million bushels, one of the largest capacities in this area. The new unit will operate with an aeration system which requires no grain turning.



**FIRST ONIONS**—Castro County's first onions to be processed by Pacific Fruit and Produce were run through the new processing machine here this week. Two crops, from the H. D. Smith and Glenn Terrell farms at Hart, were the first through the machine. Onions are selling around \$1.50 for yellows and \$2.00 for whites per 50-pound sack. Out of this price must come processing and other charges. Maximum yields for onions is expected to be better than 600 sacks per acre. The onion season will last for 30 to 45 more days. Carrot processing activity is expected to start later this month.

## Hospital Bond Election Changed to August 26

The coming Castro County Hospital Bond election date has been changed from Tuesday, September 9th to Tuesday, August 26th, according to an announcement this week by County Judge Robert Estes.

Confirmation of the August 26th date is expected from the Commissioners Court which must pass on bond election dates.

Reason for the change is that the State Board of Education, which receives by law the first chance to accept or refuse municipal and county bond offerings, meets in September just before the first proposed date. This would mean the bonding company handling the bonds would have to wait until the board met again. By holding the election during August, the bonds can be accepted or rejected by the Board of Education in September.

Under some revenue setups in Texas, there are funds which cannot be touched, but which can be invested and the proceeds used for school operation.

## Latin Youth Held Following East Dimmitt Knife Slaying

A fight between four Latin-Americans at the open-air Conga Dance Hall in East Dimmitt Friday night resulted in the death of one man, Doretto Rios, 47.

Held in connection with the slaying is 17-year-old Thomas Aldaco.

The fight started when young Aldaco and Joe Rios, son of the dead man, got into a heated argument at the dance. Both fathers

of the two boys soon joined in and the fight started. During the scuffling young Aldaco allegedly drove a dagger-type knife into the back of Rios, killing him almost instantly.

According to Sheriff Jack Cartwright, Aldaco fled as soon as he saw what had happened, but relatives brought him in later after he had returned home. The knifeing occurred about ten minutes before midnight Friday. The dagger had been purchased with trading stamps, Cartwright said.

The family of the slain man had moved with him several weeks ago from Morton. They returned there after the funeral Saturday.

## Dimmitt Construction Booms During First Six Months of '58

Building in Dimmitt has picked up added vitality after an indifferent 1957 and prospects are for another million-dollar-plus year.

So far \$172,295 has been spent on residential construction, which is probably a six-months record for non-development building here. On the business side, arriving at a definite building figure is an awkward procedure. From one standpoint, more than \$1,000,000 was reached during the first six months—that is, if one grain elevator just outside the city limits is counted plus another whose permit was taken out during the first six months although construction doesn't start until next week.

As it is \$400,000 worth of business buildings were started during the first six months this year, which is still a healthy figure. Total construction this time last year was only \$231,000.

Biggest month for building was February, when \$63,220 in building permits were issued. This was followed by March with \$42,900, May with \$25,800, June with \$22,000, January with \$17,075 and an almost non-existent April with \$1,300.

Most of the residential money was spent on brick or brick veneer homes in the \$10,000-plus bracket. There were seven brick homes started and nine frame-base houses. Considerable remodeling also went on.

Construction-wise, the county economy seems to have loosened up a bit over last year. From a virtual standstill, Dimmitt's building is again approaching 1953-56 levels.

County income has remained fairly stationary. At this time last year there were \$3,849,820 on deposit at the First State Bank, while now deposits are lower by about half a million dollars to \$3,308,674. However it is above 1956 when \$3,140,743 were on deposit.

An estimated 2,000,000-plus bushels of wheat were produced in the county this season which would mean about a 20-bushel average, despite a loss of some 2 to 300,000 bushels due to hail and wind. Prospects are good for a bumper cotton and grain crops also.

Cotton John Smith's Educational Farm and Ranch Tour sponsored by Radio Station KGNC, left Amarillo by plane at 10:20 a.m. Tuesday on the first leg of an European tour. On the trip from Dimmitt were Mr. and Mrs. Homer Newton and Mrs. Pearl Sheffy.

Preceding the takeoff a breakfast was held for the trippers and their guests. New York was the scene of their first stop where they spent about 24 hours, before resuming their flight to London. There they will be formally welcomed by the British Minister of Agriculture. They will go by train to Bristol to attend the Royal Agriculture Show.

At Hereford, England, where the Whiteface cattle breed originated, the entourage will visit the Hereford Herd Book Society. After four days in England the tour will go to Brussels, Belgium, for the Worlds Fair.

Two days of sightseeing in Switzerland will include the cities of Lucerne, Interlaken and Berne. From Switzerland, the travelers will go to Venice, Italy, for a half day gondola tour of that city. They will visit various agriculture and dairy operations in and around Venice, Florence, Rome and Milan, Italy.

After visiting Nice, France, they will tour the palace of Prince Ranier and Grace Kelley in Monaco.

The tour will continue on through South France to Paris, from where they will begin their return journey to the U.S. about August 1.

Boys were selected on the basis of their high school football performance record and on the basis of their coaches' recommendation as to character and attitude.

Keith Lowe was elected to the All-District Team, All-Regional Team, and All-South Plains Team while a student at Dimmitt High School. He was highly recommended by Coach J. D. Covington.

It past history repeats itself there will be standing room only in the 3,000 seat Childress Municipal Stadium on the night of Friday, August 14th. This game each of the past eight years has drawn an over flow crowd of football fans to this pre-season football classic. Tickets can be obtained by writing Post Office Box 28 in Childress. **CHANGE COMING**—Only one major road in Dimmitt remains unpaved today, but within the next several months it, too, will be hard surfaced. This will be a Farm-to-Market road in North Dimmitt and will be the only east-west paved street in that part of town. It will be paved from its juncture with State Highway 51 at Kirkpatrick Sales Company's location to 25-mile-avenue some six miles west of Dimmitt.

## New Paving Soon

Fourteen miles of paving and improvements will take place this summer in and around Dimmitt as the Texas Highway Department has announced.

Affecting Dimmitt most will be the paving of Farm to Market Highway 2392 from Highway 51 west to 25-mile-Avenue six miles east of town. The FM's junction with Highway 51 will be in North Dimmitt adjacent to Kirkpatrick Sales Company. The new paving will lie in front of Castro County Hospital.

Right-of-way preparations by landowners along the route of the road have been under way for several months and are practically completed. The Highway Department is advertising now for bids to be received until July 16. Work is expected to begin around the first of August.

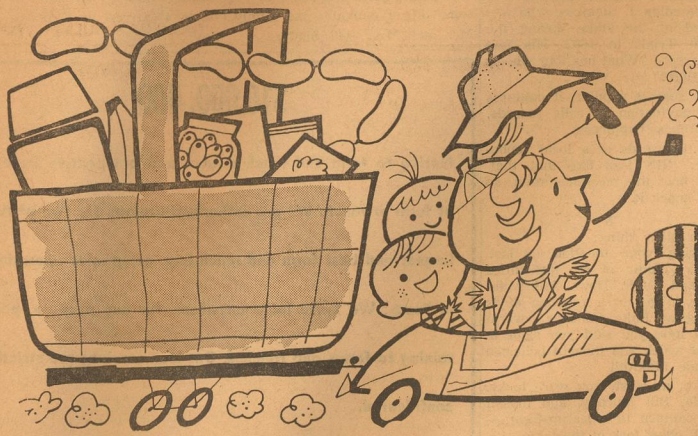
The widening to four lanes of Highway 51 in South Dimmitt from the curve to the Y will also take place in August.

The other major paving in view for this summer is completion of the paving of Farm To Market Road 1305 west of Dimmitt. The new paving will tie together the road which has a gap from its intersection at Highway 86 to near the Easter Gin in the Easter Community. This will mean a completely paved road from Amherst through Earth to Summerfield.

This will be one of the biggest paving programs near Dimmitt in recent years.

### Little Picnic Pies (Makes 4 to 5)

- 1 package (10 ounces) pie crust mix
- 1 package (4 ounces) instant butterscotch pudding mix
- 1 1/2 cups (large can) undiluted Carnation Evaporated Milk
- 1/4 cup chopped nuts
- Shredded or flaked coconut

Mix pie crust according to package directions. Cut 4 or 5 5 1/2-inch heavy aluminum foil circles. Cut the same number of pastry circles, the same size. Place pastry circles on top of aluminum foil circles. Place, foil side out, over bottom of custard cup. Pinch edges together well. Remove from custard cup. Place on baking sheet. Prick pastry with fork. Bake in hot oven (475°F.) about 8 minutes or until done. Do not remove foil.

For filling: Place pudding mix, Carnation and nuts in a wide necked, 1 quart jar. Cover tightly. Shake well for 1 minute. Spoon into tart shells. Top with coconut.

The song is popular, it captures the imagination, it sells records, it spreads happiness.

In the words of a local sophomore: "It's jazz like that that helps bust the recession, man, so don't knock it."
