Commission Accepts Five-Hundred Gallon Well from McDonald

Municipal Water Well, at Depth of 268 Feet, and After Twenty-Four Hour Test, Accepted by City Commission This Week. Work Being Rushed on Reservoir and Distribution System to be Started at Early Date. Test Showed Over Five Hundred Gallons per Minute in Twenty-Four Hour Run.

After a twenty-four hour test, the city water well, D. L. McDonald of Amarillo, contractor, was accepted this week by the City Commission. The test showed over five-hundred gallons per minute, and this fulfilling the contract, city officials have announced acceptance of it.

Work is being rushed on the 200,000 gallon reservoir, and as soon as that unit is finished, the 50,000 gallon tank will be erected on the tower.

Ditching Is Started

The Jordan & Hall Construction Co., who have the contract for the distribution system, commenced ditching and laying the eight inch mains west on Jones Street, Tuesday morning.

According to Mr. Jordan, who is supervising this work, his machine and crew will go west on Jones Street to Eighth St., one block west of the court house, then north to Andrews, and east on Andrews to Fifth, then south two blocks to the well, completing the business district with the eight inch main.

After this, the cross town lines will be laid, with the six inch mains.

Not Decided on Rates

The city commission has not announced monthly water rates, nor connection and meter charges, but it is expected that they will make these rates at their meeting next week. It is understood by the News that the monthly rate will be placed at a figure which will permit the water department to pay its way, and after operation for some time, the rate will be reduced as occasion permits. This method will be adopted, it is understood by the News, to permit the city to issue bonds on other improvements, which are badly needed, and which will not be possible in the vent the water system is being operated without a profit.

PLAINVIEW ROAD FROM DIMMITT NOW REALITY

Commissioners Court Accepts Jury of View Report After Delay of Month.

After some delay, occasioned by what they considered excessive damage claims, the commissioners court this week accepted the report of the jury of view on the new Dimmitt-Plainview Highway, and the road is assured, as Plainview representatives here this week informed the News that their portion was already pledged, and some work was now being done on the project.

This means that a direct route, saving from fifteen to twenty miles, and thru Hart, is assured for Dimmitt and Plainview, and which will parallel the Denver all the way.

Plainview civic bodies have been working on this for the past year, and it is expected that actual construction work from both ends will start at an early date.

Before the court in the interest of this project Monday were Maury Hopkins of Plainview, and O. D. Dinwiddie, J. C. McLean, C. L. Attaway, J. R. Rilley, and others, from Hart.

Castro County on Radio Program From Okla. City

GOOD INTEREST IS SHOWN IN NITE SCHOOL

First Session of Night Poultry School Held Tuesday Night in Dimmitt.

The second free night school for farmers of Castro County was started on Tuesday night of this week, when eighteen attended the meeting held in the Dimmitt high school building.

T. V. Weaver, who is responsible for these schools, and which are sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce of Castro County and the Dimmitt Board of Education states that much interest is already shown, and this school is expected to accomplish as much good as did the dairy sessions, recently closed with the acquisition of more than a car load of registered cattle for the farmers of the county.

TWO COUNTY ROAD PROJECTS ACCEPTED

At their meeting this week the commissioners' court accepted the Cal Dickey road jury report, and ordered the same opened. This road branches off of the highway east of Dimmitt, traversing a section in the southeast part of the county, and serving many families on a mail route.

The E. Thornton road, in the northeast part of the County, was ordered opened, without a jury of view report, all damages being waived by property owners.

Excursion for County is Plan

Conductor Ray of Denver Behind Movement for Excursion to Beauty Spot.

Thru the efforts of W. P. Ray, of Dimmitt, and conductor on the Fort Worth & Denver, an excursion to the Palo Duro Canyon, Texas' largest gravel pits, and the most beautiful scenic spot in Texas, is likely to be arranged in Texas, is being arranged for the people of Castro County.

Mr. Ray has called the attention of the News to the fact that other towns in this section have had such excursions, and it is proposed by the News that Dimmitt and Castro County put on such an event, to be known as a picnic day for the entire County.

The places to be visited are located between Quitaque and Sterley Junction, on the Denver, and included in the trip will be the two tunnels, made famous by the Denver.

It has been the pleasure of the News' editor to visit these points of interest, and we believe that such an excursion will prove of great interest to the citizens of Castro County.

According to Mr. Ray, who has conferred with Denver officials, the excursion will be run on Sunday, April 27, and the round-trip fare will be slightly over \$2.00.

Commissioners' Court Approves of Chamber of Commerce Agent Plan.

An important step toward procuring a county agent for Castro was made this week when the commissioners' court heard the proposition of the Chamber of Commerce of Castro County, thru its vice-president, T. A. Singer. The plan, as outlined, is, that the civic body, with funds pledged by practically all progressive firms of the city, and many individuals, employ a capable man to serve as their secretary and at the same time as county agricultural agent.

Since the commissioners court has been approached from many angles on this matter, and due to the fact that some opposition has been encountered, as well as financial difficulties, they have never felt free to employ an agent with the funds at their disposal.

It is now the hope of chamber of commerce officials, to place a man on the job just as soon as possible, and after a year's work, our court will, thru the constituents of the members, be free to take definite action themselves, removing the responsibility from the chamber of commerce.
