USE OF IODIZED SALT IMPORTANT TO HEALTH

"Read the label on the package to make sure of getting full value for the money spent" is a good rule to follow, whether a washing machine or table salt is on the shopper's list, says Mattie Lee Seago, Home Demonstration Agent.

home marketing for Texas A & M College reminds us that many shoppers seldom notice whether their table salt contains iodine and often don't understand the health protection offered by iodized salt.

About half the salt now selling for table use is iodized, but, as for any other product, it will continue to be manufactured only if there is enough consumer demand for it.

The need for iodine in the diet was first brought to the public attention about 25 years ago, when common goiter was prevalent in the United States, especially in the northeast and around the Great Lakes. The lack of iodine was found o be the cause and the use of iodized salt the simplest method of prevention.

A nationwide campaign was carried on to educate the public on the need for iodine and the convenient use if iodized salt. The campaign was so successful that goiter practically disappeared in many places where it had been common. But today, physicians and nutri-

Dimmitt residents will go to the polls Tuesday to ballot on a \$75,000 city bond issue. In authorizing the bond election the City Commission pointed out that the need for immediate improvement to the water and sewer facilities was imperative and that a street improvement program could no longer be ignored.

Presented on one ballot, the issue calls for \$20,000 to be expended for another well to stave off a critical water shortage and to extend and improve existing water facilities. Another \$20,000 is earmarked for extension and improvement of the sewer system. The remaining \$35,000 will be used for the paving of city streets where property owners express a willingness to cooperate in the program. It was pointed out by the Commission at a public hearing that Dimmitt was fast outgrowing present water and sewer facilities, and that if the present populace, as well as prospective residents, were not to be penalized it was necessary that the needed improvements be made immediately to stave off a crisis.

WATER

No town can hope to develop without an adequate water supply. This water supply for Dimmitt can be provided for with \$20,000 derived from the sale of city bonds.
