1,800 Expected for Texas 4-H Roundup June 9 to 11

College Station, June 3.—Recognition for achievement and entertainment are the primary objectives of the 1952 Texas 4-H Roundup. The 1,800 4-H club members, local adult leaders and extension agents who are expected to attend will find all planned programs and activities aimed at achieving the two objectives.

According to A. H. Walker, chairman of the Roundup program, the first planned activities are scheduled for Monday afternoon, June 9 and include visits to spots of interest on the campus of Texas A. & M. College. The Monday night program will feature an outdoor party for all 4-H members at the "Grove" and at the same time Chancellor and Mrs. Gibb Gilchrist will honor all 4-H leaders with a reception at their home on the A. & M. Campus.

Tuesday is the big day. Sixteen judging and demonstration contests will be held to pick the state winners in as many different 4-H fields of work. The delegates to the Roundup and the leaders will participate in the program which formally opens the 1952 state meeting and they will hear Dr. G. C. Baker, Jr., chaplain, Southern Methodist University, discuss "Tomorrow's Honors". Periods devoted to group discussions and recreation for the 4-H delegates will follow the general meeting while the 4-H leaders will confer on "How to be a Better 4-H Leader."

The afternoon session will feature Captain Don Lawrence, Department of Public Safety, with a special program on firearms. Beginning at 2 p. m., a tour of the A. & M. College Campus and the new agricultural facilities will be made. A tea honoring all 4-H members who have won state and national awards is scheduled for 4:30 p. m., Social Room, Memorial Student Center.

The winners, teams and individuals, will be presented in a series of meetings to be held in the MSC between 6 and 7 p. m.

The State 4-H Recognition Banquet is scheduled for Sbis Hall at 7 p. m. The Sears-Roebuck Foundation is sponsoring the banquet and the state winners and local leaders will share the spotlight. An outstanding entertainment program has been arranged by Mr. C. T. Johnson, southwest area director for the Foundation.

The Roundup will be officially over after breakfast on June 11.

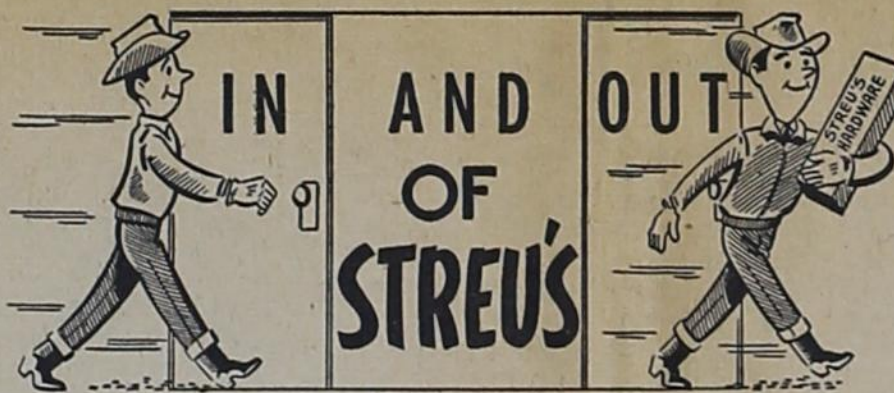

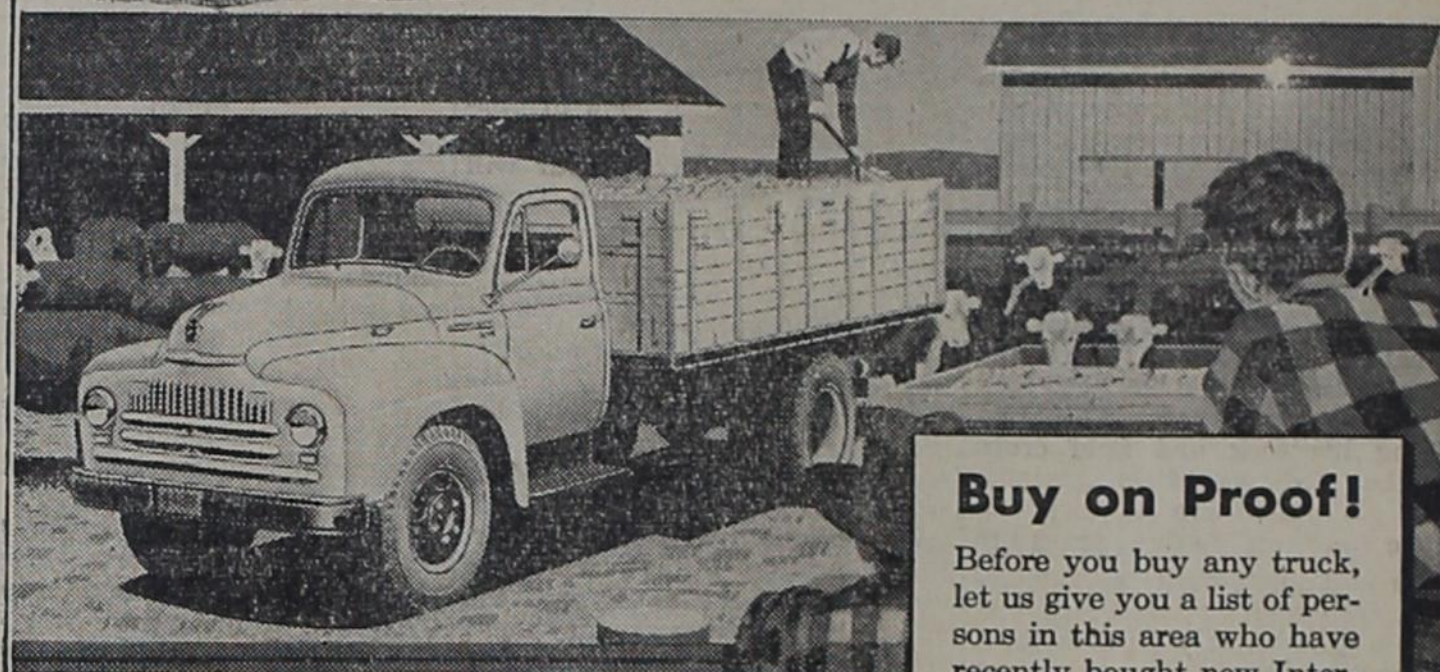

WASHINGTON NEWSLETTER

By Congressman Walter Rogers



THE TIDELANDS VETO: The veto of the tidelands bill by the President came as no surprise. The veto message reached the Senate at two o'clock on May 29. At the time I was sitting in the Senate Chamber along with Congressmen Poage, Ikard, Pickett, and Teague. We received some of the first copies of the message after it was delivered to the Senate. The reason that the message went back to the Senate rather than the House of Representatives is because the bill that was finally passed was a Senate bill, S. J. Res. 20. The Senate will vote on the question of overriding the veto sometime between June 5th and June 10th under present plans. Should the Senate override the veto, the matter will then come to the House of Representatives, where there is no question about overriding the veto. That is, if the Senate overrides the veto, the tidelands question will finally be settled right. Should the Senate fail to override the veto, the matter will not come back to the House of Representatives, and the tidelands legislation will have suffered another setback. I say "another setback" for the reason that a failure on the part of the Senate to override the veto does not mean that the issue is settled. This fight will never be relaxed until this matter is settled right and these lands returned to their rightful owners. Much has been said about the present President of the United States being set in his ways and obstinate. Some say this is a basic Missouri trait. Be that as it may, I can tell the President of the United States and all other interested parties that they don't know the meaning of the phrase "set in their ways" or the word "obstinate" until they try to run over a bunch of Texans. That is exactly what they have done and they can get ready to take their medicine. If they think for one minute that we as Texans have ever entertained the idea of submitting to this rank and flagrant misuse of property rights and the legalized larceny on the part of the Federal Government, they are in for the saddest awakening of their questionable careers. The President's veto message clearly exhibits that the INFAMOUS GREED that prompted this attempted theft in the first instance is still the only grounds upon which they stand in their sordid attempt to justify an act that has no parallel in the criminal annals of this nation. The tidelands steal that began with the reversal of position by Harold Ickes will go down in the history of this country as the greatest crime that was ever perpetrated by a government upon its patriotic and law-abiding citizenry. Nothing can ever erase the black mark caused by the warped philosophy that prompted centralized government scoundrels to make this raid. It can, however, be dimmed by a full restoration of the property stolen, the acknowledgment that a wrong has been committed, a confession by these wrong-doers that they have violated the spirit and the word of the Constitution and the written law of this great land, and a humble request by each of them that they be allowed to re-dedicate their lives to the basic philosophy of truth, honesty and Americanism.

The House of Representatives stands ready, able, and willing to meet its responsibilities to the people of the coastal states who have been subjected to this unethical and ignominious treatment at the hands of the Federal Government. I only hope and pray that the Senate of the United States will permit the light of Truth to shine upon its chambers and measure up to the glorious traditions of fairness and justice so necessary for the survival of our union.

In my newsletter of last week I told you of some incidents concerning the tidelands question that indicate the complete lack of knowledge of the true issues involved. The President's veto message reflects either a total lack of knowledge of the basic principles involved or a deliberate attempt to write around these basic principles and to justify an attempted wrong by question-begging tactics. That the entire tidelands steal was prompted and prosecuted by greed is revealed in the following paragraph contained in the veto message:

"Until recent years little or no attention was paid to the question of who owned these lands under the open sea since they were for all practical purposes without value. But about twenty years ago oil began to be produced in substantial quantities from the submerged lands off the coast of California. Then, for the first time, the legal question of ownership became important and was given serious consideration."

Yes, the Federal Government never had title to these lands, never claimed title to these lands, and in fact denied that the Federal Government had title to these lands, until long after potential oil development became apparent. The states were permitted to make leases on these lands that were not questioned by the Federal Government, and all of the written law fully supported the state ownership. It was when the vast riches in these lands began to be realized, long after the first oil production, that the scheming and conniving minds of a small group of men, prompted by greed and spurred on by a list for power, conceived the trickery and the chicanery that finally resulted in the Supreme Court of the United States pulling out of the hat an unheard of theory of real property law and sovereign power that cast a cloud upon the title to every piece of privately owned property in the United States and its possessions.

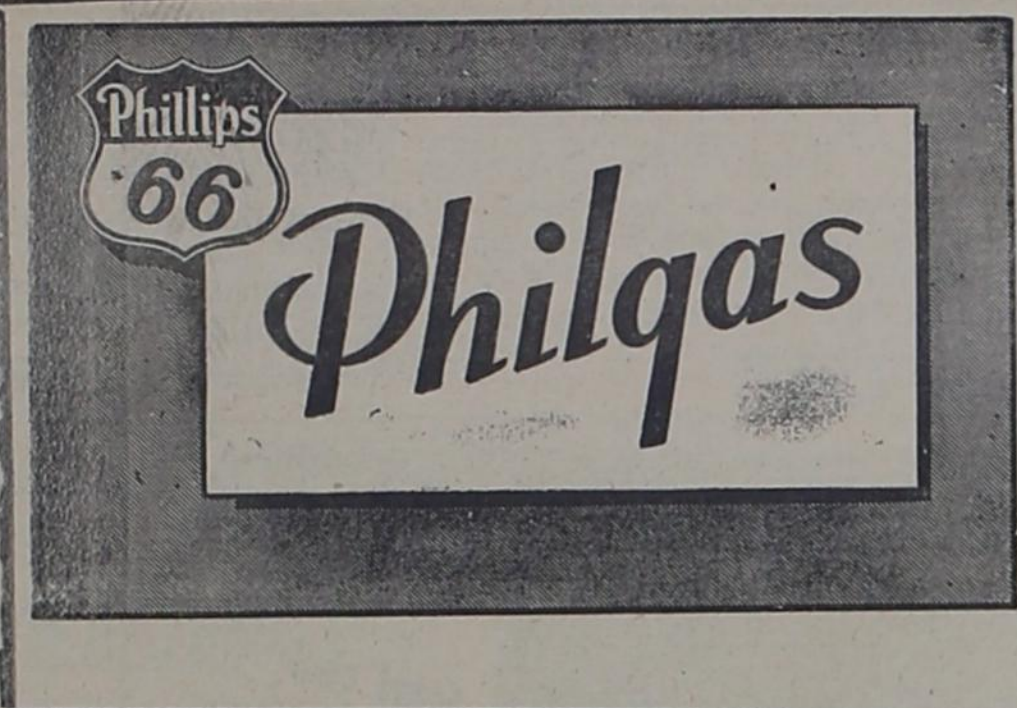

young man with the know-how and plenty of determination is combining modern science with the business of making old Bossy produce butterfat. More milk will be produced on those few acres than any of us old timers would ever thought possible. At the Earl Cole farm in the northeast part of the county ample proof was evident that the business of following modern farming practices hadn't been left altogether to the young farmers of the county. The field tour on the Cole farm included the inspection of improved irrigated pasture where an unbelievable number of cattle were pastured on just a few acres, and in addition a good hay crop had been taken from one of the patches. A fine irrigated and fertilized wheat crop, estimated conservatively at 40 bushels per acre, is well on the way to maturity on the Cole farm. A model farm operated by Jay Boston was the last

stop and was an outstanding example of modern farming practices. A diversified program of cattle feeding and farming operations has made the Boston farm one of the outstanding units of the county. Besides being an authority on improved pastures Boston operates a well rounded farm program and gets unusually high yields from the use of soil building crops and commercial fertilizer. His irrigated wheat, which has responded admirably to two applications of commercial fertilizer, will produce an estimated 70 bushels per acre. He was turning under a heavy crop of Hairy Vetch on a plot of land. This business of farming is becoming a science that requires a skill on the level with any of our profession and the farmer who fails to progress with the times will find that he is in company that is just a little fast for him in a very few years, and that remark doesn't apply to the farmers only of this area. The business man who fails to recognize the agricultural revolution that is taking place will be as far behind in his business practices as is the farmer who fails to recognize "the handwriting on the wall."

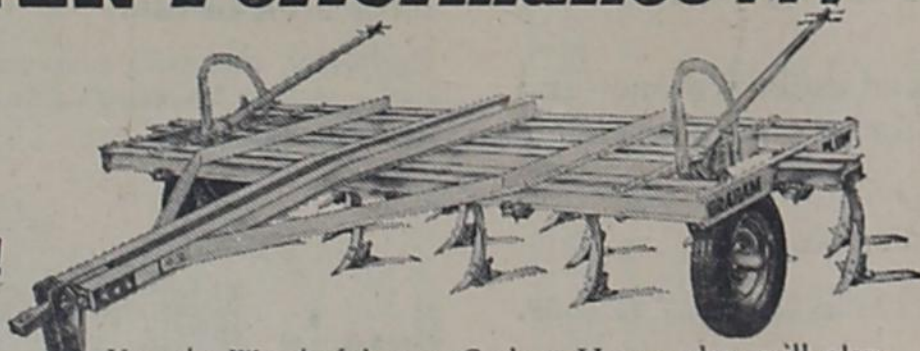
