Breeds of livestock shown included Quarter horses, Poland China gilts and barrows, Berkshire gilts and boars, Holstein heifers and bulls, Brown Swiss heifer, Guernsey heifers, Hereford cows and steers, Angus heifers and steers, Rambouillet ewes, Suffolk ewes, Weather lambs, registered South-down ewes and bucks, New Zealand White rabbits and Bantam chickens.

Peggy Davis, sixteen year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. T. R. Davis, exhibited the champion dairy animal, and her sub junior Holstein heifer went on to be judged Grand Champion animal of the first annual Hart F. F. A. and 4-H Club Project Show.

John Smith, nine year old son of Mr. and Mrs. F. A. Smith, exhibited the champion of the swine division and his Birkshire boar was named reserve champion animal of the show.

John Bridges, son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Bridges, won the Showmanship trophy.

Aquilla Record Is Tied by Bobbies

Emulating their cousins, the Bobcats, the Dimmitt Bobbies survived a four day gruelling tournament, with the strongest girls teams in the state competing, to complete a spotless season while chalking up 36 consecutive victories without a single defeat in their march to their third consecutive state championship.

The Bobbies coached by John Blaine, were only slight favorites at the beginning of the tournament with their high scoring forward, Lometa Odom, treading lightly on weak ankles that had been sprained in practice sessions in recent weeks. Another strong forward, Darlene Cates, was nursing an injured foot. When the tournament opened the outlook for the Bobbies was anything but bright.

The first game of the tournament was between a strong team from East Chambers and the Bobbies. The East Chambers Sextet pressed the Bobbies all the way. The score was tied at the end of the first quarter, the Bobbies had a two point lead at the half and at the end of the third quarter and were content to lead by 36 to 34 at the whistle.

In the quarter finals the Bobbies had very little trouble with a classy Aledo team, downing that team with the comfortable margin of 47 to 28. Up to this time the scoring duties were shared about equally between the forwards with Odom depending heavily on her teammates while she was desperately trying to shake off a scoring slump.

In the semi-final game with a strong Penelope team the Bobbies reverted to form and Odom literally filled the basket with balls, setting an alltime tournament scoring record by racking up 78 points. At the final whistle the score was 92 to 51.

The final game found two fine Plains girls teams facing each other for the third time during the season. The Bobbies, an entirely different team from the one that opened the tournament with East Chambers, were confident and set the pace ahead with a six point lead the Bobbies were never in real danger from the touted New Deal hoppers. 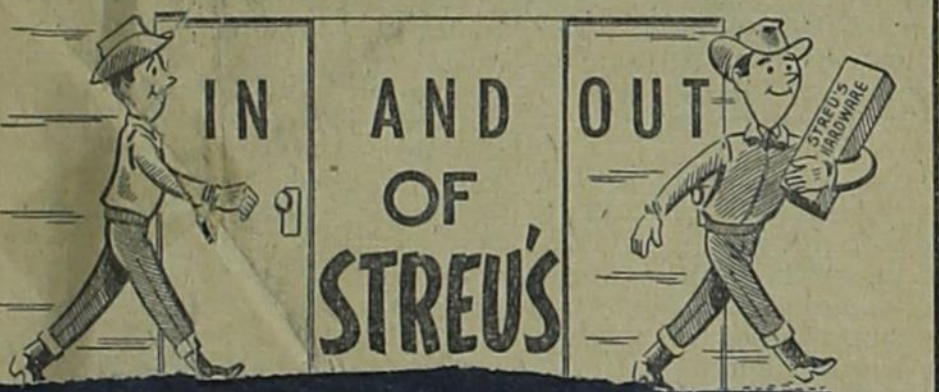

THE LAW AND YOU

DO YOU KNOW what the difference is between participating and non-participating royalty? With reference to oil and gas leases, royalty is that sum paid to the owner of the land, or of the mineral interest, for the oil and gas which is taken from the property.

If in a deed a person reserves an undivided one-half (1/2) interest in and to all the oil, gas and other minerals in and under the premises conveyed, this means that the individual is retaining for himself an undivided one-half (1/2) interest in the minerals, which by its terminology would entitle the individual retaining the same to share in the royalty and bonus and rentals paid for oil and gas leases, and would require his signature on a lease of the whole tract of land.

Our Favorite Recipes

Individual Pot-Roasts 3 pounds cross-cut beef shanks 1/4 cup flour 1 teaspoon salt 1/8 teaspoon pepper 3 tablespoons lard or drippings 1 cup water 1 No. 2 can sauerkraut Have shank slices cut 1 1/2 to 2 inches thick. Dredge with flour, seasoned with salt and pepper. Brown slowly on all sides in hot lard or drippings. Add water, cover closely, and let simmer 2 to 2 1/2 hours or until done. Add more water as needed. Half an hour before the meat is done, add sauerkraut and continue cooking. Serve sauerkraut on hot platter with the cross-cut beef shanks on top. 4 to 6 servings.

Cancer Educational Program Planned

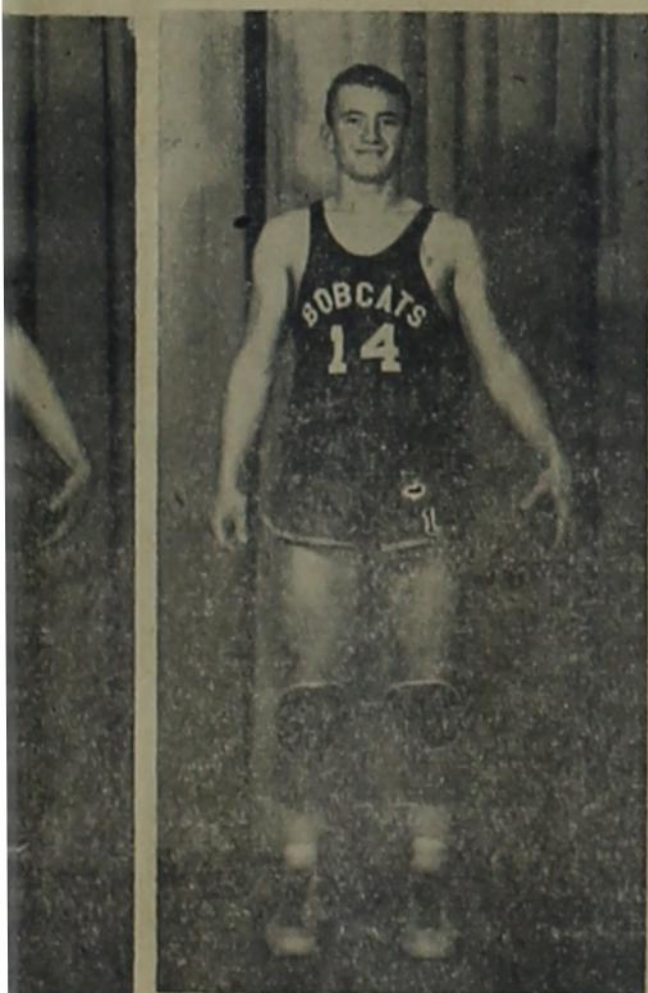

WASHINGTON NEWSLETTER

By Congressman Walter Rogers



THE TIDELANDS: The tidelands issue is presently being fought out in the Senate, and as of March 13th remained as the Senate's unfinished business in legislative session. The leader of the fight for federal control is Senator O'Mahoney of Wyoming. He is a very able man, very resourceful, and thoroughly familiar with his subject. He has in his camp a formidable array of talent, the powers and abilities of which must not be discounted. A proposal now pending as S. J. provides for continuation of the tidelands under certain conditions covering submerged lands on the continental shelf, to be used for the development of oil and gas deposits and to provide for the protection of the United States in the oil and gas deposits on the continental shelf. This is in effect an appropriation that would give the federal government the right to explore and produce oil and gas from these submerged lands and would leave unsettled the question of whether these lands belong to the states or to the Federal Government. The proposal on its face appears most inviting to those unfamiliar with the background of the matter and the principles involved. Should the O'Mahoney proposal be adopted, it would be the "foot in the door" for federal control that could well be the death knell of Texas' hopes to recover property that rightfully belongs to Texas. I stressed the recent television program of the nature of a debate between Senator O'Mahoney and Senator Long, of Louisiana, concerning the tidelands question. I stated with interest one of the arguments of Senator O'Mahoney. He stated that since the Louisiana Purchase was paid for out of the federal treasury, it became the property of the federal government and that Louisiana, as a part of the territory so acquired, had no more right to claim the tidelands than would the other states included in the Louisiana Purchase and the rest of the United States. He also pointed out that the California territory was ceded to the United States by Mexico. On the television program he had a map on which he pointed out these different territories in support of his arguments. The interesting thing to me was that he never mentioned Texas or referred to how Texas came into the Union. The truth is that the above arguments could not possibly apply to Texas. The Texas case is entirely different. The unanswerable fact in the Texas case is that Texas retained title to its public lands and the source of the title to the land that you live on is a Texas patent, and not a United States patent. When Texas came into the Union, changing her status from a sovereign power to a state, and by the resolution of annexation retained her public lands, she owned the 10 1/2 mile strip of submerged lands along her coast, and she still owns them under every conceivable law of mankind. For the federal government to assume ownership of these lands is nothing less than larceny, whether it be by judicial decree or legislative edict. The Texas delegation will continue to fight to protect our property rights until this question is settled right, and it will not be settled right until these lands are returned to the rightful owner, the State of Texas.

THE WAR ON WASTE: The temper of the Congress concerning waste in government is evidenced in daily debate and floor speeches. The several departments of the government, both civil and military, are well aware that they are under a searing searchlight. The department heads and those

responsible for the expenditures are examining and re-examining the operations of their departments. This is resulting in the trimming of small unnoticeable items that will mean millions of dollars in savings to the American taxpayer. The Congress is not going to be satisfied with the recommendations and reports of the departments, but is going to make deeper cuts and force the departments to absorb them. The action of the Congress on the appropriations bills that have come to the floor indicates that the economy wave is definitely on the move. Unless an expenditure can be unquestionably justified, the Congress will cut it off. The members are searching the budget requests and the commit-

tee hearings for every possible means of cutting down. This is a healthy situation and I hope we can keep it going full strength. It is the opening wedge for tax reduction.

FEDERAL AID: The report of the Joint Committee on Reduction of Non-Essential Federal Expenditures reflects that since 1934 the federal government has paid out 58.2 billion dollars in 150 programs of aid to states and individuals. (This period covers 18 years.) The payments to individuals totalled more than 42 billion dollars, payments to state and local governments more than 16 billion. I hope that this report won't upset some of our allies, who during the seven-year period from 1945 to September 1951 re-

ceived only approximately 25 billion in foreign aid grants. If some of these foreign powers learn that the American taxpayer is getting back some of his own money, no telling what might happen.
