State Health Officer Urges Rigid Control For Venereal Diseases

AUSTIN, September 28. Venereal infections, notably syphilis and gonorrhea, will probably increase sharply in cities and towns near military centers in the near future, State Health Officer G. W. Cox has predicted.

He urged all cities, especially those in which greater numbers of military personnel were expected, to intensify their efforts to control diseases.

Experience during World War II, the health official said, indicates that unless civilians become as concerned about the venereal disease problem as are military and public authorities, there will "most certainly" be a great increase in venereal disease infections among men in uniform and in the civilian population as well.

"That doesn't mean all soldiers are destined for VD infection," Dr. Cox declared. "It means simply that vice conditions, poorly supervised recreational facilities, and an indifferent attitude on the part of the public are inevitable around military posts and all contribute to higher VD rates."

"These young men were only recently civilians," he pointed out. "They worked or went to school in communities no different than your or mine."

He urged that they be provided with wholesome recreational facilities while "in your town". It will help make their lives in uniform a little less drab and monotonous.

The State Department of Health has been working for years in close cooperation with the military in controlling VD and other diseases affecting men in uniform.

"It's a very important part of the civil defense program," he said. "Disease can incapacitate a man quite as effectively as a bullet."

Electric Lights Help Raise Egg Production

Poultrymen can increase their fall and winter egg production and take advantage of the high prices of these seasons of the year by using the simple electric light.

For maximum production, a hen needs 12 to 14 hours of light a day, says W. J. Moore, associate poultry husbandman for the Texas A. & M. College Extension Service. He explains that the electric light can be used to artificially lengthen the hen's laying day.

The use of artificial light should begin about the middle of September, and should be used until next spring. Moore cautions that the light rays must fall on the birds for best results, even if they stay on the roost.

Moore says that it is not the extra feed which the birds may eat that keeps egg production up during the winter, but the effect of the light. And it makes no difference whether morning or evening lights are used, although

morning lights are more common since they are more convenient for the poultryman to use.

Lubbock to be Host To American Cancer, October 4

LUBBOCK (Special) — Special cancer educational session will be held here Oct. 4 under the sponsorship of the Texas Division, American Cancer Society.

Representatives of 18 South Plains county cancer control units will participate in the first annual meeting of the Cancer Society's Texas District 3—South. A program on cancer will follow a luncheon meeting at noon.

State and district leaders of the Society will participate, according to Dr. D. M. Wiggins, district lay director. They will emphasize the

need for public education to create that cancer must be treated early if it is to be cured.

Laymen, women and doctors from all counties will participate in open discussion of improved methods of cancer education and volunteer services to cancer patients.

A medical program will be presented the same day. All practicing physicians in the 18 counties are invited. This cancer session will be given during the regular meeting of the Panhandle Medical Society, which will be held that same day in Lubbock. Doctors from the Tarrant County Medical Society tumor clinic in Fort Worth will present a demonstration cancer clinic. The Fort Worth clinic is one of 10 clinics supported by funds raised in the annual Texas Cancer Crusade.

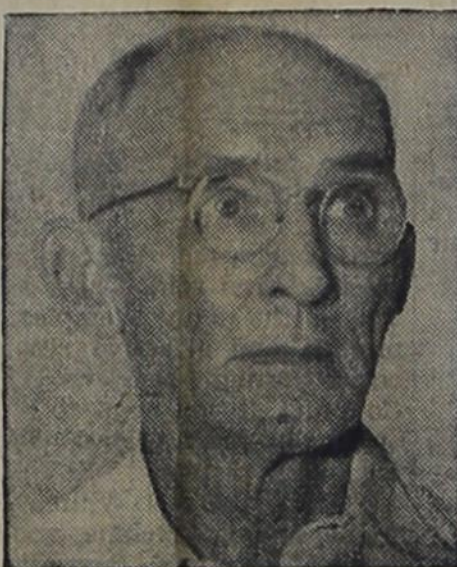

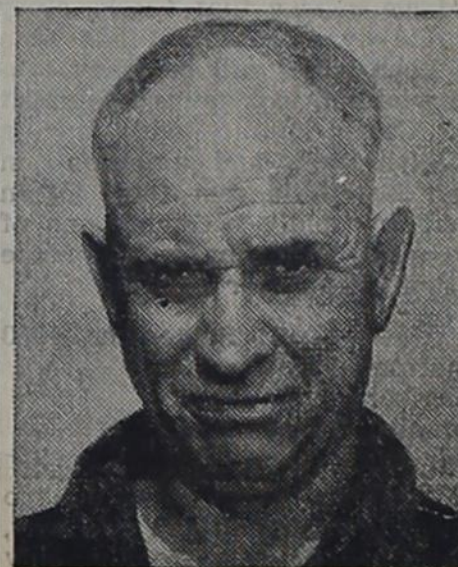

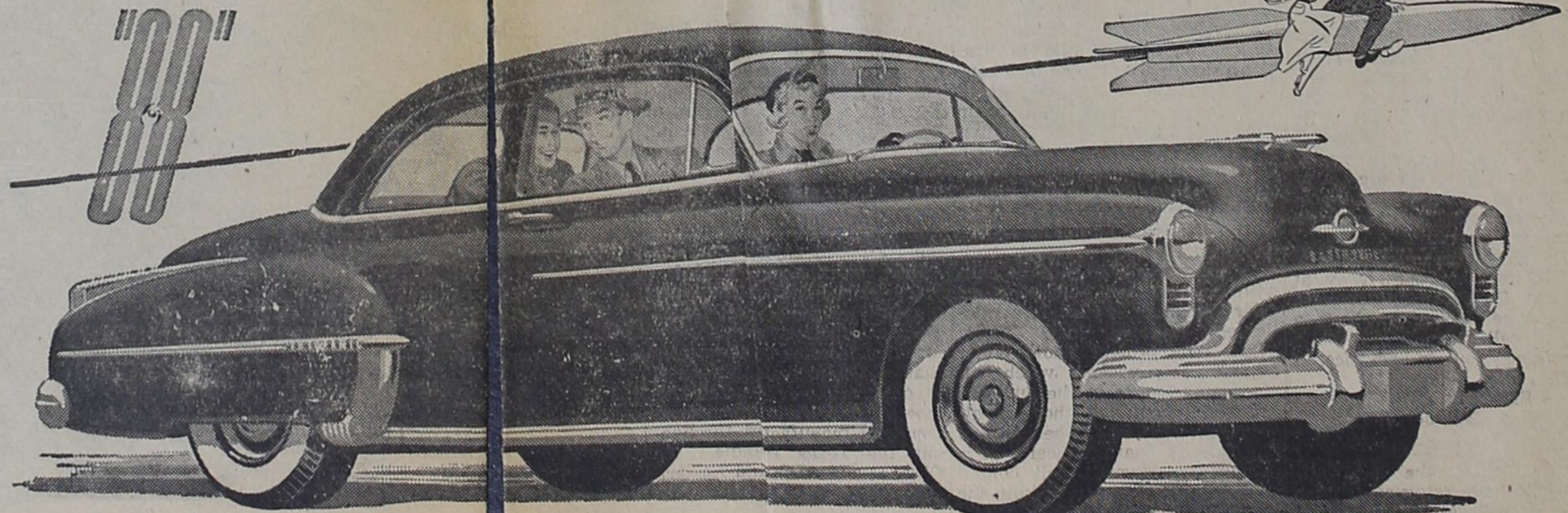

County Agent Gives Pasture Pointers

County Agent Raymond King gives some information on perennial pastures. Perennial pasture is a pasture made up of cool or warm season perennial grasses or legumes each of which should contain a legume. Year around grazing—Consists of a combination of cool and warm season grasses and legumes and will last year after year as long as it is properly managed. Supplemental pastures are those which are seeded to some crop for the purpose of providing pasturage to supplement permanent pastures. Seeded preparation: 1. Firm seedbed reduced danger of seeding too deeply. 2. Moist, fertile and weed free seed bed is important. 3. Irrigation prior to seeding is prescribed to make the seed bed firm. 4. Border irrigation is the most acceptable for pastures. **Perennial Pastures** Cool Season Grasses: Perennial Rye, Brome; Cool Season Legumes: Alfalfa, Sweet Clover (Madrid), Tall Fescue (ky-31 alta), orchard; Warm Season Legumes: Madric Sweet Clover, Alfalfa. **Supplemental Pastures** Cool Season Grasses: Wheat, Barley, Oats; Warm Season Legumes: Sudan, Cool Season Legumes: Sweet Clover Hubam. Warm Season Legumes: Chinese Red Cowpeas, Blackeye Peas, Crowder Peas.

Recommended Pasture Mixtures Pasture No. 1: Mixture; Perennial Rye No. 10, Alfalfa No. 1; Date to Plant: September; Other Suggestions: Seed 1-2 pks wheat or 1 Bushel Oats; Grazing Period: March to June, Sept. to Nov. Pasture No. 2: Mixture; Brome No. 15, Alfalfa No. 1; Date to Plant: September; Other Suggestions: Seed 1-2 pks wheat or 1 bushel oats; Grazing period: Apr. to June, Aug. to Nov. Pasture No. 3: Mixture; Blue Panic No. 1, Sweet Clover No. 1; Date to plant: Spring Apr. to May, Sept. to Oct; Grazing period: May to Sept. In order to have a balanced pasture program the following proportions should be planted No. 1-2 Acres, No. 2-3 Acres and No. 3-1 Acres. This combination of pastures should carry approximately 2 head of cattle per acre for 8 to 10 months depending on the amount of water and management of the pasture. Other mixtures are acceptable but more expensive. These will be given on request. The perennial pastures may be supplemented with annual plants such as sudan and wheat. **Methods of Seeding** Best method of Seeding is with a grass drill or broadcast with a drill using a grass seed attachment. Going over the field twice one way and then the other direction will give a more uniform stand. **Inoculation of Legumes** Legume seed should always be inoculated to promote vigorous early growth and give the plant the ability to obtain nitrogen from the air. Use the proper inoculant for the legume planted. **Fertilizing Irrigated Pastures** The stand of legumes and grasses can be controlled by the application of fertilizers. Phosphorus may be applied to increase legumes and nitrogen to increase grasses. Apply amonium Nitrate at the rate of 100 pounds per acre and super phosphate at the rate of 200 pounds per acre. Winter legumes should be planted in most sections of the state as soon as possible or when moisture conditions are favorable.

Values of Legumes As Soil Builder's Pointed Out

Legumes are fine soil building crops if they are properly inoculated and fertilized. Most fields should be planted to a legume crop at least once every three years, to improve the soil fertility and to make crop production more profitable. For legumes to be effective in building up soil fertility, it is necessary that the seed be inoculated with the right kind of inoculant, says E. A. Miller, agronomist for the Texas A & M College Extension Service. The label on the inoculant container indicates the kinds of legume seed on which the inoculant may be used. The inoculation provides bacteria which live in the nodules on the leguminous plant roots and makes possible their utilization of nitrogen from the air. Miller says that inoculated legumes may well be called nitrogen factories. Other crops such as cotton, corn and grain sorghums cannot utilize nitrogen from the air. They have to get it from the soil and, therefore, are soil depleting crops. To make sure that the plants will have plenty of nodules, many farmers now use a double dose of the inoculant. The other important step in growing legumes, Miller emphasizes, is fertilizing properly. Good legume fertilizers for the depleted sandy and sandy loam soils in the eastern half of Texas are 3-12-12, 4-12-8, 5-10-5 and 4-12-4 applied at the rate of 300 to 400 pounds per acre. He says that 0-14-7 and 0-12-12 are suitable for use on the newer or better soils. On the blackland soils in the Gulf Coast Prairie, 200 pounds of 20 percent superphosphate is suitable, but 0-14-7 and 4-12-8 are better for use on the sandy and sandy loam soils of this region. In the blackland region of north, central, and south Texas and the Grand Prairie region, 200 pounds of 20 percent superphosphate per acre is recommended for the blackland and 200 pounds of 4-12-4 or 0-14-7 for the sandy loam soils in the area. The application of 200 percent superphosphate per acre on the better soils of the West Cross Timbers and Rolling Plains area and the same amount of 0-14-7 on old sandy crop land in those areas is recommended. Either 100 pounds of 11-48-0 or 200 to 300 pounds of 20 percent superphosphate per acre are suitable for fertilizing legumes growing under irrigation on the High Plains. Miller recommends using 200 pounds of 20 percent superphosphate on the heavy soils of the Rio Grande Plain and 200 pounds of 4-12-4 on the sandy soils. In the Lower Rio Grande, Winter Garden, Edwards Plateau, Pecos, and El Paso irrigated valleys, Miller advises using 400 to 600 pounds of 20 percent superphosphate on legumes.

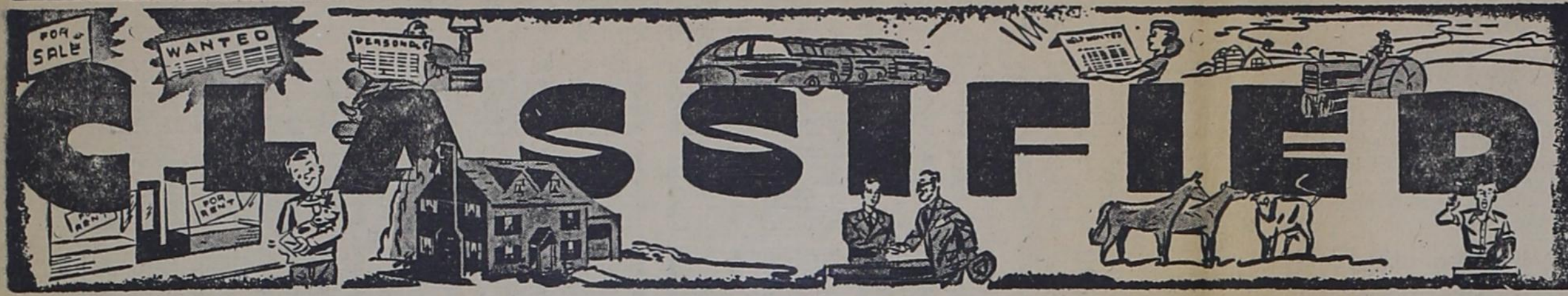

Sports Afield
by Ted Kesting

Plug casters have been told over and over to keep their reel handles up, not sideways when casting, but I'll wager less than a tenth of those you see fishing do it. So let's stop and figure out why this is so important. First, a casting reel spins much more smoothly and freely with the spool sort of balanced

on the tail pivot. It just won't run right with the handles sideways, the pillars and spool horizontal. Then, with the reel handles sideways, the guides are on top of the rod. As the line goes out it slaps the rod and when wet, clings and jerks on it. But what happens with the guides on one

side, as they must be with the reel handles up? Why the bow of the line downward between the guides can touch nothing but air. So it flows out smoothly, easily. Now for the most important reason. What do you do when you cast with the spool horizontal? Why you're throwing the rod out with the thumb of your casting hand — you just can't help it. But has this ever occurred to you? How are you going to drive the rod out with your thumb and at the same time use that thumb to control the reel? You can't. To control the reel properly, and to be sensitive, the thumb must be relaxed, not tense and pushing; one job is all it can handle. So to push the rod forward use the lowest joint of the index finger where it joins the palm. Now let's boil all this down to the essential sentence, which if you'll remember and follow, will soon make you a smooth, accurate and effortless caster: Keep your reel handles and the knuckles of your first finger up, and push forward with the lower joint of that first finger—leaving your thumb relaxed, free, with nothing to do but control the spool. Here's something else that was brought to our attention by Angling Authority Jason Lucas. Fly casters are told to wait and feel the "pull of the line" on the backcast. Why has nobody ever advised the beginner at plug casting to wait to feel the pull of the plug? It's the mair secret, next to that free thumb, of smooth plug casting.

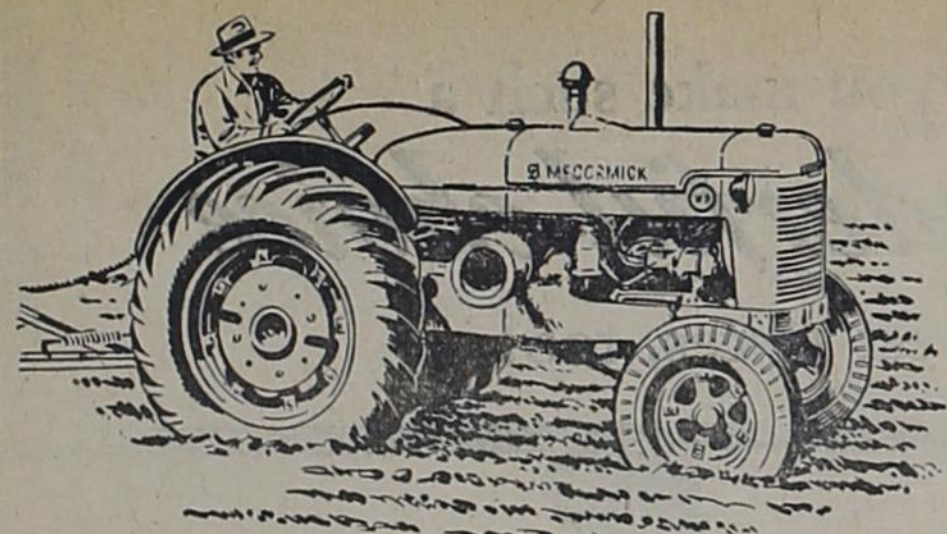

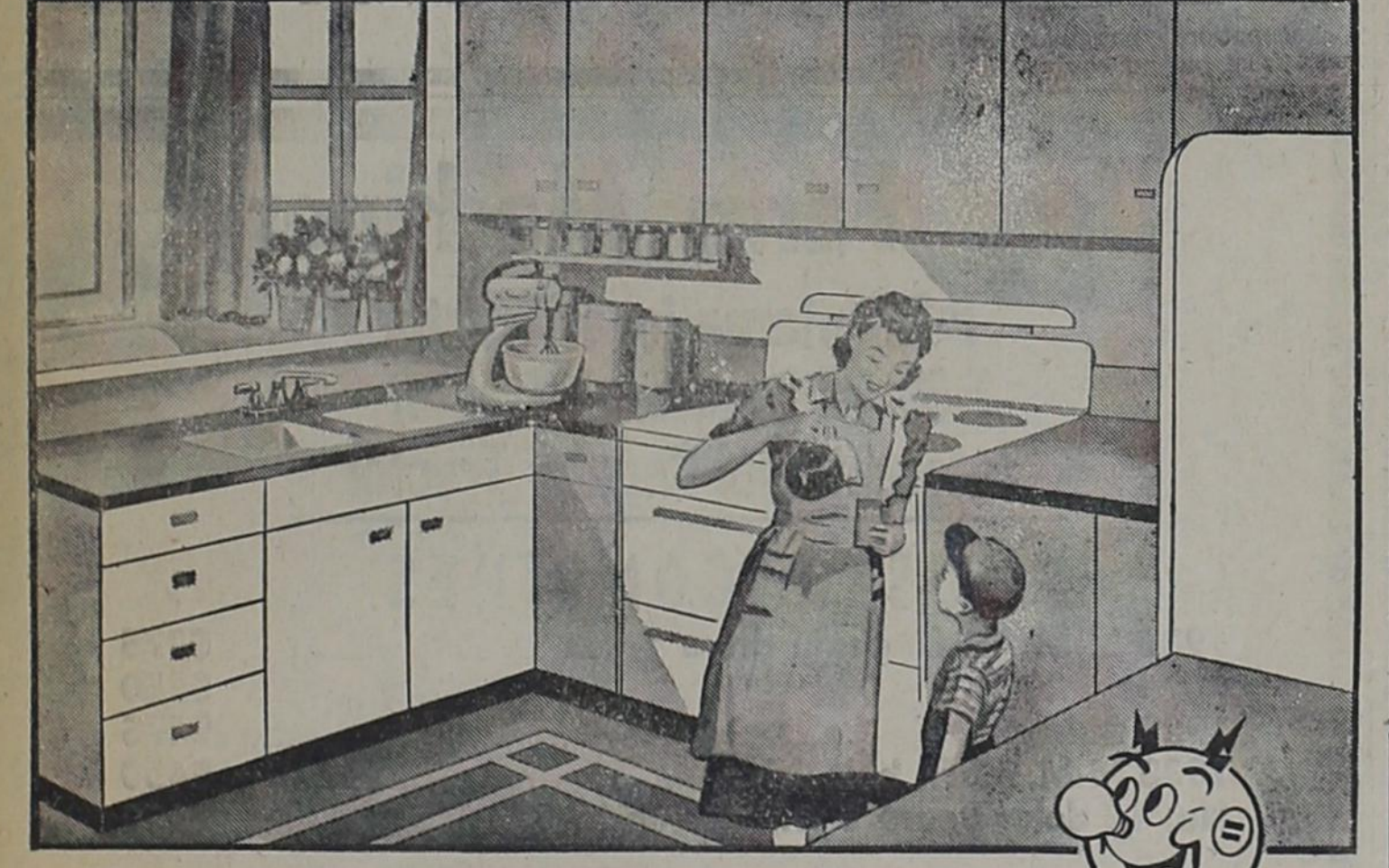
