# **Science Exhibits Denote School Week at Dimmitt**

Due to a lack of space, Dimmitt High School science students this year did not put on their usual science fair, but they did construct many unique scientific displays which were shown all week in the science laboratory at

which were shown all week in the science laboratory ar school. Mrs. Inez Robinson, who teaches the youngsters, proudly pointed out the displays this week, some of which repre-sented results of late findings in national science fields. All of the exhibits were conducted in a technical, scientific fashion, designed to teach the youngsters the basics of analytical studies in physical phenomena. Mrs. Robinson selected six for the above photographs, but insisted there
