Last Rites For Mrs. L. E. Tucker

Funeral services were held Thursday, November 9th, at 3:00 P. M. for Mrs. Louie E. Tucker who died Tuesday, November 7, in the Plainview Sanitarium. She had been in failing health for the past year, and in the hospital three weeks before her death.

Services were conducted by Rev. V. F. Lemons at the Sunnyside Baptist Church, assisted by her pastor, Rev. Noel V. Guice, of Plainview, Rev. Clarence Howell of Kress, and Rev. A. C. Byrom Sunnyside, pastor. Interment was made in the Dimmitt cemetery.

Maude Iva Ferguson was born November 9th, 1884, in Pinebluff, Ark., to Mr. and Mrs. R. M. Ferguson. She was married to Louie Tucker April 16, 1911, at Caps, Texas, 7 miles south of Abilene. To this union was born two sons.

Her mother preceded her in death when Mrs. Tucker was only 15 years of age. Her husband passed away some 9 years ago, and her father 4 years ago. She would have been 60 years of age the day after her funeral.

She was converted and joined the Baptist Church at the age of 12 years, and was a charter member of the Sunnyside Baptist church in 1921. At the time of her death she held membership at the College Heights Baptist Church in Plainview.

Deceased is survived by two sons, R. Trocie Tucker, Mo. MM 3/c of the U. S. Navy of Norman, Okla., and Pvt. Wayne B. Tucker of Camp Shelby, Mississippi. She is also survived by five grand children, Chesley, Bessie Pearl, Kenneth Wayne, Phillip Trocie, and Bobbie Tucker, and three brothers, R. A. Ferguson of Sunnyside community, Fred F. Ferguson of Spokane, Washington and B. M. Ferguson of Amherst, Texas, all of whom were present but Fred who was unable to be here. Also surviving are three nephews and four nieces and a host of other relatives and friends.

paigns in North Africa and Sicily. The Group arrived in CBI-land in time for the Burma action and won wide commendation.

NEW SUGAR SATMP VALID

Sugar Stamp 34 in War Ration Book Four will be good for buying 5 pounds of sugar beginning November 16, 1944, the District Office of Price Administration announced today.

The stamp, like other sugar stamps now being used, will be good indefinitely for use in buying sugar. Other stamps, validated in the past, which are also good indefinitely for use in buying sugar are Nos. 30, 31, 32, and 33.

Sugar Stamp No. 40, validated February 1, 1944 is good for buying five pounds of sugar for home canning through February 28, 1945.

A recent letter from Mr. C. M. Smith of Plainview, Regional Manager of the U. S. Treasury War Finance Committees, received recently by Mr. H. W. Golden, County War Bond Chairman, revealed that Castro county's quota in the Sixth War Loan had been set at \$120,000.00. The Sixth War Loan officially opens Monday, Nov. 20, and will continue through December 31. All sales of E, F, and G Bonds and Tax Notes C from November 1, however, will count on the quota. The E Bond quota for Castro county has been set at \$70,000.00.

The county quota in the 5th War Loan was \$130,000—\$10,000 more than the county is asked to raise in the current drive.
