## Local Preparations Are Complete For General Election

In addition to the political candidates, voters in Texas will have an opportunity to vote on eight State Constitutional Amendments.

The two major parties, Democrats and Republicans, are completing the most strenuous vote-getting campaigns ever waged in the nation.

## State Offers Aid To Crippled Children

Austin, Texas—In an effort to familiarize every person in Texas with the services offered by the State Department, Dr. Geo. Crippled Children's Division of the State Health Department, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer has released the following statement:

Every crippled child in Texas, under 21 years of age, and of normal mentality whose parents are unable to pay for needed care, is entitled to assistance from this Division.

Crippling conditions which may be treated are infantile paralysis, osteomyelitis, club feet, harelip and cleft palate, burns, curvature of the spine, arthritis, bow legs, rickets, tuberculosis of the bone, flat feet, congenitally dislocated hip, Muscular dystrophy, superbrachial palsy, Potts Disease, connumery fingers and toes, wry genital anomalies, spondylolisthesis, amputation, webb fingers, ep-neck, elephantiastis, spina bifida, iphsitis, and sarcoma.

Assistance may be obtained by applying to the Crippled Children's Division, Texas State Department of Health, Austin, or by placing an application through an established city or county health unit.

Full information about local groups and organizations throughout the state who are anxious to assist crippled children to establish their eligibility and receive proper care, may be had by writing for a pamphlet, "Handbook on Agencies." Address Crippled Children's Division, State Department of Health, Austin 2, Texas.

## County To Organize In Relief Campaign

Thursday November 4 at 7:30 o'clock all citizens of Castro county who are interested in setting up a Christian Rural Overseas Program County-wide Committee for Castro county will meet in the District Courtroom at Dimmitt according to R. L. King, County Agent.

Christian Rural Overseas Program familiarly known across the nation as Crop, is an organization of all the religious denominations—Protestant, Jewish and Catholic—and other interested civic, business, agricultural and educational groups set up to receive and distribute gifts in kind to the hungry and needy war victims in Europe and Asia.

Mr. T. H. Holmes assistant campaign director will be present at the meeting to explain Crop and to help perfect organization of a county committee for Castro County.

Crop receives gifts in kind from farm and ranch folks who have not heretofore had an opportunity to contribute to war relief funds. Most of the people living in the larger cities of Texas have already made donations in the form of cash. Now, Crop is asking our rural people to give gifts in kind, such as a bale of cotton, a ton of wheat or combine maize, a good beef calf, or whatever gift in whatever amount the rural citizen wants to participate in Crop's war relief program.

As one illustration of what rural folks in other states have already done, over 5,000 dairy heifers have been donated and shipped to Japan, China, Italy, Austria, Czechoslovakia, and other countries of both Europe and Asia.

The Crop program was launched in Texas on September 1, 1948, when Governor Beauford Jester urged the rural people of Texas to give gifts in kind "from the bounty of their fields and the fullness of their hearts."

Mr. King urges all interested parties, along with leaders of all clubs, newspaper people, and church representatives to be present at the meeting.

## EDITORIAL

### BOSTON TEA PARTY FOR NOVEMBER 2ND

In the early history of the United States England taxed her colonies heavily, but would let them have no representatives in Parliament. This tax was gathered in various ways, one of them being a tax on tea. To show their indignation at such doings, a bunch of Indians went down to Boston Harbor and unloaded a ship load of tea in the ocean.

The Constitution provides that Texas shall be re-districted so that its population will have equal representation in our State Legislature. The Legislature has ignored this provision after the 1930 and 1940 census. In Texas we now face a condition where counties in East Texas, with a population of 25,000, have a representative in the Legislature. Our district has approximately 100,000 and we have one representative. This condition is exception by the rule. Practically all of East Texas has twice as many representatives per population as we have in West Texas. Constitutional Amendment in place 2 on the General Election Ballot is an endeavor to correct this taxation without representation.

This paper heartily endorses this Amendment. It is important that we go to the polls like these Indians went to Boston Harbor on November 2nd and carry this Amendment.

## 4-H Club Work Summarized By County Agent

Castro County 4-H Clubs have had a very successful year during 1948 according to R. L. King County Agent.

To summarize the local program 4-H club boys exhibited a total of 103 head of beef calves weighing 109,462 pounds and sold for \$33,568.76. 117 head of pigs that weighed 26,180 pounds and sold for \$7,466.15. 10 lambs weighing 978 pounds and sold for \$346.00.

These animals were fed and exhibited at the following shows: Lubbock, Amarillo, Fort Worth, Dallas, Plainview and Dimmitt.

160 4-H club boys were enrolled last year and in addition to demonstrations already mentioned Projects carried included Poultry, Dairy Cattle, Breeding Swine, Breeding Beef Cattle, Crops and Gardening.

A total of \$273.00 in prizes was won by 4-H Club boys in the Sears Foundation Program.

In the recreational program a 4-H club Christmas party was held in December. Play day in July and rally day in August. 12 boys attended a district 4-H club camp.

Regular meetings are held each month in all the schools of the county. A good program is now underway for the 1948-49 club year.

## County Court Favors Amendment TO THE PEOPLE OF CASTRO COUNTY

We, as part of your governing body, wish to call to your attention the importance of Constitutional Amendment listed second place on the General Election Ballot this year. This amendment is called the Re-Districting Amendment and provides for amendment to Article 3, Section 28 of the Constitution. When the Constitution of the State of Texas was written and adopted, the founders well knew that there would be shifts in population in the state, and proper representation being set up on the basis of population this Constitution provided that every ten years (after every Federal Census) that the Legislature should re-district itself according to the then population. There is no penalty for not performing this provision. If you have a Texas Almanac you will notice that in the last Federal census the 120th District, of which Castro is a part, had a census of approximately 75,000 people. You will notice because of the loss of population at least half of the East Texas Districts had just half the population. This evil is not only present in our district but largely present in all of those in the Panhandle. We, your present county officials and those who have served before us, have had great difficulties in getting our portion of State Highway funds and other proper considerations from the Legislative body of the State because we could easily be out-voted by East Texas. This not only applies to road money apportionments rightly due this portion of the State, but the question becomes very important in the underground water laws that will be submitted to and may be passed by the State Legislature at the next session. Our local representative, Honorable I. B. Holt, recently called the attention of some local residents to this situation when he told us that his desk mate at Austin in the Legislature was a representative from one county in East Texas with a population equivalent to Lamb County, same being just one of the counties in his district. This Constitutional Amendment will likely not be perfect, but it is certainly a step in the right direction and we, as county officials who have had to battle for the rights of West Texas, earnestly solicit your ardent support to this Amendment. This solicitation is not for our personal gain but for the good of this county and the other counties of West Texas.

On this your first opportunity to help yourself, give this Amendment your study and support.

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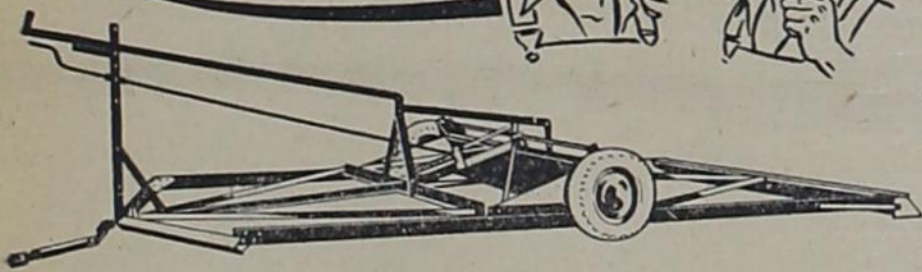

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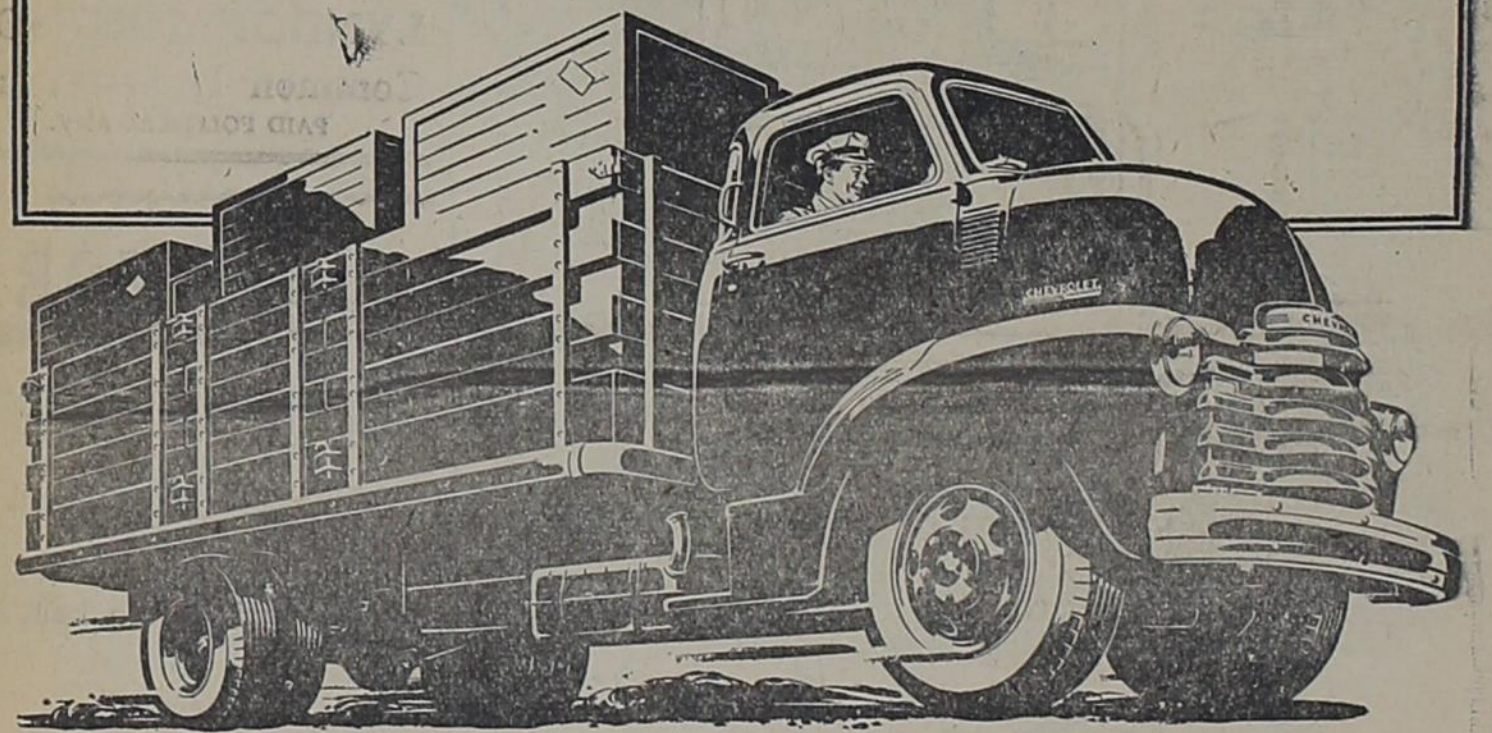

For example, the one who referred to a political party with its motley groups as "held together by the cohesive power of plunder".

And Tom Corwin's phrase that if his native land were invaded, "We would welcome them with hospitable hands to bloody graves."

A man who had just listened to a speech said it reminded him of "the peace of God" because "it passes all human understanding."

All that a Texan wants is what is coming to him—not any less but not a bit more. But some are receiving more than they are entitled to because of the greater growth in population of some parts of the State in comparison to others.

Representation in the legislature is not based on today's population as it should be—but what the population was, 28 years ago.

The State Constitution calls for redistricting after each census but there has been no redistricting since 1921. A few members of the legislature have blocked redistricting because they might have to run against each other.

They put their own political interests above their oath to carry out the Constitution. They place their selfish individual ambitions above doing justice to 7,500,000 Texans.

The folks back home do not share any such selfish view. Texans believe in a square deal; they are fair-minded.

That's the reason why Constitutional Amendment No. 2 should pass in the general election; it provides a sure way of bringing about redistricting every 10 years.
