

RECLAIMED LAKE LAND - This is an aerial photograph of the Huggins reclamation project north of Dimmitt. Tail water from the land in the lower right hand part of the picture irrigates oats planted in the terraces shown in the lake bed. Rainwater and other surplus water is collected in the L-shaped slough which corners near the center of the lake. The slough marks the northeast boundary of the Huggins place and was filled with water from Monday morning's 1inch rainfall there. The water system includes about half the farm and is not all shown here. The mark running up and down through the terraces is an underground pipe which will carry water from the slough for irrigating higher grounds or the pats in the terraces.






