It is difficult for us to get set for more elections, but we must. Last year the citizens of Castro County voted and voted and voted enough that trying to push a get-out-the-vote campaign this year is like firing a bullet without any powder.

Every last one of us has been affected by the outcomes of last year's elections. Our individual votes still count despite the fact that they are thrown in with millions of others.

Texas are now faced with the probability of a senatorial election that can have a profound effect on the Congress of the United States. The balance of power between the Republicans and Democrats in the Senate can be decided by one man due to the almost even split in numbers.

At this writing there are more than twenty persons entered in the senatorial race. Why there are so many, we have no idea. Actually, the race will be between Judge Ralph Yarborough, Republican Thad Hutcheson, Representative Martin Dies, Judge James P. Hart, and State Agricultural Commissioner John White, with Searcy Bracewell getting three or four votes.

Dies, White, and Bracewell, should one of them win, would have their vacancies filled by still another election. Since the race of Governor Price Daniel, it seems to be fashionable for elected politicians to try for higher office while seated comfortably and securely in their lesser jobs.

Of the candidates, Yarborough, White, and Hart are proven loyal Democrats, while Dies and Bracewell are conservatives who are apt to let their loyalties shift with the winds. Thad Hutcheson is reportedly an honorable man, albeit Republican. Even though President Eisenhower carried the state in November, it is to be seriously doubted that Hutcheson can ride the President's bandwagon.

Several polls have been conducted throughout the state by Joe Belden (The Belden Polls), Radio Station KLIF in Dallas, and by the "Democrats of Texas." If a pre-election poll can be held as an indication of things to come, then Ralph Yarborough will lead the pack—in fact, all the other candidates will see of him will be his dust.

The highest percentage received by Judge Yarborough in these polls was 89 percent of the votes. Now remember, this is all pre-election and as yet the conservative "Democrats for Eisenhower" goons have not had time to turn their slander and smear campaigns against him as in the past.

According to the political prognosticators, the race will actually be between Yarborough and Dies. We are reminded of the caustic remarks made by the El Paso Herald-Post last month in commenting on the Pool Bill as the "most outrageous piece of legislative hypocrisy we can remember" and "a conspiracy to defeat Ralph Yarborough and elect Martin Dies." The run-off election would cost \$1 million, and "Martin Dies isn't worth \$1 million," said the newspaper. "Judging from his congressional record, he is worth \$0.00."

Farmers of the High Plains should be careful of their vote on April 2. About the middle of last month, Judge Yarborough told Central Texas farm audiences in Fort Worth and San Antonio: "I am for restoration of fixed-price crop supports at 90 percent of parity."

"Parity does not mean a profit for farmers. Parity means only a fair price for raw crops from (See ABOUT DIMMITT, Page 6)

## Special Elections Called for April 2 In Dimmitt, Hart

### Absentee Balloting In Senatorial Race To Begin March 13

A special election will be held with the Senatorial Election April 2 for a mayor for Dimmitt to replace E. B. Wright, who is retiring from the post.

Bob McLean, president of the First State Bank of Dimmitt, consented to become a candidate after being presented with a petition signed by 16 Dimmitt residents requesting him to seek the position. McLean was the only candidate to file for the office of mayor before the March 2 filing deadline.

On the special ballot will be McLean's name and space for one write-in candidate.

A mayor and two commissioners will be elected for Hart in a special election to be held in the Hart American Legion Hall April 2.

Willis A. Hawkins Sr., mayor of Hart, called the election by authorizing a notice of city election to be published in the News.

The mayor and two city commissioners will be elected by write-in balloting; no candidates had filed for the posts by the March 2 deadline.

Absentee balloting for the April 2 special senatorial election will begin Wednesday, March 13, in the office of the County Clerk in the Castro County Court House. Any qualified voter in the county who will be out of the county on that day is urged by Mrs. Neva Hastings, county clerk, to mark their absentee ballots beforehand.

Also, Mrs. Hastings said, any college students of voting age who either paid their poll taxes or signed for poll-tax exemptions in February and who are registered as citizens of Castro County, are urged to write to the county clerk's office for their absentee ballots, which will be sent them.

## Bobbies Win Bi-District Title; Play For Regional Saturday

The Dimmitt Bobbies earned the right Tuesday night to enter the regional tournament in Lubbock Saturday by defeating the sharpshooting Antelope Antelopes, 86-85, in the Dimmitt Elementary Gymnasium.

The bi-district championship game was played before an overflow crowd of 1,300. The lead changed hands 11 times during the game, and the score was tied 11 times, including an 82-82 tie with 1:38 remaining in the fourth quarter.

Largest margin in the score during the night was eight points. Abernathy led Dimmitt, 12-4, early in the first quarter; the Bobbies jumped ahead of the Antelopes by a 54-48 score early in the third period, and kept their eight-point buildup throughout the third quarter.

The first quarter ended with Abernathy holding a 24-22 advantage over Dimmitt. The Bobbies played catch-up in the second period and gained a 50-46 lead by halftime. They kept their lead throughout the third period and went into the final quarter with a 68-62 advantage.

Two girls accounted for 90 points of the total score as Bobbie pivot forward Dovie Smithson and Abernathy pivot Margie Guinn sank 45 points each in one of the hottest scoring duels of the year.

Antelope guards tried to bottle Smithson up in the first quarter, but forward Mickey Pelley talked them out of it by sinking 12 points in short order with long set shots. Pelley was the third highest scorer of the game with 27 points.

Playmaker Sandra Thompson also helped keep the Antelope guards honest as she stalled, shot, passed and drove in to help set up scores. She also accounted for 14 points of her own.

Abernathy's Phillips used her fast-and-accurate style to add 16 points to the Antelope total, and Betty Shipman, who alternated between pivot and out-forward positions, sank 23 points to complete the Abernathy scoring.

A hassle over the rules developed in the fourth period when an official called a five-second time limit on Sandra Thompson as she dribbled the ball, unguarded, in trying to force an Abernathy guard out of position. Miss Thompson tucked the ball under her arm and was ready to take the case to court when a rule book was produced which proved that Miss Thompson was right, and Dimmitt was allowed to keep possession of the ball.

## County Center Discussion Slated For Friday Night

The possibility of building a Castro County community center will be discussed at a meeting Friday at 8 p.m. in the District Court Room.

A community center has long been considered by many in this area as the county's greatest civic need at present.

No group has been organized as yet to promote such a project; the Friday meeting is the result of action by several interested persons throughout the county, mostly farmers.

Among questions to be considered at the meeting are:

1. Do the people of Castro County want an all-purpose community center?
2. If so, what types of uses should be planned for the center?
3. How much should be spent for a first-class county center; and
4. What would be the most feasible materials, type of construction, dimensions, location, and facilities.

Many possibilities have been pointed up for such a center. Among the uses mentioned so far for such a building are (1) facilities for Castro County Fair exhibits; (2) facilities for a recreation center, such as bowling alleys, skating area, billiards tables, etc.; (3) facilities for converting the main auditorium to a large-crowd arena for sports events; (4) facilities for county-wide conventions; (5) meeting facilities for county organizations; (6) facilities for offices of county public service administrators; and (7) banquet facilities.

These are representative opinions expressing a portion of the services and facilities needed by Castro County. Any other suggestions would be welcomed at the Friday night meeting, a spokesman said.

Main purpose of the meeting will be to crystallize ideas on the county's need for an all-purpose center, and toward what goals planning should be directed if such a center is thought necessary. All interested persons throughout the county are urged to attend the meeting.

## Dimmitt to Have Two New Clinics

Construction will begin soon on two new medical clinics in Dimmitt.

Announcement was made this week that Dr. Carl Page and Dr. J. W. Spence will build a new medical-surgical clinic which will be ready for occupancy on or before July 1. Complete details will be available at a later date, the announcement said.

Construction will begin April 1 on the new Bischoff Clinic, Dr. Harold Bischoff announced this week. The new clinic, to be located immediately north of the present Bischoff Clinic, will be of brick and heylite construction, with glass brick windows and 2,040 square feet of floor space. Norman Cleavinger is the contractor for this structure.

Upon completion of these two clinics, Dimmitt will have a total of three medical-surgical clinics, including the Dimmitt Medical and Surgical Clinic, owned by Dr. R. E. Cogswell.

## Burglar Takes \$407 in Invoices From 66 Station

Credit card invoices totaling \$407.12 were stolen Wednesday morning from Bob's Phillips 66 Service Station.

Bob Jackson, owner of Bob's Service Station, said Wednesday that the invoices have been invalidated for customer use through the Phillips Petroleum Company, and are of no use to the person who took them.

Jackson urged that the person with the invoices return them to the station in some way, either through the mail or by leaving them on the station premises after hours. He said that if the invoices are returned, no felony charges will be pressed.

Jackson also asked that all his customers who purchased orders on their credit cards from March 1 through March 5 come by the service station to fill out new purchase orders, since the stolen invoices have been invalidated.

## Chamber Meeting Set for March 19

A meeting has been called for March 19 for all members of the Castro County Chamber of Commerce, B. M. Nelson, manager, said this week.

Purpose of the meeting will be to outline objectives and formulate the program for the Castro County C-C for 1957.

Among the more important topics which will probably be discussed, Nelson said, are current plans for developing a vegetable program in Castro County.

Those attending will be expected to present other topics for discussion, he said, in an effort to reach definite objectives toward which the Chamber should work in 1957.

Nelson urged that all Chamber members and prospective members attend this policy meeting, which has been set for 8 p.m. on March 19 in the District Court Room.

## Sheriff's Dept. Gets New Cars

The Castro County Sheriff's Department recently put into operation two new squad cars to replace two 1956 models.

Both cars are Chevrolet 150 four-door sedans with 230-hp engines, Power-Pac carburetion, standard shifts, and overdrive. Both have been equipped with the two-way radios from the 1956 models.

The two 1956 models, also Chevrolets, will be sold March 11 by sealed bid. The money received for these one-year-old cars will be used to help pay for the new ones, which were purchased at fleet-car prices. By this means, the Sheriff's Department is able to operate new squad cars at little or no cost to the county.

## Many Farmers Favor Vegetables, C-C Questionnaire Returns Indicate

The Castro County Chamber of Commerce has received 64 returns on questionnaires sent to county farmers last week asking for opinions on a vegetable program for the county, B. M. Nelson, Chamber manager, said Wednesday.

Sixty-three of these 64 favored a vegetable program for Castro County and expressed willingness to participate.

"This is a much better return so far than I had expected," Nelson said of the questionnaire response. He indicated that returns are still coming in on the questionnaires sent out by the Chamber of Commerce last week.

Virtually all farmers responding to the questionnaires so far showed interest in a vegetable program for the county. To the question of how many acres they would be willing to devote to vegetables, pollees gave various estimations ranging from five to 100 acres, with the average about 20 to 30 acres.

"This seems to be the most ideal vegetable acreage per farm," Nelson said. "If a vegetable program becomes a reality in Castro County, it would probably be more stable in all respects if every farmer participated through a relatively small acreage."

Nelson urged farmers who have not yet answered the questionnaire to do so. "We need every opinion we can get," he said, "so we can approach the program realistically."

Answers to the questions asked in the poll are not binding. The questionnaires were sent out primarily for opinion purposes so the Chamber might find how Castro County farmers feel about a vegetable program before continuing with plans for such a program.
