

Is This Pest Bothering Your Victory Garden?

CUCUMBER BEETLE-Color: Greenish cucumber beetles with 12 spots and yellow beetles with 3 black stripes. Feed on foliage and stems of plants. Dust with cryolite 1 part, tale 3 parts; or calcium arsenate 1 part, hydrated time 19 parts. Beetles usually attack plants when smill. Early treatment essential. Repeat applications at intervals of 5 to 7 days to keep young leaves covered with dust. For further information see your County Extension Service Agents.

Is This Pest Bothering Your Victory Garden?

BLISTER BEETLE - Color: Elongated black or grayish or striped beetles. De-foliate the plants. Dust with 1 part cryo-lite to 3 parts suffur, except on cucur-bits, then use tale with cryolite. Strong pyrethrum sprays may be used as soon as beetles appear. When beetles are numerous they may be brushed off the plants with a broom and often driven from the garden. 
