Both Miss Cluck and Howell will advance to the State 4-H Horse Show, which will be held in Dallas Aug. 1-3.

In other competition Howell placed 13th in the showmanship class out of 126 participants and was 12th out of 120 participants in the western pleasure class.



County Service Officer The Veterans Administration is increasing and extending insurance coverage for 6.8 million veterans, servicemen and ready reservists under the new Veterans Insurance Act enacted May 24.

A major provision of the law, according to Jack Coker, Waco VA Regional Office Director, is an automatic increase in maxi-\$20,000 for 2.4 million servicemen on active duty.

Servicemen and ready reservists are insured automatically under Servicemen's Group Life dividends, not to begin before Insurance (SGLI) unless they decline the additional coverage in writing. They may elect to be insured for \$5,000, \$10,000, \$15,000, or not at all, it was ance.

Another provision establish ed, effective Aug. 1, a fiveyear, nonrenewable Veterans Group Life Insurance (VGLI) which would provide coverage in amounts of \$5,000, \$10,000, \$15,000 and \$20,000. Service men leaving active duty could convert their SGLI to VGLI without medical examination.

Also eligible for VGLI are 2. terminated less than four years ago. This group must apply within one year of the effective date of the VGLI program, Coker said.

A NUMBER of changes are to be made in the educational assistance programs adminis million veterans whose SGLI tered by the Veterans Adminstration for eligible veterans and their dependents and survivors. Following are some of the changes which will be put nto effect prior to the beginning of the 1974 fall semester.

Educational assistance programs are currently administered by the VA for veterans who served honorably during the Vietnam Era and the Cold War period, which lates back to Feb. 1, 195 onetary benewives and children of living veterans who are shown to be 100% disables because of service-incurred diseases or injuries, and to the widows and children of veterans or servicemen whose deaths were the

esult of military duty. Eligible veterans and dependents who attend a college or university this fall will receive an advance payment at the time of registration, providing the necessary paperwork is completed in sufficient time. The advance payment, consisting of the amount due for one full month plus that remaining portion of the month of registration, can be prepared and sent to the school. The eligible person may receive the check at the time of registration, thus having the funds necessary to pay tuition and fees required y the school.

Beginning with the 1974 fall emester, the VA will place Veterans Representatives on the campuses of the larger olleges and universities. These representatives will be vailable to assist veterans and other eligicle persons who night encounter problems conerning benefit payments, and other matters pertaining to the edicational assistance progra: - ad ninistered by the Veterans 'ammistration.
