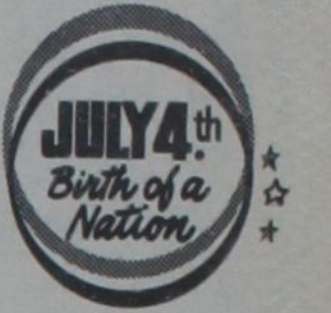


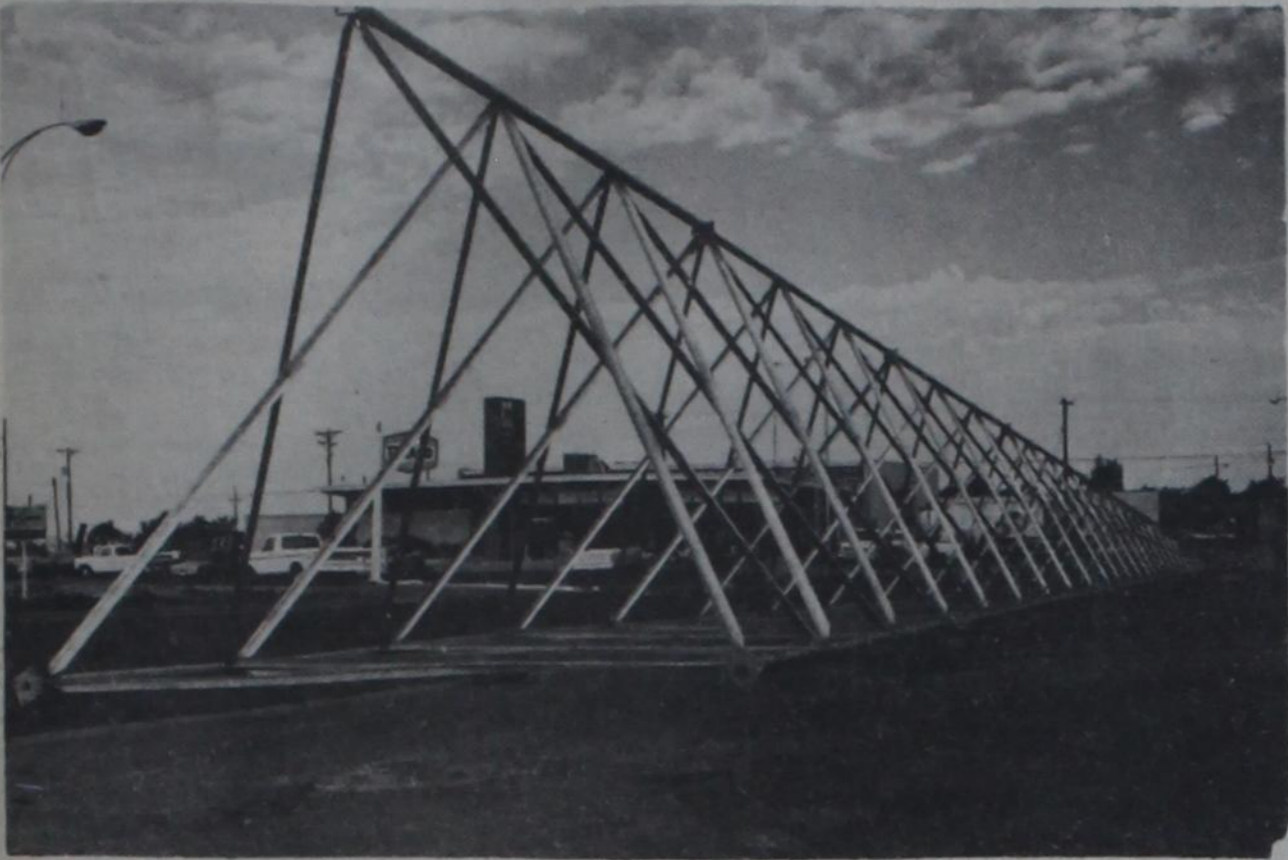

County 4-H'ers take honors

Two Castro County 4-H'ers captured top honors in the District I 4-H Horse Show held in Amarillo last week.

RENEE CLUCK displayed the grand champion mare while Matt Howell showed the grand champion gelding.

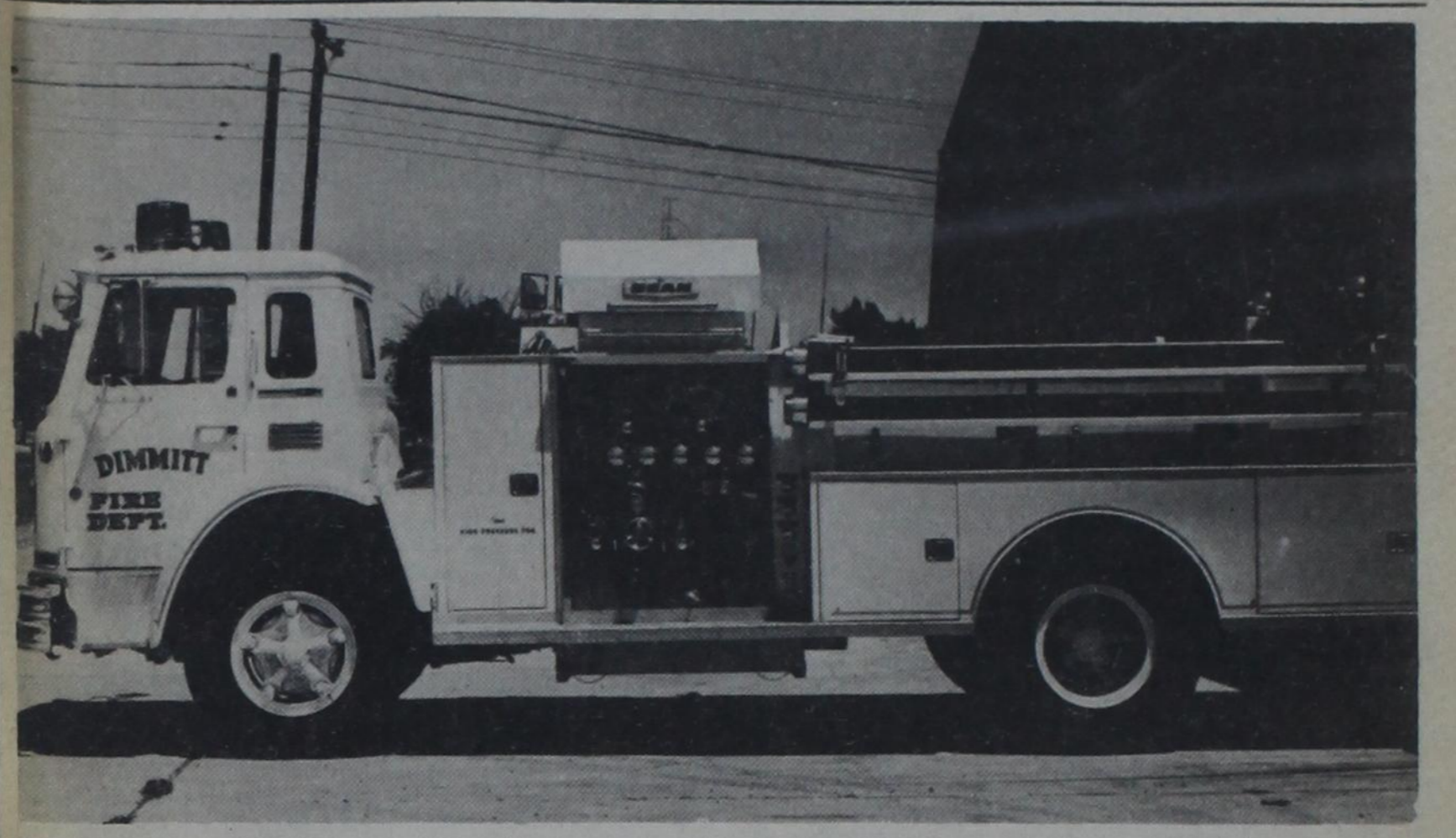
Miss Cluck captured first place in the halter class for registered mares of any breed, five years and under before going on to take the grand champion banner and Howell had the first place horse in the class for registered geldings five years and older.

Both Miss Cluck and Howell will advance to the State 4-H Horse Show, which will be held in Dallas Aug. 1-3.

In other competition Howell placed 13th in the showmanship class out of 126 participants and was 12th out of 120 participants in the western pleasure class.

Carol Bagwell displayed the 10th place animal in the registered gelding class and Scott Bagley and Greg Cluck both placed in the top 30 in the western riding class but failed to go into the finals.

THE TWO-day show was held in the Bill Cody Arena at the Tri-State Fairgrounds in Amarillo. Judge for the events was Dr. Bill Jackson of Stephenville. Some 184 contestants participated in the show.

Chamber to pursue bus service for city

Members of the board of directors of the Castro County Chamber of Commerce discussed plans for a proposed city bus service in a session last Thursday morning at the Colonial Inn.

THE CHAMBER has been engaged in an effort to secure bus service through Dimmitt for the past few months and has been negotiating with New Mexico Transportation Com-

pany of Roswell.

Earlier this year the chamber sought letters from county residents in support of bus service and also mailed out questionnaires to local merchants concerning the amount paid by each merchant in freight charges in 1973.

Chamber board members voted to send representatives to Roswell as soon as possible to pursue further the matter of bus service for Dimmitt.

In other action the board heard a report on the United Way from Bob Caddell, who named eight directors who were approved by the steering committee. Directors include Jean DuLaney, Robert Ryan, Bill Clark, Julian Falcon, Pete Garza, Reta Welch, Sandra Clark and Stanley Schaeffer.

BOARD members discussed designs for the face of the county's commemorative coin. No drawings were submitted to the chamber and board members voted Thursday to check with some local artists for a design.

Dimmitt man killed in shooting Sunday

A Dimmitt woman was arrested on murder charges Sunday morning following a shooting incident at the Castro County Agricultural Housing Project.

MARY HOWARD, 35, of Dimmitt was arrested by Castro County sheriff's officers Sunday morning shortly after the incident in which Haywood Glover, 55, also of Dimmitt, was fatally shot.

According to investigating officers Glover was apparently shot with a .22 pistol following an argument about 9:10 Sunday morning.

Miss Howard was arraigned before Castro County Justice of the Peace Mary Jo Smith, who set bond at \$1500.

Funeral services for Glover are scheduled for 2 p.m. Saturday at the Macedonia Baptist Church. Rev. James Alexander will officiate. Burial will be in Castro Memorial Gardens under the direction of Dennis Funeral Home.

37 donate blood Monday

Dimmitt area residents exceeded their quota during the bloodmobile project Monday as 37 persons donated.

THE bloodmobile was conducted by Coffee Memorial Blood Center of Amarillo, in cooperation with Plains Memorial Hospital and the Hospital Auxiliary.

All those who donated received a unique "blood insurance," which guarantees their families all the free blood plasma they may need during the coming year.

"We're trying to get at least 30 pints twice a year to make our county self-supporting," Hospital Administrator Verle West said. "We use about 40 pints a year from Coffee Memorial Center at our hospital, and we send patients to the metropolitan hospitals who have to have blood. Sixty pints a year would make our county self-supporting."

THE NEW bloodmobile used here Monday — a converted Winnebago motor home — was put into operation just last week, according to Florence Henderson, executive director of the blood center.

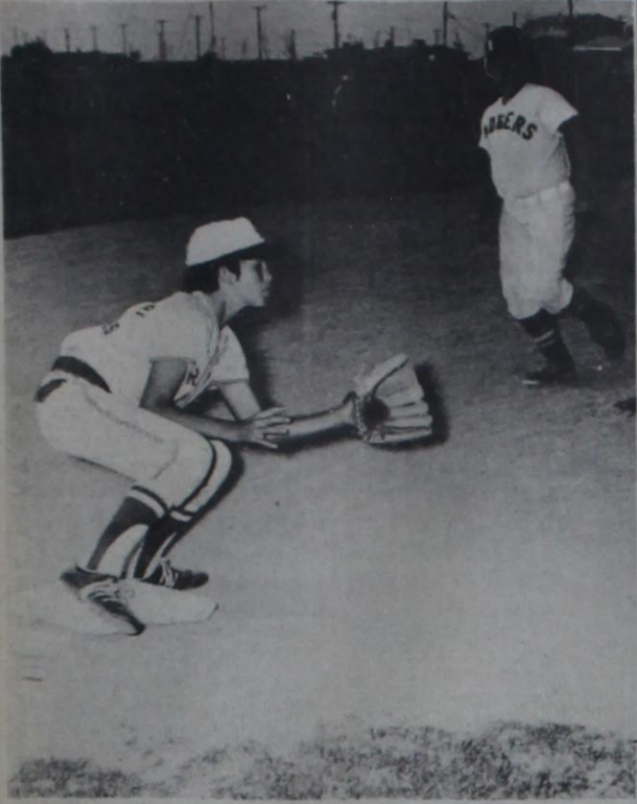

VETERANS' SERVICES

The Veterans Administration is increasing and extending insurance coverage for 6.8 million veterans, servicemen and ready reservists under the new Veterans Insurance Act enacted May 24.

A major provision of the law, according to Jack Coker, Waco VA Regional Office Director, is an automatic increase in maximum coverage from \$15,000 to \$20,000 for 2.4 million servicemen on active duty.

Servicemen and ready reservists are insured automatically under Servicemen's Group Life Insurance (SGLI) unless they decline the additional coverage in writing. They may elect to be insured for \$5,000, \$10,000, \$15,000, or not at all, it was noted.

Another provision established, effective Aug. 1, a five-year, nonrenewable Veterans Group Life Insurance (VGLI) which would provide coverage in amounts of \$5,000, \$10,000, \$15,000 and \$20,000. Servicemen leaving active duty could convert their SGLI to VGLI without medical examination.

Also eligible for VGLI are 2.7 million veterans whose SGLI terminated less than four years ago. This group must apply within one year of the effective date of the VGLI program, Coker said.

When an individual's five-

year term VGLI runs out, he may convert to an individual policy by applying in writing to a company participating in the VGLI program.

Other highlights of the Veterans Insurance Act of 1974: — Extends full-time SGLI coverage to about one million members of the ready reserves. — Provides SGLI coverage for another 100,000 reservists who are retired or will be retired, have not reached their 61st birthday, and have completed at least 20 years of service creditable for retirement.

— Provides for payment of dividends, not to begin before January 1975, to 600,000 Korean Conflict veterans who carry Veterans Special Life Insurance.

VA officials observed that the changes will enable the agency to provide a more viable life insurance program for many persons who serve in the interests of the country's national security.

A NUMBER of changes are to be made in the educational assistance programs administered by the Veterans Administration for eligible veterans and their dependents and survivors. Following are some of the changes which will be put into effect prior to the beginning of the 1974 fall semester.

Educational assistance programs are currently administered by the VA for veterans who served honorably during the Vietnam Era and the Cold War period, which dates back to Feb. 1, 1950. Monetary benefits are also available to the wives and children of living veterans who are shown to be 100% disabled because of service-incurred diseases or injuries, and to the widows and children of veterans or servicemen whose deaths were the result of military duty.

Eligible veterans and dependents who attend a college or university this fall will receive an advance payment at the time of registration, providing the necessary paperwork is completed in sufficient time. The advance payment, consisting of the amount due for one full month plus that remaining portion of the month of registration, can be prepared and sent to the school. The eligible person may receive the check at the time of registration, thus having the funds necessary to pay tuition and fees required by the school.

Beginning with the 1974 fall semester, the VA will place Veterans Representatives on the campuses of the larger colleges and universities. These representatives will be available to assist veterans and other eligible persons who might encounter problems concerning benefit payments, and other matters pertaining to the educational assistance program administered by the Veterans Administration. Those enrolled in a college this fall should contact the campus VA representative if assistance is required during the school term.

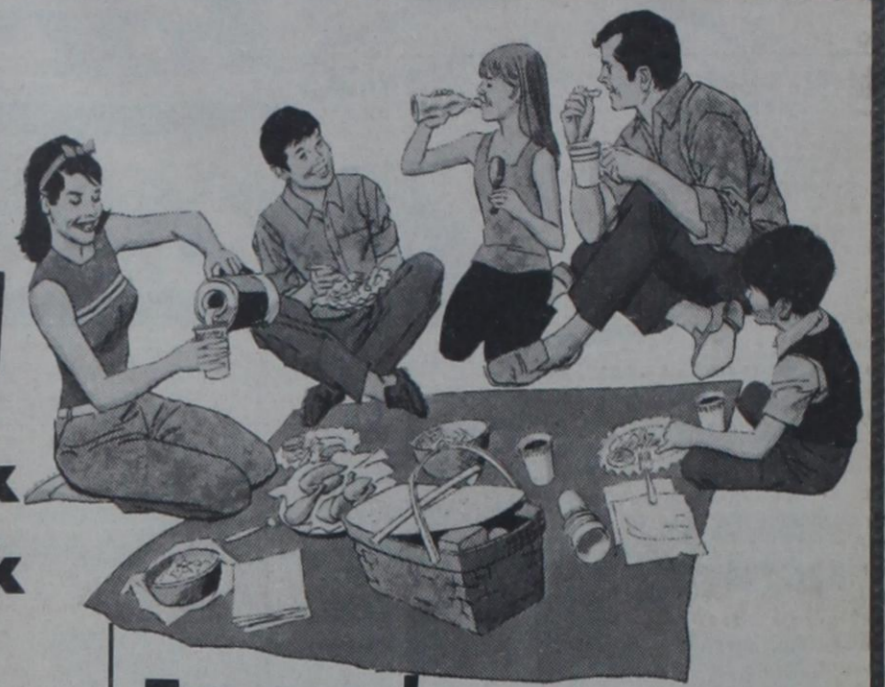

Said prevailing rates are also the minimum wage rates for the construction of the proposed work, as established by the U.S. Secretary of Labor. Each bidder shall verify in his bid that the prices quoted are based on said prevailing and minimum wage rates, and the Contract will require the successful Bidder to pay not less than the prevailing and minimum wage rates as follows:

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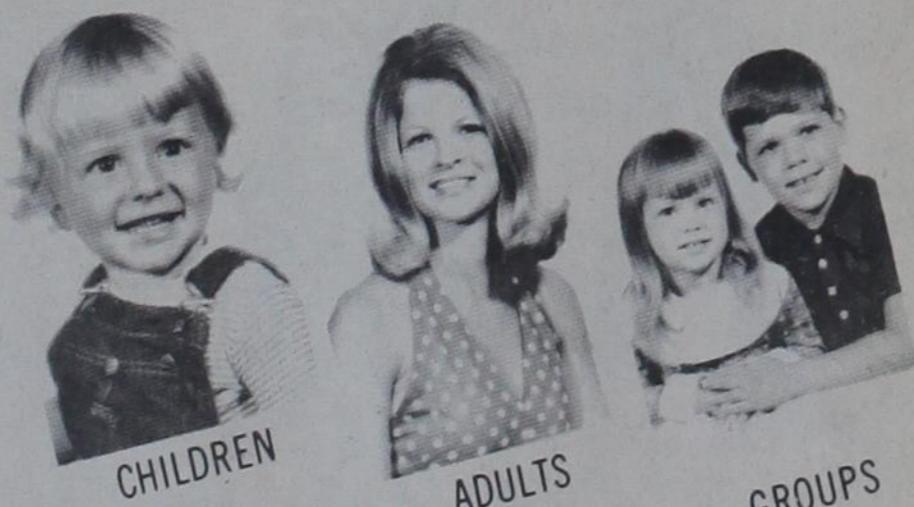
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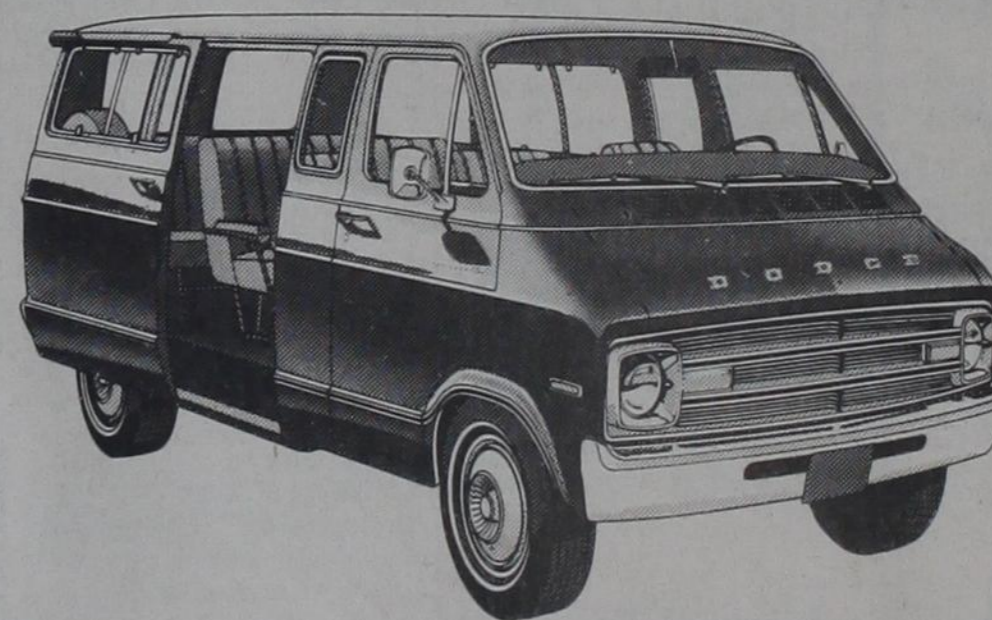

Commissioners seeking program on home rule

Dimmitt's city commissioners voted Monday to contact the Tulia city commission about the possibility of the Tulia commission presenting a program on home rule here sometime in the future.

CITY commissioners took the action in an effort to determine some of the pros and cons of home rule government. Tulia adopted home rule government about a year ago.

The Chamber of Commerce recently recommended that the city adopt a home rule system of government.

Bob Caddell appeared before the commission to give a report on some of the advantages a board of city development would give the city following the adoption of home rule.

Using information obtained from the Amarillo Board of City Development Caddell reported that such a board could initiate programs to strengthen the

work force and could also help to draw new businesses and industry to the city. He added that in Amarillo the board is funded by tax money and is not a part of the chamber of commerce.

"Whether we have a board of city development or not, I definitely think a home rule system of government would be beneficial to us," said Caddell. "Adoption of home rule under the present laws would probably be more of a drawing card for new businesses, rather than waiting for a constitutional amendment to legalize it at a lower population figure," he added.

Commissioners J. R. Brown and Garnett Holland reported that they do not know enough about home rule government to make a decision at this time and would like to look into the system more extensively before taking any action.

IN OTHER action the commissioners considered hardship cases on three units of property in the city's proposed paving project on 10th, 5th and Andrews Streets. The city fathers voted to pay \$1837.50 in paving expenses for the three units in order to clear the way for the entire summer paving project. The city will hold a lien against the concerned property. Paving work is expected to begin in the near future.

City manager E. B. Noble was given the go-ahead to check into the purchase of a war surplus truck and trailer to be used for hauling the city's track-loader.

INDIVISIBLE - Incapable of being divided

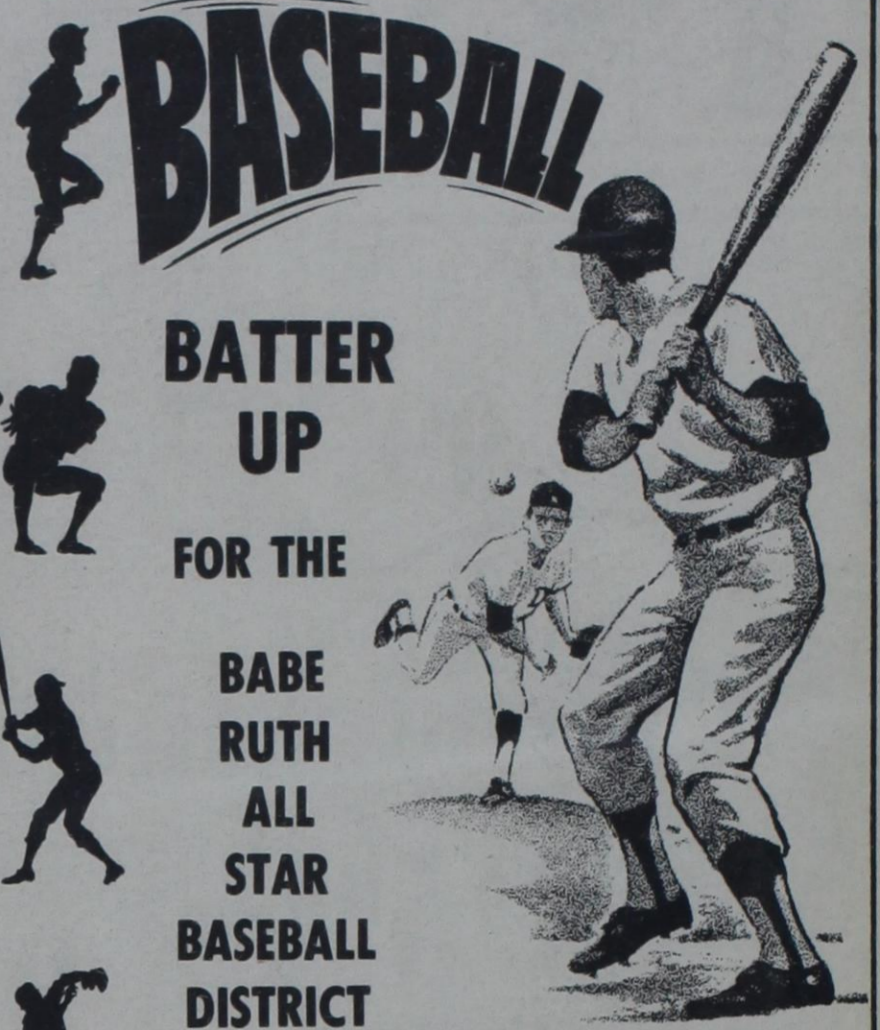
WITH LIBERTY - Which is the fundamental right or power to live one's own life without fear of some sort of retaliation


