### GSPA Struggles For Survival

Directors of the G.S.P.A. held their first meeting Sunday, January 26. Wes Anthony, president of the Association emphasized the importance of the area's number one industry, grain sorghum.

Currently, the national budget is \$12,000 short of its goal, and unless this budget is attained soon, the G.S.P.A. must close all their doors including seven foreign offices around the world according to Anthony.

He continued, "At the present time foreign markets are available only to G.S.P.A. organization. These markets are keeping grain sorghum surplus as low as it is and also keeps the price of grain sorghum stable."

Anthony says, "NOT ONLY does this budget cover market outlets, but also involves a great research development program."

One of the most urgent research projects at the present time is the control of sorghum midge. The G.S.P.A. in co-operation with Texas Tech is conducting world research, trying to discover some way or develop a variety of grain sorghum to control the midge.

In order to provide more funds for the G.S.P.A., the local directors agreed to contact the farmers of Castro County and charge sorghum producers a \$10 annual membership fee. In the fall when farmers settle at the elevators, there will be an automatic deduction of one pound per one thousand pounds of grain sorghum, subject to the approval of the producer instead of two pounds as it has been in the past. This is an average estimated cost of less than 10 cents per acre.

According to the directors, only by following the above program and only by obtaining one hundred per cent cooperation of the producers and the elevators can the G.S.P.A. program survive.

### License Tags Available Now

License tags for 1964 went on sale, February 1 in the County Tax Assessor and Collector's office announces Kent Birdwell.

He says they expect to sell the following number of plates; passenger plates, 3300; commercial trucks, 1,000; farm trucks and pickups, 2,000; trailers, 400; and farm trailers, 3,000.

This will be a total of 9700 plates which is expected to sell.

Total money collected for 1963 to date for license tags is \$177,515.28. The County collected \$113,569.16 while the state received \$63,946.12.

This has been an increase of \$12,757 over last year's sale. Collections for 1956 was \$87,638.45. In 1961, the total collection was \$150,563.39.

### Lucky Jumbo 4-H Club Makes Livestock Tour

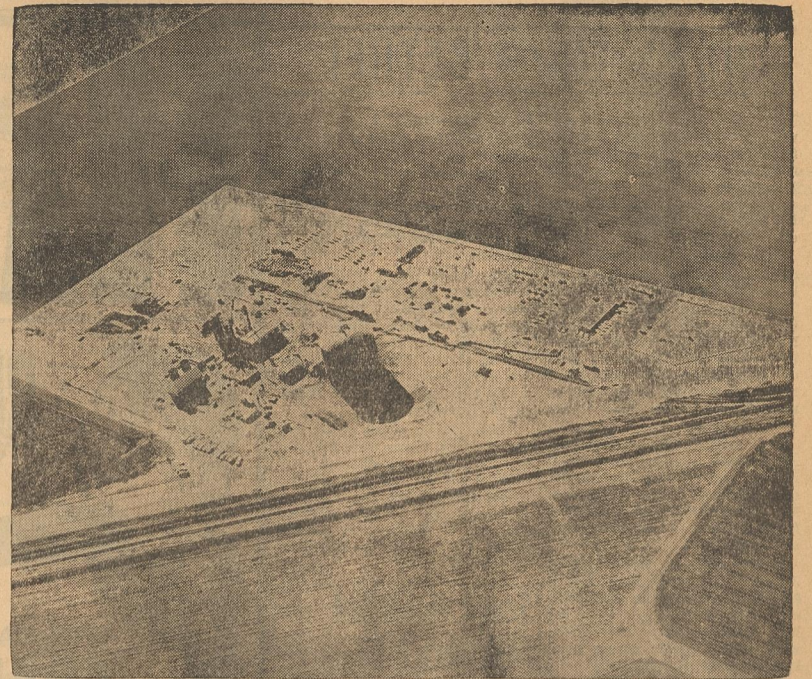
Lucky Jumbo 4-H Club participated in a livestock tour Saturday, January 25.

### Western Ammonia Corporation Starts Production of Anhydrous Ammonia

Western Ammonia Corporation's new plant located two miles southeast of Dimmitt is now producing ammonia, according to Ed McMillian, general manager. It will, however, be some time yet before full production is reached.

As with any new plant there are start up problems that develop and these must be corrected, one by

one says McMillian.

The start up of the ammonia plant began about two weeks ago. Six of the towers contain catalysts which enter into the chemical reactions in the process, and these catalysts undergo a reduction process, wherein the contained oxygen is removed. The reduction was completed this past weekend and production is being increased almost daily.

The liquid fertilizer plant, a facility that was not originally included Western's plans, is also ready for operation. This plant will use a part of the anhydrous ammonia produced to make aqua ammonia.

This material can be used in the same manner as anhydrous ammonia as a nitrogen fertilizer. It will also be mixed with phosphate to make a product that contains both nitrogen and phosphate.

Facilities for storage and handling of dry bulk fertilizers will be completed later this month.

### snow! Snow! SNOW!

Residents of Castro County and Dimmitt were literally snowed in as frosty winter weather dumped 11 to 12 inches of white stuff here.

Blowing snow caused drifts from four to six feet in some places in Dimmitt. Residents dug out chains and shovels as they attempted to motivate around the county. Only the more hardy dared to bring their cars down the streets piled with powdery snow. The scene Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday consisted of spinning wheels as cars stuck throughout the city.

Snow plows worked all night Tuesday and early Wednesday morning trying to provide passable streets and highways for stranded motorists.

Early Wednesday morning many Dimmitt residents trusted their legs for moving about the city instead of cars.

About six and a half inches were dumped in the immediate area Monday and Monday night. Continued snow Tuesday piled four and half more inches here making a total of 11 or nearly 12 inches in the county. The area received about 1.14 inches moisture from the storm. About .47 moisture was brought in with the snow Tuesday.

The last giant snow storm recorded in the county was in 1956 when 36 inches covered the area.

# Nursing Home Plans Made

Plans have been announced for the location of a Nursing Home in Dimmitt according to Eddie Coltharp, manager of Chamber of Commerce.

The Nursing Home will be located on property north of the new hospital. The property will be purchased from the Lawrence estate. Plans call for the purchase of 150 feet of frontage for the Home.

Melvin Smith and Associates of Lubbock will build, own, maintain and operate the Nursing Home says Coltharp. Smith has constructed several such type homes

throughout West Texas and has been thoroughly checked by the Castro County Chamber of Commerce.

Warren of the State Health Dept. licensing division for Nursing Homes stated, "As far as the State of Texas is concerned, Mr. Smith has an A-1 record."

Property will be donated locally for the \$65,000 Nursing Home. The Home will have a capacity for 30 residents and will be a Type I and II which will incorporate moderate nursing care. The Home will offer care for completely bedfast

patients.

It will meet all requirements needed to comply with State Vendor program. The Home will also meet all the state fire requirements.

Average cost per month for patients will run from \$160 to \$225 depending on type care required. The building will be brick veneer and have approximately 6,500 square feet. It will be centrally heated for winter and have refrigerated air for summer.

The Home will contain an area for church services, recreation,

dining and visiting.

Plans are available for anyone who wishes to see them at the Chamber of Commerce office.

The Home will employ a minimum of 11 people. If at all possible, the employees will be hired locally.

Application has been submitted to State Health Department and completion of the project will depend upon the State's approval.

The State supervises the financing, management and keep a continual check on operation of the Nursing Home.

Civic Betterment Committee of the C of C has provided the footwork and background work for a year or more on the Home. The committee is in charge of soliciting funds for purchase of property for the home. Anyone wishing to donate money may contact George Bradford, Cecil Dennis, Wes Anthony, Earl Brock or E. B. Noble.

The committee felt there was a definite need for an establishment of a Nursing Home in this immediate area and to make this type care available near home type care available near home go out of town for such care.

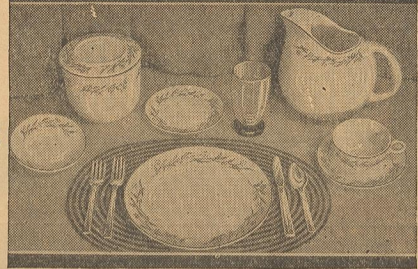

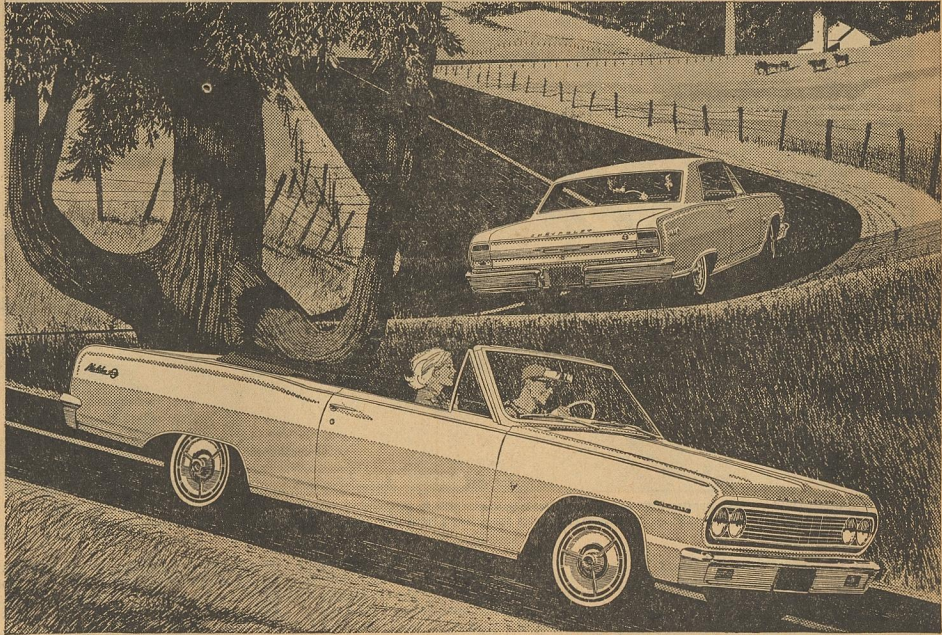

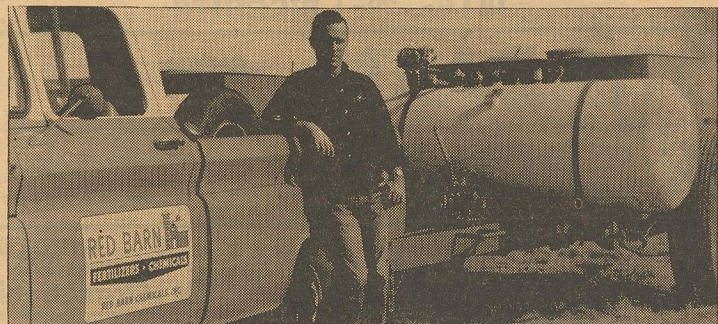

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### Lively & Owen To Enter Rodeo Calf Scramble

David Lively and Eddie Owen, Dimmitt F. F. A. Club members will be contestants in the calf scramble at the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo on February 29, 1964, at the 2 p.m. performance. They will see "America's Wildest Rodeo" as guests of the show at this performance.

The Houston show's calf scramble will again qualify as the "world's greatest" when the first of a series of 19 contests takes

place in the Sam Houston Coliseum on February 19.

When the Houston show held its first scramble in 1942, 24 calves were awarded. It was not dreamed that the project would result in putting some 4000 boys into the cattle business in the next 22 years.

In 1944, 112 boys scrambled for 56 calves in 5 contests. Each year the calf scramble activities increased, and more and more sponsors stepped forward.

The Calf Scramble Contests became so popular with the rodeo audiences that for the past fifteen years, there has been a contest included as an event in each of the 19 rodeo performances.

During the course of one season, four hundred boys now scramble

for 200 calves. Half of the calf certificates are given to boys interested in dairy cattle and the other half to those who prefer beef cattle.

When the calf scramble contestant wins, his work has just begun. With his cash certificate he purchases the best animal he can find. He must then care for the calf, furnish monthly records to the Houston Livestock Show and his sponsor, and return his animal to the show the next year.

As a result of the Calf Scramble contests, nearly a million and a half dollars in livestock, cash and prizes have been put into the hands of Texas youth, giving them a substantial start in business.

Dates for the Houston show are

February 19 through March 1. It will open with the traditional downtown parade beginning at 10 a.m.

Salt Grass Trail Riders will begin their annual 4-day, 90 mile ride from Brenham, Texas to Houston on Saturday, February 15 and arrive in time to participate in the parade.

The rodeo, which is R.C.A. approved, will offer \$47,630 added prize money, the largest purse in America except the National Finals - an R.C.A. event. A new attraction at the '64 show is a Wild Buffalo Stampede.

Stars for the show will be Eddy Arnold, "The Tennessee Plowboy" and Michael Landon, "Little Joe" of the Bonanza television series.
