

Man seriously injured in car-pickup accident

Dick Reinhardt, Dimmitt farmer and businessman, was seriously injured Friday when his pickup collided with the right rear of a turning car as he passed a truck 2.7 miles south of the city on US 385.

Reinhardt received severe internal injuries when he was thrown against the steering column of his 1976 Ford pickup. He underwent surgery Friday at Lubbock's Methodist Hospital, and was reported in satisfactory condition Wednesday morning.

The accident occurred at 12:40 p.m. Friday at the turn-in of the Bryce Dowell farm, along a stretch of highway that's now under construction.

The other vehicle involved was a 1977 Chevrolet Monte Carlo driven by Amanda "Molly" Moya, a Dimmitt medical receptionist. Mrs. Moya was treated and released at Plains Memorial Hospital for a head injury.

State Trooper Jackie Gunnels said Mrs. Moya's car was southbound in front of a construction water truck and Reinhardt's pickup was following the same truck before the accident occurred.

Reinhardt pulled out to pass without seeing Mrs. Moya's car in front of the truck, Gunnels said. At the same time, Mrs. Moya started a left turn at the Dowell farm, where her parents live.

The front of Reinhardt's pickup collided with the left rear of Mrs. Moya's car. Both vehicles careened off the unpaved highway. The water truck escaped damage.

"It was lucky that we didn't have a fatality," Gunnels said.

Elections light but lively

John Slavik will be sworn in as Nazareth's new mayor Monday night and eight new school and hospital trustees will take office this month following light but lively elections in the county Saturday.

Eighty-four of the 93 voters who turned out for Nazareth's city election wrote in Slavik's name for mayor. The incumbent, Urban Ball, had not filed for re-election and the mayor's place on the ballot was blank. Slavik, former Nazareth school superintendent, will take office at Monday night's city commission meeting.

Nazareth City Commissioner Carroll Gerber was returned to office unopposed with 93 votes.

Hart and Nazareth gained representation on the Plains Memorial Hospital board when Marguerite McLain of Hart polled 644 votes and Jerome Brockman of Nazareth received 633 to lead a four-person race. Carroll Webb and Don Carpenter of Dimmitt received 436 and 332 votes, respectively.

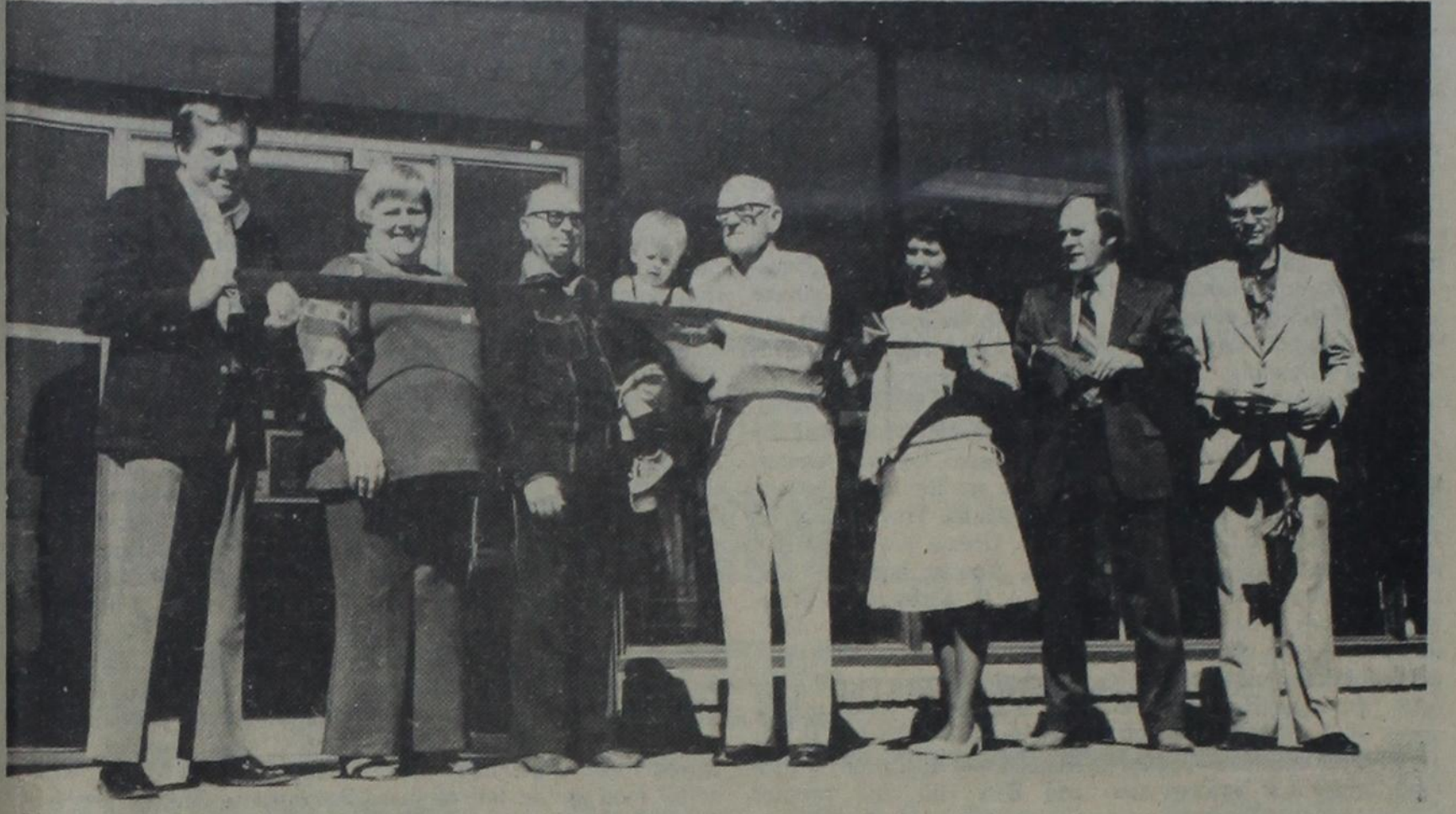
The hospital board election was the only county-wide one, and drew 1,078 voters—26% of the total registered in the county. Some 572 voted at the Dimmitt box, 270 at Hart and 236 at Nazareth.

In the race that drew the biggest field of candidates, Floyd Schulte, Alvin Klemm and Vincent Gerber were elected to the Nazareth School Board. Totals were 169 for Schulte, 161 for Klemm, 108 for Gerber. Other candidates and totals in the eight-person race were Jimmie Schulte 80, Edwin Huseman 66, Joe Dreyer 55, Fred Acker 48 and Charles Heck 27.

Harold Bob Bennett, 26, became the county's youngest school trustee when he garnered 178 votes to lead a five-person field in the Hart School Board race. Also elected was Neoma Brooks Wall with 166 votes. Other candidates in the race were Doug Higgins, who got 101 votes; incumbent Weldon Jones, who received 95; and B. E. Brantley, who polled 54.

In the Dimmitt School Board race, incumbent Monty Boozer led the four-man ticket with 376, and Don Gregory was elected to the second seat with 296. Charley Hill polled 251 and Danny Bruton 201. Also, Father Raphael Chen received 47 write-in votes.

In the county school board election, incumbent Houston Lust was returned to the Precinct 2 position unopposed.

'Now or never' blood drive set

A unit from the Coffee Memorial Blood Center at Amarillo will be in Dimmitt from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. Tuesday, according to a spokesman of the Town and Country Home Demonstration Club which is handling arrangements for the visit.

The unit will be at the city hall assembly room and a goal of 50 pints of blood has been set for this area. According to the TCHD spokesman, if that goal is not reached Tuesday, Dimmitt may be removed from the list of cities to be visited on a regular basis.

Residents of the Dimmitt, Nazareth, Hart and Sunnyside communities are urged to donate blood. Persons who are 18 through 65 may donate, also those who are 17 may with written permission from their parents.

Babysitters will be provided, at no cost, at the city hall

and refreshments will be served.

At least 46 local business firms have indicated that their employees will be given extra time off in addition to their lunch hours if they wish to donate blood.

A person who donates a pint of blood may receive, if he wishes, family blood insurance which will cost the donor a pint of blood a year and in turn insure that he, his spouse or any dependent children will not be charged the blood bank fee for any blood received during the year.

Services held Saturday for Alma Frazier

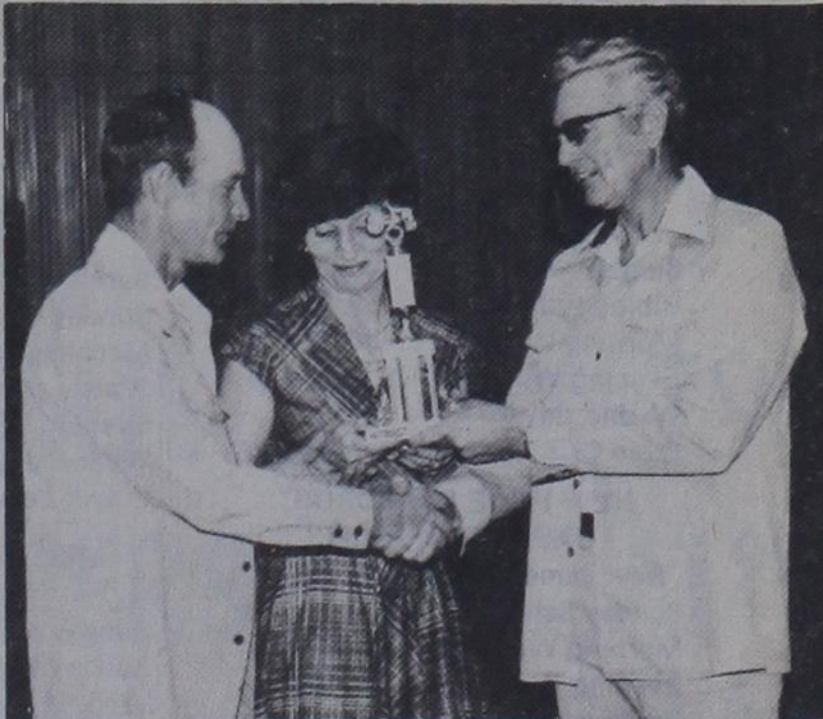

Plans for the 1978 rodeo began taking final shape Sunday during a workday meeting of the Dimmitt Rodeo Association.

A queen's contest and barbecue were approved, but a rodeo parade seems unlikely at this time. "The association has voted not to have a parade if we are only going to have the rodeo," said a spokesman for the DRA. Downtown street construction scheduled for this summer would also possibly hamper plans for a parade. However, the spokesman said if the Chamber of Commerce plans a parade, the rodeo association will invite area riding clubs to participate.

The United Lions Club has voted to sponsor a barbecue in conjunction with the rodeo. Time and location will be announced at a later date. The club will also have the concession stand at the rodeo.

THDA meet set today

Castro County Home Demonstration Clubs are ready to play host today (Thursday) to 270 or more women from clubs of District 2, Texas HD Association, in annual convention in the County Expo Center.

Beginning with registration from 9:30 to 10 a.m., the meeting will continue with addresses, entertainment and a closing business session in which a new district director will be elected.

Nell Ingram of Castro County is one of three candidates for the director's post. Mrs. Harold Preston of Llano, TSHDA president, will give the keynote address after greetings from Mayor Elmer Youts, Chamber of Commerce President Jerry Marvin and hostess club representatives.

Margaret Womack, county THDA chairman, is local coordinator for the clubs, Hart, Town & Country, Bethel and Sundowners. They have a total of 81 members.

At the noon lunch, when votes will be cast for district officers, Hart Club will present a "Comic Strip Style Show." A square dance demonstration by members of Dimmitt and Nazareth dance clubs will be an afternoon entertainment feature.

Speakers will include Phil Sorley of the Central Plains MHRM Center, Glenda Daughtrey of Plainview on the retired senior volunteer program, Martha Pitts of Lubbock on "Volunteerism" and June Cline, Extension Service organization specialist.

Boy scheduled for surgery

Surgery was scheduled Wednesday for Steve Garcia, 15-year-old Dimmitt youth who has been in the intensive care unit of Northwest Texas Hospital at Amarillo the past 10 days.

Garcia's condition was reported "stable—he's doing very well," early Wednesday. He suffered neck injuries on Easter Sunday in an accident on Texas 217 two miles west of Canyon, in which seven other youths were also injured but less seriously.

In other business, the city commission, after an executive session, voted on a total \$16,968 per year in pay increases for 22 city employees, effective May 1.

In general, the raises range from \$25 to \$100 per month, with those having the lower salaries getting the highest raises. Seven employees will be given the \$100 raises, 10 will get \$50 raises and four will receive \$25 raises.

Administrative Supervisor Jo Hamilton's salary will be raised to the level of the salaries of other department heads, which will equal about a \$214 per month raise for her.

The raises will not effect policemen or the city judge, since they received raises in the fall.

The commissioners also decided to reimburse Brenda Andrews \$30 which she was charged for repairs to a city sewer lift station in her trailer park.

However, City Manager Garnett Holland stressed that citizens having problems with the sewer or water lines should call the city before calling a plumber, so that it can be determined if the problem is the city's responsibility before the citizen incurs charges.

In addition, the commission decided to have the roof of the two-story portion of the fire station inspected to see if it needs patching or total replacement. If the whole roof needs to be done, the job will

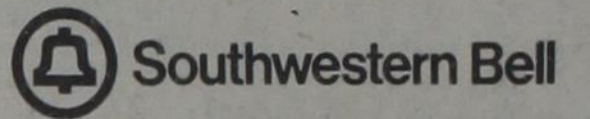

Beyond that, however, every person should uphold and participate in the Church because it tells the truth about man's life, death and destiny; the truth which alone will set him free to live as a child of God.

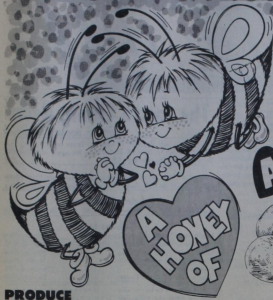

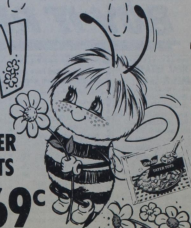

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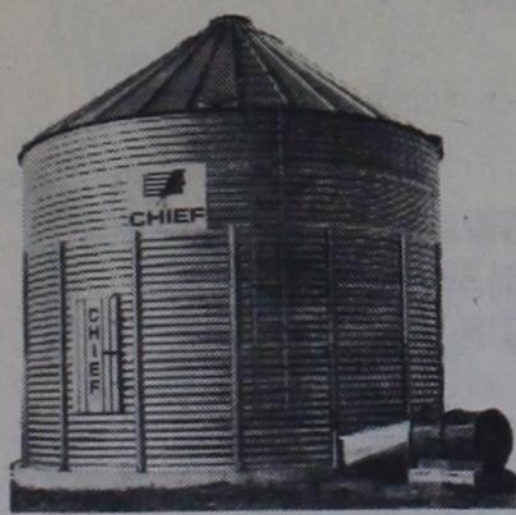

ASCS Notes

Set-aside requirements for crop year listed

By CHARLEY E. HILL
County Executive Director
A. Eligible Land: The land must be cropland that was tilled in one or more of the previous three years (1977, 1976 and 1975) in the production of a crop for other than hay or pasture. Areas designated as set-aside must be areas of regular shape containing at least 5 acres and must be at least 2 chains (132 feet) wide.
B. Ineligible land: Turn rows, drainage ditches, sod waterways constructed before the fall of the prior year, wet low-lying areas, and strips in skip-row planting patterns will not qualify as set-aside acres. Land grazed after May 31 will not qualify as set-aside acres.
C. Approved cover crops: The set-aside shall be devoted (by the normal period for

planting spring crops) to one or more of the following approved covers which will effectively protect the set-aside from wind and water erosion through the calendar year. a) Annual, biennial, or perennial grasses and legumes, grain sorghum, sweet sorghums except grain sorghum must be destroyed before maturity. b) Stubble residue from the prior year crop of grain sorghum and corn. Last year's stubble must be kept on top of the ground by minimum tillage or stubble mulching. Sweep plowing is acceptable, but tandem plowing is not acceptable. Last year's cotton stalks are not an approved cover. c) Small grains (wheat, barley, oats and rye), including volunteer stands. They must be clipped or shredded off prior to making grain.
The set-aside acreage can-

not be clean tilled, except in the normal preparation for fall seeding. Specific dates as to when fall seeding preparation may begin will be available at a later date.
The non-grazing period for set-aside has been changed to be from June 1 through Sept. 30, 1978.

It is now possible for a handful of terrorists to shape international affairs as well as events on a national level. The recent kidnapping of a leading Italian politician is proof of the growing influence of small terrorist groups. Despite the fact that Aldo Moro, the kidnapped Italian politician, was slated to become the next President of Italy, the terrorist group which kidnapped him wanted desperately to provoke a collapse of the government, embarrass the Italian government and create a revolutionary atmosphere. These terrorists are members of the ultra-left Communists. The kidnapping came on the heels of Moro's negotiating a deal which for the first time brought Italian Communists into the second-levels of the Italian government.

They believe that industrialized society should be destroyed. The Italian terrorists have Czechoslovak connections. Brazilian and Argentinian terrorist groups are by Cubans. The best known of the German terrorist groups has strong East German ties. The kidnapping of political and industrial leaders accomplished two things for the terrorists. It creates political unrest and it builds a substantial war chest of funds received from ransom payments.

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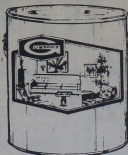
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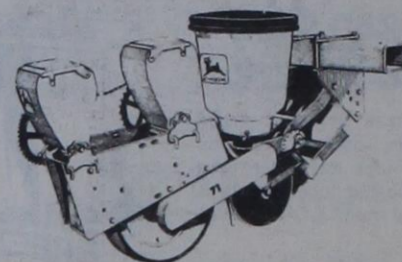


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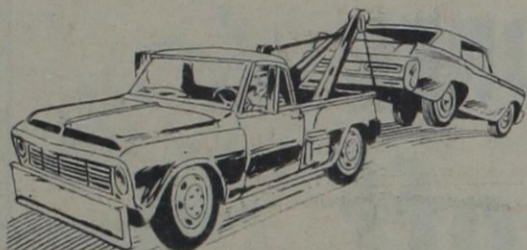
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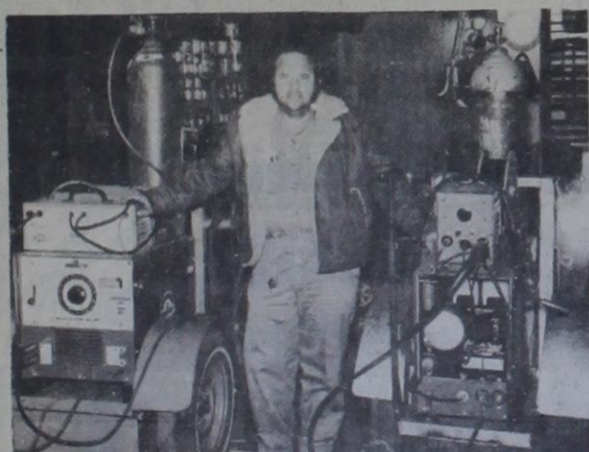

Dimmitt High completes 'hallway album' of grads

With lots of help from several quarters, the class project of the Dimmitt High School's Class of 1977 is now completed and standing in the hall of the high school near the office.

The project, first selected by the class in the fall of 1976, was to find and have mounted in a stand the pictures of every class that graduated from DHS up through 1962. Pictures of later classes were already on display.

"From the time the stand was first ordered until the last glass was installed, the whole thing took over a year to finish," said Pat Bagley, DHS teacher and one of the sponsors of the Class of '77. "Some work was done during the summer, while part of it wasn't completed until this winter."

Some of the class pictures had been on display in the middle school (the high school through 1962) in the auditorium, but some were missing and some individuals were not identified.

"That's where the greatest help came in," said J'Lyn Ryan, another DHS teacher and sponsor of the Class of '77. "Lots of people stepped forward to help us with iden-

tifying their past classmates. And some loaned us their group class picture so we could have a copy made for the ones we couldn't locate otherwise."

Lon Woodburn of the Class of '33 and Dorothy Elder of the Class of '34 supplied pictures, and others who helped with identifications included Uless Waggoner of the Class of '32, Koma Ratcliff of the Class of '30 and Millicent Davis of the Class of '32.

Pictures are still lacking for the Class of '30, and surprisingly, for the Class of '61. Beth Odom is trying to get together a senior picture of everyone in that class.

Copies of the loaned pictures and special cut-outs for the matting were done by a photo studio in Hereford at a cost of \$246. The stand cost \$490. No estimate has been given yet on the glass which was installed in the stand.

"We had ordered the stand back when we first decided to take the project," Mrs. Bagley said. "But when it didn't come, we checked with the company and were told that they didn't make that particular model any more, so we had to reorder. When it finally arrived, it didn't have any

glass in it, so we had that additional expense."

"The kids that worked on it really had a good time looking through all the old pictures, seeing how many they could recognize and how many were still living in the area," said Nita Parker, president of the Class of '77.

The seniors did most of the mounting of the pictures and organizing them and the printing of the names. Class members Kay Phillips, Darla Hicks and Lisa Hill did most of the printing.

The main part of the money for the project was raised through a powder-puff football game between the girls of the Junior and Senior Classes that year. It was sponsored by the Class of '77 and brought in about \$500. The seniors also won the game, 6-0.

"The project was a lot of work, but we're really proud of it," Miss Parker said. "We hope the townspeople can see and enjoy it now, too."
