

# Classes start next Thursday

Teachers in Castro County will go back to school Monday followed shortly by the students who are to enroll next Wednesday and begin classes Thursday, Aug. 23, in Dimmitt, Nazareth and Hart.

Dimmitt High School seniors and students who will be new to the school and not yet registered, are enrolling this week in the DHS counselor's office. Juniors will enroll from 9 to 10 a.m. Wednesday, sophomores at 10 and freshmen at 11 a.m.

Middle school registration will be in the library at 9 a.m.

for eighth grade, 10:30 for seventh grade and 1 to 4 p.m. for any who cannot register in the morning. New students not yet registered for fourth to sixth grades may enroll at any time Wednesday in the school foyer.

Enrollment for kindergarten through third grades will be held from 8:30 a.m. to 12 noon and 1 to 4 p.m. in Helen Richardson Elementary School, Principal Elmer Berryhill said. Kindergarten and first grade pupils who have not already registered are asked to bring immunization and birth certificates.

At Nazareth, pupils from kindergarten through eighth grade will register in their classrooms next Thursday, but high school enrollment will be on Wednesday with seniors at 9 a.m., juniors at 10:30, sophomores at 1 p.m. and freshmen at 2:30.

Hart High and junior high students will follow the same enrollment schedule as those at Dimmitt, and elementary pupils will register from 8:30 a.m. to 12 noon and 1 to 4 p.m. in the school gym. Parents are asked to come with kindergarten pupils, bringing birth and immunization records.

Faculty members in all three schools will have two days of in-service programs before school begins, with orientation sessions for new teachers. The Dimmitt ISD board and administrative staff will be hosts to new teachers at an informal social at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday in the city hall assembly room.

# Parents, fans will 'Meet the Bobcats' Friday

When football players, parents and fans gather at Bobcat Stadium Friday evening for a "Meet the Bobcats Night," they'll be treated to an ice-cream supper, introductions of all high school players and coaches, a "mothers' clinic" of football basics, demonstrations of the Bobcats' new offensive and defensive formations, and a pre-season pep rally.

The big stadium party, sponsored by the Dimmitt Athletic Booster Club and coordinated by new Head Coach Wayne Garner, will begin at 6 p.m., and will be followed by the players' evening workout.

"Meet the Bobcats Night" is an expansion of the Booster Club's traditional pre-season ice-cream supper to introduce players and coaches.

The entire coaching staff—most of whom are new to Dimmitt this year—and all 110 high-school players from freshmen through seniors, will be introduced at the start of the party.

Garner said his staff and players also will demonstrate the offensive formations they'll use this year, and will show the different types of defensive sets they'll use in different situations.

"We're calling this a 'mothers' clinic' because sometimes the ladies don't know just what their boys are doing down on the field," Garner said. "I think that if we take the time to show and explain some of the basics to them, it will help them appreciate the game more."

Garner said he'll also exhibit and explain the uniform equipment that the players wear—pads, headgear, shoes, garments, masks, limb-guards, etc.—and explain what it costs to field a football player in full uniform.

After the introductions and demonstrations, the players will go into their evening workout and the Booster Club will start selling homemade ice cream.

Sue Boozer, Booster Club refreshments chairman, reported that she's had telephone committees working to make sure there'll be enough homemade ice cream to serve the crowd, which is expected to top 500.

"We've got 55 gallons of ice cream lined up so far, and we'd welcome more," Mrs. Boozer said. "I'd like to urge everyone coming who has a freezer to bring ice cream."

She added, "This isn't just for Booster Club members and parents—it's for grandparents, brothers, sisters, fans, everybody. We'd like to see a big crowd out—it will be a good fellowship, and will be a good way to get the spirit going."

To help with the spirit-boosting, Dimmitt High School's cheerleaders will be on hand and will conduct a pep rally during the stadium party.

I don't usually quote anyone in this column but myself. But I was tempted, and succumbed, to lift the following from Wendell Tooley's column, The Country Editor, in the Tulia Herald. Here 'tis:

"WE HAVE LOGGED SOME 30 YEARS OF NEWSPAPERING and about 22 of these included writing columns and editorials. Through the years we have expressed our opinion on everything from politics to dog catching."

"It's enjoyable to look back to the opinions that worked out well . . . and; it's not so much fun to look back at the ones that were completely off base in the light of how the situation turned out."

"The Amarillo and Lubbock newspapers devote considerable space to the campaign promises of President Carter. Here's a good example of a Presidential quote several years ago:

"This Administration has proved that it is utterly incapable of cleaning out the corruption which has completely eroded it and re-establishing the confidence and faith of the people in the morality and honesty of their government employees. The investigations which have been conducted to date . . . have only scratched the surface. For every case which is exposed, there are ten which are successfully covered up and even then this administration will go down in history as the 'scandal-a-day Administration.'"

"It is typical of the moral standards of the Administration that when they are caught red-handed with pay-off money in their bank accounts the best defense they can give is that they won the money in a poker game, a crap game, or by hitting the daily double."

"A new class of royalty has been created in the United States and its princes of privileges and pay-offs include the racketeers who get concessions on their income tax cases, the insiders who get favorite treatment on government contracts, the influence peddlers with keys to the White House, the government employee who uses his position to feather his nest. The great tragedy, however, is not that corruption exists but that it is defended and condoned by the President and other high Administration officials. We have had corruption defended by those in high places. If they won't recognize or admit that corruption exists, how can we expect

## Second murder count affirmed on Espinoza

Abilene authorities have confirmed that Gilberto Espinoza is the man wanted on a murder charge in Abilene dating back to December 1976.

Espinoza is being held in Castro County jail in connection with the July 21 shooting death of Pedro G. Portillo of Hart.

Motive still has not been determined for the slaying of Portillo, Espinoza's uncle.

Espinoza, 21, is being held in Castro County Jail on \$100,000 bond.

Espinoza will be tried in Dimmitt before he is released to authorities in Abilene, Sheriff Granville Martin said.

A large crowd heard the country-western music concert Saturday and many made donations to the fund in addition to the \$1 admission charge. Musicians from the Easter, Dimmitt and Hereford areas gave the program. The Kiwanis Club paid expenses of advertising in this and nearby cities.

Gene King, club president, asked members to indicate their preference for a date for the annual installation banquet. He also asked for suggestions to assure "the best

parade ever held in Dimmitt" at the Castro County Fair Sept. 8.

The Kiwanis Club will sponsor the parade this year and work for better participation from all communities in the county.

King and Bill Thornton represented the Dimmitt Club at a recent area meeting. The club is invited to enter a team in a softball tournament scheduled in Amarillo for area Kiwanis Clubs.

## Hance to hold town meeting

During a recess in sessions of the US Congress, 19th District Rep. Kent Hance will return to his district and will include a visit in Dimmitt to give the home folks an update on his first seven months in the national office. Hance is a native of Dimmitt.

He will hold a Town Hall meeting here at 7:30 p.m. Friday in the city hall assembly room.

Congressman Hance and his wife will tell some of their experiences as newcomers to the Washington scene and give a slide presentation on their home, their church, his office and the capitol.

The public is invited to attend the informal meeting for an opportunity to talk with the congressman and ask him questions.

At Monday's meeting, the Dimmitt School Board gave final formal approval to the budget for the 1979-80 school year, despite the fact that expenditures are expected to exceed income by early \$80,000.

The difference will be covered by funds on hand at the beginning of the year, so a tax increase will not be implemented this year. The board voted to continue the tax rate at the same level as last year—\$1.50 plus \$.23.

The biggest items of increased expenditure in the budget were attributed to increased gas prices, inflation and the state-mandated teachers' salary increase.

Hoping to save money by spending money, the board voted to make application for funding from a government energy program to make improvements to the lighting system in classrooms and the gymnasium at the middle school.

A possible 50% funding is available for improvement projects that will pay for themselves within 15 years through savings realized on energy expenditures.

A study submitted by an engineering firm showed that replacing 183 incandescent lights in fourth, fifth and sixth grade classrooms with fluorescent lights would cost an estimated \$16,250, at a savings of \$1,606 per year by reducing kilowatt usage per fixture from 48.4 to 29.1 making the project able to pay for itself in 10.1 years.

An additional \$7,040 expenditure would replace 40 incandescent lights in the middle school gymnasium with 16 metal Halide lights, which would pay for themselves within 7.6 years by saving \$924 per year.

At 50% funding, the cost to the local district would be \$11,645 if the district's application for the program is accepted.

Superintendent Robert Ryan told the board that the lighting improvements, especially in the classrooms, is badly needed and has been recommended as a needed improvement for the past two years by health department inspectors.

After the board had earlier approved a schedule for determining eligibility for free or reduced-price meals, a new state ruling invalidated that schedule, necessitating the board's adoption of a schedule termed "more liberal" by school business manager Gene King.

The new schedule raises the amount of income a family may have and still be eligible for the program. A family of four making up to \$8,940 per year would be eligible for free meals, or if making between \$8,940 and \$13,940 per year, would be eligible for the reduced price meals.

Also, regardless of the regular price charged for meals, [See DISD, Page 13]

## United Way to go door-to-door

A door-to-door whirlwind campaign to raise \$16,250 for the Dimmitt United Way has been mapped by the 1979 drive committee headed by Gary Moore.

It will start with calls on businesses Aug. 27-29, then volunteers will knock on doors all over the county Sept. 18-20 with the aim of contacting every resident individually, Moore said.

This is a change from the previous plan of reaching residents through employers. United Way goals have been met in Dimmitt until last year, when the intended \$17,431 lacked about \$2,000. A last-minute push was required to reach the goal of the previous year.

Volunteers are being recruited for the door-to-door drive, and a meeting will be scheduled for next Thursday, Moore said.

The city has been divided into 37 areas and the volunteers will be assigned to specific areas.

In addition, residents of other county towns and farm families will be contacted.

Possibility of a United Way benefit tennis tournament on a weekend in September are being discussed. A golf tournament to raise more money is also under consideration.

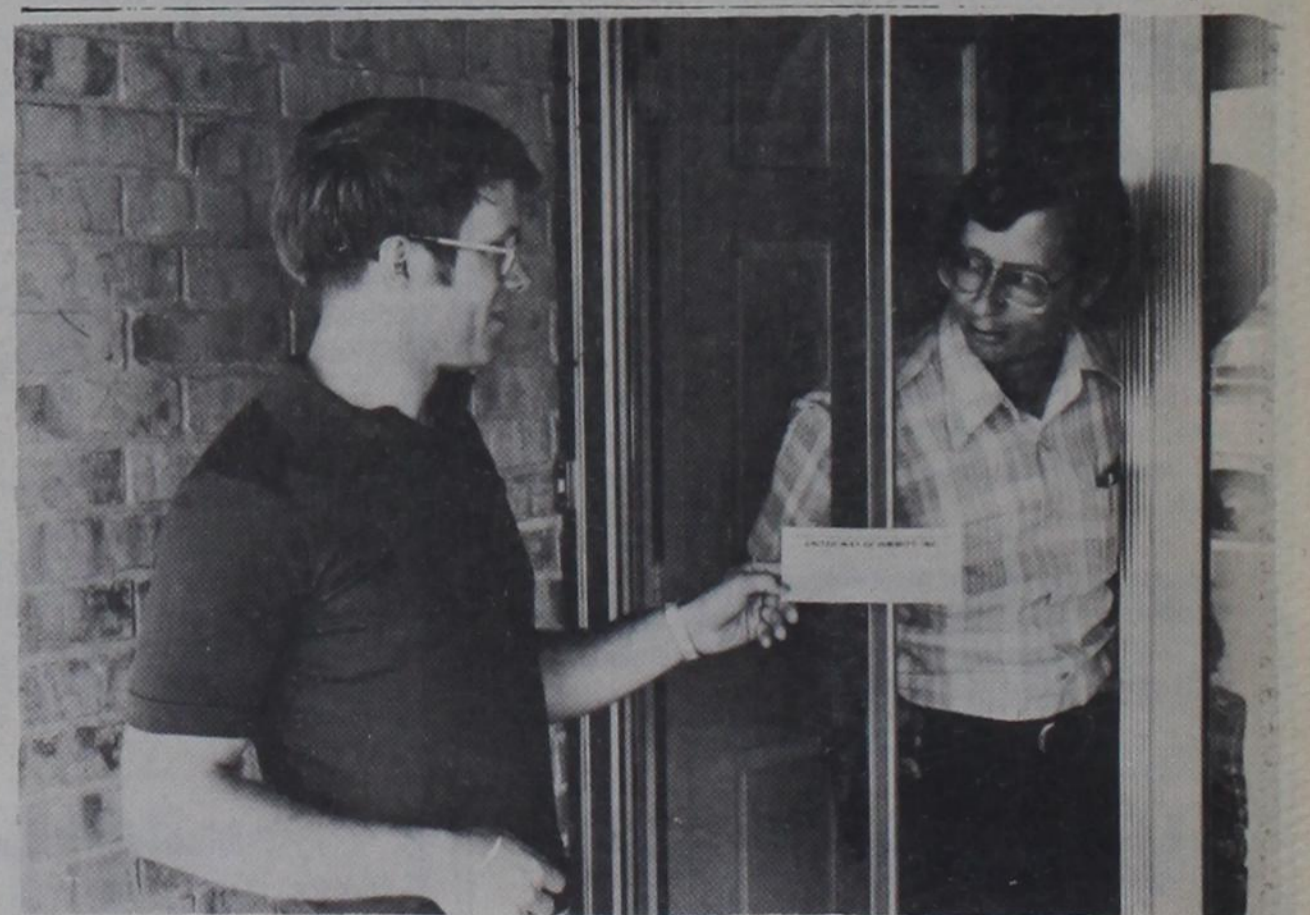
Nine agencies will share in the United Way for the coming year. Kids Inc. and the Senior Citizens have been allocated \$3,500 each in the budget, the Satellite Center \$1,766, Rhoads Memorial Library \$1,500, South Plains Boy Scout Council \$1,500, Caprock Girl Scout Council \$1,000, American Field Service \$975, Meals on Wheels \$1,000 and the Salvation Army \$1,300.

"In order to underwrite this budget we must have \$45 a day through the year," Moore said. "We feel the community will support this budget and the agencies that are members of the United Way. We're asking people to give the equivalent of an average hour's wage per month and feel that this is realistic."

He stressed the campaign is a community effort and participation from all residents is needed to assure its success. Contributions may be

made by bank draft by the month or in single payments. Advance gifts are being accepted through Sept. 1 and may be made to Moore or to the United Way board president, Ken Justice. The Dimmitt Lions Club has already given a \$750 advance gift.

"Success of this campaign means that there will be just one drive to support these agencies instead of nine," Moore said. "That's the reason for the United Way."

**Solar drying systems eligible for payment**

SOLAR DRYING SYSTEMS-Financing for solar grain drying systems is available to producers in Castro County. Anyone interested is urged to come by and visit with us for more information.

**PAYMENT LIMITATION-**Deficiency and voluntary diversion payments to each person for 1979 feed grains, cotton and wheat programs cannot total more than \$45,000.00.

**SET-ASIDE ACRES-**You may not graze your set-aside acres until after Oct. 31, and nothing may be cut for hay or baled from this acreage. Weeds, wind and soil erosion must be controlled.

**WHEAT LOANS-**Loans are available on 1979 crop wheat. The loan rate is \$2.35 per bushel for No. 1 wheat. Loans

are available for a nine month period, with an interest rate of 9 percent per annum.

**CROP INSURANCE-**A completely new all risk insurance program on irrigated wheat is now being offered to producers in Castro County.

Producers will find the new all risk program very attractive due to the increased flexibility of being able to tailor the insurance protection to their individual needs in terms of payment levels.

The new program offers three different levels of coverage plus three different elections which give the price producer nine possible combinations to choose from. The deadline to apply for insurance on 1980 wheat crops is August 31, 1979.

Farmers can obtain information about the all risk insurance protection on their farm by writing Federal Crop Insurance Corporation, 1416 West 8th Street, Amarillo, 79101 or phone 806-376-2268.

Eligibility for participating in all programs administered by the ASCS is established under law without regard to race, color, creed, national origin, or sex.

**Brown elected by state group**

Eldred A. Brown of Route 3, Friona, was elected vice-chairman of a statewide political action group known as Rural Friends /ACRE last week in Austin. Brown farms in western Deaf Smith County.

His election came at a meeting of RF/A members in connection with the 39th annual membership meeting of the Association of Texas Electric Cooperatives. The meeting drew more than 500 rural electric leaders and ladies representing 74 of Texas' 83 rural electric systems.

RF/A is composed of rural electric leaders, ladies, personnel and other individuals across Texas involved in education on political issues of concern especially to rural Texas.

Brown has been secretary of the organization for the last year. Among other services to his area is tenure on the board of directors of Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative, Hereford, for the last 13 years. He is a farmer-rancher in partnership with his mother and his son, Tommy A. Brown, and two brothers and their sons.

**Postal service profits nothing new for Dimmitt**

The US Postal Service announced that it will make a profit for the first time this year but the Dimmitt Post Office has always been a profit maker, Dimmitt Postmaster Bill Sava said.

In 1979 for 10 accounting periods the Dimmitt Post Office has made \$163,716 with \$148,835 in expenditures. There are 13 accounting periods per year with four weeks in each accounting period.

In 1978 Dimmitt PO made a total of \$193,125 with \$180,535 in expenditures.

The reason Sava gives for Dimmitt's profits is that "We have a bunch of people here that do good work, we don't schedule people here that are not needed. We have only three full time employees

other than myself," Sava said.

A nationwide program has been designed for the very large mailer that has saved the postal department and the mailer a lot of money, Sava said.

Zip codes also save the post office money, Sava said.

Delays in mail are usually caused by improper addressing or zip codes. "Gone are the days when a person can receive a letter addressed to the person with the city and state only," he said. There are 1,631 possible deliveries in Dimmitt alone.

Any first class mail should be delivered in three days to any place in the United States, Sava added.

**Walking mail carriers to start Oct. 1**

Walking mail carriers will be seen in Dimmitt starting Oct. 1, postmaster Bill Sava announced this week.

"We as a federal organization are committed to the energy crisis and savings," Sava said.

Some changes will be seen in delivery, he said, as to the time of day the mail will be delivered.

The Dimmitt Post Office is also cutting back on the use of electricity by keeping its thermostat set at 78 degrees. This is saving the post office money, too, Sava added.

In 1974 the Dimmitt PO used 6,246 kilowatt hours as compared to 3,008 so far this year.

**Clayton check presented to Boys Ranch**

A check for \$18,000 was presented to Boys Ranch Sunday on the steps of the Boys Ranch Chapel by Rep. Bill Clayton.

The \$18,000 is one half of \$36,000 that was contributed to the speakers on Speaker's Day in May.

Tradition holds that the speaker of The Texas House of Representatives in the past was presented with gifts from friends and supporters.

Since Clayton has become speaker in 1975 he has insisted that no gifts be given; he only accepts contributions to Girls Town and Boys Ranch.

**Cattle brands from county to be shown**

The animal science department of Texas A&M University has asked cattlemen to nominate eight brands from the county to be displayed and branded into the oak wall of the branded stairway of the Robert J. Kleberg Jr. Animal and Food Science Center at Texas A&M University.

The names of each county in Texas is carved into the oak panels. The panels for branding are beneath the county's name and are 7 inches wide and 6 feet long.

If more brands are nominated than there is space for on the county panel, a committee of cattlemen not associated with the department will make the final selection.

County Extension Agent Charles Hottel will coordinate the county branding ceremony which has been set for Sep. 17 for counties in Extension District 2.

This is part two of the article on self-help books.

The previous part of the article defined self-help books as those written for readers with problems, be they overweight, emotional flare-ups, smoking or other bad habits, and how the reader can overcome them. Self-help books vary a great deal in quality, which usually depends on how much the author knows about his subject and what the true purpose of the book is. Some authors are sincere but unqualified. A number of authors are sincere AND qualified. The books which show bibliographies, case studies, and the most statements backed by solid facts are the

books most likely to be of use.

Some of the recommended self-help books are:

"How to Win Friends and Influence People," by Dale Carnegie.

"Dress for Success," by John T. Malloy.

"P.E.T.—Parent Effectiveness Training," by Thomas Gordon.

"Your Erroneous Zones," by Dr. W. Dyer.

"How to Survive the Loss of a Love," by Dr. M. Colgrove.

"Pulling Your Own Strings," by Dr. W. Dyer.

The self-help books which cannot be recommended for one reason or another are:

—Any book claiming to help the reader through psychic or extrasensory means. According to authorities in the area, such use of the psychic

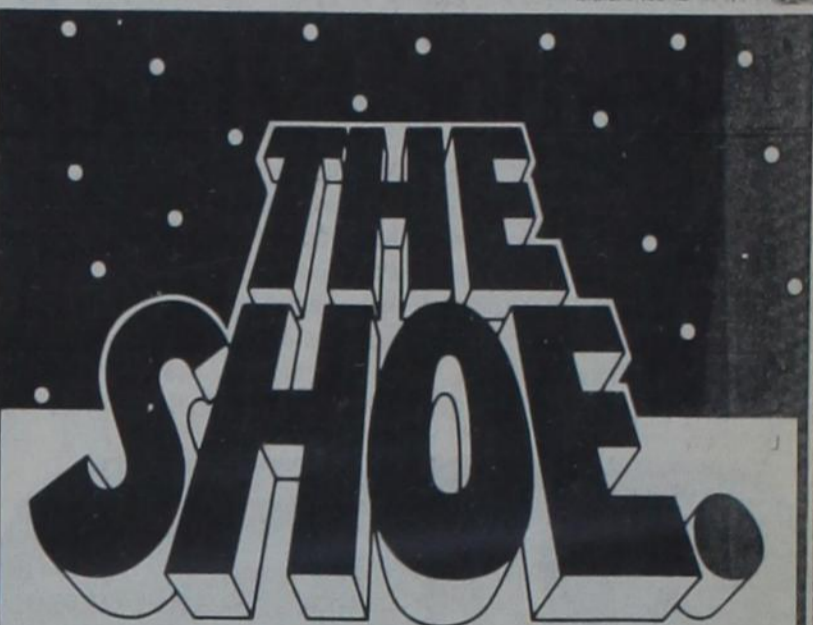
opens one up to negative influences.

—Any book claiming extraordinary cures or weight loss. "Believe!" by De Voss inspires the reader to have faith, for example, but blames the reader if he doesn't believe hard enough to correct the problem.

However, in many instances, the worst of self-help books pull the reader through with little harm and sometimes with unexplained success. "As your faith be, so be it with you," is an obvious explanation.

Generally, it is unwise to follow a self-help book that gives noticeably bad advice, or which recommends a group or a cult which costs a lot of money. The "EST" group, which writes and directs a self-awareness program, is especially among this group which should be shunned.

You might notice also that I have not included diet books. You who know me are probably aware of why—and for those who don't, I'll say the reason is obvious when you know I never weighed more than 130 pounds.



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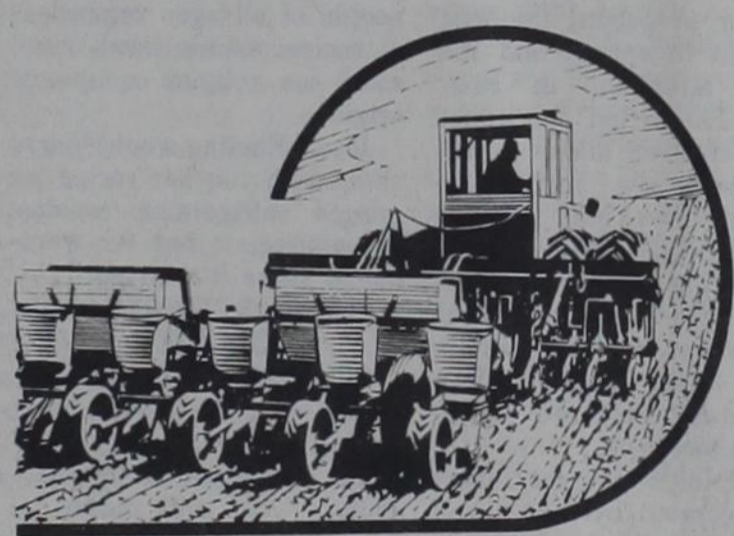

Sift together 2 3/4 cups flour, 1/2 tsp. salt, 1/4 tsp. soda, 1/4 tsp. baking powder.

Put into bowl, 1/2 cup shortening, 1/2 cup soft butter, 1/2 cup brown sugar, firmly packed, 1/2 cup granulated sugar, 1 egg, unbeaten.

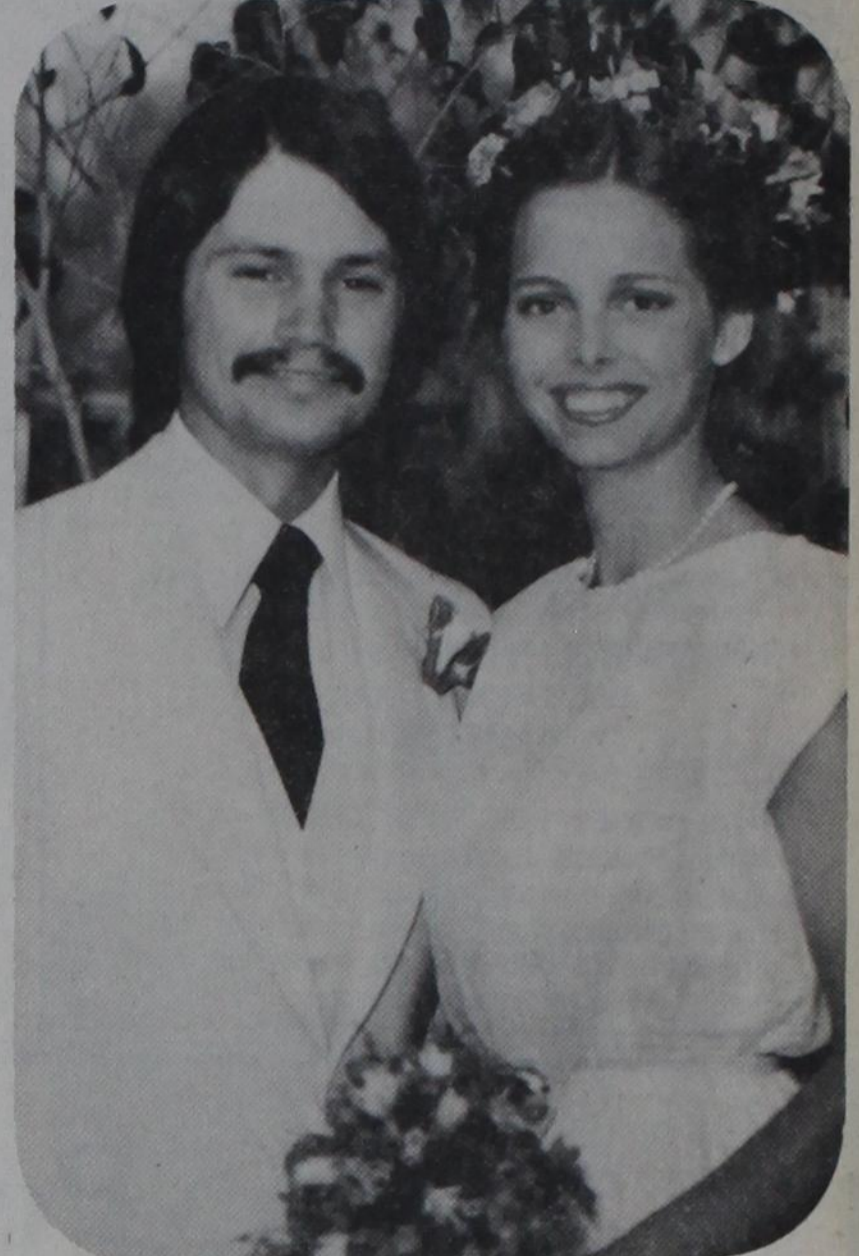
Beat for about 1 minute and then add 2 tbs. orange juice, 1 tbs. grated orange rind, 1/2 tsp. lemon extract, 1 cup chopped pecans.

Add sifted flour mixture, beat until well blended. Shape into rolls, wrap in waxed paper. Chill several hours. Slice thin; put on greased cookie sheet, and bake in preheated oven at 350 degrees about 12 minutes.

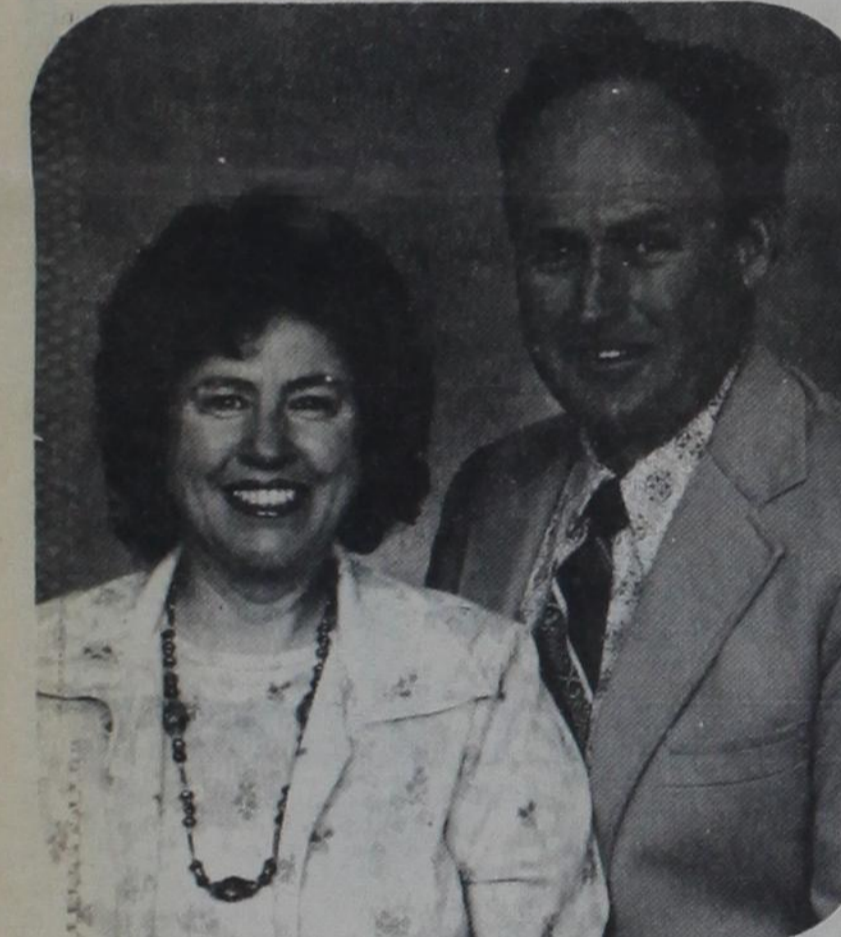

## Carter gets farmer's view in meeting with Carl King

A letter handed to President Carter by Carl King of Dimmitt, when he spoke to the President after a meeting in Washington Tuesday, "was factual, and I told him if he took it in the right context he would better understand the farmers' problems," King told an Amarillo newspaper reporter by telephone.

King, member of a Texas Democratic Executive Committee delegation to the White House, took part in a

all-day briefing session with presidential assistants and a cabinet member, Treasury Secretary G. William Miller who formerly lived in Borger.

President Carter met with them in the afternoon and it was then that King, who is Demo Committeeman from the 31st senatorial district as well as president of the Texas Corn Growers Association, had the opportunity to speak to him and give him the letter with his view of the state of agriculture in the nation.

King said the letter informed Carter that farmers who supported the President in 1976, "may look at it differently next year."

The Dimmitt man, who was said in the past that Carter is getting bad advice about agriculture, stated before he left for Washington that he cannot actively support the President's re-election unless Carter changes his farm policy.

King added that he would not seek re-election to his post as Demo Committeeman if he feels that he cannot support the party's presidential nominee in 1980.

"I doubt he could salvage 50 percent of the agricultural vote next year," King told the Amarillo newsman Tuesday, "but the Republican record on agriculture is not that good, either. The President showed a very progressive, positive approach" to Texas problems.

"I believe he's trying real hard, but he's just been getting misadvice. He had the guts to field questions; I'll give him credit for that. He just needs to listen to the farmers, not the budget director or other intellectuals in Washington."

The Texas delegation met with Demo National Chairman John C. White and former Cong. Bob Krueger, both Texans, at a lunch at the State Department.

One of the speakers Tuesday, Presidential Assistant Stuart Eizenstat, gave the briefing on the President's domestic program and energy, and King said he told the speaker afterward that he "talked about everything but agriculture."

"I told him farmers need the diesel fuel allocation as much as truckers do, because if there is no food there will be no need for truckers," said King, who left Washington for Austin to attend a session of the Texas Energy Board of which he is a member, and also a seminar on energy where he expects discussion on gasoline production in Texas.

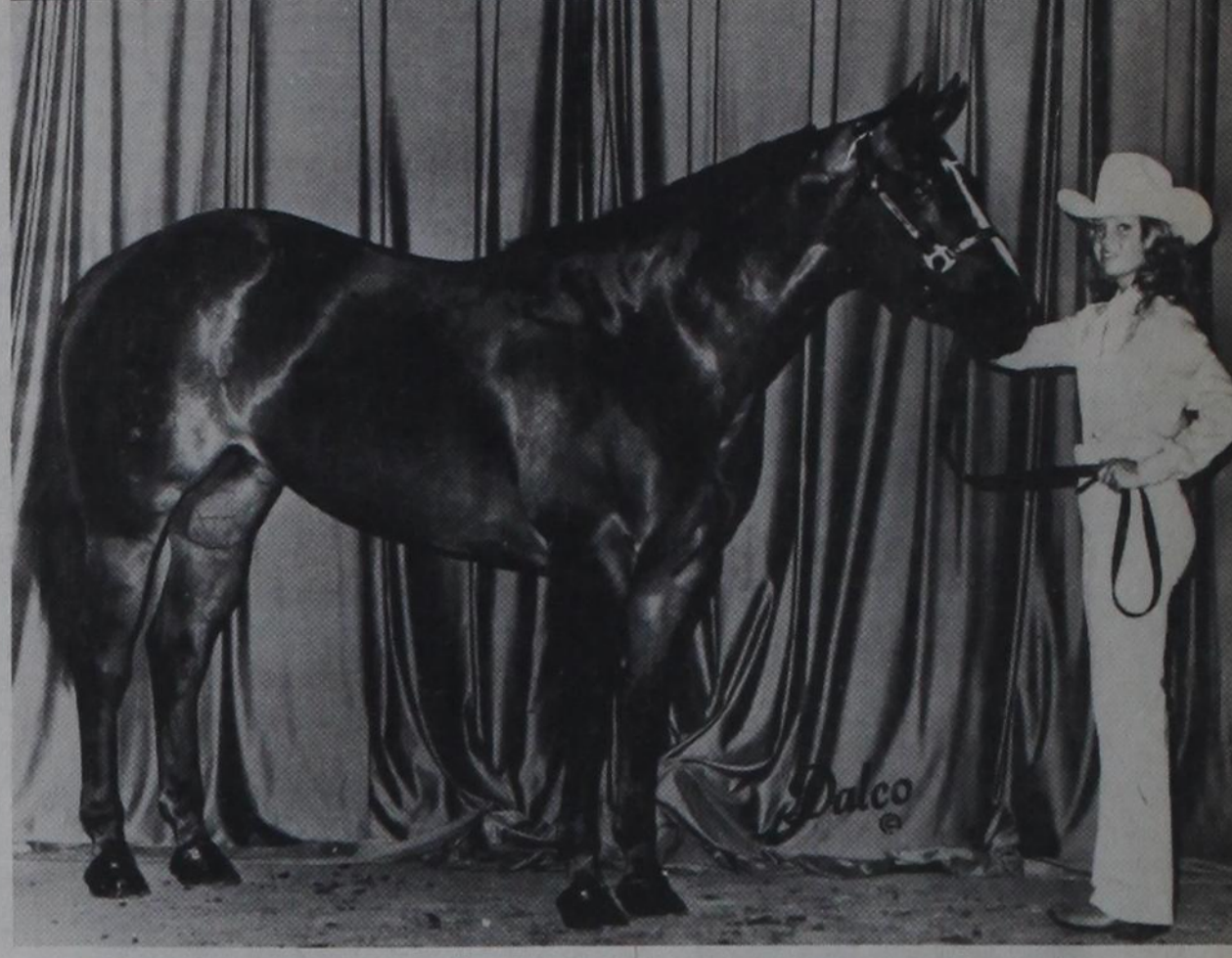
The Civic Center is on the Clovis Highway in West Muleshoe.

## County employees' health insurance plan is retained

The Castro County Commissioners Court decided Monday to retain the county's group medical insurance with Blue Cross, despite a rate increase that will take effect Sept. 1.

To keep the increase to a minimum, the commission voted to go to a plan providing a \$100 deductible on non-hospital expenses, rather than remaining with the present \$50 deductible.

At present rates the county is paying \$28.54 per month per employee. To continue the \$50 deductible plan would increase the payments to \$33.25, but going to the \$100 deductible only raises the premiums to \$30.56.

Family coverage, paid by the employee, will rise \$4.72 per month with the \$100 deductible, whereas it would have risen \$13.40 to remain with the \$50 deductible.

The commissioners decided to postpone any action on a

resolution to join the same tax appraisal district as the cities and schools in the county until after attending a workshop on the subject Aug. 29 in Amarillo. The county must decide whether to join by Sept. 15 in order to be able to join in selection of the first five-member board of directors for the district. The new appraisal districts are a part of the implementation of Texas House Bill 621.

State Trooper Dyrle Maples requested that the commission purchase a new radar unit to replace an old one that was recently repaired, but seems "about ready to go out again." The commission promised to look into what might be obtained through PRPC first, or go ahead and make the purchase through the county if necessary.

In other business, the commission: —Voted to pay all bills, including one for \$5,728.19 to

Plains Machinery for supplies and repairs for Precinct 4, one for \$4,120 to Pritchard and Abbott for appraisal of commercial property for the county, and one for \$2,064.98 to B & B Farm Supply for supplies and parts for Precinct 1.

—Decided to wait until after the next meeting to begin advertising for bids for a motor grader so that there would be more time to draw up the necessary specifications.

—Agreed to pay \$350 to the County Historical Society to cover postage expenses for mailings in connection with the upcoming county history book.

—Was informed by the Rhoads Memorial Library board of a raise to be given to Assistant Librarian Marie Howell.

—Heard the county treasurer's report.

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
