OFFICERS IN STATE, DISTRICT AND COUNTY GIVEN WITHOUT THE **USUAL TABULATED FORMS**

We have thought it unnecessary to give the usual tabulated form of election returns, as the hour is so late all who were sufficiently interested have doubtless acquainted themselves with all the facts of the great contest of last Saturday.

With a Democratic majority of around 60,000, O. B. Colquitt will be the next governor of Texas. Poindexter ran second in the race, Johnson third and Davidson fourth.

A. B. Davidson was elected overwhelmingly for lieutenant governor; Teague. Lane and Barker are close contestants for the office of Comptroller; Mayfield won out as railroad commissioner; Sparks for Treasurer; Robinson for land commissioner; and Harper and Turner running close for court of criminal ap-


