T. A. Singer, Dimmitt's exponent of soil fertilization and soil conservation practices, was awarded a fine new hat Tuesday at the regular meeting of the Dimmitt Lions Club. Presentation of the hat was made by Mr. Barber Eubanks in behalf of the Castro County Soil Conservation District. Eubanks is a member of the County Committee and it was through that committee that Singer was selected to be the recipient of the special award. In making the presentation Eubanks pointed out that the County Committee desired to pay special recognition to some business man of the county that had done outstanding work in encouraging fertilization and soil conservation, and that Singer was the unanimous choice.

## Local Boy Gains Highest Honors In Baptist R. A.'s

Jess Burch, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Burch of Dimmitt, was recently honored at the District Nine Plains Baptist Assembly Recognition Service of the Royal Ambassadors. Jess attained the highest possible rank in Royal Ambassador work, the rank of Ambassador Plenipotentiary.

Royal Ambassador work was started in 1908 by Womens Missionary Union, Auxiliary to the Southern Baptist Convention. There are about 9,000 Royal Ambassadors Chapters in the Southern Baptist Convention. There is a growing number of R. A.'s on the foreign fields.

The Order of Royal Ambassadors provides a ranking system with individual recognition. An R. A. may advance through Page, Squire, Knight, Ambassador, Ambassador Extraordinary, and Ambassador Plenipotentiary.

The work which Jess has completed is of interest to every boy. A Royal Ambassador, to complete the rank of a page, must know the Commission and declaration of the Order, the Royal Ambassador Hymn, and Watchword, take part on program four times, tell two missionary stories and memorize six scriptures that show man's need of the gospel.

To attain the rank of a squire, an R. A. must locate Baptist State Headquarters, name the secretaries and give the work of each, be able to memorize five scripture passages which give the message of Christ to a lost world, tell life stories of three missionary, memorize the hymn "Jesus Shall Reign" and attend 75 per cent of the meetings since becoming a Page.

To attain the rank of a Knight, an R. A. must know Southern Baptist Convention boards, secretaries and headquarters of each. Memorize seven scriptures telling of a Christian's rules of life, read a mission study book, name the missionaries of today and locate their fields and give nature of their work. Write or tell the life of one Baptist Missionary autobiography he has read and attend 75 per cent of the meetings since becoming a Knight.

An R. A. who attains the rank of Ambassador must memorize scriptures which point out an Ambassador's duties and select and tell three incidents in the life of Christ that show His missionary zeal; give a talk on Paul's missionary journeys; give an intelligent answer to the question "What does it mean to me to be a Christian?" Write the story of your favorite missionary; give an outline of Baptist beliefs; give types of work done on foreign fields; train a boy to become a Page and attend 75 per cent of the meetings since becoming a Knight.

After attaining the rank of Ambassador, an R. A. has to complete 68 projects which he may choose from the designated 34 to become Ambassador Plenipotentiary.

Jess chose the following: trace the history of his own church; picked out falsehoods in tobacco ads; collected stamps from five different countries where Southern Baptists have mission work; wrote a biographical sketch of the missionary for whom the chapter is named; made a chart showing in color flags of 30 nations, picked out 20 missionary verses in the Old Testament, made a chart showing distribution through church treasure of gifts for a three months period; sketched lives of two men prominent in the United States, who were born in other countries. Read three Mission Study books, wrote a poem which was accepted for publication in the R. A. magazine, "Ambassador Life". Secured five subscriptions to this magazine; corresponded with R. A. Chapters in three countries, explained and demonstrated five games, each from a different country. Collect and displayed coins from four countries in which Southern Baptist have mission work; helped conduct a vacation Bible School for Negroes, interviewed personally 3 missionaries; gave a demonstration showing the value of R. A. work to the work of the local church. He also read one issue of the Commission and Home magazines and reported articles of interest to his chapter.

Each year District Nine, which is composed of 176 churches, sends an R. A. to the Young Men's Mission Conference at Ridgecrest, North Carolina. Jess was the unanimous choice this year to represent District Nine. He plans to leave for Ridgecrest with other Texas R. A.'s on August 1 in order to attend the conference August 3 to 12.

## State Organizes YDC Branch For Child Delinquents

Mr. Luke E. Robinson, field representative for the State Youth Development Council, of Lubbock, was here Wednesday to confer with County Judge Bob Estes and other officials on the juvenile problems of the community and to explain programs of the Y. D. C. The Y. D. C. is a new state department created by the 51st Legislature.

The purpose of the organization, according to Mr. Robinson, is to develop the state's most important resource, its youth. A two world purpose is set up for the organization. It administers state juvenile training schools and it assists every community in the state in organizing a well rounded developmental program designed to prevent juvenile delinquency. The success of the state YDC depends upon the strength of the youth programs in each community in Texas.

The local community is the key city in the state YDC program. The State Council recognizes the importance of recreation in the proper development of the child, and have provided a recreation consultant, Mr. Earl Meadows, former olympic pole vault champion who is available to every community in the state of Texas to assist them in organizing a sound recreational program.

Mr. Robinson will be in Dimmitt at a convenient date in the near future, to speak to one or more local civic organizations, giving details of the state youth program, and how it can help Castro County with respect to juvenile delinquent problems.

**Sports Afield**

Some fanciers of the Weimaraner insist that it is nothing less than a miracle dog, able to do everything done by other breeds—only much better. On the other hand, critics of the Weimaraner say that even the best examples of the breed are no more than ordinary performers in the field.

If anyone is in a position to explain the general confusion concerning the true merits of the Weimaraner, Clarence Schukel of Waterloo, Iowa, is the man. He has imported, bred and hunted over the "gray ghosts." Here is what he writes about them:

"What has created all of this confusion is that the Weimaraner has been terrifically oversold in this country. It always has been a grand hunting dog. But it has had too many fanciful build-ups. Buyers have expected impossible miracles, then been disappointed.

"There is another serious situation. The Weimaraner's affectionate nature and beautiful appearance have attracted many people who have no intention at all of hunting the dog. They simply want one for a pet. As a result, this fine hunting dog has been degenerating into a mere bench-show exhibit. Sportsmen must now make every effort to keep the Weimaraner where it belongs—hunting in the field.

"We Weimaraner fanciers have no quarrel with other breeds. Our dogs will simply do what the other breeds do when properly trained—but more of it. When you take a dog that will locate and point upland game birds and retrieve them; sit in a duck blind and retrieve migratory birds from water—then you have a combination that many dogs cannot equal.

"The Weimaraner is an all-around hunting dog—something that can't be said about other breeds. It will trail, point, retrieve, and has speeds that equals the average English pointers."

So we see that the Weimaraner is neither a miracle nor a fraud—but a fine dog in the field when trained. And in the field is where they rightfully belong—not as a part of a living room decor.

**Judge W. N. Stokes Asks for Re-election**

In another column of this issue appears the announcement of Judge W. N. Stokes for re-election as Associate Justice of the Court of Civil Appeals of this supreme judicial district. The court is located at Amarillo. Judge Stokes is well known in this section of the state. He enjoyed a successful law practice at Vernon for a number of years. He was appointed by the Governor as District Judge of the Forty-sixth Judicial District, composed of Wilbarger, Hardeman and Foard counties, and served in that capacity for eight years when he was appointed by the Governor to his present position on the Court of Civil Appeals. He has been a member of that court during the last thirteen years, having been twice elected since his appointment by the Governor. In addition to his service as judge on the courts, he was appointed by the Governor in 1940 as a member of the Texas Civil Judicial Council and has served in that capacity for ten years in addition to his duties as a member of the appeals court. The duties of the Council are to make constant study of the laws and court system of the state and submit recommendations annually to the Governor, the Legislature and the Supreme Court as to such changes in the laws as, in its judgment, should be made.

The Court of Civil Appeals is composed of Chief Justice, E. L. Pitts, Associate Justice, James G. Lumpkin and Judge Stokes. It has appellate jurisdiction in civil cases arising in forty-six North-west Texas counties, an area

about the size of the State of Ohio.

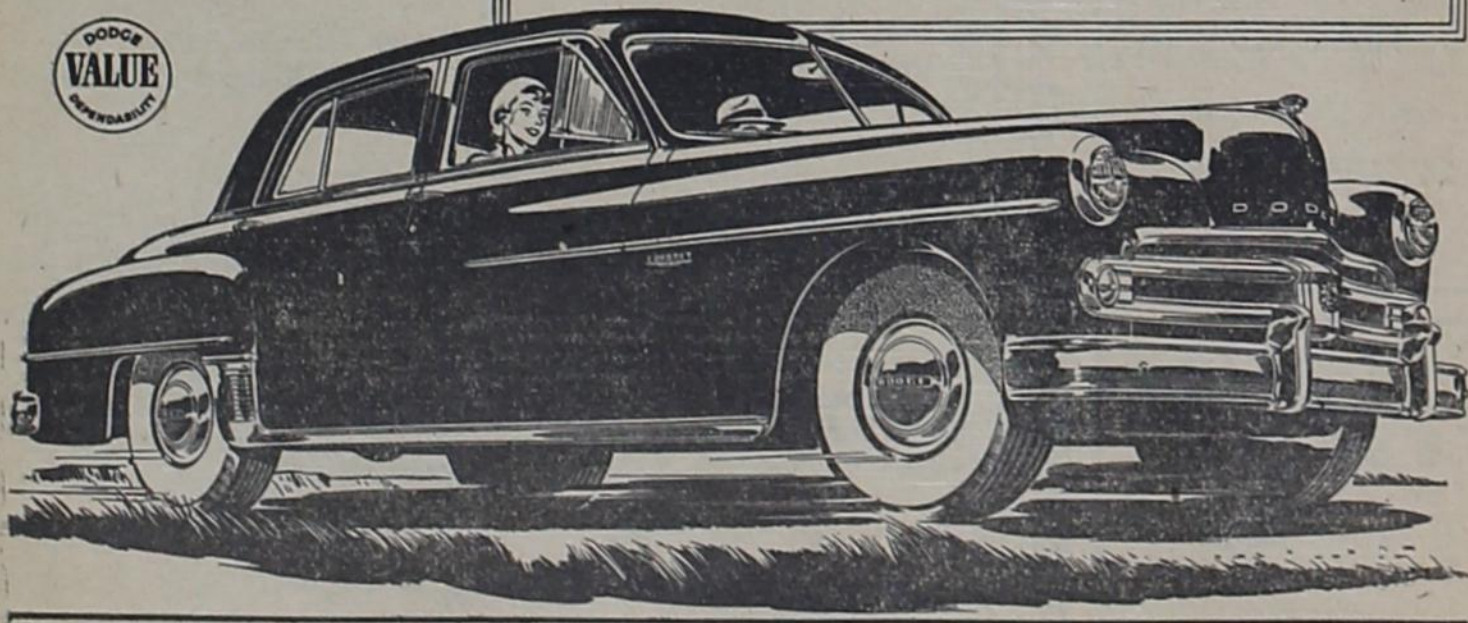

### Higher Education To Be Studied in Texas

Canyon, Tex., June 30 (WTNS)—Emmett D. Smith, associate professor of education, has been appointed head of a sub-committee to study teacher education in Texas. This committee is part of a larger one headed by John Mosley, a Texan who has been in Washington, D. C. for the past several years. Created by the recent Texas legislature, the committee is set up to study the status of higher education in Texas.

Only a group to act as a fact finding board, it was not created to propose any legislation of any sort. Rather, it was formed to assimilate data to present the legislature, should the question of higher education come up in the next meeting of the legislature next January. The committee is made up of other members of colleges and university faculties in Texas.

An interim group, 17 members of legislature head the smaller

committees. This group acts between sessions of legislature to collect material on questions most likely to appear at following meetings.

Smith will be released from his duties the first of July, and will return to the West Texas State faculty next fall. In his absence Dr. Roberts will act as college representative in the one-week courses being offered this summer. The courses are conducted by instructors from other locations all over the United States.

During the past two years, Smith has been executive secretary of the Texas Council on Teacher Education. This is a voluntary group and is not connected in any way with the legislature. However, many of the same questions will be discussed in the legislative group. Some of these are certification of teachers, elementary education, and special services for schools throughout the state.

An ex-student of West Texas Texas State, Smith returned to WT in his teaching capacity last

fall. He received his Bachelor of Science degree from WT and his Masters of Arts degree from Texas Technological College, Lubbock. Originally from Groom, he spent the year preceding his year of teaching at WT in Austin working on his doctorate at the University of Texas. While there he served his first term as secretary to the Texas Council of Teacher Education.

Smith was public school principal and superintendent at White Deer for many years.

Unless the soil where corn was planted this spring was supplied with plenty of nitrogen, yields will be low. The situation can be corrected through the use of a nitrate fertilizer applied now as a side dressing. Two hundred pounds per acre of ammonium nitrate or 300 pounds of sulphate of ammonia will balance the 200 to 300 pounds of 4-12-4 or 5-10-5 that was applied before the corn was planted.

### New Fishing Law Explained Again

AUSTIN, Reported misunderstanding of the statewide fishing law prompted the Executive Secretary of the Game, Fish and Oyster Commission to restate some of the principal provisions Saturday.

The law, passed by the last regular legislative session to replace many conflicting local statutes, permits persons to fish without a license in their home counties and to fish in streams separating the county of their residence and adjacent counties unless they use artificial bait. Fresh water fishermen who use artificial bait are required to have a license regardless of where they fish.

The act also permits Texans to fish in counties adjoining their home counties without a license unless they use artificial bait or use live bait. Licenses are required of persons fishing for commercial purpose regardless of where they fish.

There also has been some misunderstanding about the trespassing law which was amended by the last regular legislative session. The new changes, according to the Executive Secretary, stipulate that game wardens now have the authority to make arrests for trespassing, and also provides for an increased penalty for violations.

No change has been made in the primary provision of the original trespass law. Parsons still need the permission of owners to enter property that is enclosed, when they desire to hunt or fish. Land that is not enclosed is

available to sportsmen without the permission of the owner.

For the benefit of persons living on the Gulf Coast and for those planning to visit that area, no license is required for sports fishing in salt water. Commercial fishermen have to be licensed, as usual, for operating in salt water.

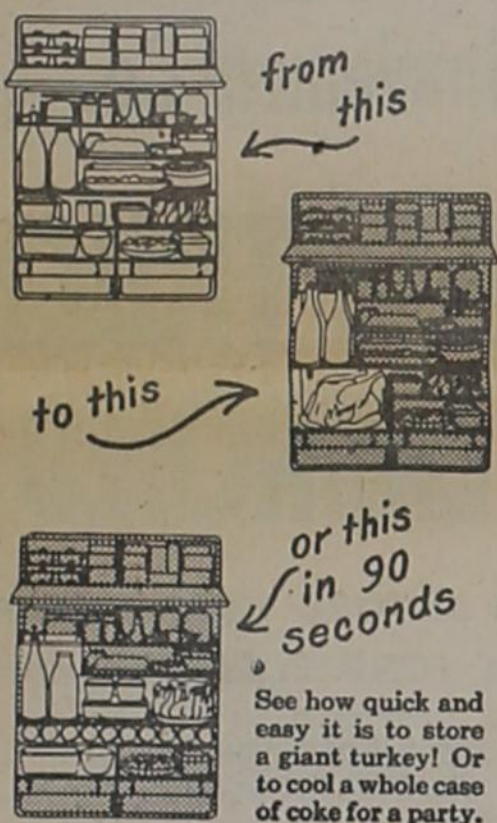

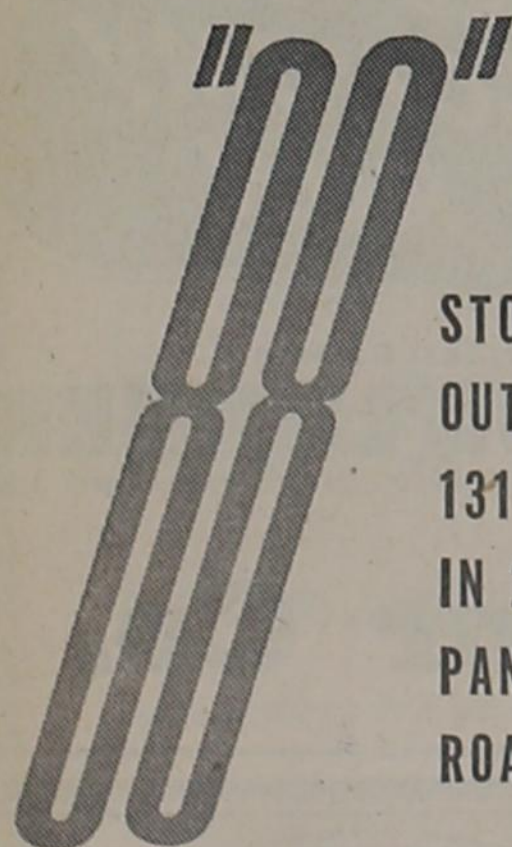

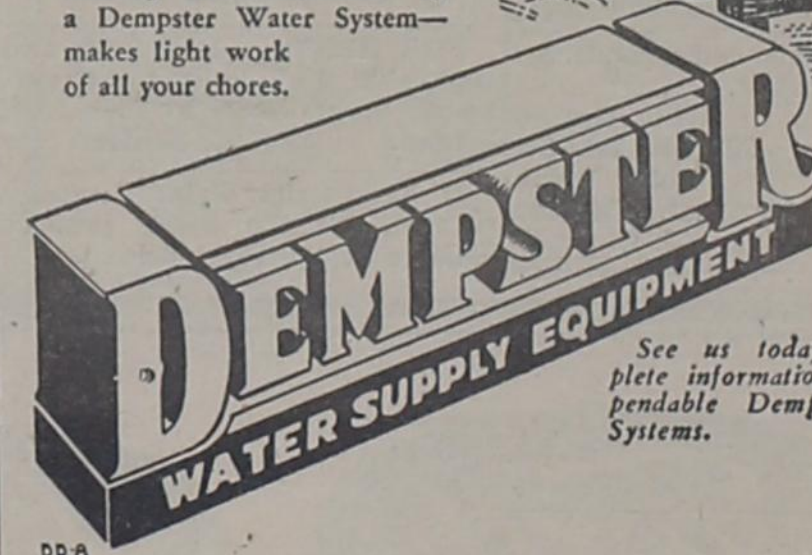

## KITCHEN MEMO

Growing children need vitamin-packed food for between-meal snacks. Old-fashioned Oatmeal Cookies contain molasses rich in iron and the oatmeal is loaded with Vitamin B. Cream 1/2 cup shortening and 1 cup sugar together. Add 2 tps. vanilla and 2 eggs, one at a time beating well after each addition. Add 1 tsp. molasses and 2 tps. soda which has been dissolved in 1 tsp. water. Sift 1 cup flour, 1 tsp. cinnamon, 1 tsp. salt and add to mixture. Stir in 2 cups oatmeal, 1 cup raisins, 1/2 cup chopped walnuts. Drop from a teaspoon on ungreased aluminum cookie sheet. Bake in preheated gas oven at 375°F. Yields 4 doz. cookies.

There's much more fatigue in drying than washing clothes because of the 45 lbs. of wet wash to be carried out to the line, hung to dry later taken in and sprinkled for ironing. A gas dryer automatically eliminates all this back-breaking drudgery.

Children's treat: Skewer bananas on wooden sticks, dip in melted semi-sweet or milk chocolate. Freeze in cube compartment of your gas refrigerator.

There are 5,000,000 working wives who have families to cook for. Many of them prepare oven meals ahead of time, set the clock control on their gas ranges so they'll be free to do other household tasks while the meal cooks without watching.

A pastry brush is a handy kitchen accessory. For example, when making a gelatin dish, brush the mold with salad oil so that when set, the gelatin slips out easily.

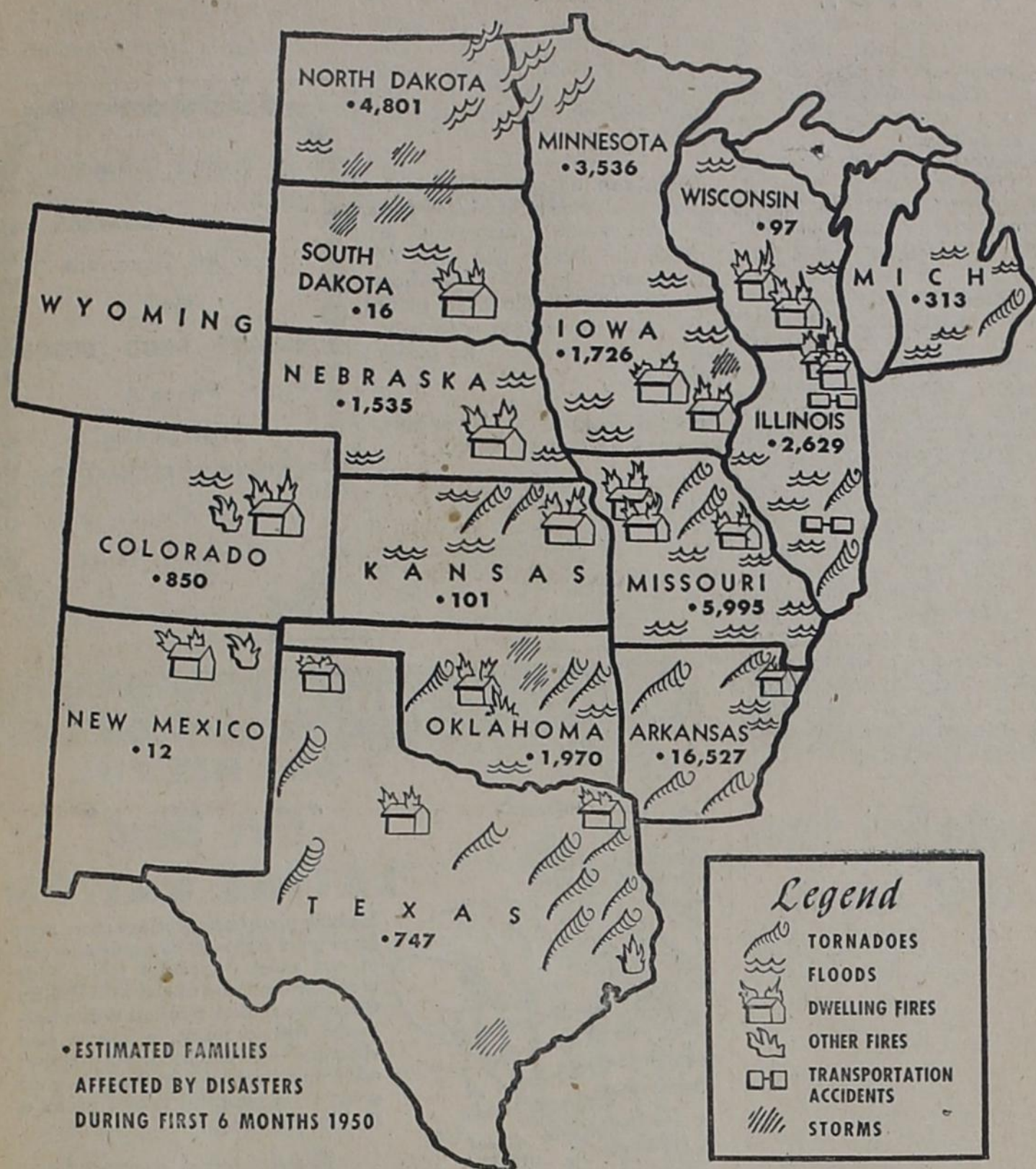

Largest continuing operations are in the North Dakota-Western Minnesota flood area, where Red Cross has provided continuous assistance since the end of March, with operations complicated by recurring floods and blizzards.

LITTLEFIELD, June 29, (Special)—Petitions from Lamb County voters seeking designation of underground water reservoir by the State Board of Water Engineers are on their way to the Board.

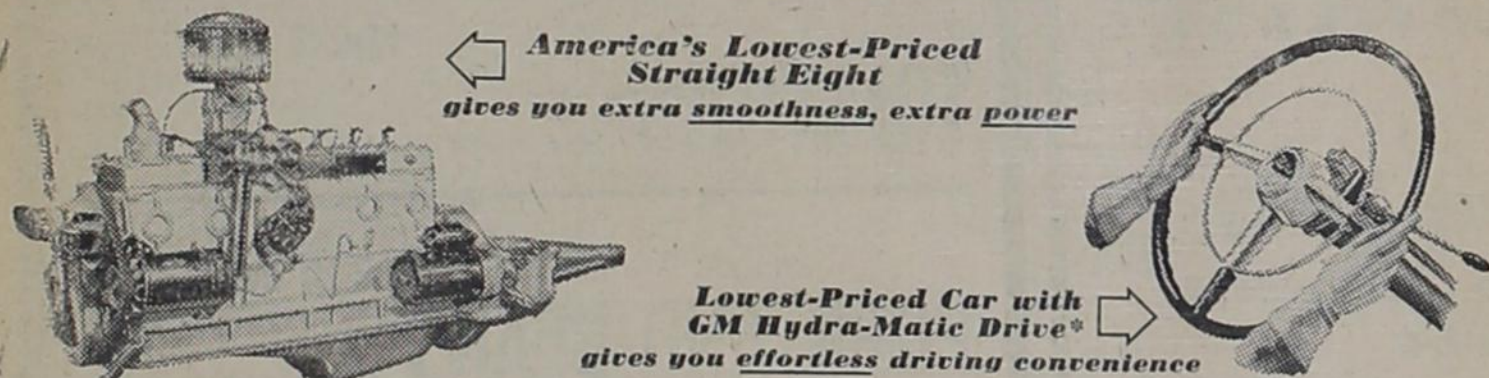

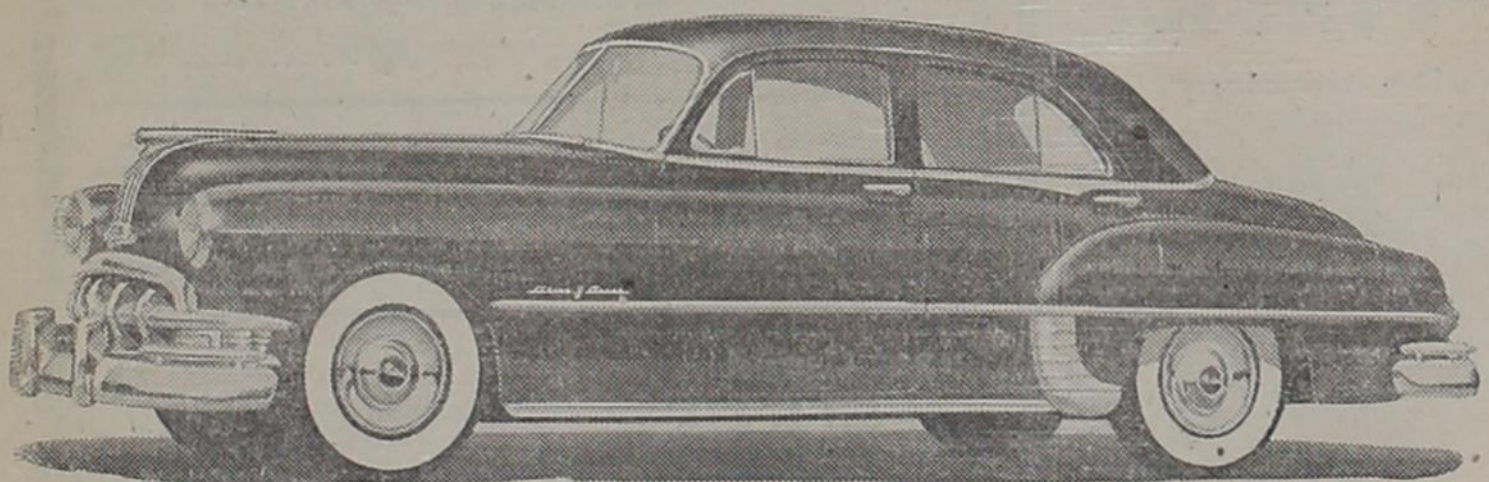

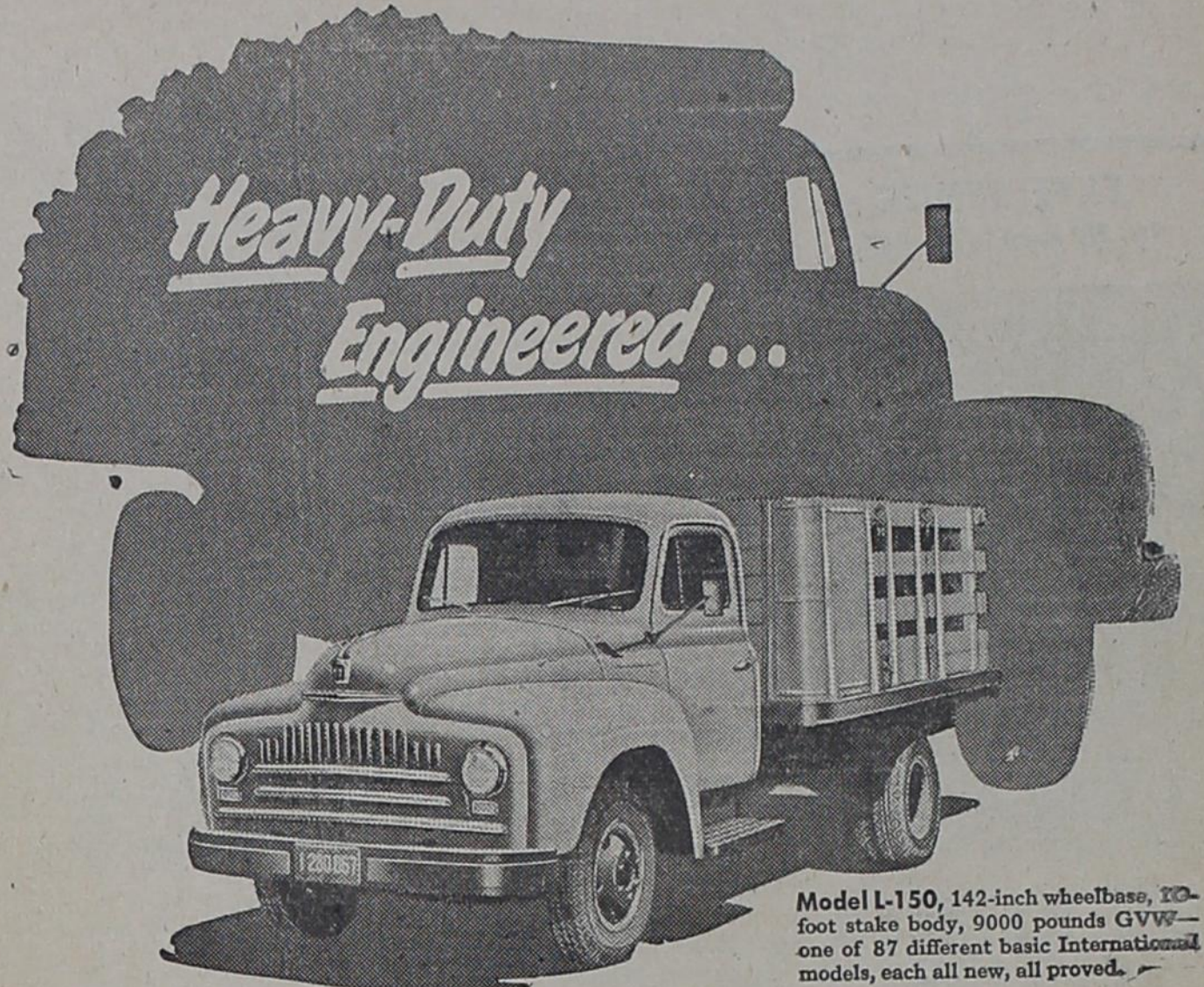

# Petitions

**LUBBOCK, July 13 (Special)** With petitions circulating throughout the country, Lubbock farmers are moving to form an underground water conservation district under House Bill 162.

They took the action July 6 at a meeting addressed by W. O. Fortenberry, New Deal ginner and president of the Lubbock and High Plains water associations; L. A. Howard, Lubbock lawyer; A. P. Dugan, Jr., Littlefield lawyer; and Raymond Lee Johnson, Plainview representative of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

Fortenberry told the farmers that the High Plains Water Conservation and Users Association, which steered House Bill 162 through the 51st Legislature, "can't represent you again in Austin if you don't make this law work."

The conservation district law was substituted for legislation seeking control of water. The present law guarantees private ownership and provides for a conservation program carried out by local, independent water districts.

"This is our own program, we asked for it, and we must make it work or take the consequences," Fortenberry declared.

**Polio in Texas**

**AUSTIN, July 13.** State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox has turned the bright light of optimism on the heretofore dark picture of polio in Texas.

Observing that the state's 1,000 cases of polio since the year's beginning has occurred among a population of 7½ million people, the health official Thursday deplored "the attitude of hysteria that polio creates in a community."

That didn't mean people should not be concerned, the doctor commented, for a case of illness in any form is good reason for a great concern.

"I'm talking about the fear that keeps a person or a whole community from thinking straight. Of course each case of polio is an individual tragedy for the family involved, but wholesale public panic simply is not justified."

He doesn't want to encourage complacency either, the state health officer said, adding:

"Every clear-thinking effort must be made to keep every home, every community, every vacation camp consistently clean and sanitary. Briefly, elimination of fly and insect breeding places, personal cleanliness, and getting milk, water and food from safe,

approved sources will aid in preventing a number of communicable diseases."

National statistics, Dr. Cox asserted, show good reason for optimism in most cases of polio. According to the figures, from 40 to 60 per cent of all victims recover completely and can do anything they choose.

From 25 to 40 per cent recover with only minor disability, and can, within very wide limits, lead perfectly normal lives. From 15 to 20 per cent are more severely handicapped, and 5 to 10 per cent terminate fatally.

"It goes to show that polio is actually a minor cause of illness, and an even less significant cause of death, when compared to certain other communicable diseases," the health officer concluded.

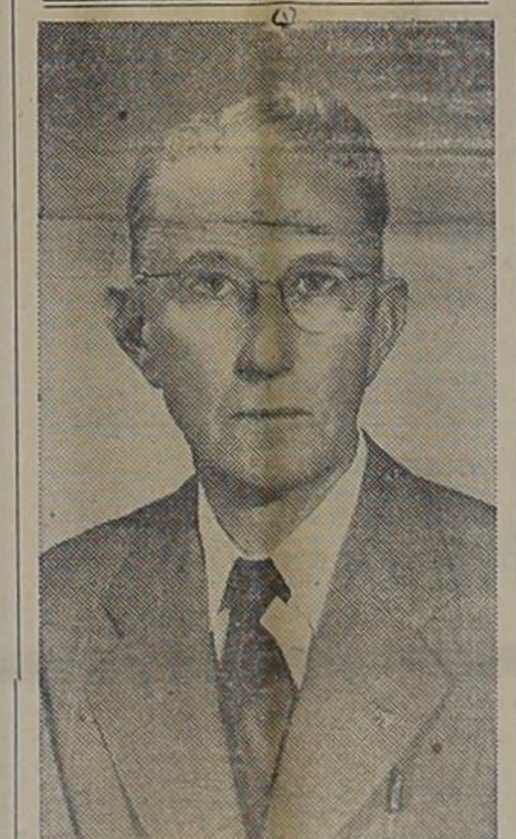

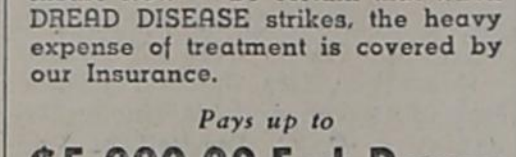

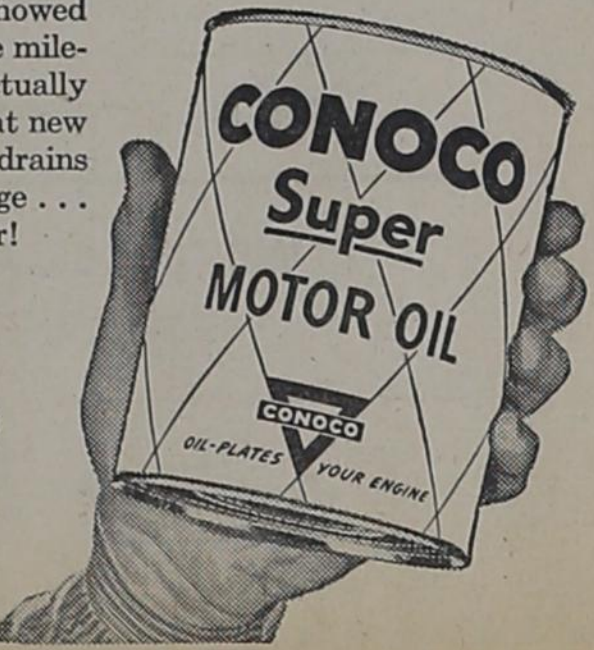
