last week, this time picketing three vegetable packing plants in

The chanting, banner-waving picketers marched in front of the Western Vegetables plant last Wednesday afternoon, at Dimco, Inc., last Thursday, and at the main facility of La Mantia, Cullum, Collier & Co., Inc., Friday.

But the demonstrations were peaceful. The picketers stayed beyond property lines and didn't interfere with workers or truckers that were dumping, processing, loading and shipping the county's 1980 crop of cucumbers, onions and potatoes.

However, a TFWU spokesman harangued workers over a bullhorn throughout each demonstration.

The TFWU picketers usually numbered 20 to 30, many of whom appeared to be youngsters under 16. Apparently, no workers at any of the local plants left their jobs to join the

Open Letter to The Public: ror the past few weeks all we have been hearing about is "la Huelga," the strike.

The strikers' grievances, demands, goals, beliefs and their way of thinking are what we have been hearing, but is this handful of people really representing the true feelings of the majority of agricultural related Mexican-Americans in this area?

The answer is an emphatic

The general feeling is that we do not need these people in our community. While they MAY help a handful of individuals, such as the union leaders, they will actually hurt the vast majority of our people who are dependent on the vegetable harvest and on other farm-related jobs.

We all know that the farmer is struggling for survival; the farmer does not have a guarantee for his vegetable crops.

If the plant had to pay a \$6-an-hour wage, he said, "We'd

"The farmers are already losing money on the onion crop," Drake said. "The farmer simply wouldn't be able to afford to grow vegetables any longer, because it's the farmer who pays most of the processing costs.'

A \$6 wage with \$9 for overtime would amount to \$420 for an

average 60-hour work week, Drake noted.

"There are people in specialized fields, who had to have special training for their jobs, who don't make that kind of money in this area," Drake said. What would it do here if the shippers started paying \$6 an

hour?" Drake asked. "The field workers and tractor drivers are going to say, 'Hey-if that guy is getting \$6 an hour for pushing a wheeler or sorting potatoes, I'm going to get \$8." That's what happened in California-tractor drivers get \$8.75, and the farmers are going to bigger and bigger tractors. The net result is higher costs and fewer workers.

Hourly wages for seasonal vegetable workers here range from the federal minimum wage of \$3.10 to \$3.75 for loaders and graders. Drake said.

'Everybody makes at least minimum wage here," Drake said. "It's the federal law, and we abide by it. We also pay time-and-a-half for over 40 hours a week-that's federal law,

Commenting on the union's request for a full day's pay for a partial day's work, Drake said, "It's very rare for our workers to have a short day. This happens sometimes on the loading crew, but on the other hand they get paid a lot of hours when they aren't loading. We aren't guaranteed a market, or a certain number of orders every day.

Concerning medical and hospitalization insurance, Drake commented, "No, we don't have hospitalization insurance. We Strikers, we DO NOT need have liability insurance that takes care of anyone hurt on the [See PICKETS, Page 12]



## Social Security Castro County



Security conducted symposiums throughout the country to obtain public response and input to our programs. Many valid questions were raised.

This week and next, this column will present several of the most frequent inquiries along with the responses of Manager, Laura Peacock.

Question: Despite reassurances that Social Security is in good shape financially, I still read reports by various ity fund to the old-age fund. government officials that Social Security will not be able to pay some benefits in the 1980's. What is the real truth, and why do these stories keep popping up?

Answer: Social Security benefits are paid with Social Security taxes, which are actually divided into separate



This past spring, Social trust funds. These are the old-age and survivors trust fund, the disability trust fund, and the health insurance trust fund. Although the total monies available in these funds are adequate to pay all benefits due under reasonable economic forecasts, there will be a cash-flow crunch in the the Lubbock District old-age fund by 1982, as opposed to an excess in the disability fund.

The proposed is simple: shift money from the disabil-Congress is expected to take the necessary legislative action soon to allow this interfund borrowing. Under our best judgement about the economy, this step will permit Social Security trust funds to continue paying benefits timely for the next 25 years and then some.

The Social Security system remains under constant study and scrutiny in order to provide the executive and legislative branches with a sound basis to consider any changes the program needs well in advance.

I remain confident that this basic social program for our country will always pay benefits on time, as it has for the last 40 years.

Question: We keep hearing what a good deal Social Security is - if it is such a good deal, why don't government employees want to be covered by Social Security?

Answer: When the Social Security Act was enacted in 1935, the Federal Civil Service Retirement System had been in existence for 15 years and was well established. Civl Service employees were not covered under Social Security at the time because there seemed to be no need for Federal employees to be covered under two retirement

systems. Federal employees are concerned with ensuring that retirement benefits paid for over the years are preserved, more so than they are antisocial security. Government employees have paid taxes to support the Civil Service Retirement Fund since 1920. It is at a higher tax rate than under Social Security, and in addition is paid on their full salary, rather than a base amount.

A Congressionally-mandated study on the feasibility and desirability of providing Social Security coverage for Federal employees has recently been completed and has been submitted to the Congress and the President for further study.







From his vantage point out in the street, Moya observed, 'The farm worker in Texas is the most exploited in the nation. They have the highest disease rate and mortality rate in the

nation, with no protection. "Farmers and spraying companies spray chemicals on their crops when they feel like it, and the workers have no

'What about pay for the farm workers that were laid off by the tornado? If they can't work, do they get any consideration or compensation from the insurance companies, as the

"Also, farmers are asking for disaster designation, for federal subsidies, for guaranteed loan rates. But what about the workers who are also affected by a disaster situation?

"Farm workers were excluded from the National Labor Relations Act of 1935," Moya continued, "and Texas is a right-to-work state where the workers have virtually no protection under the law. Child exploitation is still present in farm work, but look at the manufacturing companies and the welding shops-you don't see children working in those

He added, "The majority of farm workers are Mexican, or of Mexican background. They have been denied their rights, harassed by the police, exploited by low wages, harassed by the immigration people who collude with the growers."

Moya predicted that if the farm worker's situation doesn't change, "I think in the future you're going to see turmoil in the Southwest-violent turmoil, not just strikes. This is because of the lack of sensitivity of the growers. When people can't solve their grievances legally, they resort to whatever means is left to them.

He added, "Sooner or later we've all, together, got to come to grips with these problems-what is your responsibility to me and what is my responsibility to you? How can we build a better, more decent, more equitable society? That's what we are trying to do."

Drake, citing some of the problems that he feels would come with the unionization of agricultural workers, commented, "In most fields, if the cost of living goes up, your rates go up. But in farming, when the cost of living goes up, it just goes up. There's no way the farmer or processor can set the price-they can't just pass it along. In the food industry, all these costs are passed backward. The farmer is the only businessman in the US that this happens to.'

Drake added, "The farmer and processor are not guaranteed anything. The hired workers are the only ones in the industry who are guaranteed their wages by law.'

Saturday the TFWU picketers went back to Hereford, where they staged a downtown march in protest of alleged police harassment. Before leaving, Moya said the picketers had encountered no police harassment in Dimmitt, although he felt they had been harassed on local highways by state troopers.

## It costs less to live in Texas, survey shows

It costs less to live in Texas, a family resource management specialist says.

In other states, families need \$20,517 to maintain an "intermediate level" of living, but in Texas they need less, a family resource management specialist

Nancy Granovsky, who is on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, cites recent family-budget figures released by the Bureau of Labor Statistics from the latest "Texas-brag" material. This brag is no joke, either,

According to the report, Dallas families can buy that same "intermediate level" of living for \$18,301 and Houston families can get it for

\$19,025.

These budget figures are derived from what it would cost an urban family of four with an age-38 husband, employed full-time, a nonemployed wife, a boy age 13, and a girl age 8 to buy specific goods and services for a whole year, at autumn 1979

Dallas and Houston are the only two areas in Texas for which specific data were collected.

There's even more "brag" to report: Texas costs less at lower and higher budget levels, too.

At the lower budget level, families in other states would have to spend \$12,585.

However, Dallas families would pay only \$11,687, and Houston families would spend only \$12,000 to maintain the same level of living.

On the "high side," families in other states needed \$30,317 to stay in that living standard. Dallas families who wanted to live at these higher budget levels only had to spend \$27.004, and Houston families needed

Why? Absence of a state income tax is a major reason.

But what if you aren't part of a four-member urban

same story. For example, single people (under age 35) trying to maintain an intermediate level of living in Dallas would pay

## Heat threatens lawn watering

Current severe heat and dry conditions pose many problems for homeowners, and lawn care during times of stress is one of the most difficult to deal with.

Dr. Richard L. Duble, turfgrass specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, offers hope with some practical advice to help homeowners cope with lawns during the extreme weather conditions of this summer.

Where water is limited for lawn use, Duble suggests watering only when the lawn shows signs of stress, such as wilting or discoloration. "When you can water, soak

value but they seem to to freely express yourself, but the lawn about three or four inches deep to encourage deep rooting, stronger plants. Ideally, lawns should be watered early in the morning to incorporate any dew which might be present and to reduce evaporative loss," he

When water is available, Duble recommends mowing at a height of two and one-half to three inches at 10 to 14 day intervals.

"If you cannot water the lawn, mowing at a height of three to four inches and only when the lawn becomes unsightly is the best practice. Mowing at this height will allow common St. Augustine and bermudagrass to mature and produce seed. The seedstalks can be shredded with a mower in late fall or winter to allow seed to revitalize the lawn next spring," he emphasizes.

The specialist also recommends little or no fertilizer during the summer months, and an active insect and disease control program to protect against further

## **Drouth increases** plant diseases

Texas, certain plant diseases combine. are thriving and infecting drouth-stressed plants.

It is a disease caused by a soil-borne fungus, said Dr. C. Wendell Horne, plant pathologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Plant damage occurs only when a plant stand is under moisture stress at heading or ear-forming time.

Charcoal rot fungus grows in the base of the stalk and eats inner portions. This causes the stalk to stop transporting water and nutrients. The plant becomes weakened at the ground line, and Horne said a modest windstorm will bigger problem. Shredding cause plants to lodge, or fall as a means of early stalk over.

To salvage the crop, producers who detect this disease should harvest as soon as grain moisture levels

While extreme heat and dry permit. Harvesting before weather is slowing growth lodging occurs will allow more and killing many field crops in grain to be taken into the

Horne said charcoal rot fungus is widespread in A serious threat to corn and nature and is present in many sorghum crops is charcoal rot. if not most fields. Rotation with other crops that are less susceptible helps lower fungal populations.

Growers tend to plant crops to fit wet years, said Horne. Most crops are overplanted for moisture conditions such as the state is presently facing. Too much competition between plants results in smaller, weaker stalks which produce less grain.

During low-rainfall periods, crop residue is broken down more slowly and this may make soil-borne diseases a destruction will aid in breakdown. Horne said shredding, plus measures to retain soil moisture, are other ways to avoid drouth stress diseases



The National Safety Council a control and cause an has launched a nationwide program to urge farmers and ranchers to adopt a "no riders" rule to keep children

Nelson, a safety engineer for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said the council acknowledges that most rural children and young farm visitors enjoy following adults to watch, or participate in, the daily jobs of running a farm. However, of the 1,900 accidental work deaths in agriculture in 1978, accidents involving tractors accounted for 150 deaths and

thousands of serious injuries. According to Nelson, hundreds of children fall from tractors and other machinery each year, often to be run over by the drive wheel or trailing equipment. Children have fallen into feed or forage wagons and suffocated, or have been mangled by

unloading mechanisms. Even in a cab, a child is not totally safe, Nelson declared. Quick stops or turns may cause the child to be thrown against objects inside the cab. He said cases are also on record where the cab door came open, allowing the child to fall out. In addition, a passenger can get in the way, annoy or distract you or move
