## 'Be proud,' Hance urges

Returning to his alma mater 20 years after his graduation, Congressman Kent Hance told Dimmitt High School's seniors Sunday night to fix their goals, develop positive attitudes, and "always be proud that you are Dimmitt Bobcats."

Hance, a 1961 DHS graduate, was the baccalaureate speaker Sunday evening in the high school auditorium. "Dimmitt and Dimmitt High School have done a lot for me," Hance commented. "I had a bunch of great teachers."

He said that ambition, goal-setting and attitude "aren't mentioned in the textbooks, but are every bit as important."

"It's important to set goals — both short-range and long-range," he said.

A person with strength of character and belief in his goals won't let temporary failure defeat him, Hance said. He cited Abraham Lincoln and Thomas Edison as examples of men who overcame temporary failure more than once in pursuit of personal goals.

Hance also recommended the 23rd Psalm as a source of personal strength and renewal.

"I'm thoroughly convinced that Abraham Lincoln and Thomas Edison were the type of men who, when they were down and out, read the 23rd Psalm," he said.

## Brownie troop gets answer from Reagan

## Murder trial is underway

The murder trial of Oscar Quintero of Hart was expected to go to a 242nd District Court jury here sometime Wednesday.

Quintero, 45, is charged with murder in connection with the shooting death of Raymond Lopez of Hart March 9, 1980. Lopez was Quintero's wife's son-in-law.

Following selection of a nine-man, three-woman jury at noon Tuesday, District Attorney Jimmy Davis wound up the state's case late Tuesday afternoon after putting four key witnesses on the stand.

Defense attorneys Keith Lemons and Frank Gaston of Plainview started their presentation Wednesday morning. Judge Marvin Marshall is presiding over the trial.

Testifying for the prosecution Tuesday were Sheriff Lonny Rhynes, Deputy Sheriff Jerry Jansa, Amarillo pathologist Jose Diaz-Esquivel,

## City grants building code modification

In a special called meeting Tuesday, the Dimmitt Board of Aldermen made plans to modify the city building code for Zone 1 in downtown Dimmitt.

The decision will change the building code for the business district to include metal buildings, in addition to buildings constructed with 12-inch masonry walls.

City Manager Garnett Holland said that any building constructed must be in compliance with the State Board of Insurance for fire protection.

The aldermen's decision resulted from a request by Bill Snider.

The city governing board also hired Bart Kaderly and his father, Harold Kaderly, to take over responsibility of the city parks and to maintain both parks through the summer. The city parks are located on Southwest Third and in Northwest Dimmitt.

Zelda Ellison, pianist, and Shirley Peggram, organist, will play the processional and recessional. Trent Armstrong will give the invocation, followed by Judith Smith's salutatory.

The class song, "The Way Old Friends Do," will be performed by Jacquie Washington and Valerie Klause, vocalists, and Dee Morris, Todd Touchstone and Betty Hoover, instrumentalists, who will later be joined by the senior class.

Sharla Street, valedictorian, will give her address, followed by the presentation of the senior class by Supt. Robert Ryan.

School Board President Charles Wales will present the diplomas. Robert Boozer will offer the benediction.

## County board reviews jail changes, MH/MR work

The Castro County Commissioners Tuesday heard reports on the county jail and the Community Mental Retardation Center.

The commissioners learned in mid-April that corrective measures had to be taken to bring the county jail up to standards set forth by the Texas Commission on Jail Standards or the jail could lose its state certification.

This week, commissioners reviewed jail operational plans submitted to the state jail commission.

Sheriff Lonny Rhynes, who submitted the plans, said that District Inspector Joe Slater plans to meet with the county governing board June 8 to clarify any misunderstandings, to review the kitchen facilities in the jail and to evaluate the jailer situation.

"We've got it (minimum standards) all done, don't we?" County Judge M. L. Simpson asked.

"As far as I know," Rhynes said. The jail operational plans

included inmate classification, medical service, sanitation, inmate discipline, recreation and exercise, education and rehabilitation, library, telephone privileges, correspondence privileges, commissary privileges, visitation privileges, religious privileges, female processing and supervision, and fire prevention and suppression.

Seth Halbert of the Community MH/MR Center in Plainview reported that 75 people from Castro County had been clients of the center in 135 different services from September 1979 through August 1980.

Of those clients, 68 people had been seen in the Dimmitt outreach MH/MR clinic located at 306 W. Bedford St.

Carol Lantz, trustee from Castro County and secretary of the executive committee, told the commissioners more about the outreach office. She said that a psychologist comes to the local office weekly and sees eight to 10 clients. The clinic also has a waiting list, Mrs. Lantz

added. Former Hale County Judge C. L. Abernethy explained the development of the MH/MR centers.

Halbert told more about the center's programs, including a 28-day intensive treatment program for alcoholism or drug abuse. The complete cost of services in the fiscal year 1980 was \$42,068.22, Halbert said.

Sponsorship requests from Castro County for the coming fiscal year totaled \$3,520, which was the same level of requests as in the prior fiscal year.

"Your contribution of \$3,520 not only helps sponsor needed programs for your county's residents," Halbert said, "but is used as 'match' money to enable us to obtain other funds from the state." The "match" rate is 17 percent, he added.

The commissioners approved Ed Bennett's motion to renew the lease agreement with Dr. R. H. Lindsey for the present location of the outreach center.

The cost will be \$250 per month, beginning in June. The city and county share expenses of the MH/MR outreach building and utilities, except the telephone bill, which the center pays.

In other business, the county governing board:

—Approved Billy Hackleman's request for two additional employees in the county tax office. Hackleman said that he already had several applications and that the new employees will start June 15. Hackleman will succeed Jerry Heller as the county tax assessor-collector when Heller moves into the appraisal district office in July.

—Okayed the appraisal district's purchase of two filing cabinets from the county, as requested by Heller.

—Approved an increase of \$12 in county court cost fees, to be effective June 1. The fees were \$53 and will be \$65.

—Approved Diamond Shamrock's request for a right-of-way easement across Rodeo Road, located on the east side of Dimmitt, for a service pipeline.

## State goes after Challenge, Inc.

State Attorney General Mark White filed a deceptive trade practices suit last Wednesday against Challenge Academy, Inc., citing the organization for alleged pressure tactics and "unconscionable sales techniques."

As a result, a temporary restraining order has been issued against Challenge requiring, among other things, that it disclose to potential investors the name of its company and the fact that it sells motivational courses at initial contact.

The lawsuit, which was filed by the attorney general's Consumer Protection Division,

seeks a temporary injunction against Challenge immediately — which would achieve the same purpose as the restraining order, but for a longer period — and a permanent injunction upon final hearing against Challenge. White asks for restitution damages and civil penalties of \$10,000 each to be levied against the defendants.

Named as defendants in the attorney general's suit are Challenge, Inc.; Ed Rector, chairman of the board; Bud Shelton, and Bruce Mosely, Lubbock area director.

Concern over Challenge in Castro County was first raised

more than a month ago, when it was discovered that county residents were being asked by friends involved in the venture to invest without being told the name or nature of the business.

According to one source, residents were being approached by members of their community and asked to give a check for \$130, leaving the payee's name blank, without being told the exact nature or name of the business.

The \$130 reportedly allowed an investor to attend two meetings in Amarillo, the first of which was usually on Saturday and the second on Monday.

In the Lubbock operation of Challenge, the first meeting has usually involved a long bus ride to an undisclosed location, sources said.

The attorney general's lawsuit claims that Challenge instructs its agents to make every effort to manipulate the emotions of prospective purchasers enroute to the meeting by talking about how much money they will make.

According to the suit, participants are instructed to board a bus when they arrive, with the purpose of the bus ride being to allow organizers to "jack up" the emotions of the potential investors so that they will be vulnerable to the

company's sales pitch.

The suit claims that friends who arrive together are separated on the bus to prevent any possible negative reactions of one to affect the other. The suit also alleges that when prospective investors arrive at their destination, they are subjected to a variety of high-pressure techniques.

These techniques, according to the suit, include a closed meeting of seven to 10 hours, during which the organizers are told not to let the possible buyer out of their sight, even long enough to go to the bathroom.

They also reportedly use

attention-keeping techniques such as keeping the guests literally on the edge of their chairs with legs and arms uncrossed during the entire presentation.

The suit alleges that Challenge employs the use of group chanting, clapping and intense peer pressure to elicit emotional participation. The suit also claims that, if a speaker momentarily falters, the agents are taught to begin chants to maintain the emotional fervor.

Sources in Castro County have told the News that after the initial cost of \$130 for the weekend meetings, partici- [See CHALLENGE, Page 8]

# A&M alcohol plant goes into operation

When the availability of fuel becomes more important to agricultural producers than the price, Texas A&M engineers will be able to tell them all about an available alternate fuel — ethyl alcohol or ethanol.

The engineers have been running a research and demonstration ethanol production plant for the last five months. It produces 184 proof alcohol from grain through a series of fermentation and distillation process. It's just a matter of cooking the alcohol up, as Henry O'Neal explains.

"To this point we have used only grain sorghum and corn as the feedstock for making alcohol," O'Neal says. "The general process is to, first, grind the grain, put it into a cooker, add water and add an enzyme to keep the mixture liquid during the heating process."

"This mash is heated to just below boiling and cooked for about an hour. Then it is cooled down to between 95 degrees and 100 degrees F. Another enzyme is added to change the starch to sugar, then yeast is added to begin the fermentation of the sugar."

It's allowed to ferment for three to four days, after which we have an alcohol concentration of about 10 percent," explains O'Neal. "Finally, the alcohol is distilled so we can get a high enough proof to use as a fuel."

The production plant at Texas A&M is a small-scale model and has less cooking and fermenting capacity than an actual on-farm plant would have. The demonstration model has four cooking tanks, each with a 12½-bushel grain capacity, which gives the plant a 30-gallon per day production rate. Its distillation capacity is 10 gallons per hour.

"There are some residues left which are a good protein source for feeding livestock," O'Neal says. "We are easily recovering eight pounds of 27 to 28 percent protein per bushel of grain that went into the cooker."

Many products can be fermented to produce ethanol, including wheat, potatoes, sugar cane, sweet sorghum and sugar beets. The engineers plan on testing the production potential of several feedstocks. Thus far, they have found that grain sorghum and corn both produce 2½ gallons of 184 proof ethanol per bushel.

"We will be using the alcohol we produce in a 1,000-hour engine test," O'Neal says, "so we can get a feel for any out-of-the-ordinary wear or maintenance that might have to be taken into account if we're going to use this alcohol as a fuel under long-term conditions."

The energy requirements of the plant and environmental and safety aspects of alcohol production are also being studied.

Research and demonstration data are available to the public, and tours of the plant can be arranged through the county Extension agent's office.

# Bentsen seeks to 'clean up' US Water Act

Sen. Lloyd Bentsen has joined in proposing legislation that would clarify and restrict the authority of the federal government under the Clean Water Act.

Federal courts have ruled that a requirement in the Clean Water Act for permits from the Army Corps of Engineers to do dredging and filling work on "navigable waters" extends to virtually all waters of the US, including playa lakes.

Bentsen in 1976 first sought to amend the law by defining "navigable waters" in the way the term has been traditionally understood.

"Under current law every farmer and rancher who wants to alter the use of his land, every city that wants to lay a water line, every county that wants to construct a drainage ditch could need a federal permit," Sen. Bentsen said in remarks accompanying the bill.

"This is not the first time Congress has tried to deal with this issue. In 1976 and again in 1977 Congress failed to change Section 404 of the act to draw a clear line between those dredge and fill permit requirements that are in the national interest and those that represent federal encroachment on the everyday lives of this nation's citizens," Bentsen said.

Sen. Bentsen pointed out that the expanded bureaucratic powers of the federal government under the Dredge and Fill Permit program have resulted in a "bureaucratic nightmare" of red tape and delay for private landowners, farmers and ranchers, and state and local governments.

Although time limits were set within the current law to restrict permit review time to 90 days, Bentsen cited a recent GAO study of three Corps district offices showing that average permit processing time ranges from 120 to 300 days.

In the case of Texas, Bentsen noted the recent success of the Fish and Wildlife Service in joining forces with the EPA to declare private playa lakes subject to the Section 404 process.

"This far exceeds the concept of dredge and fill permitting that Congress intended," Bentsen said.

"Clearly, with the 404 program loosely structured — as it is under current law — it lends itself to misinterpretations in the Courts and abuse by the bureaucracy. The time has come for Congress to re-establish its will and define a clear and workable program," Sen. Bentsen said.

# Insects of interest

# Bagworms are back

Bagworms are back. This familiar insect has recently hatched from overwintering eggs and is now feeding on trees and shrubs. Eggs survive the winter in last year's bags, so if bagworms were a problem on your trees last year, chances are they will be back this year, and in larger numbers.

Young bagworms build a small conical bag about 1/8 inch long. The tough silk bags are covered with pieces of leaves and twigs, and are often difficult to see when small. Bagworms feed throughout the summer, rebuilding the bags as they increase in size. In late summer, the larva seals the bag, pupates and in a few weeks transforms to the adult.

Adult females are very unusual as they are wingless, soft-bodied and look like large maggots. They have no functional eyes, legs or antennae, and do not leave the bag. The male, a moth with a wingspan of about one inch, flies to waiting females. The mated female lays large numbers of eggs in her bag, and then drops to the ground and dies. Eggs hatch in early spring and the tiny larvae emerge from the bag to begin feeding.

Bagworms feed on most kinds of trees and shrubs, but are common pest of ornamental conifers. Defoliation weakens the tree or shrub, and all or part of the plant may die after several years of damage.

Handpicking bags is the best control for small trees and shrubs. It is useful any time of the year, but most important before eggs hatch in the early spring. Be sure all of the bags are removed and destroyed. Young larvae will emerge from eggs and crawl back onto trees if bags are only thrown on the ground.

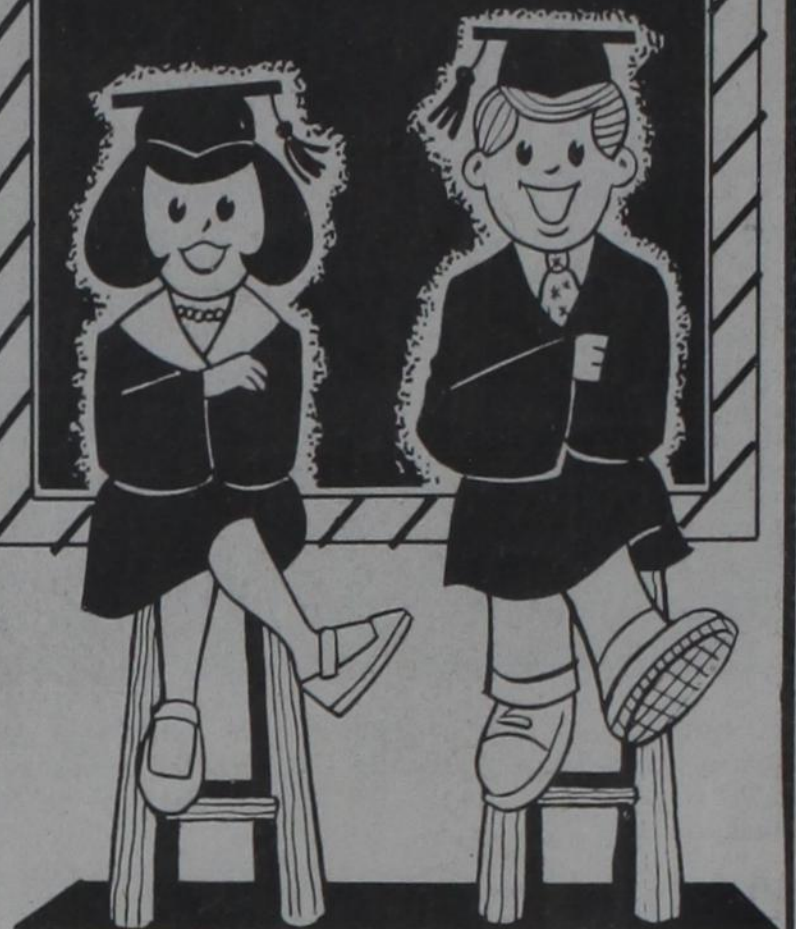
Spraying is necessary on large trees and when infestations are too large for hand picking. Sprays are most effective when bagworms are small, 3/8 inch or less. Early control reduces damage and no new bags remain. Sprays delayed until after mid-June kill fewer worms and most of the bags remain attached. Good coverage is essential for good control. Two spray applications about 10 days apart may be necessary for heavy infestations.

Several insecticides provide effective control, including carbaryl, diazinon, acephate and malathion. The biological insecticides, which contain

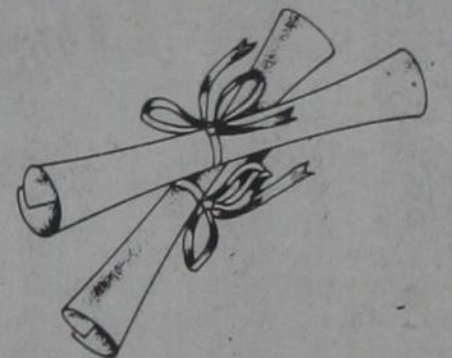

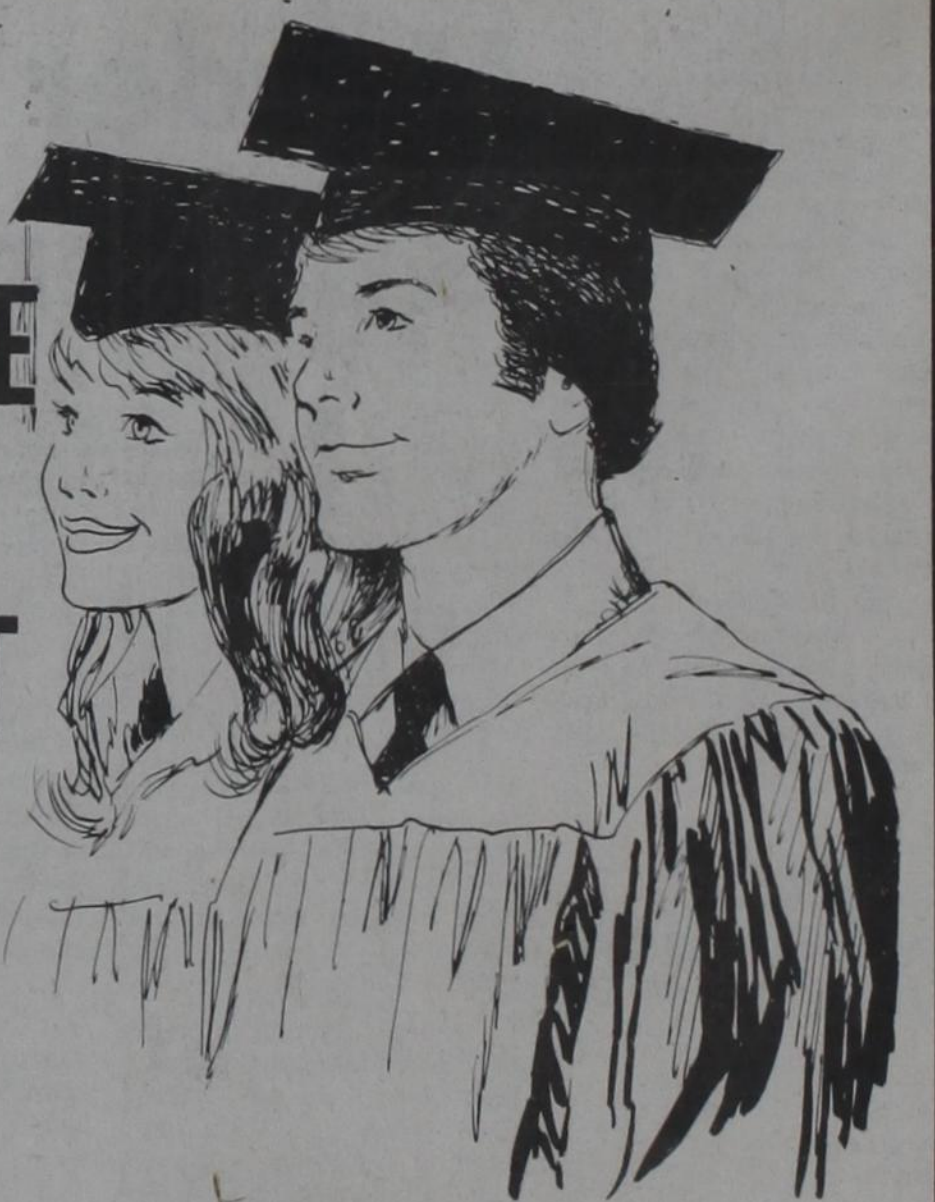

Where's the wheat growth market for the '80's? Overseas, says agricultural economist, Dr. Michael Cook. Citing increased dependence on food supplies by foreign countries and increased dependence on foreign markets by U S producers, he believes agricultural exports are increasing sharply to both developing and centrally planned countries. While agreeing this is good, Cook cautions these are the most politically volatile areas leading to a greater dollar risk. U S agricultural exports rose from \$6.9 billion in 1970 to \$40.5 billion last year. A 3 percent increase in food and fiber demand is predicted in the next few years with worldwide changes from a grain diet to one with more animal protein being part of the reason. Cook's statement emphasized increased agricultural production and decreased resources of energy, water, land and credit will be the key to future growth in agriculture.

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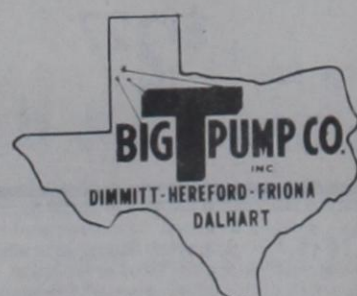

**Protect eyes when using ag chemicals**

Reports from hospital emergency rooms over several years show that chemicals have been responsible for

nearly two-thirds of all agricultural eye injuries," says Elvin J. Schofield, president of the Texas Society to

Prevent Blindness. "Yet with eye protection and proper precautions, 90% of these eye injuries could

have been prevented," he said.

"Anhydrous ammonia is the most powerful and dangerous of these chemicals," he added. "In the soil, ammonia means abundant crops; in the eye, however, it can mean tragedy, for within seconds of contact it begins to destroy the cells and tissues of sight."

The society urges all who work around such chemicals to wear safety goggles. In addition to urging safety eye-wear, the society has these other safety tips for those handling agricultural chemicals:

- Study the product's label for correct use and observe listed precautions.

- Thoroughly understand how to operate any equipment prior to use.

- Always store pesticides in their original containers, keeping them tightly closed.

- Always carry at least five gallons of plain water on tractors and other farm equipment. Then, if an accident should occur, flush the eyes with water instantly, continuing for at least 15 minutes, with the eyelids held open.

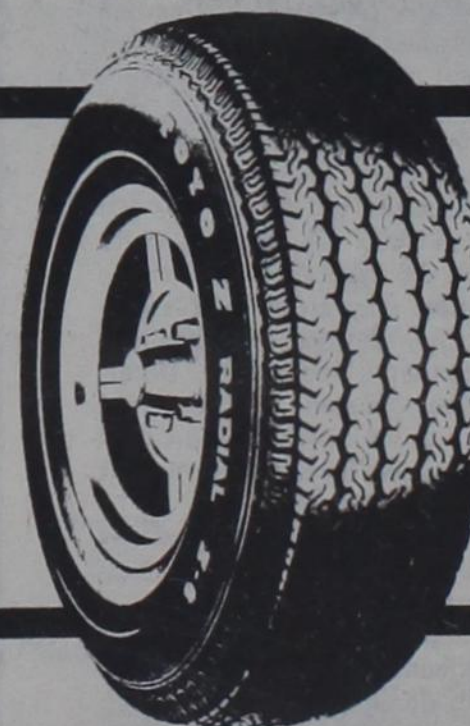

# Refinery project awaiting permits

Before the Diamond Shamrock Corp. can begin construction on its alcohol refinery, it anticipates three months or more of paperwork to get the necessary air-quality permits from the state and federal governments. According to Roger Schrum, a spokesman for Diamond Shamrock, the ground-breaking date depends on how long it takes to process the permits and to register with the Texas Air

William C. Griggs, executive director of the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum in Canyon, and Eddie Guffee, director and curator of the Llano Estacado Museum in Plainview, have both accepted invitations to the dedication.

Dimmitt came on strong at the beginning of the Tuesday night game, scoring one run in the first inning to Morton's goose-egg and seven runs in the second to Morton's three.

The post-type marker commemorating the J. W. Carter family and the 7-Up Ranch will be located on FM 1055 near the Carters' original home.

Permin Gonzales and Ricky Gonzales led the scoring for Dimmitt with three runs each, and Bryan Armstrong hit his second home run in as many games. Armstrong scored two runs, as did David Ogas.

Mr. and Mrs. Carter and their three children, James, Ellen, and John, moved from Buffalo Gap in Taylor County to a place on the prairie near Running Water Draw in 1884. Carter went to Austin in 1883 and bought 72 sections of Castro County land from the state. He paid the state \$25,600.

Ron Rickenbrode did the pitching, and was backed up by good defense from the outfield and infield. Dimmitt's record now stands at 3-2.

He fenced 18 sections for a horse pasture — the first fencing in the county. Lizzie Carter, born on the ranch in 1886, was the first white child born in Castro County; and Jennie, born in 1888, was also born before the county was organized.

# Public health program funds Airman Ells finishes basic

The South Plains Health Provider, Inc. located at 402 NW Third St., will definitely stay open.

Airman James H. Ells, son of Lois Scott of Dimmitt, has been assigned to the Presidio of Monterrey, Calif., after completing Air Force basic training.

Funding for a \$2.3 million rural health program for an eight-county area of the South Plains Health Systems was approved by the agency's directors Tuesday in Lubbock.

Last week, the agency's project review committee approved the program by an 11-3 vote, according to Nurse Practitioner Maureen Jones, and recommended that the directors adopt and approve the program. Of 34 voting directors, only five did not favor the issue.

In addition, airmen who complete basic training earn credits toward an associate degree in applied science through the Community College of the Air Force.

"Our funding remains the same," Ms. Jones said, adding, "We will remain open."

Ells will now receive specialized instruction in the voice processing field.

The directors also considered recommendations for next year's funding that would de-emphasize Plainview and Hale County and concentrate more on the smaller, rural counties such as Castro, where fewer private physicians practice.

[Continued from Page 1] pants have been asked to pay \$5,000 to attend a series of motivational courses.

The lawsuit describes Challenge, Inc., as an organization in which the defendants sell and offer to sell rights of participation in the company. The suit lists violations which include the operation of an unlawful "pyramid sales" organization, failure to disclose the costs of membership and failure to notify potential members that the organization has court orders or consent decrees entered against it in six states.

Apparently, Challenge, Inc., under the title of Challenge to America, first filtered into Castro County in the Sunnyside Community. It is, however, quickly spreading, with several Dimmitt residents being asked to take part also.

A March 1974 article in Reader's Digest titled "Pyramid Selling - No. 1 Consumer Fraud," lists four precautions that law-enforcement officials and consumer-protection agencies advise:

1. Before you sign any selling contract, check out the company with your Better Business Bureau, local consumer-protection body or state attorney general's office.

2. Always distinguish between legitimate door-to-door selling and fraudulent chain schemes. Does the company want you to sell on your own, or are you being pressured to "invest" \$2,500 to \$5,000 for the right to recruit others? If it's the latter, stay away from it.

3. Beware of promised "potential" earnings. Determine, instead, just what actual or average individual earnings have been over a period of time.

4. Don't be lured by newspaper advertising, flattering letters hinting at a "management position," or personal solicitation. Above all, don't be enticed — even by close friends — to an "opportunity meeting."

# In planning events, focus on customers

To be effective in planning community festivals, fairs and similar events, focus on the customer, emphasized Dr. John Crompton at a recent conference for community planners at Texas A&M University. "Find out what the people want," said Crompton, an associate professor with the

Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Texas A&M's Department of Recreation and Parks. "It's not what you want that's important, but what your customer wants."

"You need to sell the benefits of your product, not the product itself," he noted. "Your promotional material must convey what the benefits of your product (event) are."

He pointed out that most people take part in events such as fairs and festivals because of excitement, increased self-satisfaction and self-worth, and association with peer groups.

In marketing an event or activity, Crompton listed five sets of tools to work with: clients (different groups of people), products (what you have to offer), time and place, price and promotion.

"If you aren't as successful with your event as you would like to be, then you can change any one or a combination of these five items," he noted.

Crompton suggested segmenting the product or event to satisfy different client groups, such as youth, senior citizens and those of various nationalities. Various activities and events can also be planned based on socio-demographic, behavioral and geographic differences.

"As far as promoting an event is concerned, the best promotional tool is for people to see the actual site," said Crompton. "Put your fair where most people will see it, where the most traffic is. This is the best, cheapest promotional tool you've got."

Crompton also noted the importance of adding a new dimension to your event each year and to build your promotion around it.

"Bring in something new each year and abandon old things that have turned into losers," he emphasized.

## Heart Association plans skate-a-thon



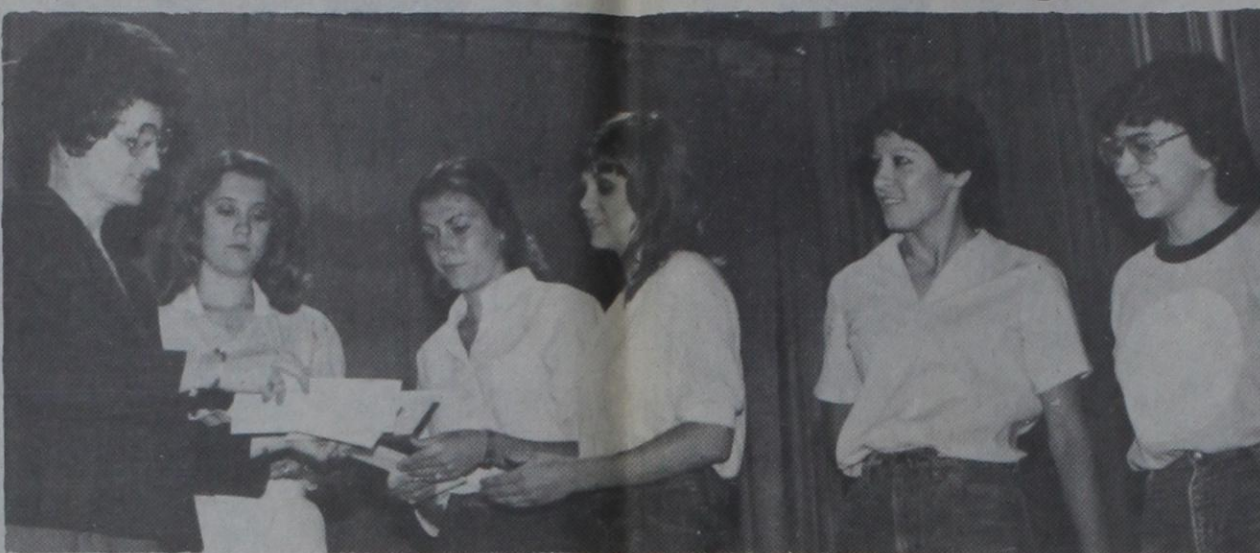

**Treat ages 9 to 13 as 'in-between years'**

Your 9-year-old may be experiencing the first sparks of his life's philosophy or religious faith. Your 11-year-old may be establishing character traits she will keep for life. Ages 9-13, the "in-between" years, are busy ones, says Diane Welch, a family life education specialist. Parents should pay attention to their "in-betweeners" and help with the special tasks this age group faces, she says. Mrs. Welch is on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension service, The Texas A&M University System.

**WHO'S AN 'IN-BETWEENER'?**  
"In-betweeners" have special characteristics and feelings. It's important that parents understand these, Mrs. Welch advises. During "in-between years," children may begin to reject adults — or feel that adults have rejected them. They may treat the opposite sex with scorn. And they may look at their

own age and sex group as being very important. **'IN-BETWEENER' TASKS**  
Developmental tasks during ages 9-13 concentrate on moral, philosophical and social activities, Mrs. Welch explains. During these years, both boys and girls need help from parents with these tasks, the specialist stresses. Parents can help their "in-betweeners" to become self-directing (doing the "right" thing without being told), form moral judgments, establish character traits, develop a beginning philosophy or religious faith, establish relationships with peers, and participate in group and community activities. **HOW PARENTS CAN HELP**  
Parents can help their youth during these years in numerous major ways, Mrs. Welch says. Here are her suggestions: When children behave as children, adults should act like adults. Children feel more secure with mature, responsible adults. Respect your "in-betweeners" as growing individuals

**Vitamin supplements -- do you really need them?**

Are you one of the 35 million Americans taking unprescribed vitamin supplements? Do you take them because a friend told you about them, or just as an "insurance policy?" You could be poisoning yourself. There are times when vitamin supplements may be necessary, says Mary K. Sweeten, a foods and nutrition specialist. These involve cases in which there is a sub-normal intake of food. For example, a physician may prescribe vitamin supplements for some patients more than 65 years of age, for some expectant mothers, or for some mothers breast-feeding their infants. Other instances include malabsorption or an acute illness which decreases the appetite. Before taking unprescribed vitamin supplements, however, check with your physician, the specialist advises. Mrs. Sweeten is on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A&M University System. Massive doses of vitamins and minerals reach beyond the realm of nutritional therapy, the foods and nutrition specialist says. This practice, then, becomes drug therapy, and it requires the supervision of a physician for safety, she stresses. Excessive amounts of the fat-soluble vitamins (A, D, E and K) can be toxic (poisonous), because these vitamins are stored in the body, Mrs. Sweeten cautions. The term "megavitamin therapy" refers to treating the person with doses of vitamins a thousand times greater than the requirement for those vitamins as set forth by the Recommended Dietary Allowances of the national Food and Nutrition Board, Mrs. Sweeten continues. Again, this massive-dose therapy requires a physician's supervision for safety. So why take vitamin supplements without a physician's advice? There are not any known advantages to taking excess amounts of any nutrient, except in cases such as those described above in which the body is not getting enough food, Mrs. Sweeten says. Vitamins and minerals are not substitutes for food, she stresses. On the other hand, the best way to obtain vitamins and minerals the body needs is by eating a variety of foods selected from the Daily Food Guide every day. Eating habits based on moderation and variety can help keep good health, and they may even improve health, especially if ideal weight is achieved. Finally, she points out, vitamin supplements, EXCEPT in cases as described above, are an economic waste when eating a balanced diet is possible.

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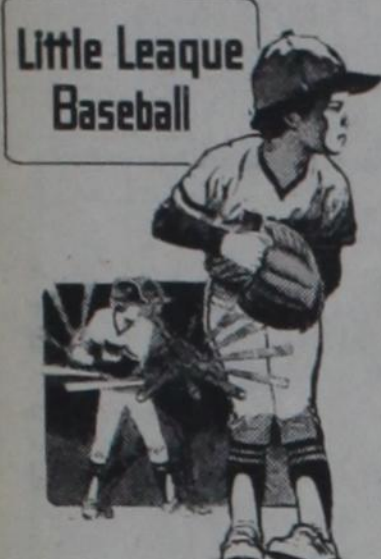
