### Two Meetings Set To Boost Projects

Muleshoe Area Industrial Foundation (MAIF) will follow up its highly successful economic development clinic held in Muleshoe March 22 with plans "to make the organization a working reality," Jim Cox, chairman of the steering committee, has announced.

Accordingly he has called a meeting for 7:30 Thursday night in the community room of the Muleshoe State Bank to elect an initial slate of directors.

### High Absenteeism Caused by Mumps Mild Flu Epidemic

A mild flu epidemic — plus mumps, some chicken pox and perhaps just spring fever — caused high absenteeism in Muleshoe schools and businesses, a Journal check Friday revealed.

The heaviest absenteeism of the school year was reported last week at Muleshoe High School, by Principal Ralph Stevenson. The virus or flu took the heaviest toll of students with several teachers being absent each day. Sore throats were also prevalent, with a few cases of mumps also known.

R. E. Everette, principal at junior high school, reported an average of 45-50 absent each day last week, mainly due to the flu with two or three cases of mumps.

Richard Hills' Principal, Milton Oyler commented that the mumps and chicken pox have caused the highest absenteeism the past two weeks at this elementary school and were now on the decline, with the flu virus causing many of the absences more recently.

At DeStazo Elementary Principal Bill Taylor said that absences increased this past week, with mumps now taking higher tolls with chicken pox also reported, as well as the flu.

Muleshoe doctors confirm an overabundance, even termed officially as a mild epidemic, of flu cases, the asiatic or common variety, among not only children but many adults. Mumps are also heavy by doctors' figures, with some chicken pox showing up among the younger folk.

### Top Junior College Official to Check Prospects Here

With the visit of Roy Davis, Muleshoe chamber manager, to the Austin office of the new coordinating committee on higher education, Muleshoe area's junior college project has taken on new life.

Alex Williams, chairman of the Muleshoe junior college committee, announced that Davis had made arrangements for Dr. David Hunt, acting assistant commissioner for junior colleges to make a preliminary inspection of the area next Friday.

Dr. Hunt may be accompanied to Muleshoe by Dr. Lester Harrell, commissioner of higher education for the entire coordinating committee, or by one of the lay members of the junior college committee, a sub-committee of the full board.

It was announced Saturday that Williams has called a meeting of the local committee to make plans for Friday's important visit by Dr. Hunt. His visit to Austin last week.

Local efforts to establish an institution above the high school level in this area were interrupted last year when new legislation transferred authority from the state board of education to the new coordinating board.

Announcement of appointments to the new board were not made until September, after which the local group immediately contacted the nearest board member, Dr. D. M. Wiggins, Lubbock.

On his advice, correspondence was initiated with the chairman of the junior college committee, further correspondence took place with him. Since that time, the local committee has been waiting for some word from these state officials.

Williams Saturday announced with what he termed elation, that 1966 may be "the year of decision for the junior college project.

The junior college committee of the chamber of commerce will meet tomorrow at Paul's Cafe at 3:30 p.m. for a planning session. The planning session was called by Williams, the chairman.

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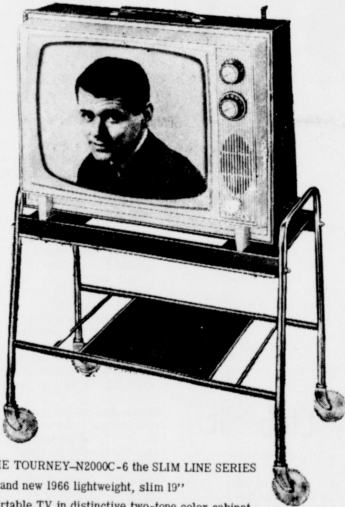
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### TOPS Will Crown Month, Yearly Queen

## Fire! Arson? 'Is Serious!' Chief Warns

"Our luck can't hold forever, we're going to have a Big One someday," Muleshoe Fire Chief Earl Ladd said Friday as he reported that the first quarter of 1966 had netted the volunteer fire department here 57 calls. This compares with 45 in 1965, up 12, in the first quarter. But the big problem is that 30 per cent of these fire calls have been "set" fires, Chief Ladd explained, caused chiefly by children, teenagers, and of course, unknown persons deliberately setting a fire. "And that is arson, a serious offense, two-years minimum," he added. "We have definite proof on some fires of arson."

Ernest Kerr, manager of the local association, also attended the meeting.

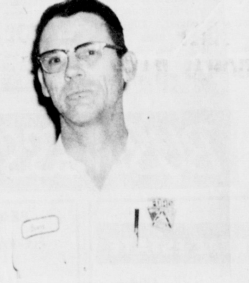
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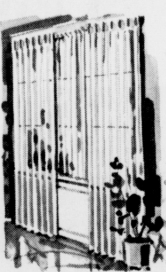
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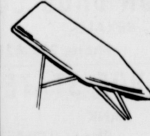

This will be done through a full time and continuous effort to contact leaders in industry, agri-business and various other ways clearly stated in the by-laws of the corporation.

Who are members of the organization?
