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## Infant's Leather Shoes On Ration List

Shoe rationing will be extended May 1 to include the entire size range of infants' leather shoes—an action taken to help build up critically needed supplies of infants' leather shoes in larger sizes already rationed. District OPA Shoe Rationing Officer Oscar J. Walker has announced.

At present, rationing covers infants' leather shoes in sizes 4 1-2 to 8, the size range most babies need when they begin to walk. There is an acute shortage of these sizes in many sections of the country. The new provision will put the smaller sizes 0 to 4, which are in relatively plentiful supply and are worn chiefly by infants in arms, on the rationed list beginning May 1.

Largely because sizes 0 to 4 have not been rationed, demand for them has soared out of proportion to actual needs. The result has been that these shoes have absorbed too much of the manpower and production facilities and too much of the scarce types of leather suitable for making the much more urgently needed toddlers' sizes, Walker explained.

It was emphasized that only infants' shoes using leather will be affected by the new provision and that it is believed that non-leather types of shoes should be adequate to take care of the footwear needs of infants not yet at the walking stage.

Walker also stated that inclusion of the infants' smaller size leather shoes on the rationed list was suggested by the industry itself.

## SWP Co. Plan Ready for Veterans Aid

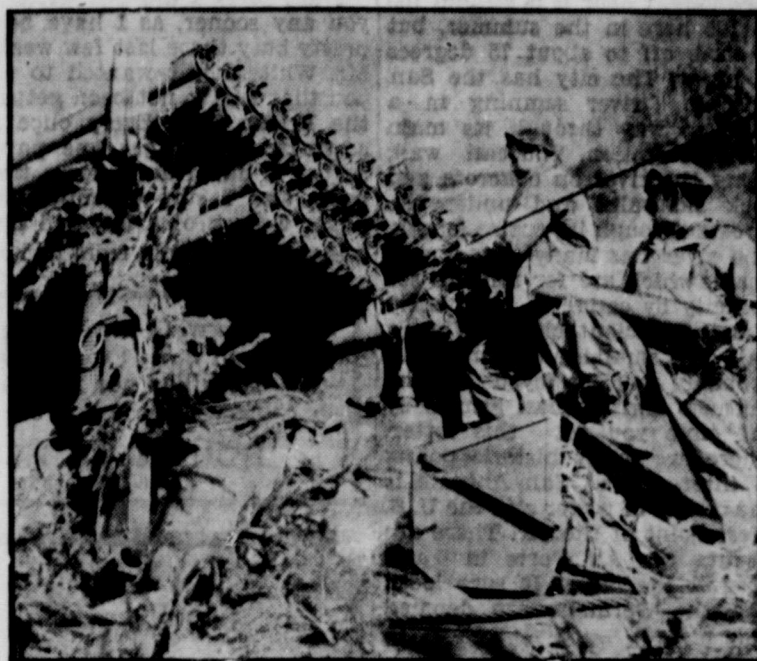
Smaller War Plants Corporation, counting strongly on Congressional blessings for an extended life, is ready with a long-range program pledged to benefit veterans, Morton Harrison, Dallas, regional SWPC director, said Tuesday.

While Harrison outlined the agency's veteran's loan program and an over-all advisory service to returning GIs, a teletype message from Maury Maverick, national head, came to his desk. It gave the promise of a future to the plan with the news that a House committee had unanimously reported out a bill extending the agency eighteen months to Dec. 31, 1946.

And SWPC officials count on a much longer life for the agency set up to safeguard little business. They expect it to continue either in its present setup or as a branch of the Department of Commerce.

SWPC is ready to help veterans to loans through three programs—recommendations for private business loans to GIs, approval of SWPC loans for manufacturing and food processing, and granting of loans for veter-

an purchase of surplus government properties.

### Heavy Business Seen

Although the agency has made no loans to veterans to date, Harrison anticipates a big money-exchanging business as soon as the inflation block on GI Bill of Rights loans is removed and when veterans are directed to the easy-term SWPC business and surplus property loans.

Under the GI Bill of Rights SWPC recommends veterans for all business loans except those handled by banks and loan associations through the Reconstruction Finance Corporation. The agency will process about 80 per cent of all such loan recommendations, Harrison predicted.

Ex-servicemen are eligible for regular SWPC loans to finance manufacturing and processing, and the government money goes at \$6 for every \$4 supplied by the individual.

The Surplus Properties Act put SWPC in a solid position with the right to buy up government-owned properties for resale to small business for their protection against big business purchases. It also permits loans of \$9 for every \$1 for the purchase of these properties by the individuals.

### Veterans Make Inquiries

Veterans have made inquiries of SWPC on loans to go into the trucking, grocery, filling station and other small business, Harrison said. At present the inflationary value of property makes many of these inadvisable he added.

Harrison, a World War I Navy chief electrician, believes that veterans, now confronted with multiple war agency assistance, need a centralized and simplified advisory body.

The answer, he believes, is a five-member committee—a veteran, a "liberal banker" and three good businessmen—in each draft board area. The program would operate in conjunction with the state veterans placement committee and would

## Tire Applications Put on Occupation Preference Basis

A preferential list of occupations for use in selecting persons to receive passenger car tires has been prepared by the Office of Price Administration in cooperation with the War Manpower Commission, the district OPA announced this week. This list will be used in channeling the quota of tires to persons whose transportation needs are regarded as most essential to the war effort.

Under the new plan, the number of eligibles is not reduced but is classified into four preference groups for the aid of local War Price and Rationing Boards in issuing certificates. In accordance with regular tire eligibility standards, each individual tire applicant must establish his need for a tire, even though he is rated in a high preference group.

## Combat Veteran Receives His Army Discharge

MIAMI BEACH, FLA.—Staff Sgt. Sylvester A. Fangman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Fangman of Hereford, has been honorably discharged from the U. S. Army, for reason of physical disability, it was announced this week at the AAF Regional and Convalescent Hospital, Miami District.

An engineer-gunner aboard a B-24 Liberator with the 15th Air Force in Italy, the Hereford airman wears the Silver Star in addition to the Air Medal with one Oak Leaf Cluster, the Purple Heart and the European theatre service ribbon with two Bronze Stars.

Sgt. Fangman was awarded the Silver Star for "heroism beyond and above the call of ordinary duty." On his 20th and last mission, while his group of Libs was raiding enemy installations in the Balkans, his bomber was attacked by more than 50 German fighters over Yugoslavia. In the ensuing battle, Sgt. Fangman shot down one Me-109. The enemy fighters killed two of his crew members and crippled the plane by shooting away the control cables and knocking out two engines. The remaining members of the crew bailed out and along with Sgt. Fangman, fought with Marshal Tito's forces for three weeks before returning to their base in Italy.

Sgt. Fangman was engaged in farming and ranching prior to entering the AAF on Oct. 22, 1942. He served overseas for eight months.

## Death Claims Mrs. Geo. Maurer Friona Pioneer

The city of Friona and the surrounding community suffered an irreparable loss when another of our highly esteemed pioneers, Mrs. George W. Maurer, passed away at her home here, some time Friday night.

Mrs. Maurer was living alone at her home as she has been for the past 22 years, and for some time past had been in her usual health, and going about attending to her household duties. For some time, her grandson, Gaylord Maurer, had been spending the nights with her; and on Saturday morning Gaylord arose about the usual hour and before going to the home of his parents on the adjoining premises, he looked into his grandmother's room, and saw her apparently peacefully sleeping, which was not unusual, as she often slept late.

Later in the morning Carl C. Maurer went to his mother's home, and found her still apparently asleep and quietly withdrew as it was their custom to let her sleep until she awoke of her own accord. Later in the day, her daughter, Mrs. L. F. Lillard, went to her mother's home to assist her in preparing the usual bountiful Easter dinner which she always served to all her family and a few friends, and found that she had passed away, apparently in her sleep, probably some time during Friday night.

Mrs. George W. Maurer, whose maiden name was Wilona Belle Garst, was born in Mohican, Ashland County, Ohio, Nov. 9, 1867, and passed away March 30, 1945, at the age of 77 years, and four that she had passed with the Dutch Reform Church.

On November 15, 1888 she became the wife of George W. Maurer. Then, with her husband she united in the membership of the Evangelical Lutheran Church. About the close of the first decade of the present century she moved with her husband and two children to Friona, and a few years later the entire family joined the local Congregational Christian Church. Mr. Maurer died, July 31, 1923.

She is survived by her son, Carl C. Maurer and a daughter Mrs. L. F. Lillard, both of Friona. Also by four grandchildren and one great grandchild.

Funeral services were held here at 10:00 o'clock Monday morning, at the local church, conducted by the pastor, Rev. J. L. Beattie. Following the services here, the body was shipped to Loudenville, Ohio, where it will be laid to rest by the side of her late husband.

Mrs. Maurer's kindly influence and her sincere Christian character will be sadly missed in this community. She was never excitable or demonstrative about her religious views, but was deeply sincere, and lived her religion, rather than talked it. The service clubs are very large and up-to-date in the modern fixtures. They have beautiful ball parks—just like the New York Yankees play on. There are plenty of trees and green grass and no dust storms, just like Southwest Virginia. The weather is very hot this early in the spring, and we will go into cotton uniforms on the 1st. The Air Corps changed to cotton uniforms on the 15th of March. The humidity is very low here and you feel sticky all day. We really will be sweating here before long. I hear it is around 100 to 105 here in the summer, but it cools off to about 75 degrees at night. The city has the San Antonio river running in a winding way through its main business section. You can walk along the river on concrete and rock sidewalks and under the streets through its entire length. The river has many canoes and boats, which are for rent, to see the city by canal. It is probably like the ancient city of Vienna only on a small scale. Vienna will probably be destroyed by the German and Russian armies by the time you get this letter. There are many historic points of interest, and San Antonio is the center of power and the U. S. West Point of the Air. There are about six Air Ports in and around the city. It sure looks like the Germans are doomed and I think quick victory is in sight. The war news sure is good and for the past few days we have been looking for the end. This is my first experience in a fort, and they are much different from the camps, that I have been stationed in during

the past four years. Well I must close for this time. Your son,

Cpl. Lloyd C. Mingus of the U. S. Marines, located somewhere in the Pacific, writes that he is in the best of health and feeling fine. He reports that it is very hot and rainy there on the island. He wishes to say "Hello" to all his friends and hopes to be back home soon.

Honolulu, Oahu, Mar. 15, 1945  
 Dear Mr. White:

I am sorry I did not write to you any sooner, as I have been pretty busy these last few weeks. Mr. White I just wanted to tell you that I have not been getting the Friona Star. Every once in a great while I get one paper and it is dated quite some time back, and I sure do miss the paper a heck of a lot, and now the only news I get from home is

from my mother and W. C. Reid. How is everything back there at this time of the year? Over here the wind has been blowing pretty hard and the sand and dust has blown. It has been raining quite a bit the past few weeks. I am just fine and still sweating it out over a furlough. I guess I will get a furlough by May, 1946, and that is only 14 months off. Every time I go for mail call, and I don't have a Friona Star. I feel I'd like to eat him out for not having a paper for me. But I keep hoping and praying that I will get the paper and lots of them; but they are never in the mail. Well Mr. White, I must close this letter and write a few more. I hope to be getting the paper real soon, because that paper means so much to me to tell me of the news at home.

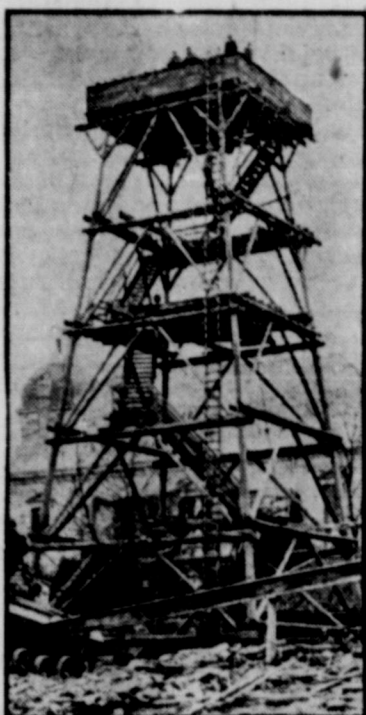

Dear Dad:

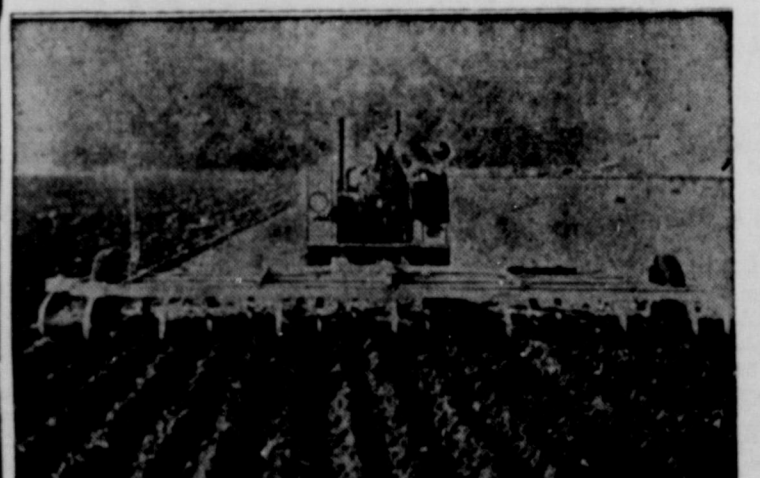

Other persons from here who attended the ceremony were Mr. Coleman and son Bruce; Mrs. Coleman's mother, Mrs. G. E. Pinkerton of Elk City, Okla., and Miss Sadie Lee Oliver.

It seems that just before Christmas, and just before this particular group of Marines were to invade the Marshall Islands, they decided to celebrate by serenading Japanese prisoners from Tarawa with Christmas carols. So, while machine-guns surrounded the prison camp area, these Marines sang Christmas carols. At first the Japanese did not understand, and thought they were being "prepared" for mass execution; but one prisoner, who said he was a Christian stepped forward and expressed his thanks, while some others joined in shouting "Merry Christmas!" The serenade was arranged by Lt. George LaBarre, former Protestant Episcopal rector in Williamsburg, Va.

Mt. Hermon School, a secondary school conducted by the Methodist Church high in the Himalayas at Darjeeling, North India, under the principalship of the Rev. J. R. Boyles, lays claim not only to being one of the "highest" schools in the world, but also one of the most cosmopolitan. Its 260 pupils include Christians, Jews, Parsees, Hindus and Mohammedans. They are Americans, English, Scotch, Irish, Austrians, Poles, Czechs, Greeks, Scandinavians, Chinese, Indians and Anglo-

Indians. Some 30 are from missionary homes, a large number are tea planters' children, others are from the steel and iron centers of North Bengal, others from the paper and jute mill area; and the remainder from homes of government officials and railways employees. "And they all live happily together," says Mr. Boyles.
