Estimates Cost Of Sewer System At Over \$80,000

The City Commission has received from the Engineering Firm of Proese & Nichols, estimates and plans for the future sewer system that we are all trying to get at this time for Friona. The first estimate of the cost was some higher than we had thought it would run at first, but as was explained to the Commission, the town is somewhat scattered and as this plan covers the entire town it is running the cost up.

The first estimate was \$83,000; but since that time there has been a reduction of \$1,000 and there is hope that this still might be reduced. In arriving at an estimate the engineering firm took three of the lowest bids on jobs that they had handled in the past and took an average from these three to determine what figures to use on our system.

In as much as we have a very good type soil in which to work—no rock or quick sand it is hoped that if and when it is turned over to a contractor for a bid that this will reduce our costs still more, which could be very true.

Regardless of the cost of this system, in any reasonable figure, it is thought by most everyone that we still cannot afford to go on without this sewer system. There are so many angles that a project of this sort can be figured from and your consideration as a resident of Friona is urgently requested, in planning and thinking about this system. Talk to each other about it with open minds and swap ideas and contact the City Officials, give them your opinion and get theirs. At a later date we will have more definite plans and will get them to you as soon as we can; in the meantime, be a booster for the sewer system.

REGISTERED JERSEY HEIFER PRESENTED TO FFA CHAPTER HERE

Mr. Leo Pottishman, grain dealer of Fort Worth, and owner of the Santa Fe Grain Co., at Friona, has presented the Future Farmers of the Friona High School with a registered Jersey heifer.

This heifer is to be given to some boy who will in turn, return a registered calf to the Chapter so some other boy may have the opportunity of owning a registered Jersey heifer.

Farm Security Loans Explained by Frank Seale, Parmer County Chief

The Farm Security Administration has changed its improvements requirements for farm ownership loans. Frank Seale, local FSA Supervisor said, "This gives us a chance to approve some loans in this county. Heretofore with the high price of land and the high price of buildings it has been almost impossible to buy an economic farm unit in Parmer County and stay within the \$12,000 limit that has been placed on farm ownership loans."

Now loans can be made for farms with minimum buildings consisting of a liveable house, and such other buildings as the applicant would require to carry on his farming operations. There will be no requirements as to the inside fixtures of the house.

Aubrey Cannon, a GI of the Hub Community has already filed an application for a GI Tenant Purchase loan. "Under this program," Mr. Seale advised, "this application apparently meets all the requirements that have been outlined. The farm consists of 320 acres and has the essential buildings."

The other type of loan under the farm ownership program is the farm enlargement loan.

Farm enlargement loans can be used by owners of small farms to buy additional land, refinance land debts, and to construct buildings. This loan has the limit of \$12,000 too.

Mr. Seale said, "Funds are available for these loans for GI and other farm families."

Most of the farmers in this area are somewhat familiar with the farm ownership repayment plan. It is a variable repayment schedule based upon the borrower's record of his income and expenses. The payment due will be his income for the year less his family and farm operating expenses and less his family and farm operating expenses and less the necessary amount needed by the family for buying equipment.

This repayment plan has worked very satisfactory on the six tenant purchase loans previously made in this county. Under this plan the borrower has 40 years to repay the loan. The interest rate is 3%.

There loan applications can be made at the Farm Security Office in the court house at Farwell.

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COGITATIONS and APHORISMS of Jodok

It occurs to me that there is scarcely a newspaper, magazine or other periodical that is being put out for the purpose of disseminating news or information on any or all subjects that are of common interest to the rank and file of the people, that does not, from time to time, have something to say relative to the insufficient salaries of

teachers.
 I arrive at this conclusion from the fact that I have very little time for general reading, such of my time being scattered throughout the day in just a few minutes periods, yet I have seen many references to this fact. It is stated that some of the best teachers are leaving the profession simply because their salaries are not sufficient to provide them with the necessities of life and at the same time to meet the social and professional standards required of them, and to support and educate their children.

But, they can leave the teaching profession and secure employment in other lines of activity, which do meet such a demand upon them and at the same time allow more time for leisure or recreation.

As it occurs to me, the teaching profession, while it may be not what it should be and can be, is still the foundation of our vaunted civilization. As conditions are now and have been for ages, Education, which begins with the common school education, is the foundation stone for all that may be attained in either the professions of the crafts, and we be to us as a nation, or as a world family of nations, if it be allowed to lapse. Therefore, it behooves the general public to see to it that it does not lapse, especially for so trivial a matter as a sufficient amount of pelf in the way of salary. What are a few dollars when compared to the mental training of a child?

This, it occurs to me is not a matter so far away as to be almost "foreign" to us; but comes right to our hearthstone. Here is a question from a news letter sent out by the News Service of the West Texas State College: (Quote) "That 165 public school teachers have left their jobs in forty Panhandle towns since September, to take more attractive positions, is revealed in a recent study. Among

this number, 60 said they quit teaching to earn more money. Others mentioned that they felt their new jobs would be less exacting than teaching.

"In reply to a question concerning recommendations for getting and holding teachers of ability and good preparation, the school heads gave three:

1. Raise teachers pay to "respectable" levels.
2. Make teaching loads more reasonable.
3. Established a social status for teachers comparable with that of other professional workers." (End Quote).

For many years, while the local school was climbing from a 3rd class to a 1st class, State Accredited school, I was in very close touch with its condition and operation, and knew each of its teachers personally and intimately; but during the past decade and a half, my relation with the local school has been rather distant, and evidently by far the greater number of its teachers have, apparently, held a horror for, or a superior complex toward, an ordinary "street corner" philosopher and I have little opportunity to form an acquaintance with them.

Therefore, for this and sundry reasons, I do not know whether the local school board is paying our teachers salaries on a par with those by other schools of this county or of adjoining or neighboring counties. If it has not, and are not doing so, "more's the pity." Our young people deserve just as good and careful instruction as those of any other school in the and, and if they are getting that—and I have no reason to think that they are not receiving such—then our teachers deserve just as good salaries as any other teachers are getting, all other conditions being equal.

Well, I am not "going to seed" on this matter of salaries of which I know nothing but "what I read in the papers and magazines," or hear on the street corners. I am a firm believer in the theory of "Cause and Effect," and that any question that has not two sides is NOT a question for want of the other side.

And here is something I read only last week, concerning the sort of instructions our young people are receiving in our colleges, high schools and even in our grade schools, throughout our land. However, I CANNOT

believe that the conditions referred to in that editorial can apply in the least to our local schools.

I read from so many papers and magazines that I soon become confused as to which contained the information as it later comes to my mind and such is the case regarding this editorial; but, at any rate, as I recall it now, it was in relation to a speech that had recently been made before the chamber of commerce of the city in which the paper was published, and the speaker was supposed to know whereof he spoke, and spoke as "one having authority and not as the Scribes and Pharisees."

The import of the speech was to the effect that the instructions being given to the students of the said colleges, high schools and in some instances, the grade schools, was of such a nature as to fill the minds of their students with sentiment, viewpoint and outlook perfectly in line and in league with what is commonly identified as Communism, Socialism, Utopianism and many other similar isms, that are commonly considered absolutely foreign to what is, and has been identified as "AMERICANISM."

I am ignorant of the truth of such conditions. Personally, I know nothing of the facts in the matter, and am writing only from what I have read and heard on the street corners. But in the event such is the case, is not ANY salary at ALL, too much for such instructors? Regardless of the merits of any such "isms" above mentioned, it is evidently not the purpose of our public institutions of

Million Victory Gardens in Texas This Year Wanted by Agriculture Dept.

The "Victory Garden" program inaugurated during the war will continue this year if Secretary of Agriculture Clinton P. Anderson has his way. "Why change the name?" says Anderson. "The war is over but Victory is not complete and will not be complete until the wounds have been healed, the good earth is in full production again, and the starving victims of war are eating regularly again."

Latest reports from all over the world indicate that the food shortage in Europe and Asia has developed into an international crisis far worse than was indicated three months ago, the Department of Agriculture had advised the local Agricultural Extension Services.
 "Drastic measures are being taken by our government, and by the United Nations, but every citizen in the community, coun-

ty, state and nation must help if we are to prevent mass starvation in the rest of the world," Anderson says.

County Home Demonstration Agent, Miss Sadie Lee Oliver, and the County Agriculture agent, Hugh Clearman, have both been supplied with information on growing of gardens this year, and offer the information and assistance to all who will cooperate.

A million gardens were grown in Texas last year, and the USDA estimates that as many or more will be necessary this year if the food situation is to be appreciably relieved.

The local agents are urging that all available land, in town and on the farms, be planted in gardens this spring.

Fertilizers for Irish Potatoes Recommended

COLLEGE STATION.—The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station recommends that commercial fertilizers for Irish potatoes in the High Plains area of Texas be applied at the rate of 600 pounds of 8-12-4 or 800 pounds of 6-8-4 fertilizer per acre.

A tremendous increase in the number of irrigation wells dug recently, and the newness of pump irrigation are taken by D. L. Jones, superintendent of the Lubbock substation, to indicate an eventual increase in High Plains acreage devoted to some intensive crop with potentially high returns.

Irish potato production is a comparatively new crop in the High Plains, and an active demand and high prices received during the war period preclude any forecast as to the future economic importance of its production in that area.

Some of the factors met in Irish potato production in that part of the State are analyzed



Veteran's Loans Simplified by Recent Changes

Veterans who have decided to solve their own personal housing problem by buying a home will find the process of obtaining government guaranteed loans has been considerably simplified by recent changes in laws governing such loans. The amended laws make it possible for a veteran to obtain a home loan in a matter of days, where before the procedure took several weeks in some cases.

In the past, the veteran did not obtain his home loan from a lending agency until the Veterans Administration had approved the loan. Now, the government guarantee goes into effect immediately when the borrower and a qualified lender close their deal. The loan papers need not be submitted to the VA until after the veteran has completed arrangements for his loan with the lender.

Under the old law, a veteran could not obtain a government-guaranteed loan if appraisal showed the property was priced at more than its "reasonable normal value." In view of current inflated real estate prices, this provision prevented many veterans from obtaining loans. This phrase has now been amended to read "reasonable value," recognizing the fact that most homes are priced at more than their normal, pre-war value.

Further information on government-guaranteed loans may be obtained from the nearest Veterans Administration contact office. In addition, many banks, building and loan associations and other lending agencies have set up special "veterans' departments" to advise veterans planning to buy homes.
