TEXAS BOND ISSUES **ARE NOW IN DEMAND**

Market Is Materially Improved and Money is Getting Easier.

Austin, Tex.-Within recent weeks more bond records have been submitted to the attorney general's department than before the war. The bond market is materially improving and the reduction in the interest rate proves that money is easier and there is a greater demand for Texas securi-

It has become noticeable in the attorney general's department that the new bond issues are with few exceptions bearing 5 per cent annual inter-While the market was sluggish the interest was usually on a 6 per cent basis. A very few issues now call for 51/2 per cent, the tendency being downward as the market gets bet-

trinkets she begins to speak of her | An effort is to be made to have the next legislature amend the statutes so as to standardize Texas bond issues. It is claimed by investment bankers that this will make a better market for Texas securities and enable the counties, cities and improvement districts to more readily sell their bonds and get a shade better price for them.

> Among the suggestions for the new law is that the bonds be in uniform denominations, preferably \$1,000 each, have annual interest obligation and uniform method of paying interest. At present the bonds vary as to the nual interest, and various methods and places are fixed for paying the interest. Bond buyers have to study each bond issue separately to ascertain the terms imposed therein. Standardization would end this work and uncertainty, it is claimed.

TRUCK SHIPMENTS **WILL BE HEAVIER**

Texas Produce Is Expected to Produce About 19,000 Carloads.

Dallas, Tex.-Texas will ship up wards of 19,000 carloads of early vege tables this year, according to figures compiled by the Texas Chamber of Commerce from various government and private reports. This figure does not include the heavy shipments of later vegetables and other small crops, which will bring the probable total to 60,000 carloads for the year.

Texas during the past few years has kept abreast of Florida and California as an early shipper to Northern and Eastern markets. According to recent government reports, Texas had, up to the close of April, shipped approximately 10,000 carloads of cabbage, onions, spinach, white potatoes, strawberries and mixed vegetables of the 1922 season and government estimates show that approximately 9,000 more carloads of these products will be shipped from Texas before the close of the early market season. This is an increase of 3,000 carloads over shipments to April 30 of last season, and govern ment statistics show that the total ear ly vegetable production in Texas will Samuel Gompers, president of the run about 7,000 carloads ahead of the American Federation of Labor. The total production of approximately 11,-000 carloads last season.

> Texas has shown a large increase in cabbage production over the past year, 3,596 cars having been shipped to the close of April as against 1,646 to the same date last year. The production of cabbage this season will run up ward of 5,000 carloads as against a pro duction of 1,671 carloads last year. The early cabbage production is practically all in the lower Rio Grande Val-

Texas is the premier Bermuda onion shipping state in the union, and this year's crop shows an increase over that of the last season; 2,998 carloads of early onions had been shipped previous to April 31 according to government reports as against 2,104 cars of the same date last year. The 1922 production of onions is estimated at 4,400 carloads as against the produc tion of 4,208 carloads last year. Texas onion crop is grown largely in Webb County, near Laredo.

The spinach crop of Texas this year will approximately equal that of last year, the last year's crop being 1,459 carloads. The spinach season has closed with a total shipment of about 1,430 cars. The spinach of Texas is grown in Travis County, Webb County and points south of San Antonio.

Unless growing conditions change decidedly in East Texas, that territory will produce over 3,000 carloads of tomatoes this year as against a production of 1,488 carloads

last year. Though Texas does not rank high among the states as a shipper of strawberries, yet the Lone Star State furnishes more of this product to the market than the average citizen of the state would guess. The production this year will be approximately 88 cars as against 67 carloads in 1921.

Outside of the above mentioned vegetables, there has been shipped from the state this season 1,671 carloads of mixed vegetables as against shipments of 1,078 caripads to date last season. The total shipments this year will run upwards of 2,000 carloads as against 1,268 carloads last year.

The watermelon and cantaloupe crops will be on the market shortly. A production of 350 cars of cantaloupes is forecast by the United States de partment of agriculture as against 224 cars last year. The Texas watermelon acreage this year is estimated at 37,000, an increase of 20 per cent over last season.

Market fluctuations make it difficult to estimate the value of these crops, but the total figure for early market crops will not be far from \$6,000,000, using prices received by farmers as a basis for computation.



Only two items in the report showed ncreases, "other resources" and "assessment for gauaranty fund," All of the others, including depos a, loans and capital stock, show decreases.






