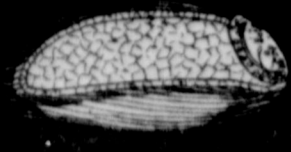

ARMY TRAINING CAMPS OPENED

About 10,000 Young Men Study to Become Reserve Officers.

Washington—Summer training camps were opened everywhere over the country Thursday under army supervision for youths of the reserve officers' training corps, part of the machinery of the new defensive military policy set up in the national defense act of 1920.

The corps now includes approximately 10,000 young men under training to become members of the officers' reserve corps, or officers of the national guard, and of these it is estimated that 7134 began the summer work of intensive field training at the camps. The courses mapped out for the student officers cover the whole field of military science. Particular attention is being devoted to the work by the war department, as the R. O. T. C. is relied upon in future to produce annually enough new reserve officers to keep the reserve officers' corps up to the strength necessary to fill in the officer framework of the organized work division of the army of the United States.

It has been calculated that the camps this year will result in at least 2000 potential officers being added to the reserve corps for assignment to organized reserve units, or to be commissioned in national guard regiments. Ultimately it is planned to expand the training work so that an annual crop of 10,000 reserve officers will be forthcoming.

Attendance at the summer training camps of the army this year, it is indicated, will be the greatest to date. By corps areas, the attendance at the training corps camps is expected to aggregate as follows:

First corps, 721; second corps, 605; third corps, 985; fourth corps, 1330; fifth corps, 777; sixth corps, 703; seventh corps, 944; eighth corps, 567; ninth corps, 691.

HASSELL CALLS ATTENTION TO DRILLING REGULATIONS

Austin, Tex.—Chief Supervisor J. W. Hassell of the oil and gas division of the railroad commission Friday called attention to the fact that many operators in the coastal fields are under a misapprehension as to rule 37, which prohibits the drilling of wells nearer than 150 feet of a boundary line, or 300 feet of a producing well. There is a provision of the rule as follows: "Rule 37 shall not for the present be enforced within the proven oil fields of the gulf coast."

The rule was adopted November 26, 1919, and it is the construction of the chief supervisor that the exception or exemption from the rule applies only to fields proven at that time and not to the new fields being brought in.

COTTON SEED OIL REDUCTION IS SHOWN

Washington—The cottonseed and cottonseed products report for the 10 months period, ending May 31, announced Friday by the census bureau, showed:

Cottonseed crushed 2,959,098 tons, compared with 2,497,337 for the same period a year ago, and on hand at mills, May 31, 23,319 tons, compared with 129,624 a year ago.

Crude oil produced 915,675,477 pounds compared with 1,252,185,211 and on hand 23,801,145 pounds compared with 71,781,973.

Refined oil produced 815,132,938 compared with 1,065,158,608 and on hand 254,796,287 pounds compared with 244,022,137.

Cake and meal produced 1,242,088 tons, compared with 1,714,778 and on hand 109,600 tons, compared with 84,157.

Linters produced 291,306 bales, compared with 424,212 and on hand 191,717 bales compared with 180,448.

Exports for the ten months: Linters, 110,517 bales compared with 41,435; oil and meal exports not available.

Port of Petrograd Open.

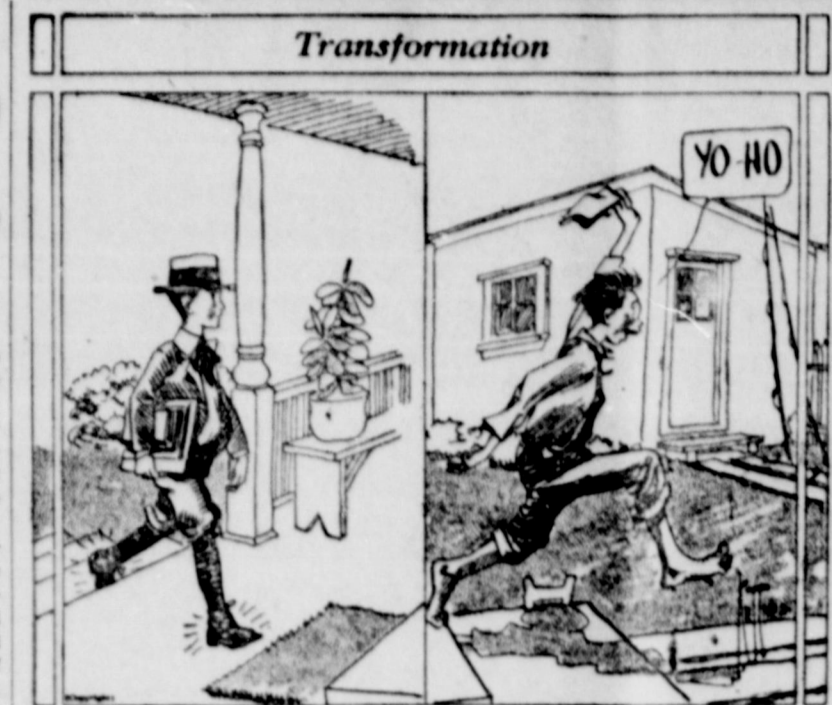
London—The port of Petrograd is now open and five ships carrying American relief administration cargoes have already been routed here. They are loaded with supplies for adult sufferers in Russia. The opening of Petrograd will ease the problem of the American Relief administration shipping representatives in the Baltic. Of the 600,000 tons of supplies which the American relief administration is sending to Russia, 425,000 have already arrived at either Baltic or Black sea ports. Enough of this food has reached the Volga valley to maintain free feeding of 8,000,000 persons.

Mrs. Mallory Defeated.

London—Mrs. Molla Bjurstedt Mallory, the American lawn tennis woman champion, was defeated in the semifinals of the Kent tennis championship in women's singles at Beckenham Friday by Miss McKane, the British star. The score was 6-1, 2-6, 6-3.

Well Gets Showing.

Trinity, Tex.—The well on the Esat-ham State farm, near Weldon, is showing signs of oil and gas.



TEXAS RAILROADS AGREE TO RATES HOUSTON RIOTERS TERMS REDUCED

State Commission to Make Cut, Effective July 1, on All Lines. Several of the 63 Former Soldiers of 24th Infantry Receive Commutations.

Austin, Tex.—There will be no opposition by the railroads of Texas to the proposition of the state railroad commission to reduce the intrastate rates all along the line in the same proportion that the interstate rates have been reduced by the interstate commerce commission. Final acquiescence in this decision has been made at a conference held in Austin attended by more railroad attorneys and traffic heads than have assembled in that city since the days when the commission had its unrestricted jurisdiction.

By virtue of the position of the railroads the state rates will be reduced, effective July 1, to where the increase of August 26, 1920, will be 21.5 per cent over the then existing tariffs instead of the 35 per cent as was ordered by the interstate commission.

A formal statement in behalf of the railroads, outlining their position of voluntarily accepting the interstate reduction for application in Texas, will be made to the commission by Judge E. H. Perkins, general attorney of the Cotton Belt and dean of the railroad counsel attorneys of Texas. Statements will also be made by other railroad representatives giving the position of their lines.

INCOME TAX FROM TEXAS \$25,400,849

Washington—Residents of Texas for the calendar year of 1920 as shown by figures as issued by the internal revenue bureau, paid an income tax on personal returns of \$25,400,849, which was slightly more than two per cent of the total for the country. There were 224,617 returns made to the collectors, which was less than 5 per cent of the total population, but 3 per cent of the total for the country, and the Texans reported net incomes aggregating \$720,720,162, a sum of 3 per cent of the total of the United States.

Less than 7 per cent of the people of the United States based upon total population made returns for the year, the bureau reports show.

The average net income per return from Texas was about \$12,200, upon which the government collected an average of \$113. The per capita net income reported for the state was \$154, and the per capita income tax \$5.45. The average for the country over was \$10.14 per capita.

The number of returns for the state has grown from slightly more than 10,000 in 1916 to more than 224,000 in 1920, while the net income increased from \$113,278,937 in 1916.

Texans in 1916 paid \$2,643,900 tax but the high year was 1919, when their payments aggregated \$32,302,280.

June Bugs Injure Fig Trees.

Corpus Christi, Tex.—June bugs have been doing considerable damage to fig trees during the last few weeks, according to local growers. In many instances trees were completely stripped by the bugs. A way has been found to combat the bugs by placing a lighted lantern in a tub of water and shaking the bush. The bugs will then fly to the light, alighting in the tub of water.

Settle Lockout in England.

London—By 76,478 votes against 39,427, the Amalgamated Engineering Union has voted for acceptance of the employers' proposals for the settlement of the lockout in the engineering industry.

Sweet Potato Meet.

Dallas—Representatives of sweet potato growers in sixteen counties were in Dallas Thursday considering organization of a state exchange to market their products.

THIRD WAGE SLASH FOR RAILROAD MEN

Labor Board's Ruling Affects 300,000 Clerks, Station Men and Signal Men.

Chicago.—Pruning nearly \$27,000,000 from the annual payroll of 325,000 railway employes, by cutting clerks, signal men and stationery firemen from 2 to 6 cents an hour, the United States railroad labor board Friday announced another wage slash, bringing total reductions under the board's orders up to \$135,000,000 beginning July 1. The clerks were cut 1 and 4 cents an hour, according to their classification, the signal men 5 cents and firemen 2 cents.

Approximately 1,200,000 railway employes will share the total reduction which will result in a strike vote of 10 railway labor bodies. The voting is already under way in seven unions and the other three affected by Friday's order are expected to mail their ballots immediately.

A dissenting opinion protesting against any reduction was included in the decision, as was the case in the two previous cuts for the maintenance of way laborers and the shopmen. The minority decision Friday was signed by Arthur O. Wharton and Albert Phillips, both labor members. W. L. McManimen, the third member of the labor group is in the East on an investigating trip for the board.

Definite recognition of a "living wage" and "saving wage" was made for the first time by the board in Friday's decision. Although abnormal post-war conditions were pointed out as obstructions to fixing any scientific basis for saving wages at present the board declared that as soon as this condition cleared away it would "give increased consideration to all the intricate details incident to the scientific adjustment of such a wage."

The bulk of those hit by the new cut will be 200,000 clerks, those with two years experience or more, are cut 3 cents an hour. Other clerks are cut 1 cent, and beginners instead of the former minimum months pay of \$67, will get \$60. After the first six months they will receive \$70 instead of the former rate of \$77.50. Storekeepers, chief clerks, train and engine crew members, train announcers and baggage room employes will be cut 3 cents.

Under the 4-cent reduction come janitors, watchmen, office boys, messengers, and freight handlers as well as common laborers around stations and warehouses.

Telephone girls who, the board declared, have suffered from disproportionate increases and decreases heretofore, received the most welcome news of the order when a minimum wage of \$5 a month was fixed by the board with the further proviso that any "hello girls" who receive more than that amount at present shall not suffer any reduction.

The 12,000 signalmen received the heaviest cut of the group, being reduced five cents an hour, with helpers suffering a 6 cent slash. Signal foremen, assistant foremen and inspectors, however, escaped with no reduction whatsoever.

The 5,000 train dispatchers likewise escaped a cut, the board declaring the nature of their work and their responsibilities warranting continuance of the present rates.

Stationary engineers, firemen and oilers numbering 10,000 escaped with the smallest slice from their pay envelopes, being cut only two cents an hour.

Executives of the firemen and oilers union, the signalmen and the clerk's brotherhood met, at a conference with eight other labor unions in Cincinnati last week, to issue a strike ballot if their wages were reduced. The six shop crafts and the maintenance of way union also in conference already have their strike vote under way. The other participating union, the telegraphers, did not receive a cut and is not expected to ballot at this time. A decision covering the 75,000 telegraphers will be issued by the board later.

The board explained that the clerks' cut was lighter than some other classes because they had "suffered considerable loss from certain changes in their rules and because they have never been highly paid compared with other classes." The greater reduction for beginners was ascribed to the fact that the majority "have not as yet assumed family responsibilities."

Amendment by Briggs Accepted.
Washington—The house committee on merchant marine and fisheries Friday voted to accept the amendment offered by Representative Briggs of Texas, that there shall be no discrimination against any port in the designation and maintenance of trade routes.

Live Stock Body Formed.

Cameron, Tex.—A live stock association, to be known as the Milam County Pure Bred Live Stock and Poultry Association, has been organized in the county.

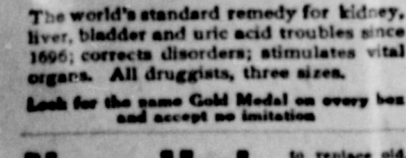

Texas News

San Augustine club boys will join the Shady club boys in their encampment, July 11, which will be held at the crystal lake, at Joaquin, Texas.

The election at Franklin for an increase in the local school tax from 50c to \$1 on the \$100 valuation carried by a good majority.

The school bonds of the Center independent school district have been approved by the attorney general.

The attorney general's department has approved an issue of \$25,000 county of Blanco road district No. 1 bonds, payable serially and bearing 5 1/2 per cent interest.

Plans for the highway leading from Timpson to a connection with the Atascocoches highway at the Atascocoches river, have been completed.

Harvesting of wheat will begin in the Texas Panhandle this week. It is estimated that 1,925,000 acres of winter wheat will be cut in Texas this year. Most of this is in the Panhandle.

Three new freight houses will be built in Texas in the near future by the Missouri, Kansas & Texas railroad. The freight houses will be built at Wichita Falls, Fort Worth and Waco.

Anderson county farmers have been reaping rich financial returns from this season's tomato crop, and it is predicted it will be the most profitable season they have ever enjoyed in the growth of tomatoes.

Approval has been given by the Texas railroad commission to the M. K. & T. railroad to dismantle its present shops at Denison and to construct new shops and terminal facilities to cost approximately \$3,000,000.

The state fire insurance commission has awarded good fire record credits to two additional towns, Gunter and Kirvin, each receiving the maximum allowance of 15 per cent off the final calculation, with three-year loss ratios of .165 and .097, respectively.

County Judge Sommerlatte has been notified by the attorney general that the \$200,000 bond issue to be used in building public highway from Sweet Home via Hallsville to the line of Lavaca and Fayette counties, near Schulenburg, has been approved.

The Port Arthur independent school district has called an election to be held on July 1 for the purpose of voting on the proposition of issuing bonds in the sum of \$675,000 to make additions to the present high school building and the DeQuenneville building.

The date of the annual encampment at Camp Mabry of cavalry units of the Texas National Guard, which had tentatively been set for July 6-21, has been changed to August 16-31, inclusive. The infantry encampment is to open July 28 and continue fifteen days.

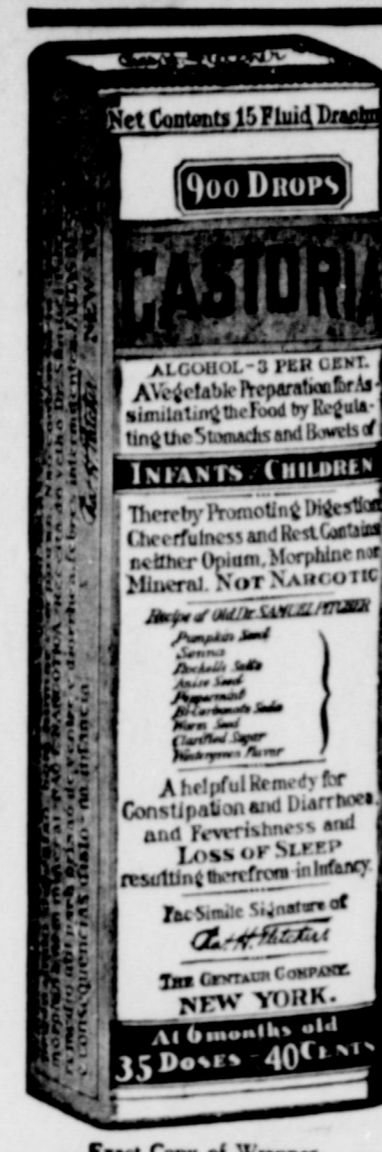
Texas has upwards of 100,000,000 acres of cultivable land, of which less than one-third is now improved. This small percentage of cultivable land has for the past three years led all other states of the union in total value of agricultural products by a wide margin. When fully developed, Texas will produce annually three or four times the value of the agricultural products of any other state in the union.

There was a decrease in the average cost of maintaining the state's wards during the month of May, as compared to the average during the nine months of the fiscal year, which began September 1 last. During May the average cost maintenance per capita was \$19.64 as against \$22.28 for the nine months including May. These figures are for sixteen state institutions and do not include the Northwest Texas insane asylum at Wichita Falls, recently opened.

The attorney general's department has approved the following bond issues: Plano sewer bonds, \$40,000, maturing serially, 6 per cent interest; Moran water works, \$35,000, maturing in thirty-five years with ten-year option, 6 per cent; Coke county common school district No. 11, \$2,000, maturing in twenty years with five-year option, 6 per cent; Houston independent school district, \$6,000, maturing in twenty years, 6 per cent; Marathon independent school district, \$20,000, maturing serially, 6 per cent.

Eighty-five warehouses carrying cotton in storage and which are under jurisdiction of the state market and warehouse department, show a total of only 4,304 bales in them, according to T. R. Hollis, state marketing agent, who has made an inquiry into the report that a shortage of cotton exists in Texas. "That no confusion may follow with respect to this report, cotton in private warehouses in the hands of cotton buyers, on the compresses and at export points in the state is not included," said Mr. Hollis. "Many of the warehouses reported no cotton on hand."

Texas is a considerable producer of fruits, ranking high among the peach producing states of the union, with an average of about 4,000,000 bushels annually. Plums, prunes, apricots, apples and pears are also being produced in commercial quantities. About 1,000,000 pounds of figs are harvested annually, and within a few years Texas will rank with California and Florida as a producer of oranges and grapefruit. Citrus trees are now bearing in the Rio Grande valley and thousands of additional trees are annually reaching the age of maturity.

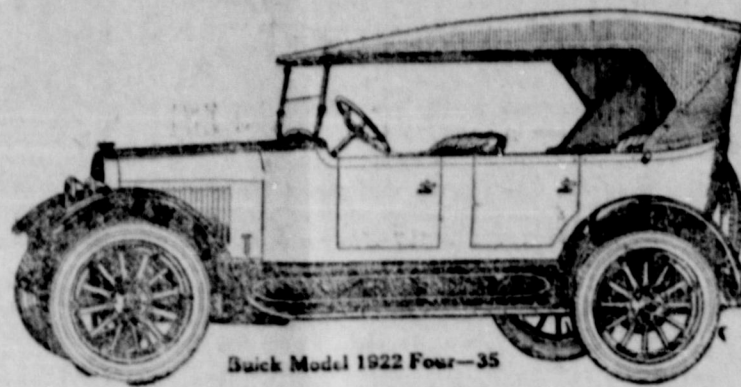

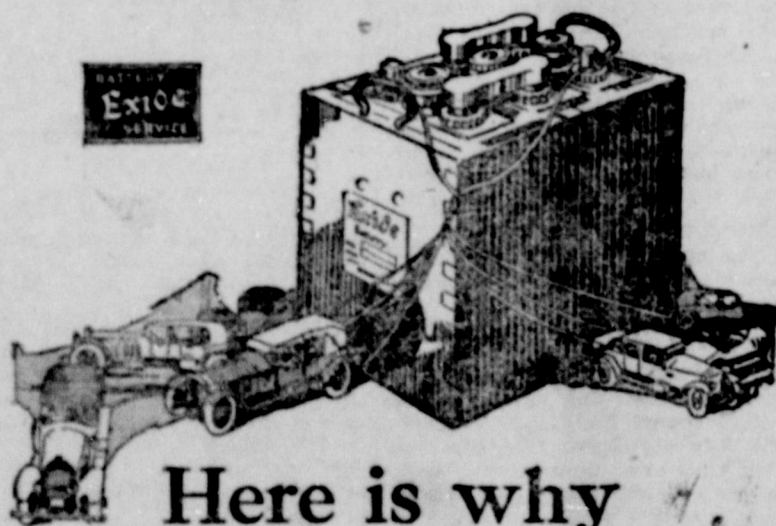
