

That ordinary soap should not be used on the highly polished surface of the body of the car, because soap usually contains free alkali or lye which enables it to cut the dirt and grease loose, but, at the same time, injures the varnished surface and wears off the attractive gloss which is the pride of the new car owner.


The best method is to us hose alone, removing the nozzle so that the flow of water comes out slowly and does not tear the grit against the gloss of the car. If a hose is not available, a large sponge and a pail of water may be used, but care should be taken to rinse the sponge after practically every stroke, in order to avoid scratching the finish. A mixture of a gallon of linseed oil with a half-pint of good varnish makes an excellent renewal agent for a surface which has begun to dull. As this is designed only to freshen up the rarnish, the mixture should not be sticky, but sufficiently oily to impart a luster without catch-

Washington .- The \$4,000,000,000 soldiers' bonus bill was passed Thursday by the senate.

The vote was 47 to 22, with party lines wiped out. The roll call follows: For the Bonus.

The bonus bill as passed by the senate provides: A world war veteran may make application for one of five optional bonus plans: Cash pay, paid up insurance certificate; vocational training aid, farm or home aid, or a 160-acre land settlement.

Though the application can be made at any time, paid up insurance certificates with a loanable value will not become effective until January 1, 1923. Thereafter banks of the nation are authorized to lend on these certificates not to exceed 50 per cent, except in a few instances, of the full face value, plus interest, from the date of the certificate to making of the loan. If the loan is made within three to six years of the date of the certificate the amount loaned can be up to 85 per cent of the value, and after six years up to 70 per cent of the value of the

certificate, both plus interest. Service men whose credit is not more than \$50 may receive this amount in cash, the payment to be made as soon as practicable after the bill is

Veterans choosing vocational training are entitled to an amount equal to their adjusted service credit, plus 40 per cent, at the rate of \$1.75 a day.

GRANTED WAGE INCREASE

Cincinnati.-Clerks and station employes on the El Paso & Southwestern railroad and clerks on the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railroad have effected settlements with the manage ments on the questions c' wages and working conditions, it was announced this week at the Brotherhood of Railway and Steamship Corks, Station and Express Employes.

The settlement on the El Paso & outhwestern railroad, according to statement issued at the clerks' neadquarters, affects 1200 clerks and station employes, who have been granted an increase of from 3 to 4 cents an hour, which restores the former wage scale in effect before the decision of June 30, 1922, of the railroad labor board, cutting the clerks and station employes' wages. Vacation and sick leaves and Saturday half holiday were restored the men under the settlement, it was said.






