Allred Wins Another Tilt In Attack On Fixing

AUSTIN, Mar. 28 (AP)-Judge J. D. Moore in District Court here today ruled the Texas anti-trust laws are constitutional.

The ruling was made in connection with hearing of the suit of Attorney General James V. Allred to expel 15 major oil companies from the State and to collect penalties amounting to \$17,850,000.

The court next will consider special exceptions before trial of the case on the main facts begins

The attorney general in a lengthy petition, alleged the oil companies and the petroleum associations had violated the Texas anti-trust laws the first gift made by Mr. and Mrs. est gift bring their philanthropies by a conspiracy to obtain control of market outlets for gasoline and refined oil products. Under the purported agreement the companies agreed to follow certain practices set out in a "code of ethics" in marketing their pproducts.

The attorney general alleged the code was a thin guise to cover the real intent of the companies which was to throttle independent competition and monopolize market outlets. He also claimed the "code of ethics" in marketing their prices.

After losing three preliminary jousts, the oil companies attacked the constitutionally of the antitrust laws, claiming inclusion of an unconstitutional law in the revised penal statutes of 1925 rendered the whole body of anti-trust laws invalid. 




