No season of the year would be more appropriate to commemorate His resurrection than this adopted season. This is the time of year when nature provides us with visible evidence of a resurrection.

We have had since early childhood a simple belief in the story of the crucifixion and the resurrection. We believe that every mortal man, from the highest prelate to the lowest of God's creation, has many, many times crucified our Lord. All who have sought forgiveness have experienced a resurrection in their own lives. We believe there is little, if any, difference of opinion on that matter.

Differences of opinion prevail in any community, but, with the natural beauty of our surroundings, there could be one of the most spectacular Easter sunrise services here with the cooperation of every Christian church participating. A cordial invitation has been extended to everyone in the community to attend the services.

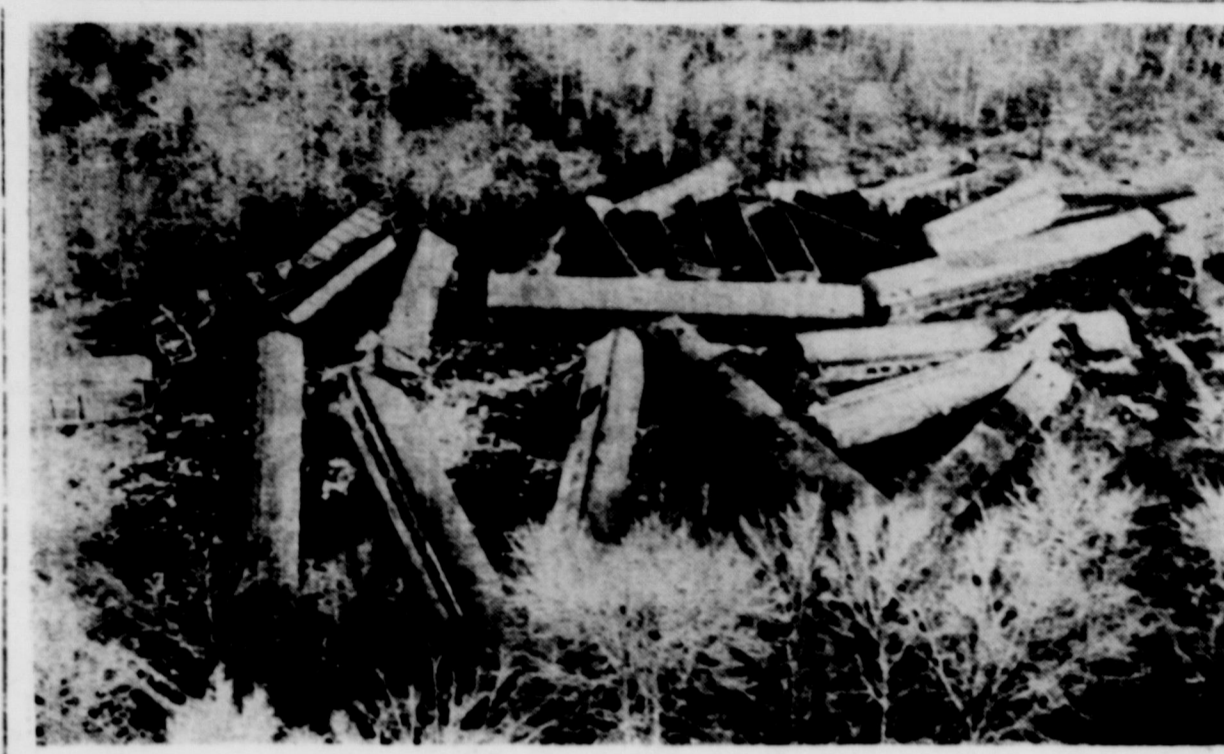
**Band To Go To Kermit April 11 for Contest**

**Jamie Mitchell Found After 7-Hour Search On Brown Ranch Sunday**

Little Jamie Mitchell, 3-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Billy Mitchell who reside on the Herbert Brown "Divide Ranch", was found at approximately 5 p. m. Sunday after a 7-hour search by parents, relatives and friends of the little lad. He was unharmed, calm, but hungry when he and his little red Pekinese dog were returned to the ranch house by his great-uncle, Judd Montgomery, of Fort Stockton, who was visiting on the Mitchell ranch when the boy wandered off.

Jamie was last seen playing in the yard about 9:15 or 9:30 and was missed shortly before 10. Montgomery and the boy's parents began searching for the boy in the adjacent barns and pens. When they were unable to locate him in the immediate vicinity of the house, they called to their neighbors for help and, after the word was spread, by noon there were about 20 or 25 people on hand to continue the searching. Herbert Brown, operator of the ranch, and Joe Kerr, Jr., flew out to the ranch from Sanderson and carried on the search by plane until he was found. By 4 p. m. there were about 125 people, on horseback, in jeeps and afoot combing the flat country surrounding the house.

The ranch is about 32 miles north of Dryden. Montgomery, with several others, was searching in a canyon about 1 1/4 miles from the house and Montgomery was calling the boy's name, desperately hoping for an answer, when he heard the answer from the bottom of the

**Curb and Gutter Crews To Begin Work Here Next Week**

W. A. Davis, resident engineer of the Texas Highway Department, announced this week that H. B. Zachry, low bidder on the local street project and highway construction extension of the newly constructed highway east of town, would send crews in next week to begin their work in this area.

Davis stated that the work of construction on both projects would be carried on simultaneously and that completion was expected to be before October 15.

He stated that detailed plans have been made to carry on the work on the highway through town so that there will be a minimum of disadvantage and inconvenience to local business men as well as local citizens.

**Only \$370 Received In Red Cross Drive**

Since contributions to the Red Cross are coming in slowly, the time of the present drive has been extended, according to an announcement made this week by Marshall Cooke, chairman of the drive.

With a quota of \$999 to be raised in the county, only \$370 has been contributed to date.

Miss Eleanor Hanna, special fund representative, was in Sanderson Wednesday to confer with the drive chairmen and heads of committees connected with the drive.

She stated that recent figures showed that \$4.85 was required to collect and process one pint of blood for gamma globulin which is rescuing the children of the nation from the crippling effects of polio and for serum albumin which is bringing life into the veins of the battle-wounded servicemen of our country.

By contributing to the drive, other nation-wide programs to participate in will include disaster and services to the armed forces and veterans.

**76 of 205 Steers Go To Eagle Pass for Feed**

Seventy-six head of steers, the remainder of a shipment of 205 steers which had been consigned by Tom Bell of the Texas Livestock Marketing Association of San Antonio, were loaded last week end from local stock pens and shipped back to Eagle Pass, origin of shipment.

The steers that survive the trip will be put on an oats pasture, it was reported.

The balance of the shipment of steers died from what was believed to be arsenic poisoning, according to Bell.

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**Highlights and Sidelights FROM Your State CAPITOL**

 Austin, Texas — This is about the time when it seems that the Legislature is all bogged down in so many different bills that it will never get any where.  
 But the truth is that the lawmakers are making very good progress and may finish their business in the prescribed 120 days.  
 What clouds the picture is the variety of subjects before both houses. First and foremost, there's the appropriations bill. Then there are the subjects of four-year terms for county and district officials, water conservation, stream pollution, preferential primaries, modernization of colleges, and so on at great length.  
 And let's not forget taxes.  
 Maybe there won't be any new taxes.  
 It seems that economy forces are in control of both houses, and that they will keep the appropriations bill down to the amount of revenue the state can expect to receive during the next two years.  
 The House and Senate differed on the amount that should be appropriated. The House said \$160-million, while the Senate put the

figure at \$166-million.  
 The bill approved by the Senate would include pay raises for state employees and college teachers.  
 When House and Senate failed to agree, the appropriations bill went to a conference committee composed of economy-minded members representing both houses.  
 Hope for a quick stack of blue chips faded when three pipeline companies appealed to the State Supreme Court their case against the gathering tax on natural gas.  
 The tax was passed by the last legislature and has been in the courts ever since. The Third Court of Civil Appeals ruled last month that the tax is valid.  
 If the Supreme Court rules against the pipeline companies, it is expected that they will carry it to the U. S. Supreme Court.  
 Governor Allan Shivers and others have urged the companies to drop the suit and thereby permit the state to use the tax money already paid under protest, as well as the million dollars plus that is being collected monthly.  
 Money is needed for many state purposes. For example, state employees are leaving their jobs because of low pay.  
 Ninety-seven engineers have left the highway department during the last two years. At Austin State Hospital, 477 of 528 employees hired last year have resigned.  
 W. P. Watts, executive director of the Texas Public Employees Association, gave these and other figures to show that higher pay is needed to keep state workers on their jobs.  
 Requirements for highways, teachers, and water conservation have been frequently emphasized. It was hoped that the natural gas

 The Senate passed and sent to the House a bill providing for a presidential preferential primary in Texas.  
 The bill requires party delegates to cast their first ballot at the convention for the presidential and vice presidential candidates according to the choices expressed by the voters. On all ballots, the delegates would be bound to vote as a unit.  
 Senator Jimmy Phillips, author of the bill, said it is aimed at the elimination of boss rule and rump political conventions.  
 Senator Dorsey Hardeman opposed the bill, saying it would not achieve its purpose, but would only create confusion. He urged the Senate to wait and see what Congress might do about preferential primaries.  
 Both houses showed along toward final passage, a bill that would give four-year terms to county and district officials, and the house added an amendment to include state representatives.  
 Opponents said that only those officials who would benefit from the change are for it, and legislators are being browbeaten by county officials who favor it.  
 Backers of the bill said that the county and district officials ordinarily serve two two-year terms anyway, and elections every two years cost money and interfere with the officials' work.

**Health Authorities Offer Helpful Hints**  
 "Don't blow your nose so hard, junior," mother calls to son, "you may get sinus trouble."  
 Mother is perfectly right. Blowing your nose violently is one way of forcing infectious germs into the sinuses, the air spaces in the bones of the head. Sinusitis, as the disease is called, is an infection of the lining of these air spaces, all of which are connected with the nose by small openings. Their lining, or mucous membrane, is continuous with the lining of the nose. For that reason, infections of the nose, throat, and chest can travel to the sinuses, with unpleasant results.  
 Sinusitis is frequently painful. Inflammation of the nose or of the lining of the sinus may close the air space and block drainage. If the sinus is closed for any length of time, the air inside is used up and a vacuum forms which causes

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pain. Pus or other secretions may form and press on the sinus wall, also causing pain.  
 Sinus trouble can be caused in many ways, other than blowing your nose too hard. In addition to respiratory infections like colds, influenza, whooping cough, or diphtheria, causes may be one or more of the following: sudden chilling, poor diet, fatigue, allergies, infected teeth or tonsils, enlarged adenoids or other nasal obstructions.  
 Frequent use of sprays and antiseptics in the nose may injure the mucous membrane and bring on sinusitis. For this reason, alone, it is wise not to use nose drops or inhalants unless the doctor prescribes them. Sinusitis is too serious to try to treat yourself. Uncured, it may lead to more serious diseases like bronchitis, mastoid infection and arthritis.  
 Symptoms vary from person to person, but the most common are headaches, or pain over the infected sinus, dry and clogged nasal passages, or post-nasal drip. Other symptoms may include fever, cough, swelling of cheeks, eyelids or forehead and general fatigue.  
 If you suspect sinus trouble, see your doctor. There are a number of valuable drugs for the treatment of sinus infection. In severe cases, an operation may be necessary to open the sinus and allow it to drain.

**Home Hazard Hunt Urged As Precaution**

Austin, April 1. — Spring is the time for a home hazard hunt, according to Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer. Accidents in the home are the second leading cause of accidental death in Texas.

Each year about one thousand persons die as the result of accidents in the home.

Spring house cleaning time is a good time to remove the common hazards that cause so many home accidents. Attics, basements, and closets accumulate piles of junk. Piles of papers, magazines, broken furniture and other combustible material are dangerous fire hazards. In addition, rats, mice, cockroaches and other pests thrive in trash heaps.

Loose throw rugs are notorious for causing falls. Toys and other objects scattered over the floors and stairway often cause falls. Check the electrical cords and see that they are in good shape. Frayed electric cords have caused fires and sometimes fatal shocks.

While rounding up piles of junk, to throw away, don't forget to look into the garage, backyard and alleys. In your Spring clean-up check your garbage can. Be sure that it is of metal and see that it has a tight fitting lid. Cooperate with your neighbor in seeing that the community disposes of all garbage and trash in a sanitary manner.

This general clean-up, if carried out all through the year, will reduce home accidents and sickness or death from such causes as polio, typhoid fever, malaria, typhus and others.
