Chances are you didn't. The chances are you paid a pretty healthy slice of your income to the Federal government in taxes.

In our state there was some federal money paid in benefits of various kinds, such as subsidies, veterans' benefits, welfare assistance, old age payments and to the state government for highway construction.

The trouble is that for every \$100 you and the other people of Texas sent to Washington in taxes, only \$6.52 came back. This wouldn't be so bad if the amount each of us sends in to Uncle Sam weren't such a big part of our total income. In fiscal 1951, the 48 states and Hawaii sent \$65-billion to Washington and got back \$4.2-billion. This tax load is such that it makes it impossible to raise enough taxes to adequately operate our own state and local governments. Besides there is no possible chance to create a surplus for operating expenses in any kind of business or vocation.

We are waiting for President Eisenhower to go further in carrying out his announced desire to turn the trend from centralized government. He stated in his address to Congress at the beginning of his administration that centralized government was a "major national problem."

This country needs to encourage more responsibility and more self-reliance in local communities and the state. We need to reduce pressure upon Congress exerted by

communities to obtain federal aid.

Around town we noticed the Texas Highway Department office force moving out to their unfinished quarters . . . and the base going down on Oak Street which means we won't have to put up with dust too much longer . . . probably the first pickets ever around the telephone office . . . and we don't mean those kind on a fence . . . lots of clouds every day, but no rain locally . . . some felt hats being brought out for fall wear . . . fewer sick people now that we have two doctors, thank goodness . . . and another picture of another person fishing on a bare lot down town — they will probably swear they were trying out a new rod and reel.

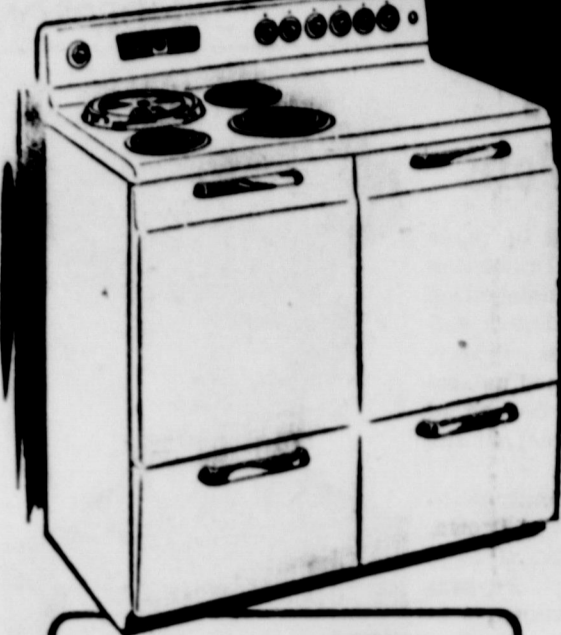
