Striping On Oak St. Marks Driving and Parking Lanes

Pvt. Richard Turner Selected to Attend Bliss Leader Course

Pvt. Richard L. Turner, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. R. Turner, has been selected to attend Leader's Course, the most advanced training program of the Anti-aircraft artillery replacement training center at Fort Bliss.

Pvt. Turner was one of a class of 25 chosen for the leadership class from a group of more than 400 soldiers. Appointments to the rigorous training course are based on demonstrated leadership abilities, high scholastic aptitudes, and have above average physical stamina.

The purpose of the course is to train potential leaders early in their military careers and develop them to lead troops as non-commissioned officers.

The first five weeks of training are a study of leadership principles, methods of instruction, and tactics. The last three weeks of the course emphasize practical exercise. During this period the men are placed in basic training units in the AA RTC to instruct troops in the various phases of training, from infantry drill to servicing and firing the light and medium anti-aircraft guns.

Graduation from the Leader's Course comes at the close of the eighth week of training and is climaxed by a formal parade and retreat ceremony.

Sanderson started on the short end of the score when an attempted quick kick hit an Eagle backfielder and was recovered by one of the Shorthorns. Larry Pippen scored the first TD for the Shorthorns on the next play. The try for the extra point was no good.

In the second quarter the Eagles fought down the field to about the 12-yard line where Higinio Pena, quarterback, tossed a pass to Tommy Mansfield who went across for the first Eagle score. Charles Stegall kicked the extra point.

Again in the second period, the Eagles scored after Gary Harrel had intercepted a Shorthorn pass, followed by a 24-yard run by Stegall and a 26-yard run by Raul Flores to the 14-yard line where Mansfield took a pitch-out from Pena and scored the second TD. Stegall again scored the extra point by a placement kick.

Five soldiers from Sanderson recently began 16 weeks of basic training in the Antiaircraft Artillery Replacement Training Center at Fort Bliss.

After 16 weeks they will be eligible for assignment in a permanent anti-aircraft artillery unit.

Three Per Cent Discount On 1953 Taxes Paid Now

About 1,150 tax statements for 1953 will be put in the mails next week for Terrell County taxpayers. The taxes, real and personal, become due and payable on October 1 and may be paid any time before February 1. However, as an inducement to get taxes paid at an early date, again this year a 3 per cent discount on all taxes, except the poll tax, will be offered to all county taxpayers during the month of October.

A two per cent deduction will be offered in November and 1 per cent offered for payment of taxes in December.

GARY GENE KIMBALL FRACTURES ARM SUNDAY

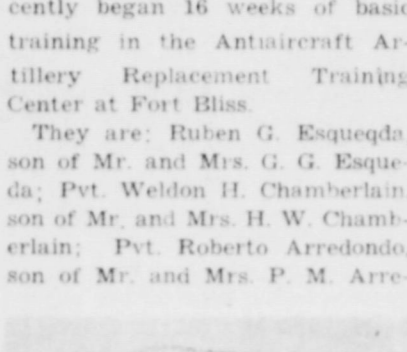

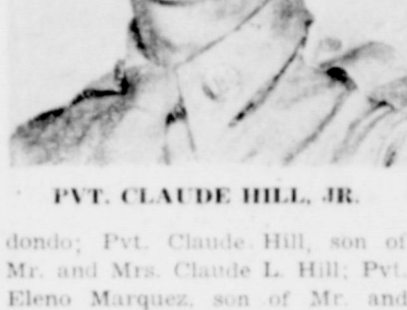

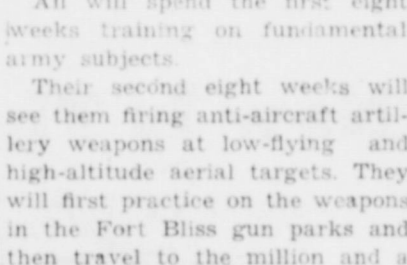

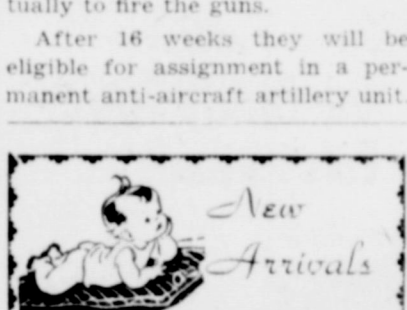

TWO WILDCATS SLATED IN COUNTY

The latter site is one mile southeast of the Ingram operation and both locations are in the extreme northeast block of the county in sections that border the Pecos River.

Parachute Jump To Be Featured At October Prison Rodeo

Huntsville — At this year's annual Prison Rodeo, where 22 years ago the first stock chute was opened to eject a convict rider astride a wild bull, a new sort of chute will open to waft a prison inmate groundward from an airplane 1,500 feet above to a landing in the same arena used for the first show in 1931.
 Barney Thurman, World War II paratrooper with a record of almost 50 jumps, serving a 3-year sentence, will make the spectacular leap into the Prison Stadium arena.
 Thurman, who is also a member of the National Parachute Riggers and Jumpers Association, when asked about the risk involved in the stunt, replied: "Parachute jumping isn't nearly as dangerous as riding those wild bulls. A parachute at least won't hook or stomp you once you're on the ground."
 Another act — one much talked about by the convicts behind Huntsville prison's walls — by another inmate will also be a new part of the annual rodeo.
 Marion Frazier, serving 59

years on Ramsey prison farm, has trained a prison born dog to perform a number of extraordinary routines. Mutt, as the dog is named, is said to be able to climb a ladder faster than a fireman, ride and propel a small scooter, jump through a hoop of fire, open a small gate, go through it on his hind legs, then close it behind him, plus other unusual tricks.
 Frazier, a native of Montague in North Texas, who for the past three years has been one of the bull-fighting inmate clowns of the prison show, says he has never before trained an animal — just thought he'd try his hand with Mutt after the pup was born on the Ramsey farm.

WTCC Urges Texans To Eat More Beef

Abilene — Texans who take pride in boasting of their state as the world's largest cattle range, are being asked to eat more beef this fall.
 With an already low-price picture to stare at, cattlemen have been told by their own industry representatives and by government authorities to expect a heavier-than-normal marketing of grass-fed cattle during the period September 15 to October 31.
 The Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers' Association called upon the West Texas Chamber of Commerce to "do something", and a state-wide campaign is now underway to encourage greater per-Texan consumption of beef during this period.
 The program was planned in July by the WTCC's agriculture and livestock committee with the assistance of restaurant, hotel, grocery and bankers associations as well as railroads and meat packers, state press and advertising associations, and from the U. S. Department of Agriculture, the National Livestock Board and the American Meat Institute.
 "It's a cooperative venture of Texas business to help a Texas industry to help itself," chairman of the regional chambers agriculture and livestock committee stated.
 Emphasis is being placed on appealing to the Texas housewife to use more of the lower cost cuts of beef in preparing her meals.
