1953 Hunting Rules Are Clarified

Here is the general run-down on the big game season for 1953-1954.

Black tail deer season will be from Nov. 20 to 25, both dates inclusive. Only one black tail with a pronged horn per season.

Bear season, if you happen to find one, is the same as deer season. Bag limit, one bear.

A hunting license is required of everyone, regardless of age or county of residence. An exemption license can be issued to any citizen under the age of 17 or any citizen who hunts on land on which he resides only. A license is required because they bear the deer tags. It is a violation of the law to possess a deer carcass without a tag attached, or with all signs of sex removed.

Landowners or lessors wishing to take hunters for pay can purchase the shooting preserve license from the county clerk.

Open season on ducks and geese is from November 6 to January 4, both dates inclusive. Exception: no open season on black-bellied tree ducks.

Five ducks per day can be taken or 10 in possession. Geese and brant, 5 per day or in possession, including not more than 2 Canada geese or 2 white fronted geese or one of each.

Duck stamps can be purchased at the post office. A license will be needed to hunt outside county of residence, and residence hunting licenses are needed in some counties.

"The Seal Sale, which will be conducted by mail throughout the county from November 16 through December, is the only source of funds for the tuberculosis prevention and control activities of the association," Mrs. Ezelle said. The local campaign will be a part of the 47th annual Christmas Seal Sale to be held throughout the country by the 3,000 voluntary associations affiliated with the National Tuberculosis Association.

Catholics To View 'Our Lady of Fatima' Statue Here Dec. 10

The world-famed statue of Our Lady of Fatima will be brought into the Sanderson area starting December 10 as part of a month-long program of prayer by Roman Catholics for world peace.

The prayers for peace have been ordered by the Most Rev. Sidney M. Metzger, Bishop of El Paso, throughout the Diocese.

A symbol of peace to Roman Catholics all over the world, the statue of Our Lady of Fatima has been on a continuous tour of 225,000 miles since arriving in the U. S. in late 1947, and an estimated 15 million persons have knelt in prayer before the statue.

Accompanying the statue will be the Right Rev. Monsignor William T. McGrath from New York and the Rev. Desmond Springer.

The statue will be displayed at the St. James Catholic Church in Sanderson on December 10.

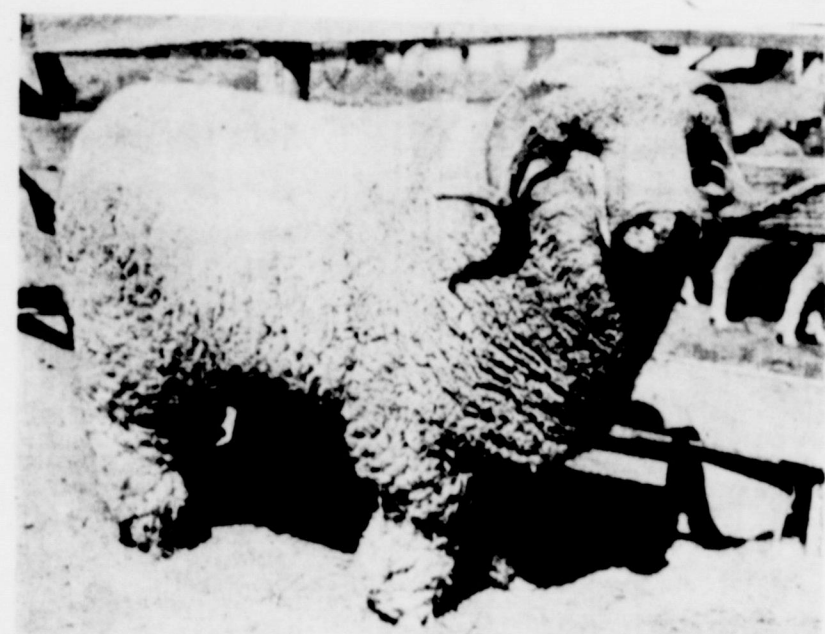
Lee Billings, who served for 18 months as deputy sheriff under Nance, was appointed to fill the unexpired term as sheriff and received the oath of office on November 2.

The Sanderson Eagles regained a little of their self-esteem in last Saturday night's ball game at Eagle Field by defeating the Lakeview B team 39-6. The game also gave the Eagle substitutes an opportunity to work gaining some experience and knowledge along with the hard hits of tackling and blocking.

The Eagles scored early in the first quarter when Carroll Eggleston went across from the 5-yard line and Tommy Mansfield converted the extra point. Also in the first quarter Mansfield went 40 yards after receiving a lateral, following a pass completed from Higinio Pena to Ochoa. The extra point try was no good.

In the third period Raul Flores went across from 1 yard out and Mansfield also scored on a 14-yard run and converted the extra point to put the half score 26-0.

In the third quarter Pena again passed to Ochoa and the play was good for 19 yards and another 5 points.

In the fourth period Pena chose to keep the ball on a wide end sweep and went 46 yards for the final tally. Charles Stegall converted the extra point on a running play.

The Lakeview score came in the fourth quarter on a 4-yard buck by Garmes, stalwart carrier for the team. Garmes set up the play by making a brilliant 80-yard run before being overhauled by Stegall just 4 yards short of the goal line.

Sanderson made 15 first downs to 5 for Lakeview.

The win by the Eagles followed wicked defeats at the hand of the Wink Wildcats and McCamey Badgers and the nose-out win by the Midland B team and put the Eagles back in the winning column with a little confidence in their ability before they go against the Van Horn Eagles here next Friday night in a conference game.

The last call for contributions from local citizens to two worthy projects has gone out this week. The Terrell County Tuberculosis and Health Association has been collecting materials for the new occupational therapy program recently inaugurated in the McKnight Sanatorium. Anyone having materials on hand or desiring to contribute new materials may leave the articles at The Kerr Mercantile Co. Articles requested include: embroidery and crochet needles, thread, sewing needles, embroidery hoops, wool yarn, knitting needles, textile paints, clean nylon hose, wood burning sets or needles, candlewick string, ribbons, felt pieces, sequins, small beads, reed, raffia, flower making sets, mesh sacks, patterns for embroidery or crafts, copper wire, any tools or equipment for leatherwork, wood craft or metal craft, or any other discarded hobby materials or tools that anyone may have that are still usable.

The Legion Auxiliary has been collecting gifts for the veterans' Christmas shops, a yearly project to which the public has always given generous response in the past. Gifts are selected by the hospitalized veterans who do not have an opportunity to go to town to shop for their family. Each veteran is permitted to select his gift free of charge from the generous supply that is provided for the gift shops.

Gifts are needed for members of immediate families of hospitalized veterans. They need not be wrapped and may be placed in boxes which are to be found at Spears-Duncan Drug Co. and at The Kerr Mercantile Co.

Local residents are requested to respond immediately to the plea for both projects in order that the sponsoring organizations may send their packages away. The rehabilitation program is already working and the Christmas gift shops are already open in the government hospitals.

LOCAL DROUTH FEED COMMITTEE GETS INSTRUCTIONS ON HAY PROGRAM

The Terrell County Drouth Emergency Feed Committee has announced that it has received instructions and other pertinent information on the long-discussed hay program. People desiring hay as a supplemental feed for the winter months to come, may make application through the local PMA office.

Briefly, the program will work as follows:

1. Ranchmen desiring hay will file application with the PMA office.
2. The application will be considered by the feed committee at its first meeting following the application, and approved if the application meets all the eligibility requirements.
3. If the hay is received, the rancher will then pay the dealer for the hay only. The dealer will be responsible for collecting the freight charges from the Texas Department of Agriculture. If the hay arrives by truck, the rancher will then pay for the hay and approximately one-half the freight. The State Department of Agriculture will pay one-half of the freight based on the railroad rates from the nearest shipping point where the hay was received, to the shipping point nearest the destination of the hay.

Hay as defined by the State Department of Agriculture, is any hay or roughage suitable for livestock feed. This includes all hay and bundle feed. At the present time, cottonseed hulls and dehydrated alfalfa cubes are not considered as hay or roughage.

A dealer is anyone that sells hay or roughage suitable for livestock feed and he should understand all rules and regulations set out by the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Ranchmen are limited to a 60-day supply of hay, based on 2 pounds of hay per sheep or goat, per day, and 10 pounds of hay per cow per day.

The only function of the PMA office in the hay program is to process a rancher's application and to issue him a certificate to purchase hay when his application is approved. It will collect no money or be responsible in any way for the quality or delivery of the hay.

Any new directives or changes that may occur on the hay program will appear in this paper. If further information is desired, it may be obtained through the local PMA office.

The containers are slotted so that they will receive either coins or checks.

In past years about 600 bags of goodies have been distributed to local tots and an equally large crowd is anticipated this year.
