### SCHOOL CENSUS TO BEGIN JAN. 1

According to a new law, the scholastic census will be taken this year beginning January 1, instead of the latter part of the school year as in the past.

Supt. Matt Bader announced last week that Mrs. W. J. Ferguson would take the census this year and would begin her calls Friday, planning to solicit the scholastics for the entire county.

The support of all residents of Terrell County is asked as the apportionment for the county will be partially based on the total number of the scholastics. Every child, whether in school or not, who is between the ages of 6 and 18 on September 1, 1954, will be included in the census.

### New Peak In SP's Operating Efficiency Reached in 1953

Southern Pacific reached a new peak of operating efficiency in 1953, reflecting the mounting results of its vast postwar improvement program, President D. J. Russell announced today in a year-end review of the railroad's operations.

The all-time high in operating efficiency was set in rolling up an estimated 53,040 gross ton-miles per freight train hour, 53 per cent more than ten years ago.

Southern Pacific's gross operating revenues for 1953 will be only about one per cent less than the all-time record set in 1952, the rail president estimated.

Improvements made in the company's services helped make possible the shortening of some freight train schedules to the fastest running times in the history of the railroad, Russell said. Through greater utilization of the railroad's highway truck subsidiaries, the transit time for less than carload traffic has been shortened in a considerable number of instances, he added. Further improvements in 1954 are contemplated.

More than three-quarters of the SP freight hauling now is being done by diesel locomotives.

The railroad's postwar purchases of new locomotives have averaged about one diesel unit every two days.

Southern Pacific took delivery of approximately 6,700 new freight cars in the year. More than half of its fleet of freight cars now consists of postwar equipment, SP having acquired 38,500 freight cars since the war.

Orders were placed for 25 more streamlined passenger cars in 1953 for delivery in 1954.

Among the major improvements completed this year was the installation of remote control train dispatching between Rosenberg and Harrisburg, Texas.

Ground was broken at Houston for a large push-button car classification yard.

Trailers-on-flatcar service for shippers, using trailers owned by the railroad's trucking subsidiaries, was inaugurated between several points on the company's lines.

"Southern Pacific looks forward to greater development of the territory it serves in the Far West and the Southwest, the fastest growing areas in the nation," Russell said.

### New Welfare Worker Named to District

Mrs. Catherine Hall of Imperial began duties last Tuesday as field worker for Terrell, Pecos, Upton and Brewster counties for the State Department of Public Welfare. Her headquarters will be at the court house in Fort Stockton.

A five-weeks orientation welfare training school was attended by Mrs. Hall prior to beginning her new assignment. The school is conducted by the State Department of Public Welfare to train the district workers who have been selected on the merit system examination.

Child welfare, old age assistance and aid for the needy blind and dependent children are covered in district welfare work. There are 337 active welfare cases in the four counties and of these 131 are in Pecos County.

"Since approximately 65 per cent of the welfare work money is derived from Federal sources, a thorough study was made of social security laws and other Federal laws which affect welfare work," said Mrs. Hall.

Trainees at the welfare school in Tyler were given first hand practical case investigation experience. Public relations and client agency relations were also considered as well as the general framework within which the district office operates.

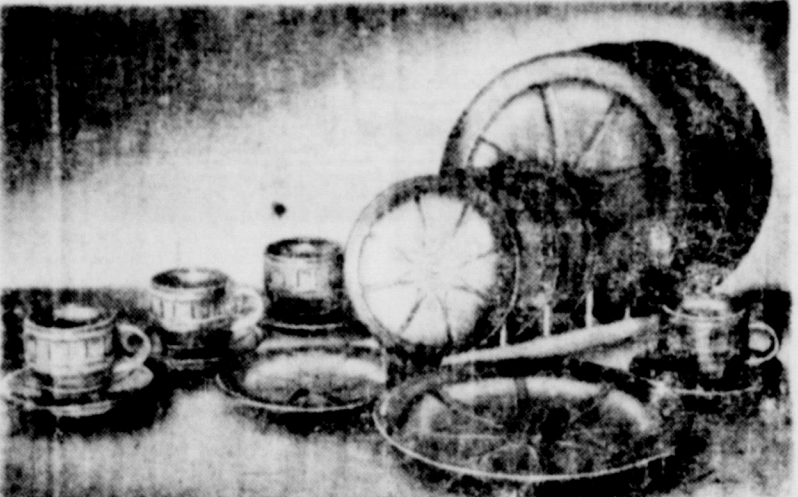

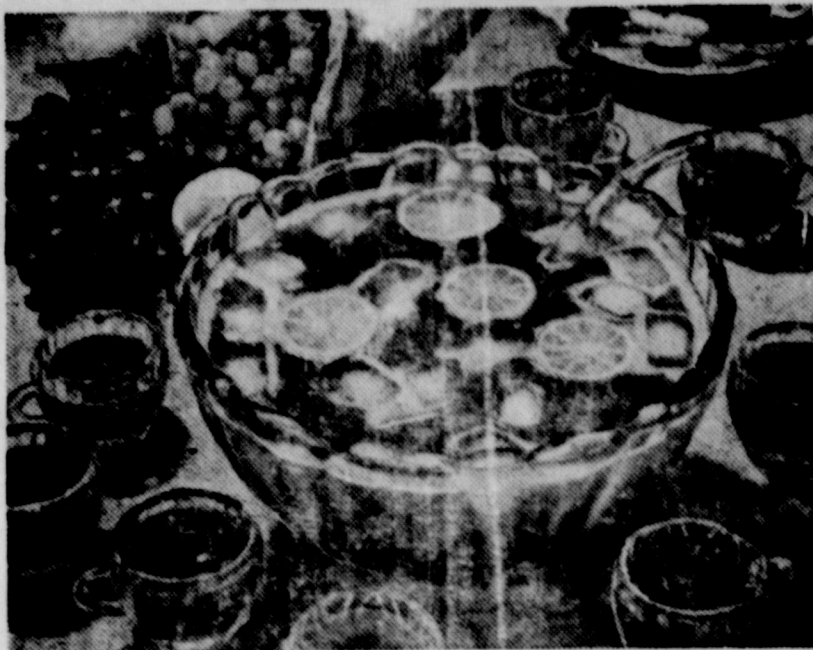

**FEATURE A PUNCH**



IT'S a wise hostess who plans to have her punch bowl featured at parties. Punch is the easiest drink for the hostess, since it leaves her free to mingle with her guests and eliminates repeated trips to the kitchen for refills. She can appoint someone to be in charge of the bowl, and if she doesn't there'll be sure to be a volunteer.

There are just three hard and fast rules that apply to the making of a good punch—it must be of good flavor, it must be well-iced and it must be attractive in appearance. Fruit juices, fresh, frozen or canned, are used for the base, and to be assured of sparkle and zest, use pale dry ginger ale as the other ingredient. Fruit juices and ginger ale should be chilled before using.

**CRANBERRY-GINGER BOWL**

- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon ginger
- 1 cup boiling water
- 6-oz. can lemonade concentrate
- 3 cups cranberry juice
- 4 cups apple juice
- 2 28-oz. bottles pale dry ginger ale

Combine sugar and ginger. Add boiling water; bring to a boil; stir until sugar dissolves. In punch bowl combine lemonade concentrate, cranberry juice and apple juice. Just before serving add ice and pale dry ginger ale. Garnish with lemon slices. Yield: 25-30 punch cup servings.
