An extreme interest in the welfare of future citizens of Texas is the cause of the establishment of the free school system and the interest will make it better.

## Program At School Highlights Local 'School Week'

About 200 attended the program in the high school auditorium on Tuesday evening to celebrate the 100th anniversary of Texas Public Schools and the local observance of "Texas Public Schools Week."

The Sanderson High School Band, under the direction of Philip Cherry, opened the program with "The Star Spangled Banner" followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag by the audience. Rev. John W. Byrd gave the invocation.

Supt. Matt Bader acted as master of ceremonies and introduced Jack Hayre who gave a brief history of the public school system in Texas, going into the historical reasons for the necessity of such a plan and outlining the development of ideas which led up to the present plan of education facilities within the state.

Walter Downie gave a concise history of the educational facilities within the county and the history of their growth and development which was very interesting to note. He told of the various schools that have serviced the county and of incidents of interest.

A song, "Texas, our Texas" was sung by Vivian Moore, Mary Ann Helcher, Doris Jones, Diana Duke, Carolyn Spears, Sandra Schwalbe with Carlene Werneking as accompanist.

Supt. Bader presented certificates of Courtesy to all living ex-school board members, and told of the services these men had performed by their voluntary action in the government of the county school system. Those present to receive the certificates were J. J. Whistler, John Stovell of Alpine, Hugh Rose, T. R. Arrington, John Harrison, Herbert Brown, S. H. Underwood and A. J. Halm.

J. W. Happle was recognized as having served longest on the board — 16 years.

Mrs. A. D. Brown was recognized as the teacher with the earliest service in the county schools, Mrs. W. E. Grigsby, as the teacher with the longest service in the county schools; and Mrs. A. A. Shelton, with the longest service as a teacher.

"For Sanderson, We Will", by the band and audience closed the program.

The Garden Club decorated the stage for the program, the Events Study Club had programs printed and the Culture Club was responsible for the display of old school books which was viewed with interest prior to the program. Of special interest in the display was an old reader published in 1828 and used by the great-grandmother of L. E. Muller. An old slate and slate pencil was also furnished for display by Muller.

## Holland-Page Gets Contract For Work On U. S. 90 East

Holland-Page of Austin was awarded the contract for the construction of 7.65 miles of U. S. 90 just west of Dryden, according to W. A. Davis, resident engineer of Sanderson.

The low bid was \$204,969.34, according to Davis.

Work on this stretch of road is expected to begin immediately.

This is the final portion of improved highway along U. S. 90 from Sanderson east and will be a major factor in attracting travelers over this scenic, all-weather road for trans-continental traffic.

It is hoped that work will begin in the near future in reconstruction of the highway west of Sanderson and especially the section about 30 miles west of Sanderson at Lemons Gap where several dangerous curves exist and have been the site of many accidents in the recent past.

## NEW ROAD MAP ISSUED BY STATE HIGHWAY DEPT.

Austin, March 1 — Publication of the Official Highway Travel Map for 1954 was announced by D. C. Greer, State Highway Engineer, and it is now available for distribution.

Incorporating many changes and new features, it is believed to be one of the best travel maps the Highway Department has published. Greer stated. For the first time this year, type has been used for all names and symbols appearing on the map, instead of the lettering previously used. This greatly improves legibility of all names.

A different size and type face was selected for the various categories of names that appear on the map; counties appear in one size; cities of similar population density will have the same size type; mountains will have their own type style, while rivers will appear in still another size and type face, Greer stated. In all, 33 different styles and sizes of type were ordered for the new map.

Over 1300 villages, towns and cities are to be shown on the new guide. Each of these falls into one of the five population categories — towns of less than 1,000 persons, towns up to 5,000, those with 25,000, and cities with populations up to 100,000. After a city's population passes this mark, Greer said, it will be shown as a stippled outline of the city limits. Thirteen insets of Texas' largest towns showing highway routes through these towns are continued in the margins of the map again this year.

For the past two years, the Department has been attempting to develop a relief base for the travel map that would succeed in showing the contours of the land to better advantage of the printing to the expense of the printing, Greer said. This year a method has finally been developed to show a true relief which can be reproduced in brown, conforming to all standard cartographic relief practices.

Also to improve the legibility of the map and to allow for the showing of more detail, the width of the highway bands has been reduced in size on the 1954 map. This is a particular advantage around cities where several highways converge, Greer pointed out.

He went on to say that Texas is so large that any attempt to map it at a scale that will accommodate all information of interest to tourists would not be practical. The size of road maps has been fairly well standardized all over the U. S., and any attempt to squeeze Texas into the same size sheet of paper required by the average state must necessarily prohibit the use of much interesting information.

All items that render service to the traveling public are clearly designated including roadside parks and tourist information bureaus. A mileage index, which shows the distance between principal cities in Texas, is also compiled for the users' assistance. Copies may be obtained free of charge from any of the district highway offices in the state, the travel information bureaus, or by writing to the Texas Highway Department, Austin 14, Texas.

Coach Rath stated that the girls were meeting one of the strongest teams in the region and would make no predictions of the outcome of that game, but added that he thought the local girls had a good chance to win the game if they were playing their usual calibre of basketball.

A special committee of the Terrell County Chamber of Commerce has begun making plans for the observance of the 50th anniversary of the formation of Terrell County. The celebration is being planned for next summer.

## Chevrolet Dealers Form Committee For Industry Study

E. J. Hanson has just returned from El Paso where he took part in a meeting of the Chevrolet Dealer Planning Committee for this zone.

Hanson was elected to the committee by fellow dealers under a nationwide program by which Chevrolet keeps in touch with retail selling problems. In his position, he acted as spokesman for other Chevrolet dealers in this area.

Under the system, the more than 7,600 dealers in the company's 43 zones and branches first elect 20 committeemen for each area, or a total of 860. Zone committeemen meet and select representatives to serve on the eight regional committees. These 88 regional committeemen then name 16 dealers from their group — two from each region — to meet with Chevrolet officials in Detroit as the national dealer planning committee.

March 15 is tax time in Texas in more ways than one. It's Federal income-tax-paying-time. And it marks the opening of a specially called tax assessing session of the Texas Legislature — to raise the pay of teachers.

Members of the legislature will assemble at noon on March 15 for the beginning of what may prove to be a stormy session. Stormy because there are repercussions any time you assess a tax.

Most everyone seems to feel that Texas teachers merit a raise — so long as somebody else has to pay for it.

The legislators' job is to put the finger on somebody to foot the bill. That's when the fighting will begin.

It will take about \$24-million per year to put the teachers pay up \$402.

Governor Allan Shivers said that he would recommend a "replacement" tax. By that he meant that he would suggest a revenue bill to take the place of one, passed by the last legislature, that was ruled out by the U. S. Supreme Court. It was a gathering tax on gas.

Attorney General John Ben Shepperd prepared three bills that would bring in about \$36-million per year from the natural gas industry.

Interested parties, while they waited on a court decision in the George Parr case, went back to Duval County.

Parr had asked for an injunction against Rangers Alfred Allee and Joe Bridge. The Duke of Duval said he feared the Rangers would harm him.

Arthur Garfield Hays, renowned New York attorney representing Parr, told the three federal judges trying the case at Houston that they should "do something constructive to prevent bloodshed in Duval County."

Hays said the Rangers are "men of zeal who think they are doing good." A man like Captain Allee, the attorney declared, can be both honest and dangerous when he takes civil law in his own hands, and "we have to kill this idea of Rangers being above the law."

Frank Knapp, representing the Rangers, summed up their case by saying:

"It is crystal clear that there is no law of Duval County as free men would have it as long as the Rangers are not there."

"Lurking in the background and shadows of this case are thousands of Duval County citizens who have been oppressed by ruthless and un-

conscionable actions of which only the faintest outlines are visible in this courtroom."

As the attorneys checked the case to the federal judges, the Rangers and Parr headed back to Duval County.

Austin, Texas — Plenty of political friction is coming up between now and election time despite the "harmony" convention of young democrats at Mineral Wells. Any harmony at that meeting resulted from the fact that one faction, the liberals, stayed away.

National and state party leaders called the gathering for the purpose of trying to reorganize the Young Democrats and bring both factions together.

Representatives of both camps were placed on the reorganizing committee. Despite these efforts, however, dissension flared up as a prelude to the Mineral Wells convocation.

Liberal Young Democrats announced that they would boycott the meeting, charging that it will be dominated by conservative friends of Governor Allan Shivers.

Shunning the "harmony" convention, the liberal Young Democrats insisted that their get-together in San Antonio last year was legal.

A feature of the confab was a panel discussion Friday afternoon, billed as an "open and frank discussion of party politics."

Attorney General John Ben Shepperd was moderator and State Senator Searcy Bracewell of Houston discussion leader.

Others on the program included Governors Shivers, Johnston Murray of Oklahoma, and Frank Clement of Tennessee; Supreme Court Justice Will Wilson, National Committeewoman Hilda Weinstock of Seguin and State Democratic Chairman Wallace Savage of Dallas.

Dudley T. Dougherty of Belleville, a member of the Texas legislature, has announced he will oppose Senator Lyndon Johnson, who will seek re-election this year.

Political speculation developed over the effect of the Duval County probes on this important race. In the 1948 race between Johnson and Coke Stevenson, a delayed count in Jim Wells County changed the results by more than 200 votes. Johnson became senator by a margin of 87 votes.

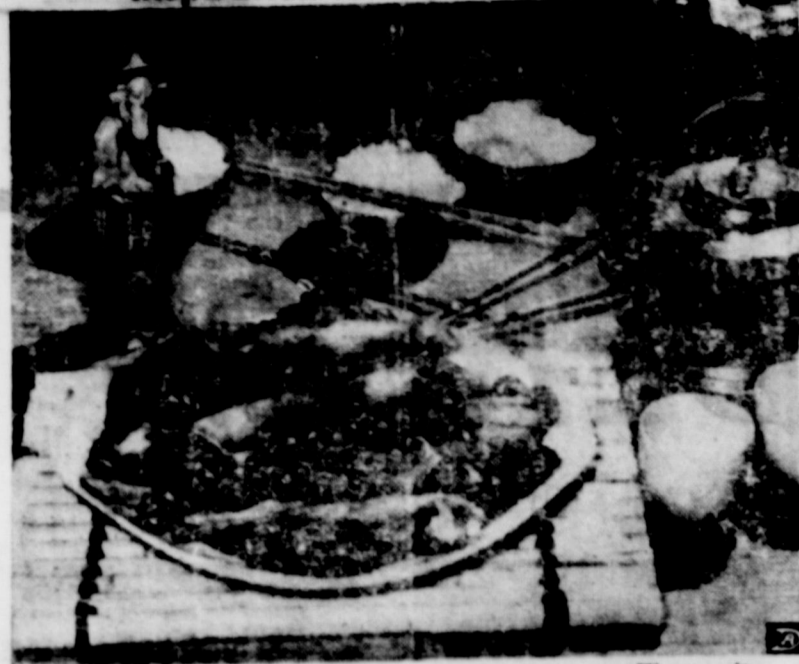
Texas legislators were poring over the tax revenue problem in order to raise teacher pay at a special session of the legislature in March.

Intensifying the problem was the U. S. Supreme Court's decision striking down the natural gas pipeline tax.

There was talk of a sales tax threat. At the same time, a large gas company served notice that any move to increase natural gas taxes will be opposed.

Attorney General Shepperd announced his department had begun drafting new gas tax bills which are considered legal and would be available to the legislators.

**Western Canned Sweet Cherries Inspiration for Chinese Dinner**



Why not try something different when it is your turn to entertain. Plan your menu with a theme in mind and let Western canned sweet cherries suggest one that will afford a conversation piece for the rest of the evening. This Chinese menu has its inspiration in the dark luscious sweet cherries from the orchards of the West. This dark purple variety is called Bing and its history is as interesting as the menu it inspired.

A Chinese gardener rescued a small straggling seedling from the trash heap. This tiny twig he tended lovingly and soon it was producing rich juicy cherries that came to be known by his musical name, "Bing."

The sweet sour sauce which makes this a bonafide Chinese menu is just as delicious when light cherries are substituted for the dark. The light ones are Royal Annes. The dark ones are the Lambert or Bing. But light or dark, all these sweet cherries are processed at the exact time of maturity to preserve every drop of their juice, every bit of their

fructose or sugar. The results are perfect cans of plump, sweet fruit, versatile enough in meal planning to be used from breakfast fruit to midnight snack.

**Sweet-Sour Sauce**

- 2 cups dark Western canned sweet cherries (pitted)
- 1 cup cherry juice
- 1/2 cup vinegar
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
- 1 1/2 tablespoons cornstarch
- 1 tablespoon soy sauce
- 2 pounds spare ribs

Pit cherries and set aside. Add cornstarch to 2 tablespoons of the juice. Mix with other ingredients in saucepan and bring to a boil. Stir and boil for 2 minutes. Add cherries and remove from heat. Cut spare ribs lengthwise between bones. Spread in single layer on baking sheet and place in 350 degree oven for 30 minutes. Remove to casserole, pour on sauce and continue baking for 30 minutes more. This will be enough for four.

**Animal Fats Found Satisfactory for Lamb Fattening Rations in Reasonable Amounts**

Colege Station — Rendered animal fats at levels of five to 10 per cent are satisfactory sources of energy in lamb fattening rations.

In a 100-day feeding trial conducted recently by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, special white grade tallow and choice grade tallow was incorporated into the rations of three groups of fattening lambs at levels of five, 10 and 15 per cent. A fourth group of lambs served as a control.

Other feeds in the rations were grain sorghum, cottonseed meal, molasses and alfalfa hay.

Lambs on a ration containing five per cent rendered fats made the highest, most efficient and cheapest gains, had the highest dressing percentages and the highest carcass grades.

At the 10 per cent level, lambs made more efficient gains than the control group which received no fats but were about equal to the control in rate of gain and dressing percentage. Although this group had slightly higher carcass grades, the cost of gain was increased slightly.

The lowest, least efficient and most costly gains were produced by the lambs fed 15 per cent ani-

mal fats. Their dressing percentages were lowest and carcasses poorest.

Results of these studies are reported in Progress Report 1644, which is available from the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas.
