Last year an all-time high of 795 X-rays were made and an effort is being made to pass that

The team from the Texas Tuberulosis Association will arrive in Sanderson on Tuesday afternoon with a mobile unit which will be ready to be put into service at 8:30 m. on Wednesday, March 24.

All residents over 15 years of age are being urged to have free chest X-rays made during the local

"Often diseases of the heart and lungs are discovered in X-rays and in some instances, tumors have been found in such X-rays," said Mrs. Duncan.

"Tuberculosis of the lungs is the most common disease revealed in the chest X-ray surveys. Tuberculosis can be cured. Early diagnosis is important if we want to cure all patients and to eliminate tuberculosis from our country.

"Chest X-rays each year are im portant and all persons in Terrell County over 15 years of age should have the free chest X-ray during the survey here," Mrs. Duncan concluded.
