Annual Flower Show To Be April 30

The Sanderson Garden Club announced this week their plans for the annual Flower Show to be on April 30. The time of the show has been set from 3:00 to 8:00 p. m. and will be in the Legion Hall.

The show this year will be divided into two classes: horticultural and arrangements. The horticultural class will include any worthy specimen from cacti to roses. The arrangements class entries may be dried, artificial, painted or treated as the exhibitor desires, but excludes artificial flowers or foliage.

There will be eleven different divisions in the arrangements class and three classes for children.

Pamphlets containing all the rules and procedures for entering specimens or arrangements in the show have been mailed out to all the ladies of the town and county, according to the chairman of the show, but anyone who has a question concerning any phase of the exhibit and show, or entry is asked to contact Mrs. O. T. Sudduth, or Mrs. W. G. Downie.

The flower show will offer local flower lovers an opportunity to view much of the handwork and craftsmanship of many other local horticulturists and gardeners and will offer all others who visit the show an opportunity to admire the beauty that can be produced through time and effort spent in the raising of flowers and shrubs.

There will be no charge for admission to the show and the public is urged to come out during the hours of the show and spend as much time as they like viewing the entries.

AT THE SCHOOLS . . .

AVERAGE ATTENDANCE IN 565.67 STUDENTS PER DAY
According to figures compiled by Supt. Matt Bader, the average daily attendance for the past seven school months is 565.67 students or 95.63 per cent, with an average daily absence of 22.8 students per day.

The membership, percentage of attendance, and average daily attendance have declined steadily since the beginning of school, according to Bader, and the outlook now is that the attendance will not gain another teacher for the local system under the Gilmer-Aikin plan unless there is 97 per cent attendance for the remaining days of school, Bader stated.

He added that the system was allowed 27 professional units this year on the basis of last year's attendance. The local system employed one extra teacher above the minimum foundation program this year who was paid out of the local funds, making a total of 28 professional units employed.

It was stated that Hickman's contract, when signed with the Ozona schools, would be for one year.

This year, Hickman coached the Sanderson Eagles football team, worked with the track teams and is now working with the boys on the baseball field. He came to Sanderson from Thomas A. Edison Junior High School in San Angelo.

A successor has not yet been named to the coaching post.

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Rains Prove Benefits Of Range Pitting, SCS Technician Says

Rains over much of the Rio Grande-Pecos River Soil Conservation District gave area ranchers a long-awaited opportunity to see the value of range pitting. Most of the 8,000 acres of pitted rangeland was pitted on "faith", but runoff producing rains have given ranchers a chance to actually study the results.

Moisture penetration checks made Monday by Alton Wilhite, Jr., SCS technician, and J. A. Mansfield showed that moisture penetrated 5 to 8 times as deep where land was pitted. Some of the ranches checked were Roger Rose, who received 7 inches. On the pitted area water penetrated to a depth of 8 inches, which is equivalent to 1.75 inches of rain, and on the unpitted area, penetration was 1.5 inches, equivalent to 2 inches of rain. Jack and Roy Deaton's Dryden ranch received inches of penetration on pitted areas compared to 2 inches on unpitted areas.

The above penetrations indicated that approximately 2 to 3 inches of rainfall was stored on pitted areas, where from 7 to 1.2 inches of rain fell, while on adjacent unpitted ranges only 1 to 2 inches of rainfall was stored in the soil.

Mr. and Mrs. John Harrison stated that they were looking at a pitted area as an inch of rain was falling and compared it with adjoining unpitted area. On the pitted area the rain was being held where it fell, but on the adjacent area water was running off in sheets of 3 to 4 inches deep. Mr. Harrison said pitting was the best practice he had seen to keep rain where it fell.

The ranchers that have pitted and received beneficial rain should keep in mind that grass is the ultimate goal, and pitting is just half of the battle. We must now give our pitted area as much rest as possible, thereby giving it a chance to produce grass which can take the place of our pits and also produce forage for livestock.

Specialist Warns Of Danger To Livestock In Poisonous Plants

College Station — Range plants which are poisonous to ranch animals are proportionately more abundant in times of drouth — when livestock can't be too choosy about what they eat.

A. H. Walker, extension range specialist, warns that livestock should be removed from any area suspected of harboring poisonous vegetation until the danger period passes.

The buds, leaves and tender shoots of all trees in the oak family contain poisonous substances which cause severe illness in cattle, sheep, goats and horses. This condition exists from the time the buds begin to swell until the new leaves become dark green, Walker explains.

Low growing oaks—low enough to be reached by livestock—cause most of the trouble. Death losses from oak poison runs extremely high, he adds. Cattle are most commonly effected.

A poor grass cover has made many ranges ripe for invasion by bitterweeds, a plant especially toxic to sheep. One to two pounds of dry bitterweed is enough to kill a full grown ewe. Deferred and rotation grazing are recommended controls for this plant.

Loco and peavine are other toxic plants which make heavy growth in the spring when conditions are favorable and livestock usually graze them only when more desirable plants are scarce. Livestock should not be allowed to graze these plants until there is sufficient growth of non-poisonous plants to take care of the forage needs of grazing animals.

The common cocklebur in the seedling stage is very poisonous to hogs and to cattle, in a lesser degree.
