All the questions having been resolved concerning who is going to run for what, the big political season is now under way.

Ralph Yarbrough of Austin, who announced that he would be a candidate against Allan Shivers for Governor, declared himself against breaking the two-term tradition in the chief executive's office.

Machine politics and one-man domination of the state government were also charged by Yarbrough as he put his name on the ticket.

Shivers had previously announced for an unprecedented third term for governor. He had stated prior to the announcement that there remain some things that need to be done, such as putting through a water conservation program.

No. 1 Problem

Governors of five Southwestern states attended a White House conference to talk about the drought. "Agriculture and livestock are our No. 1 problems," Shivers said at the conference. "A permanent solution for them must be found. Past efforts over many years have not been more than temporary expedients."

Asked by the governors was a \$15-million appropriation to deal with emergency dust and wind problems.

Placed before the President was a long-range program designed to eliminate conditions causing droughts in the Southwest.

Among the recommendations, drawn up by the governors, were: reseeding grasses and other cover crops, coordination of all federal and state agriculture agencies, more incentives for soil conservation practices, parity procedures to guarantee farmers in drought areas adequate prices for their crops, and tax policies designed to

promote proper land management.

Close to Home
 Prior to the Washington conference, Shivers had said that water conservation should begin at home, with towns and districts taking the lead in financing and supplementary money to come from the state.

In a session here, directors of the Texas Water Conservation Association echoed that opinion, calling for financing at the "lowest practical political subdivision level."

Urged by the directors was a constitutional amendment setting up a state fund to underwrite local communities in building dams.

Money so used by the state would be recovered from the sale of water and electricity.

Big Crime Story

Texas is about to become known as the biggest and best place for criminals to work. That being so, says John Ben Shepperd, we had better hire more police officers at higher pay, give them better equipment, and rewrite the criminal code.

Texas' crime rate is rising faster than the national average, he declared. "We will never bring crime in Texas down to a normal level if we continue trying to buy average, cut-rate law enforcement."

Worst features of the Texas crime situation are narcotics, obscene literature, and Communism, Shepperd declared.

Texas police officers in general are doing a fine job, but they are called upon for much duplication of effort, the speaker asserted.

He pointed out that more than half of the offenders arrested are repeaters who have been freed or who have made bond while awaiting trial.

More than half of Texas' crimes, said the attorney general, are committed by persons who are under indictment and free on bail, free on appeal bond or fresh out of jail.

Care of Children Up to Adults, Cox Says

"It is the adult's job to prevent childhood accidents," declares Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer.

As children do not always conform to the practices that would assure greatest safety, adults must be made to understand the accident problem of children and be as concerned about it as they are about childhood diseases.

A notable decrease in the infant mortality has been brought about by physicians and public health work during the past quarter century. Despite the efforts of the medical profession to protect the country's future citizens, childhood mortality continues high because of accidents — accidents that for the most part are preventable.

The accident death rate among children is being reduced only about one-third as fast as the rate for death by disease. Preventable accidents are the leading causes of death in the age group one to fourteen. Only by the understanding and cooperation of adults can the toll of child accident deaths be reduced.

Besides causing deaths, accidents are responsible for thousands of school children being injured sufficiently to require the attention of a physician or cause absence from school. Injuries occurring in school buildings account for 6 per cent of such cases, in school grounds 29 per cent, going to and from school 5 per cent, at home 17 and other places 25 per cent.

"Children deserve the right to grow up and it is up to every adult to give them that chance," Dr. Cox concluded.
