### Airman Is Victim Of Hijacking Here Last Monday Night

A1C Thomas L. Green, enroute from Barksdale AFB, La., to Pleasanton, Calif., was the victim of a stick-up one mile west of Sanderson Monday night about 3

o'clock, according to local officers. Green related the story to The Times reporter as follows

He had picked up a hitchhiker in Del Rio who said he wanted to go to El Paso. As they left Sanderson the man pulled a small calibre pistol and forced the driver to stop. Green was kept in the lights of the car and the highjacker stood at the door of the car while he forced Green to lay his wallet on the hood of the car. After rifling the money from the billfold it was placed back in reach of

Green stated that the highjacker drove away in his car with the car in Fort Stockton. Green ran to the Sanderson Drive Inn where he called Sheriff Lee Billings who put out a call in all directions for the car and driver.
