TERMINAL MOVE **HEARING SET FOR JULY 14, ALPINE**

ALPINE, June 2 - A hearing to consider the Southern Pacific Railroad's application to discontinue Sanderson and Valentine a? terminal points has been set for

July 14 here. Frank O. Ray, Alpine attorney for Southern Pacific, said the Texas Railroad Commission has scheduled the hearing for 9 a. m. in the district courtroom of the Brewster County Courthouse.

Announcement of the application was made last week by E. A. Craft, executive vice president of the railroad. He said Southern Pacific for the last several months has been making preliminary plans for establishing a new term

inal at Alpina. The plan would reduce the number of subdivisions from three to two, with Del Rio remaining as a terminal for railroad operation between Del Rio and El Paso.

Craft said maintaining three subdivision terminals is unnecessary and wasteful expense.

A move was initiated by the Terrell County Chamber of Commerce Wednesday to urge every citizen of the county to write to the Railroad Commission urging that they designate Sanderson as the logical place for the hearings to be held, since more people would be directly affected here than in any other town in th

This isn't to suggest that we are threatened with a violent revolution. But 30,000 hard - core commando-troop Communists, strategically placed in our vital industries and communication centers could conceivably wreck the defense of our nation if we were attacked, for instance, by a ground based force from any part of Central or South America. A fantastic idea? Not when we clearly understand the facts about Communism, its unchangeable objectite of world domination, its tactics and its almost unlimited power to get things done.

Fantastic Methods

Herbert Philbrick who was for nine years an FBI counterspy working intimately with leading American Communists, was an overnight guest in my home To illustrate the natur of the Communists' subversive work, he tells the story of a ship ment of sardines to our east coast from Russia. The FBI sought to intercept the shipment. The sardines, in cans, were being thrown overboard by the ship's crew under the pretense they were spoiled .The FBI discovered that the cans floated, and that instead of sardines, they contained little 24-page booklets.

The booklets were printed in Spanish. Philbrick has an actual photographic copy of one. The front cover states that the booklet contains the rules for playing the American game of football. But when you open the book you find that the first paragraph, still in Spanish, gives specific instructions for sabotaging electric power lines, transformers, central electrical headquarters, conduits cables, turbines and complete and detailed instructions on technical systems of espionage as well as of sabotage.

How to Make Bombs

Under the guise of football rules the booklets are smuggled to the Communist conspirators in this country in this devious, uneblieveable manner. In one section of the booklet are specific instructions for making bombs. Sizes vary. The big bomb, which the booklet blueprints, is powerful enough to stop a tank or a large vehicle. A smaller one is just large enough to stop a patrol car or a motorcycle policeman. Here is a very small bomb with diagram for painstaking assembly, which is

designed to fit inside of a hatband. Here are the instructions, printed in Spanish; "If you have a citizen whom you wish to elimnate. you simply place one of these little bombs inside the band of nis hat while he's at his favorite bar or restaurant. And when he goes to leave the resturant and puts or his hat, he blows off the top of his head. It's very effective. He doesn't talk any more." This information, together with the technical instructions for sabotaging America's industrial strength was a part of the training in the deeply underground, elite Comist cell into which Herbert hilbrick worked his way.

Brain Washing "The Communist instructors," Philbrick relates, "were experts; they knew their business, believe me, and they went to work on the linds, the hearts, and the souls of the young people in these cells,

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
