Have you read the proposed amendments which are being published in The Times?

It is hoped that every voter will avail himself of the opportunity to read and study each of these amendments so that he may be able to go to the polls and vote intelligently on them. If they become the law then it is too late to discuss about such laws. If you study them carefully and then vote for or against them you can vote better because you at least know your part in passing them or killing them.

One of the proposed amendments — and we hope to comment on each of them before the election — has to do with granting the right for women to serve on juries. This question has come up many times and many polls have been taken among the housewives of the state. There is argument on and on that will make you scratch your head before you vote on the question.

This column has thought of some arguments for and against the proposal. Favoring the idea is the fact that the women are qualified voters, and are, in a sense, considered citizens. Wool Growers Urged to Back Promotion Plan

FLAGSTAFF, ARIZ. — Although consumer appreciation for wool has risen sharply during the last year, intensified promotion is needed to strengthen wool's markets. Max F. Schmitt, President of The Wool Bureau, has told the annual meeting of the Executive Committee of the American Wool Council.

The program of wool promotion, which this year for the first time includes consumer advertising, should have the wholehearted support of the nation's wool growers, Mr. Schmitt said.

In this increasingly competitive era, he explained, not only does wool compete with other fibers, but wool products vie with an ever-widening range of consumer goods for their share of the consumer dollar. Wool growers must accept promotion as essential to the job of marketing their product profitably, he added.

Wool promotion efforts to date represent a "solid beginning" to a carefully planned, long-range program, Mr. Schmitt stated. Noting that the consumer's respect for wool is currently at a high level, Mr. Schmitt said:

"Basic performance qualities long taken for granted in wool are now eagerly sought by the consumer, who has found—sometimes from bitter experience—that nothing measures up to wool in service and value."

Mr. Schmitt told the committee that careful planning and judicious spending are helping to stretch the wool promotion dollar. It will go still further, and produce even more, if the nation's wool growers give the wool promotion program their determined, day-to-day support, he added.

In addition to consumer advertising, the intensified wool promotion program will include expanded operations of The Wool Bureau's Pacific Coast office in Los Angeles, Mr. Schmitt reported.

Game Violations Over State Is Led By 'Telephoning' Fish

AUSTIN—The Director of Law Enforcement for the Texas Game and Fish Commission reported that some of the heaviest fines in the last arrest report were for hand-cranked telephone sets.

Top levy for the month, among 244 cases listed, was against a Houston man. It was for \$200 and court costs, there were three for \$100 fines and costs. Smaller levies were made against others.

The report contained 22 cases for taking fish illegally. Most of these involved "telephoning fish." The largest fine outside the Houston area was \$100 plus costs against a San Antonio man.

Of the 244 cases in the arrest report, 118 involved individual fishermen's troubles. There were others affecting commercial violations.

Another chronic problem prompted several seizures. This is hunting out of season, particularly headlighting deer. A Seadrift man was fined \$200 plus costs for killing a doe deer. The same offense yielded a similar levy against a Port O'Connor man. Three Houston men drew \$100 fines and costs for headlighting deer.

Individual fines for raids on the deer herds ranged downward to \$10 which were assessed against two Fredericksburg men for hunting deer out of season.

Total fines for the month was \$4,923.15, with court costs of \$470.80 as compared with \$5,246.85 in fines and \$419.00 in court costs for the corresponding period last year.

Shivers Thanks Voters For Campaign Support

AUSTIN, August 2. — Expressing gratitude for the support that gave him a near-majority vote in the July primary, Governor Allan Shivers opened a runoff campaign for re-election this week, confident of victory.

"There is no question that we can and will win," the Governor said, as he announced plans for an around-the-clock battle.

"I'm going to wage an all-out campaign personally," he said, "and my friends over the state promise they will do the same. I will continue to discuss the issues and there will be no mud-slinging."

The Governor made his first statewide radio broadcast since the election on Tuesday night. He discussed the drought, emergency relief steps which are being taken to relieve drought conditions, and water and soil conservation.

Discussing the runoff campaign earlier this week, the Governor said, "All we need to do is to get out our vote to win. It just takes work and there is no substitute for it, in a campaign or in anything else."

The Governor indicated his efforts for re-election in the August primary would utilize such standard campaign devices as personal speeches, solicitations and contacts, including the ever-popular stump speaking as well as newspaper advertising, radio and television.

Analyzing the balloting in the first primary, the Governor said the returns proved his charge that his opponent was a "captive candidate of the CIO and NAACP."

Ralph Yarborough carried every large CIO box, Shivers said, and every Negro precinct by ten or twenty to one.

"But I carried his home box three to one," the Governor pointed out.

Shivers appraised the basic issue of the runoff thusly: "The people have a choice of two types of government — one of strife and discord, not only among the people of Texas but in the Legislature and state government, or one of cooperation such as I have had, working for all segments of Texas."

"At stake is whether the people want to attract more industry for more jobs of double the tax rate; whether to continue a middle-of-the-road policy as I have, or have one in office who will turn the Texas as government over to specialized segments of the population, particularly the CIO and Negro groups."

As for his stand on segregation, the Governor reiterated he wanted schools for Negroes just as good as the best for white students.

"Texas has spent more money on negro schools during my administration than in any comparable period, but Texans are not ready to abolish segregation in public schools, and so long as I am Governor, Texas is not going to abolish segregation in its public schools."

Yarborough Stresses Need for Immediate Water Conservation

Gubernatorial candidate Ralph Yarborough of Austin told a Central Texas farm and ranch audience this week that "action now" is needed to preserve Texas' "precious water and soil resources" — not "five more years of crippling limping delay."

Yarborough, speaking at Johnson City, only a few miles from the multiple dams of the Lower Colorado River Authority, said:

"One of the great governmental needs of Texas is a water conservation program of action now."

"Five years of delay in Texas history ought to be enough to convince everyone that action — not words — is needed."

The Austin attorney, a member of the original board of directors of the river authority, called for the construction of "50 great dams on the lower reaches of Texas' main rivers" for the two-way purpose of preventing flood destruction and conserving precious water.

He would supplement this basic program, he said, with the building of many smaller dams on the upper reaches of our rivers, and their tributary stream and ponds and tanks on our farms and ranches."

Yarborough added: "I think it tragic that Texas soil and water conservation has been crippled by the constant backbiting of the United States government by my opponent."

"I am opposed to burning the American flag to satisfy one demagogue. States' rights can be preserved in a cooperative harmonious local, state, federal conservation program."

Boom Expected in Hunting License Sales This Year

The License Clerk of the Game and Fish Commission said slightly less than one million hunting and fishing licenses for the fiscal year beginning September 1 are expected to be distributed.

The first consignments will be forwarded to the state's approximately 7100 licensed deputies late this month so that they will be available for prompt issuance on the local level.

Actual sale of fishing and hunting licenses combined usually runs more than seven hundred thousand, according to the License Clerk.

Resident hunting licenses, under a comparatively new state law, sell for \$2.15. This certificate entitles the holder to hunt all kinds of game.

Resident fishing licenses sell for \$1.65 and cover all legitimate fishing routine. No license is required for sports fishing in salt water.

Exemptions for hunting cover persons under 17 years of age, or persons hunting small game in the home county or persons hunting any game on the property on which they reside. Persons hunting big game on their home property, or persons under 17 years of age hunting big game, must obtain an exempt license for which there is no charge.

Exemptions for fresh water fishing for sport cover persons under 17 years of age and persons fishing in their own home county providing they do not use artificial bait or live bait.

One fairly new hunting license is a five-day nonresident permit to hunt migratory game birds which sells for \$5. The regular nonresident hunting license costs \$25. There is a five-day nonresident fishing license for \$1.65 and a regular nonresident fishing license for \$5.25.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas creating the State Building Commission and determining the membership thereof, creating the State Building Fund, and providing for the use of such fund under the direction of the Legislature, providing for the expenditure of such fund for the erection of memorials under certain conditions and limitations; providing for an election thereon, the proclamation of such election, and the form of ballot.

SECTION 1. THAT SECTION 18 OF ARTICLE XVI OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS BE HEREBY AMENDED BY ADDING THEREAFTER A NEW SECTION TO BE KNOWN AS SECTION 51-B AND READING AS FOLLOWS:

Section 51-B. (a) The State Building Commission is hereby created. Its membership shall consist of the Governor, the Attorney General and the Chairman of the Board of Control. The Legislature may provide by law for some other State official to be a member of this Commission in lieu of the Chairman of the Board of Control, and in the event said State official has not already been confirmed by the Senate as such, the Governor may so confirm as a member of the State Building Commission in the same manner as the State Auditor is confirmed.

(b) The State Building Fund is hereby created on or before the first day of January following the adoption of this amendment, and the amount of such fund shall be the amount of the State Building Fund for the ensuing calendar year as provided by the constitution and laws of this State. The Legislature may provide by law that the State Building Fund shall be transferred from the State Building Fund to the State Building Fund for the ensuing calendar year as provided by the constitution and laws of this State. The State Building Fund shall be expended for the erection of memorials to the State and for the purchase of land for the erection of such memorials.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for agreements between the State of Texas and the Federal Government to obtain Federal Social Security coverage for proprietary employees of its political subdivisions."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Article III, Section 51a, providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of assistance to actual bona fide citizens of Texas who are needy aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years, needy blind persons over the age of twenty (21) years, and needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years, providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the government of the United States for such assistance, providing that the payments of such assistance from State funds shall never exceed either the payments from Federal funds or a total of more than Forty-Two Million (\$42,000,000.00) Dollars per year, pending the enactment of laws to make lists of recipients of aid available for inspection, providing for the necessary form of ballot, proclamation, and publication, and making an appropriation to defray the necessary expenses of proclamation, publication and holding the election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended and the same shall hereafter read as follows:

Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:

(1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application; provided that the maximum payment per month per person shall not be more than Twenty (\$20.00) Dollars per month.

(2) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application, or on account of any child under the age of one (1) year whose mother has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

(3) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of sixteen (16) years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid on account of any child over one (1) year old who has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

The Legislature shall have the power to accept from the Federal government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such government may offer not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth, provided however, that the amount of such assistance out of State funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount so expended out of Federal funds, and providing that the total amount of money to be expended out of State funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Forty-two Million (\$42,000,000.00) Dollars per year.

Should the Legislature enact enabling laws and provide an additional appropriation hereto in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment such Acts shall not be invalid by reason of their anticipatory character.

The Legislature shall enact appropriate laws to make lists of the recipients of aid hereunder available for inspection.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at a special election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 2nd day of November, 1954, at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clause: "FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to set up a system of payments of old age assistance to those above sixty-five (65) years of age, provided that monthly payments from State funds to any one person may be in valid amounts based on need, that the maximum payment per month per person from State funds shall not be more than Twenty (\$20.00) Dollars per month, giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments for the needy blind persons over twenty-one (21) years of age, providing for the expenditure of funds from the Federal government, limiting the total amount which may be expended for such assistance out of State funds, and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to become eligible to receive assistance."

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments of old age assistance to those above sixty-five (65) years of age, provided that monthly payments from State funds to any one person may be in valid amounts based on need, that the maximum payment per month per person from State funds shall not be more than Twenty (\$20.00) Dollars per month, giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments for the needy blind persons over twenty-one (21) years of age, providing for the expenditure of funds from the Federal government, limiting the total amount which may be expended for such assistance out of State funds, and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to become eligible to receive assistance."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and the laws of the State of Texas.
