LISTEN TO LUKE

We have read some interesting news in the past few days concerning the contemplated completion date of the Pecos Canyon span of U. S. 90 which will again open the way for tourists to travel through our section of the country and especially through our town. We hope that all the business people and those who normally contact those visitors will not forget too soon how much their presence here means to us, and the fact that they are again able to travel U. S. 90.

It is going to take a lot of good will and good breaks to bring the highway traffic back to the pre-flood level. That good will must, of course, come from those who meet the visitors all of the time. Any courtesy that can be rendered will be appreciated and will add to the pleasure in doing your usual chores connected with earning a livelihood.

Anyone who has gone anywhere at any time knows how to appreciate little courtesies that have been or could have been extended by strangers along the way — and those who travel through here are visitors just like you would be anywhere else. The use of the "golden rule" would be a good rule of business for all of us to put first.

We might be guilty of squawking about what kind of treatment we have had at a certain cafe, hotel, in a certain town, or by a certain police officer, or by a certain service station somewhere on the road, or within our own town, but when we are all guilty of pulling some stunts that would deserve a similar comment from someone else, and probably we get it, too.

We all have a duty to one another as citizens of this community, and when we do some of the little under-handed, back-biting, malicious acts we are guilty of, and then it should hurt our conscience considerably. Any time that any person in Sanderson or any other town, is completely independent of all of the other people of that town, business men and citizens as well, then he is too darned independent to be living around a group of hard-working, considerate people.

A person who has gained what he thinks is financial independence from a town should be the most humble and grateful person that town; and a person who has gained what he thinks is material complete independence of fellow citizens is insane and should be put away.

Team work among the people of a town, complete and unselfish, could do more for the welfare of a town than any one thing we think of, but that co-operation to start with yourself and with waiting to see who is going to co-operate with you.

Proposed Changes In Constitution Are Listed for Study

Texas legislature went on a constitutional amendment spree during the last session resulting in 11 proposals to our state constitution which will be voted in November.

The hapless voter is faced with the duty of either wading through the small print and legal terminology of each amendment to understand what he is voting "For" or "Against" or they can take the interpretation that is handed down by an editor and thus make up their minds on how to vote, or they can neglect their duty entirely and fail to qualify themselves as voters and fail to vote on any of the amendments.

We hope that the readers will take the time and trouble to find out the true meaning of the proposals and be in a position to vote intelligently on each after due consideration to their intent and purpose.

Senate Joint Resolution No. 2 brings to the voters again an issue which was at least once defeated before by the voters. It provides that the Legislature may authorize the creation of county-wide hospital districts in counties of over 190,000 population "and in Galveston" if the proposal is approved by the qualified voters in the district at an election for that purpose. It provides for a tax not to exceed 75c on the \$100 valuation, for support of the hospital.

Senate Joint Resolution No. 4 provides for a four-year term for all elective officers in the precinct, county and district, and provides for staggering of terms beginning with the November, 1954, general election. Under this adjustment of

drive in this county for additional funds. The drive will extend from August 16-31.

It was stated that many hospitals over the nation will possibly be unable to meet their payrolls because of the expense of polio treatment unless they get help from the \$20,000,000 emergency drive for funds all over the nation.

Basil O'Connor, president of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, said that the foundation had 11-million dollars on hand but that its obligations for the rest of the year for hospital care and other activities total \$32,600,000.

O'Connor told a news conference that it was imperative to raise sufficient funds to make up the difference.

One of the entries on the fact sheet stated that the Wolff Home, rehabilitation unit in Houston, reported that it had to have \$22,924 chapter payment in order to keep from suspending operations.

O'Connor stated that regardless of how well they had done the job during the past 16 years, that it was \$20,000,000 short of the funds needed to take care of the polio patients this year.

SCHOOL OPENING SET FOR SEPT. FIRST

According to Matt F. Bader, superintendent of the Terrell County Common School District, September 1 has been set as the opening date for the 1954-55 school term in Terrell County.

High school seniors are asked to register Friday afternoon, August 27. Juniors will register Saturday morning, August 28, and sophomores will register Saturday afternoon. Freshmen will register Monday morning, August 30, and 8th graders will register Monday afternoon.

Tuesday will be taken up with faculty meetings and the completion of general preparations for the new term.

Wednesday, September 1, all students from the first grade through the seventh grades will register in their classrooms and will remain in school all day. High school classes will run on full schedule on September 1 also.

The seventh grade will be housed in the elementary building this year instead of the high school building due to the increased high school enrollment and the lack of room in the high school building.

All first grade beginners will be required to bring birth certificates with them when they register. No students will be accepted who have not reached their 6th birthday on or before September 1, 1954.

Absentee Voting Begins On Dem. Primary Run-Off

Ballots are available for absentee voting in the Democratic Primary Run-off election for Terrell County voters.

Absentee balloting is permitted until midnight, August 24 at the office of the county clerk, and ballots that are mailed in must be postmarked prior to midnight August 28, and in the office of the county clerk prior to 1 p. m., August 28, according to W. W. Sudduth, Terrell County Democratic Chairman.

Sudduth stated that only two polling places will be open for the run-off: the Terrell County Courthouse and the Dryden box.

He also stated that any person who is a qualified voter in this county will be eligible to vote at either of the two boxes.

Sudduth stated that this measure was to eliminate the expense of clerks in the other two precincts.

A. S. C. ELECTION TO BE AUG. 24

A committee composed of Joe M. Glover, District 6 Extension Agent of Fort Stockton; S. M. Crutchfield, acting F. H. A. Supervisor of Del Rio; and A. T. Wilhite, Jr., local Soil Conservation technician, appointed a county election board to nominate candidates and to hold the annual ASC election here on Wednesday, August 25. The county election board is composed of Ray Brotherton, chairman; Bernie Kerr and Hugh Rose, members.

The election board nominated ten Terrell County ranchers from whom five will be selected as ASC committeemen. Additional names may be added to this list for candidates if a petition with the signatures of at least ten eligible voters within the organization is presented to the election board. Voters may also use the "write in" system when the ballots are voted, if he chooses.

The local ASC office is of the opinion that all eligible voters in the county have been notified of the coming election, but should anyone have been overlooked, he will be included when the ballots are mailed if he will come by the local ASC office in the courthouse to establish the fact that he is a qualified voter. To qualify, a person must be an "operator" which means he must be interested in livestock operation as an owner or leasor in Terrell County. In Texas where the Community Property Law is in effect, both spouses are allowed to vote. The ballots will be mailed out and must be returned to the ASC office not later than 5 p. m., August 25, 1954, to be counted.

The following have been nominated by the election board: Lee Dudley, Tol Murrah, A. A. Shelton, Roy Deaton and Reginald Monroe, along with Noel James, Sid Smith, Felix Harrison and Clarence Jessup. The five men receiving the most votes will make up the ASC committee for 1955 and will take office September 1, 1954.

The ASC office has received several inquiries from area ranchers in regard to the possibility of Terrell County being put back on the Drought Emergency Feed Program. The ASC committee has wired and written a letter of explanation to the State Drought Emergency Feed Committee making this request. The State Committee has acknowledged receipt of the request and stated that the proposal is under consideration.

Bridge on Pecos May Be Restored Within Two Weeks

Announcement was made last week by D. C. Greer, state highway engineer, that his department is hopeful that normal traffic can be restored over the Pecos Canyon on U. S. 90 between Del Rio and Langtry within the next two weeks. Work on replacing the vital span is proceeding ahead of schedule.

The 450-foot-long bridge which stood 50 feet above the Pecos River was washed out June 26 by record floods. Since then all traffic normally moving over U. S. 90 between Van Horn and San Antonio has been routed over other highways.

At least 100 men are working at the site in three shifts. Night work is made possible by portable light plants furnishing power for approximately 1,000 globes, according to reports from highway workmen.

Some 5,000 pounds of dynamite were used in blasting down canyon walls on both sides of the river to get to the bridge site, approximately 700 yards upstream from the old bridge.

Approximately 30,000 cubic yards of rock excavation have already been moved in, winding the new highway down the canyon walls to the level of the bridge that is under construction.

The grade into the canyon on both sides will be the same as the grade on the former route and any truck that negotiated the route before can use it again when the new bridge is completed.

Ram Test To Start August 25 at A&M Station Near Sonora

SONORA. — West Texas sheep breeders will begin their annual "Ram Performance and Progeny Test" August 25 at the Texas Agricultural Experiment station near Sonora, Superintendent W. T. Hardy has announced.

"The test is a cooperative effort by breeders and the experiment station to improve potential rate of gain, length of staple, and pounds of clean wool," said Dr. W. T. Magee who will supervise the research project.

"During the 224-day feeding period records will be made on grease and clean wool produced, length of staple grown, and weight gain of each ram," he added. "Rams are also scored for conformation, belly wool, skin folds and face covering."

Added to the tests will be an auction sale by breeders during the annual field day in May, 1955. At that time breeders may sell rams tested and buyers may see both rams and performance test record.

Dr. Magee said the test is open to any sheep breeder who wants to test rams subject to registry in a recognized breed association. However, a breeder must enter a group of four rams by one sire, and breeders may enter groups from as many sires as desired. All rams remain property of the breeders.

The only cost to breeders is for feed the rams eat while on test.

All production traits of rams have increased since tests were begun at the experiment station in 1948. Rambouillet, the only breed tested in large numbers, have increased in clean fleece production from 6.6 pounds in the 1948-49 test to 9.3 pounds in the 1953-54 test. Average staple length has increased from 3.36 to 3.80 inches, and average daily weight gain increased from .37 to .51 pounds a day.

At the same time production was increasing the amount of undesirable skin folds was decreasing, Dr. Magee concluded. The gains in fleece, weight and other characteristics are considered remarkable during the six-year period.

Elsewhere in the columns of The Times we have attempted to interpret, to the best of our ability, the eleven constitutional amendments which will be voted on in November.

We have not tried to give a lengthy interpretation of them. That is a job for one more qualified at handling 756 words than we are. Neither are we trying to

under either of the systems. House Joint Resolution No. 14 is a negation of power to the legislature to obligate the state in any manner in connection with the building of toll roads or turnpikes. The proposal specifies that "the legislature shall have no power or authority to in any manner lend the credit of the state or grant any public money to or assume any indebtedness, present or future, bonded or otherwise, of any individual, person, firm, partnership, association, corporation, public corporation, public agency or political subdivision of the state, or anyone else which is now or hereafter authorized to construct, maintain, or operate toll roads or turnpikes within this state."

Senate Joint Resolution No. 7 would provide for the changing of regulations in regard to payments made by the state for old age pensions, aid to the blind and to needy children, and would provide for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States for such assistance. The proposal would also provide for the enactment of laws to make lists of recipients of aid available for inspection.

Senate Joint Resolution No. 10 would provide for the transfer of funds from the Confederate Pension Fund to a State Building Fund; and the spending of such funds would be governed by the Legislature. The amendment would also provide for the building of certain types of memorials with certain limitations and conditions.

House Joint Resolution No. 8 would permit counties of less than 10,000 population to elect an official to serve as county tax assessor-collector.

House Joint Resolution No. 10 would limit a person who is in the military service of the United States to voting within the county from which he entered the service providing that such person is otherwise a qualified voter in that county; and confers the privilege to vote upon any member of the military service who is otherwise a qualified voter.

House Joint Resolution No. 16 would provide that women would not be barred from grand or petit jury service.

House Joint Resolution No. 22 would provide for social security for certain state employees not now covered by the federal system

the first application of the amendment, if it is adopted by the voters, four-year terms would be allotted to county and district clerks, county judges, county treasurers, and county commissioners of Precincts No. 2 and 4. Unfortunates who would draw only the usual two-year terms would be allotted to county and district attorneys, the sheriff, constables, and county commissioners of precincts 1 and 3.

Senate Joint Resolution No. 5 rewrites the salary section of the constitution to fix salaries of legislators a \$25 per day for a 120-day session only.

Senate Joint Resolution No. 8 would provide for crediting the Teacher Retirement System or the Employment Retirement System of Texas all services rendered as either a teacher or person employed in the public schools, colleges and universities of the state or as an appointive officer or employee of the state for retirement benefits

Science Conquers New Sheep Disease



Dr. N. H. Casselberry, veterinary medical director of Cutter Laboratories, injects a number of sheep with Blucine, the new vaccine for the prevention of bluetongue. Bluetongue, a new sheep disease problem in this country, has caused serious losses in many sections of the west.

The disastrous losses caused by bluetongue infection, a relatively new disease of sheep, can be prevented. This was indicated by Cutter Laboratories' announcement that a vaccine for the prevention of bluetongue, known as Blucine, is in production at their Berkeley, California plant.

Bluetongue in the United States was first recognized in California in 1952 when an estimated 325,000 sheep were infected with bluetongue disease. Since the disease has been identified, there is good indication that it has also been a problem in Texas, Arizona, New Mexico, Utah and Nevada. The disease is transmitted by gnats and possibly by other biting insects.

Although there is no known treatment or cure for the disease, vaccination has proved a practical and effective method of preventing bluetongue infection. Production of Blucine provides the sheep industry with an important means of preventing the serious losses this disease may cause.

In fifteen years, encouraging progress has been made, but not sufficient progress.

Courses Needed

In every school and college in America the parents and the teachers should get together and set up a course in American civi-

zanship which would give an accurate account of the inspiring history of our nation, and teach in simple detail the mechanics of our political and economic system so that any 15-year-old child would recognize his personal advantages under the American way of life, and how he can help maintain the elements which make the American system so much more productive than other systems.

We're trying to help along on this goal. In the college which I serve as president we have a new School of American Studies. The staff, under the direction of Dean Clifton Ganus, is developing a course called "The American Scene." It already has been established as a required course for all Harding College freshmen. When it has been further refined in the "laboratory" of actual classroom experience, we expect to offer it to the nation's colleges and high schools. We consider that this will be another payment on our debt for the gift of freedom.

AUSTIN. — State candidates in the run-off races are now on the firing line, blasting away.

In the gubernatorial race, Governor Allan Shivers and Judge Ralph Yarborough have re-formed their lines and are in a show-down battle for the state's top job.

Both candidates for governor had reasons for failing to score a victory in the first primary.

Shivers said that his supporters were too confident and had not turned out at the polls in the expected numbers. He encouraged them to exercise their right to vote in the coming election.

Yarborough said that he would have won the first primary except for Texas Republicans who neglected their own primary to vote against him.

Three Factors Decide

Capable of determining the August election were 400,000 Texans.

"Section 1. The following classes of persons shall not be allowed to vote in this State to wit:

"First: Persons under twenty-one (21) years of age.

"Second: Idiots and lunatics.

"Third: All persons convicted of any felony, subject to such exceptions as the Legislature may make.

"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who has attained the age of twenty-one (21) years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before offering to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that such poll tax was paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he or she, as the case may be, shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 13 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 1 to Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide for an Assessor-Collector of Taxes providing for the election of such officer in the State of Texas, and providing the time and manner thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 16a shall be added to Article VI of the Constitution of Texas so as to read as follows:

"Section 16a. In any county having a population of less than ten thousand (10,000) inhabitants, as determined by the last preceding census of the United States, the Assessor-Collector of Taxes in the qualified property taxing voters of such county at an election the question of adding an Assessor-Collector of Taxes to the list of authorized county officials if a majority of such voters voting in such election shall approve of adding an Assessor-Collector of Taxes to such list, the Assessor-Collector of Taxes shall be elected at the next General Election for such County, the term of office as is provided for other Tax Assessor-Collectors in this State."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at the General Election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election all ballots shall have written or printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment permitting elections in counties of less than ten thousand (10,000) inhabitants to provide for an Assessor-Collector of Taxes."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment permitting elections in counties of less than ten thousand (10,000) inhabitants to provide for an Assessor-Collector of Taxes."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the same are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2 proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 1, providing that the Legislature may authorize the creation of county-wide Hospital Districts in certain counties taxing voters at an election held for that purpose within such District, providing for the submission of the proposition to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation by the Governor and publication of notice.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be designated as Section 1, which shall read as follows:

"Section 1. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of county-wide Hospital Districts in counties having a population in excess of 100,000 and in Galveston County, with power to issue bonds for the purchase, acquisition, construction, maintenance and operation of any owned hospital, or where the hospital system is jointly operated by a county and city within the county, and to provide for the transfer to the county-wide Hospital District of the title to any land, buildings or equipment, jointly or separately owned, and for the assumption by the district of any outstanding bonded indebtedness therefor owned by any county or city for the establishment of hospitals or hospital facilities to levy a tax not to exceed seventy-five (75) cents on the one hundred (100) dollar valuation of all taxable property within such district, provided, however, that such district shall be approved as an election held for that purpose, and that only qualified property taxing voters in such county shall vote thereon, provided further, that should such Hospital District construct, maintain and support a hospital or hospital system, the same shall become a charge against the State of Texas, nor shall any direct appropriation ever be made by the Legislature for the construction, maintenance or improvement of the said hospital or hospitals. Should the Legislature enact laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified property taxing voters of this State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment granting power to the Legislature to issue laws authorizing the creation of county-wide Hospital Districts in any county having a population in excess of 100,000 and in Galveston County, and to levy a hospital tax."

Fires Hit Area

Hardly had the embers of the political fires cooled when forest fires broke out both east and west of Austin.

Judge Re-Rules

Operation of the Commercial Security Company of Houston, already once halted and continued,

has been stopped again by District Judge J. Harris Gardner.

Gardner, who issued a previous order restraining the firm from business and a later one allowing it to continue, issued the latest ruling on grounds that the company had gone into business on borrowed capital, thus violating state law.

State action charging fraudulent organization against the \$250,000 fire and casualty firm was initiated July 15 by Attorney General John Ben Shepperd. He said he had asked the temporary restraining order at the request of the State Board of Insurance Commissioners.

The order was modified a few days later to allow continuance of the firm's business.

J. D. Wheeler, liquidator for the insurance board, has been named by the court as receiver to supervise all affairs of the company.

Ben B. High, company president, said shareholders would receive no loss if the receivership is handled properly.

A survey of 2,865 retailers over the state showed June sales equaling those for May but four per cent down from last June. For the first half of 1954, sales were seven per cent below 1953 showings.

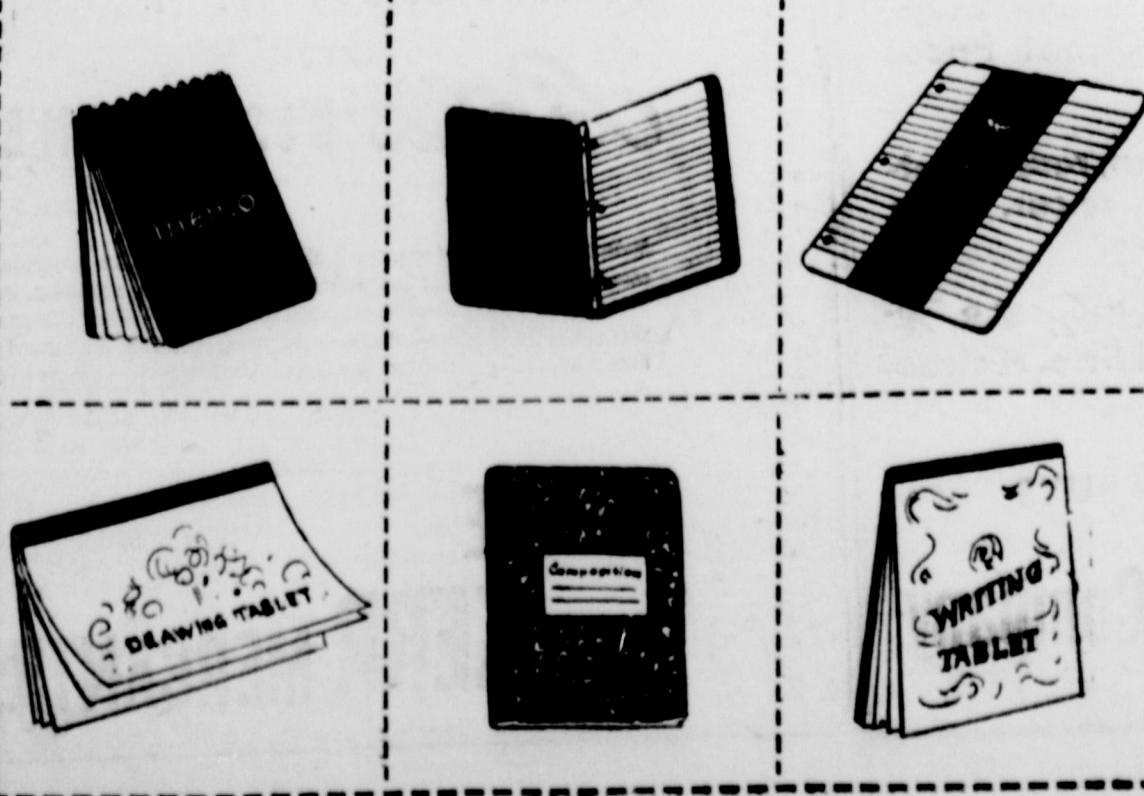
