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## Kip Gatlin Attends ROTC Summer Camp

Kip Gatlin returned home Saturday from Fort Benning, Ga., where he had attended the General Military Science Reserve Officers Training Corps summer camp. There were 1,299 cadets from 38 colleges and universities attending the six-week camp.

The objective of camp training is to supplement the instruction received by the student at his institution, much of which is theoretical in nature, by additional applicatory training in order to qualify him for appointment in the Army Reserve or Regular Army. Camp training is essentially of the individual and small unit type, with the student receiving marksmanship training and experience in the performance of tactical, technical and administrative duties in the field. Each cadet is given the maximum opportunity to develop traits of leadership and his capabilities to function effectively in the role of an infantryman in small unit combat operations, as may be required of any officer regardless of branch. ## Sheep Breeders May Use Sonora Station Facilities For Ram Progeny Traits Testing

West Texas sheep breeders will begin their annual "Ram Performance and Progeny Test" August 25 at the Texas Agricultural Experiment station near Sonora, Super-

intendent W. T. Hardy has announced. "The test is a cooperative effort by breeders and the experiment station to improve potential rate of gain, length of staple, and pounds of clean wool," said Dr. W. T. Magee who will supervise the research program.

During the 224-day feeding period records will be made on grease and clean wool produced, length of staple grown, and weight gain of each ram," he added. "Rams are also scored for conformation, belly wool, skin folds and face covering."

Added to the tests will be an auction sale by breeders during the annual field day in May, 1955. At that time breeders may sell rams tested and buyers may see both rams and performance test record.

Dr. Magee said the test is open to any sheep breeder who wants to test rams subject to registry in a recognized breed association. However, a breeder must enter a group of four rams by one sire, and breeders may enter groups from as many sires as desired. All rams remain property of the breeders.

The only cost to breeders is for feed the rams eat while on test. All production traits of rams have increased since tests were begun at the experiment station in 1928. Rambouillets, the only breed tested in large numbers, have increased in clean fleece production from 6.6 pounds in the 1948-1949 test to 9.3 pounds in the 1953-1954 test. Average staple length has increased from 3.36 inches to 3.80 inches, and average daily weight gain increased from 37 to 53 pounds daily.

At the same time production was increasing the amount of undesirable skin folds was decreasing, Dr. Magee concluded. The gains in fleece, weight and other characteristics are considered remarkable during the six-day period.

## KECK OIL CO. WELL TO BE RESUMED

Todd and Bob Keck of Long Beach, Calif., arrived in Sanderson Saturday to make arrangements for the continuation of drilling operations on their Keck Oil Co. John Harrison No. 1 well located in section 22, block D-4, MK&T RP survey.

Operations were suspended on the well about one year ago. The present hole is down below 2200 feet, according to the drillers, and present plans are to do exploratory work in the present hole prior to resuming drilling.

Cable tools will be used for additional drilling, according to the operations, because of faults that were encountered in the structure during previous drilling operations. Both operators plan to live in Sanderson for the next several months and present plans are to move their families out from California as soon as housing facilities can be arranged.

## 'DIMES' FUND DRIVE TO FURNISH MONEY NEEDED OVER U. S.

Current shortages of March of Dimes funds are creating a threat to the care of polio patients now in hospitals in many parts of the country, it was revealed this week by Basil O'Connor, president of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

Chapters are so far in arrears in payments to hospitals for patients receiving National Foundation assistance that in some places hospital payrolls cannot be met until funds are received from the Emergency March of Dimes which began Monday, O'Connor said.

"I am sure there is nobody who would wish any one of the great programs made possible through the March of Dimes contributions to be slowed. Who could even think of abandoning the evaluation studies, now in progress, of the polio vaccine which is being tested in 217 areas of the country? Who would countenance any stoppage of the research program seeking to develop preventive measures and improve treatment methods? Who would attempt to cut off the training of physicians, scientists, nurses, physical therapists and others engaged in polio work and without whom both research and patient care would suffer."

"Yet with these three programs of prevention, research and professional education continuing at full tilt, as they should, funds for patient aid simply are not available. That is why we are having the Emergency March of Dimes — so that we can continue to do the total job that has done so much good and gives promise of even greater achievement in the near future."

**Jackson Named As Farm Census Head For West Texas**

Mr. Jackson will report on August 16 to the permanent Census Bureau district office in Denver for a week's training. The training will cover administrative procedures, office routine, map work, practice in filling out farm census report forms and other duties and responsibilities connected with the job.

**Border Patrol Recruits Are Being Sought**

The U. S. Border Patrol has an urgent need for a large number of physically fit young men desiring a career in Federal law enforcement work. In order to secure a sufficient number of qualified candidates for early appointment, the Immigration and Naturalization Service, in cooperation with the U. S. Civil Service Commission, has undertaken a recruiting program in the El Paso area. Representatives of the U. S. Border Patrol will be available to furnish information to anyone interested in making application for the position of Patrol Inspector (Trainee) in Room 303, U. S. Court House, El Paso, Texas, from 9:00 a. m. to 12:00 noon, on Monday, August 16. A regular written Civil Service examination will be given to interested applicants at 1:00 p. m., in the Civil Service examining room of the Main Post Office, 219 Mills, El Paso, on the same day.

The Border Patrol is the armed uniformed enforcement branch of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Its purpose is to detect and prevent the smuggling and illegal entry of aliens into the United States and to apprehend those guilty of such violations. The job is both arduous and dangerous. Officers are required to work irregular hours, under all weather conditions, and must be available to work in any section of the country. The duties demand mental alertness as well as exceptional physical vigor and stamina.

In order to become eligible for appointments, applicants must attain a satisfactory rating in the competitive Civil Service examination. Competitors who qualify in the written test will be required to appear for an oral interview and physical examination.

**Precautions Listed On Food Poisoning**

Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer, warns that now hot weather is here, everyone should be careful in handling and storing food to prevent food poisoning. The organism grows best in foods that are quite fatty, such as ham, pork, salads, or sandwiches with rich dressings, cream pies, cream puffs, or any food with custard filling. Keep this in mind when you prepare a picnic lunch or when anyone in the family takes a lunch to work during the hot months.

Symptoms of food poisoning usually strike quickly and explosively, and those who do not eat the contaminated food do not become ill. Usually from one to four hours after eating contaminated food victims feel ill. If it is a mild case of food poisoning, recovery usually begins in eight to 12 hours, but victims may feel the ill effects for several days.

Usual symptoms of food poisoning are diarrhea, nausea, vomiting, abdominal cramps and weakness. Whenever you feel these symptoms, be sure to call your physician. Do not wait, hoping it will wear off. Sometimes food poisoning causes death.

Careless handling of food before cooking or serving, improper home canning, storing food too long at room temperature, and improper heating of leftover foods are the main cause of food contamination. So, in order not to endanger your family's health, be especially careful in preparing and storing food. Never let a cut or sore place on



**WORLD'S NEWEST SHOTGUN**

The world's first semi-automatic shotgun that stays on target shot after shot as fast as the trigger is pulled has just been unveiled by Winchester after 16 years of research.

To the nation's 20 million shooters, one important result of the new Model 50's unique design is that recoil is 30 per cent softer than the average semi-automatic.

The Model 50 is the world's first self-loading shotgun with a non-recoiling barrel. A new-type independent chamber which moves less than one-tenth of an inch starts the entire cycle of operation. The new design completely eliminates the slap and clatter usually associated with a semi-automatic.

To the shooter who catches himself flinching, or who dislikes the "double-shuffle" of an automatic, the big news is pictured in the two graphs above. They compare the recoil effect of the new Winchester with that of an average self-loader.

The lines at the bottom of each graph represent duration of recoil. The wavy lines show the force of recoil as measured on an oscilloscope. The energy from the recoil of all shotguns using the same ammunition is always the same. But the conventional 12 gauge semi-automatic reaches a maximum force of 130 pounds abruptly.

Recoil of the Model 50 is "easier" on the shooter because it is spread over more time. The maximum is only 93 pounds. Thus, while the recoil of a conventional auto-loader can be described as a punch, recoil of the new Model 50 is a gradual pushing action.

LOOKING AHEAD

By Dr. George A. Brown

AMERICANS TODAY MUST FACE THE FOLLOWING TWO VITAL FACTS: (1) Socialism in one form or another continues to expand its area of control across the earth; and (2) the only really effective backfire that could be built against the encroachment of this dark shadow must be built here in the United States. If we fail to build the backfire and keep it burning ever brighter through the next few years, civilization may be plunged backward into another Dark Age like the one which followed the collapse of the Roman Empire.

Yes, the situation is just that serious. The answer to this towering problem lies, I feel, in mobilizing a concerted effort among our whole U. S. population toward the building up of two kinds of strength—physical strength and moral strength. They go hand in hand. One cannot be maintained long without the other.

**Revivify of Service**

We can build the moral strength of America in only one way—by

each of us dedicating a larger portion of our lives to Christ, by stanching firm upon the mighty foundations of Christian principles given to mankind 2,000 years ago by the Son of God, and by developing an inexhaustible faith in the triumph of right over wrong. Each of us should make this his personal objective at the community, state and national levels.

The building of our physical strength can be limited only by how strong we make the productive might of our industries, our mines, forests and farms; and how steadfast we stand on the political and economic principles embedded in our constitutional government—from the grass roots up to Washington. Each citizen of America has as much a part in the building of this collective physical strength as he has in adding his faith and his dedication to the moral strength of the nation.

**Good System**

We have a system in America that we know is good. It has its faults of operation, but they are being corrected out of our experience as we advance. Our system likewise may be abused because of the earthly temptations that sometimes control imperfect people. But none of the faults can be traced to the fundamental structure of the system itself. The fundamental principles have been proved to be

the best combination possible, on the basis of our present knowledge, for everybody's welfare.

With our system we out-produce every other nation in the world by wide margins. In fact we produce almost as much as all the rest of the nations combined. During the last war, we did surpass the rest of the entire world in armament production. The living standard of the average American citizen is three times that of his counterpart in Europe, and at least five times that of the average citizen of Asia. American production today is the greatest deterrent to aggression by world Communism. And it serves too as an outright denial of the Soviets' claims that our American capitalism doesn't work for the good of all.

**Government's Help**

A healthy productive system must have incentives and an atmosphere stimulating to its growth. In this area government definitely plays a part. Sound government is necessary to the up-building and growth of American production. Sound government is

vital to our over-all national strength. Thus government soundness and health are vital factors in any problem requiring the full strength of our nation.

Our government can maintain these important qualities only if enough of our citizens sacrifice enough time from more pleasurable pursuits and engage actively in governmental affairs. Our local, state and national governments represent the sum total of the intelligence and the political action of our citizenry.

And so, our own self-interest and the safety of our national and personal freedom depend upon each of us becoming more active in religious, economic, and public affairs.

Charges and countercharges flew fast as the race for governor rounded the turn for the final lap. Judge Ralph W. Yarborough, quick to accuse Allan Shivers of misdeeds, found fault with state printing contracts awarded to the Times Publishing Co. of Mission because Shivers had been a stockholder in the company in 1946. From Attorney General John Ben Shepperd came the report that "I have investigated the whole transaction and there is nothing wrong with it. The contracts, Shepperd said, amounted to only about one per cent of the state's printing business and it went to the Mission firm on the basis of low bids.

Another Yarborough charge was that Shivers had withdrawn the Rangers from politically-hot Duval County.

This statement, said Ranger Captain Alfred Allee, was "utterly untrue". Captain Allee testified that the Rangers are still in Duval County.

And Colonel Homer Garrison, director of Public Safety, asserted that no request had been made to pull the law officials out of George Parr's domain. Yarborough's political promises came in for attack. When he pledged himself, if elected, to support a Galveston County project—a \$5-million bridge across San Luis Pass—a statement came from John S. Redditt of Lufkin.

Reditt, former chairman of the state Highway Commission, former state senator, and former president of the Texas Good Roads Association, said: "In all my experience with the Texas Highway Department, it has operated without this kind of political interference from the governor, the Legislature, or any other source. This policy has given Texas the nation's finest roads peculiarly expended."

Yarborough Campaign  
Otherwise, in his campaign speeches, Yarborough:

Promised to build 40 new dams in South Texas.

Charged that a "vast army of state employees" had been forced to leave their jobs and campaign for Shivers.

Proposed the creation of a new Texas water board and advocated the investment by the state of \$400 million in water conservation projects.

Charged that Shivers had spent \$2 million in his first primary campaign.

Shivers Campaign  
In his campaign appearances, Shivers:

Rapped Yarborough for being "the only man I know of in Texas who has cast doubt on Texas' title claim to the 10 1/2 mile limit."

Charged that Yarborough misled Negro voters in the first primary.

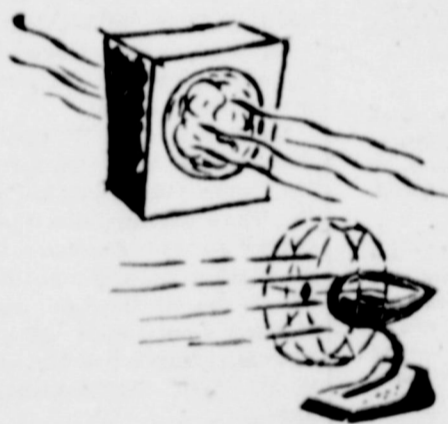
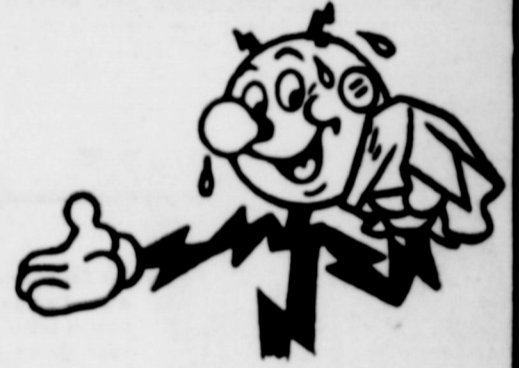

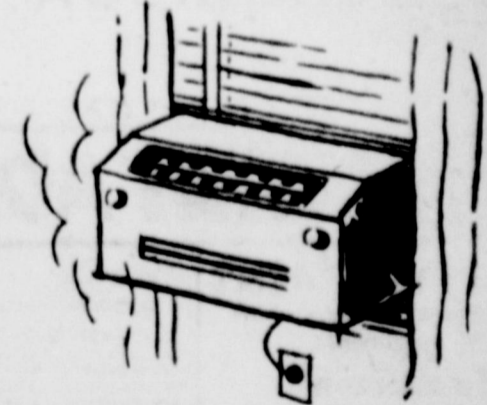

### Shivers Hits Those Opposing Old-Age Pension Raises

Governor Allan Shivers said this week that twisted facts and misrepresentations were hampering prospects for an increase in old age pensions.

He said the facts were being clouded in such a way by his opponent that the voters did not have a clear understanding that they have the right to cast ballots in November on increasing pensions.

He pointed out that the people will vote in November on a constitutional amendment to raise the ceiling on old age assistance.

"Many people do not realize that this question is not for Allan Shivers or Ralph Yarborough, to decide, but for the people themselves in the November election," the Governor said.

The Governor said misleading statements by Yarborough have confused the people to the point where it is crippling prospects of a fair vote on the amendment.

Shivers said that his opponent, a former district judge, has "never

lifted a finger to help increase old age pensions. Instead, he has worked diligently to increase pensions for retired judges.

"If he were really interested in old age pensions, he would have done the same thing for the old people of Texas that he has done for the retired judges. He has appeared before the Legislature urging \$400 a month pensions for the judges, but he has never walked the six blocks from his office to the State Capitol where the Legislature meets, to recommend even so much as one dollar more for the old folks.

"I do not really believe he wants to do anything about old age pensions, or other problems of Texas people, except to use them as a vehicle for meaningless campaign promises."

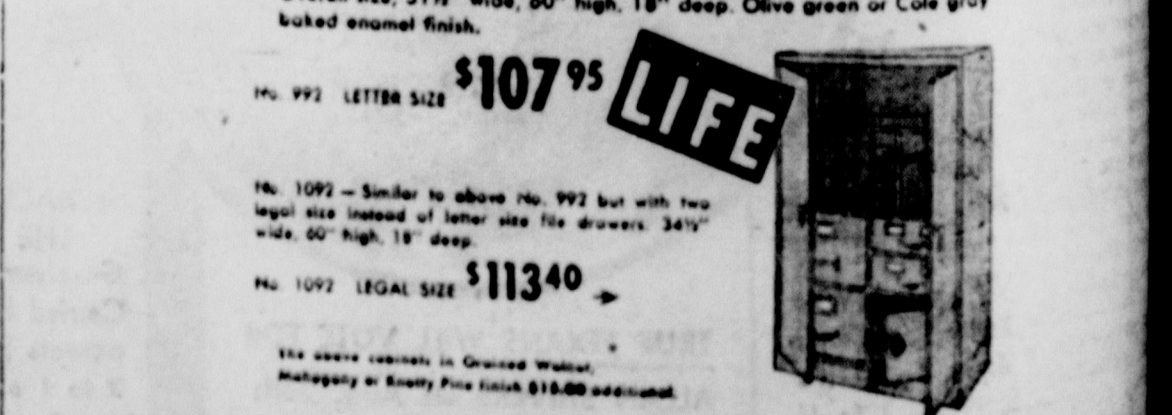
