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



Section 1. That Article III of the Contitution of the State of Texas be amended or adding thereto a new section, to be shown as Section 52-b, which shall read as follows:

Section 2. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.






